Senators Broaden Aid Plan

WASHINGTON, May 23 (UPI)—The senate voted today to broaden the scope of its \$2,500,000,000 aid to education bill.

The bill, which the senate approved 50 to 39 on Monday, expands the purposes for which federal school funds could be spent. The amendment, introduced by Sen. Winston L. Proudy, R., Idaho.

To the major purposes of the administration's bill—construction of public elementary and high schools and aid to teachers and principals—Proudy's proposal would add maintenance and operating expenses, such as heating, school transportation, textbooks and fuel, and salaries of non-teaching employees and the like.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D., Ore., floor manager for the bill, obtained a clarifying change in language that funds could be used to finance transportation and books for private schools in states which pay such private school expenses. The amendment was supported Proudy's amendment.

It was the first change made in a committee-approved school bill in a week of amendments. Legislation aides were understood to be reluctant to accept the amendment, but without much enthusiasm.

No casualties were reported in the earthquake, which was felt in an area south of Athens at 10:45 a.m. EDT yesterday. But 16 people were killed in the Aegean islands and buildings tumbled around them. Reports from Lemnos said hundreds of houses were destroyed or damaged at Marmaris, Ula and other spots on the Turkish southeastern coast.

Board Okays Ordinance on Fee Changes

The Twin Falls city commission Monday evening approved an ordinance amending ordinance which set a fee for water service connection charges, and a resolution stating a standard pool on street corners and on both sides, and under the water service connection charges will be \$100 for a three-fourths-inch tap; \$150 for a one-inch tap; \$200 for a one-half-inch tap; and \$250 for a two-inch tap, and payment of actual cost of "drop" and "main" work, connection to a tap over two inches in diameter.

The resolution pertains to curbs and commercial driveways within the city limits and sets a standard policy regarding street and alley improvements, grading, excavating and surfacing.

Cost of materials to be paid by property owners for standard residential streets, is \$1 per running foot for crushed rock and \$2 per running foot for two-inch concrete.

The resolution states that only streets which have approved curbs and gutters on both sides, and which are connected to another paved street, will be considered for paving improvements, except in special cases where one-half of a standard street may be paved, but only if the street is less than 30 feet commercial, 44 feet, and 66 feet residential.

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—The justice department geared today for a possible long line of criminal prosecutions over Alabama's freedom riders racial violence. A force of FBI agents, freed from the area over the weekend, made its first arrests late yesterday and more officers are being sent to the area.

The justice department indicated it would seek stiff penalties. It said it has 100 indictments filed against 100 persons in Alabama's ban on integrated bus seating.

In the initial arrests, four men were taken into custody by FBI agents in Birmingham. They were charged with the fire bombing of an interstate bus near the city May 14.

The offense carries penalties up to 30 years in prison and a fine of \$10,000.

The Anniston incident, in which the mob of white men broke the bus windows and tossed in a firebomb, was the first of the past week-end.

John F. Kennedy announced the Anniston arrests late yesterday after a 45-minute conference at the White House with his brother, President Kennedy.

John P. (Whizzer) White, deputy attorney general who has been in Alabama several days, flew into Birmingham Monday to talk over the situation with the attorney general. He and Kennedy conferred until about 2:30 p.m.

John Steinhilber, administrative assistant to the attorney general, said the justice department would go for their county in the morning and talked by telephone with the president.

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Guardsmen Keep Peace

MONTGOMERY, Ala., May 23 (UPI)—Tension outwardly eased off in this racially torn city today, but the slightest sign of trouble brought an immediate response from armed national guardsmen. There were indications that a group of freedom riders whose arrival in this "cradle of the confederacy" touched off rioting Saturday—decided at a meeting last night that the freedom ride must continue.

An aide for Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy in Washington declared that the city is "hot and so."

But on the surface it was "business-as-usual" in this white-dominated city on the banks of the Alabama river.

Four police officers of guardsmen, uniformed in their unaccustomed uniforms, walked the streets of Montgomery today, looking in shop windows and at the girls. Jeeps patrolled the streets at night.

The Rev. Martin Luther King announced at a press conference that he will be in Montgomery Saturday at 8 o'clock and he did not specify when.

The riders prior to rioting here had planned to make a bus trip from Montgomery to Jackson, Miss., and then to Birmingham.

The federalizing of a clash between race rioters and guardsmen during the past 24 hours was a brief incident of light at the Greyhound bus terminal, some of Saturday's bloody rioting.

About 100 additional guardsmen joined the military troops at the terminal when rioters spread that more freedom riders were on their way. A small group of hard-core segregationists turned out at the terminal.

Five white men were ordered out of the station by a squad of guardsmen after one of them said that a group of freedom riders would be coming to the station.

Some of the white men were taken to a hospital, where they were treated for injuries.

SEOUL, Korea, May 23 (UPI)—The U. S. embassy today expressed "deep concern" over the dissolution of political parties by the military junta that seized power over the Republic of Korea a week ago.

A decree ordering the parties dissolved was issued yesterday and became effective today. It came as a shock to most Americans and Koreans in Seoul.

Some American officials feared the new military rulers might be only temporary measures, but that the junta would follow through with its original promise to restore democratic processes as soon as possible.

The new ruling military junta and the United Nations command said they are in agreement on the return of all South Korean armed forces to the control of U. N. commander Gen. Curtis E. LeMay.

Mr. Gen. Paik Chung Hi, commander of the UN forces, said he would be in Seoul today to confer with the junta.

ROCKET CENTER, W. Va., May 23 (AP)—Investigators today sought the cause of an explosion at the Allegheny Ballistics Laboratory (ABL) that killed nine workers. They declined to speculate on the cause of the blast.

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Teamsters in West Present Pay Demands

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23 (AP)—Teamster talks with western truck companies will resume on June 5, at which time the employers will offer their counter proposals to union demands.

The teamsters yesterday stated their goals for a new contract covering 100,000 members in western states. Teamsters International President James R. Hoffa presided at the meeting here.

Their proposal asked for pay increases of about 50 cents an hour for local drivers and 30 cents an hour for long distance drivers, spread out over a three-year period. This would boost the rate to \$4.10 per hour and \$2.75.

Case of Tick Fever Liked

BOISE, May 23 (AP)—Idaho has recorded its first case of tick fever, according to the state health department.

State Health Administrator T. O. Carver said yesterday the case was reported in Valley county. He noted that the first case last year was in June and the final one in October.

Dr. Carver said there were 109 cases in all reported in 1960—seven in Valley county and four in Boise county.

A number of those cases, he said, were fishermen and campers in these counties.

"If illness should occur within four to seven days following a tick bite," Carver said, "it may possibly be a tick borne disease and the individual should call his family physician."

Carver also reported that 100 diseases were recorded last week by 47 physicians. Another 144 doctors did not submit reports.

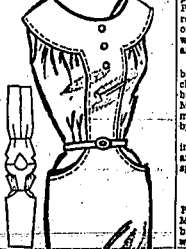

The constant cry of healthy children is "What can I do?" They are full of energy that must be used to forward their growth.

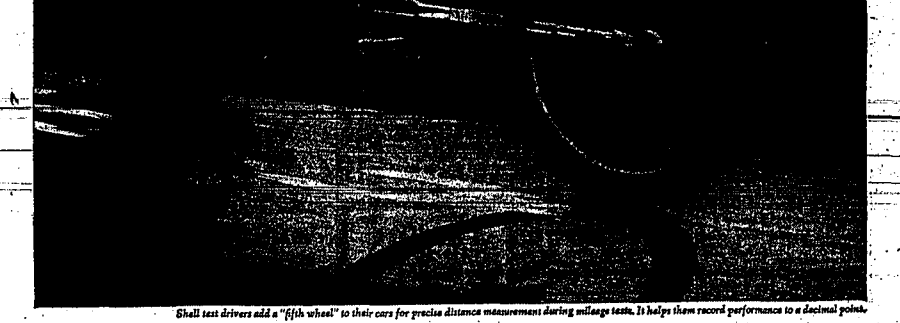

Richards to Be Manager in All-Star Game

BOSTON, May 23 (AP)—Paul Richards of the Baltimore Orioles Monday was named American League all star team manager by President Joe Cronin.

The selection of Richards, named Associated Press All manager of the year in 1950, marks the third time since 1925 that the tradition of naming the previous year's national winning pilot has been broken.

The retirement of Casey Stengel, who managed the New York Yankees in the major circuit for a year ago, necessitated the action. Other candidates would have qualified automatically for the slot honor.

"I would be proud and pleased to have any one of our present managers fill in for Casey," Cronin said. "But I feel Richards earned the honor through his fine job last season."

Richards, 35, a native of Wash. D.C., who blended youth and experience into a surprise second place finish for his Orioles last year, told Cronin he was delighted to take the assignment.

The two all star games this season will be played in San Francisco July 11 and Boston July 31. The eight starting players, pitchers excepted, will be picked next month by the vote of all active American league players, managers and coaches. Richards will select the remainder of the squad—pitchers, two coaches, a catcher and a trainer.

The 1950 and 1951 all star games were on the only other occasions when the American league's previous pennant winning manager did not serve.

In the 1940 all star contest, Joe McCarthy of the Yankees was the club in place of Mickey Cochrans of the 1935 champion Detroit Tigers. Again in 1940 Cronin was the runner-up to Boston Red Sox was selected in place of McCarthy.

Fish Diet Probe Is Slated for Richfield Canal

The Idaho fish and game department entered a one-year study of fish growth and diet this week when they planted the Richfield canal with 7,000 trout. Stacy Edwards, district fish biologist, notes this may well be the first time in Idaho an irrigation canal has been planted with trout.

Primary reason is to ascertain the value of fresh water shrimp in fish diets. The canal contains millions of the eighth-inch larva water.

Some 5,000 of the fish, with clipped fins for identification, are ranged about 7 1/2 inches. The other 2,000 ranged from 12 to 14 inches. These have been marked with jaw tags.

Edwards' asked "Magic" Valley fishermen to cooperate in the study by reporting the number on the small circular metal tag, exact location of where the fish was taken and its size and length.

"We expect the fish to do very well on the fresh water shrimp," Edwards said. "We planted Friday and by Monday the fish already were eating the shrimps almost exclusively. We expect them to grow rapidly and provide excellent fishing, before the end of this summer."

There are several other streams and reservoirs where gassed fish will probably be taken this summer. These include Big and Little Wood rivers; Mackay and Salmon Falls reservoirs; Lake Walcott, and the upper Salmon and mid-dlefork of the Salmon river.
