62 Might Be Dead In Crash

LISBON, May 30 (UPI)—A chartered DC-3 airliner with 62 passengers aboard crashed into the Atlantic ocean a few hundred yards off a Portuguese beach today.

Debris and bodies from the downed airliner were found in the sea less than a mile from the resort village of Cascais, a few miles south of the River Tago.

The plane had been chartered to the Hawaiian Islands by KLM Royal Dutch airlines. It was bound from Rome to Cascais, Portugal, and then to the United States were aboard.

There were no signs of survivors of the crash which happened four minutes after the four-jet airliner took off from a Lisbon airport at 11:15 a.m. for Santa Cruz in the Azores, next stop on the trans-Atlantic flight.

Officials said 48 passengers including 10 children, and 14 crew members were on the plane.

Dozens of American and Portuguese ships and planes have been searching for the missing airliner for more than 12 hours after it was suddenly reported to have crashed.

Airport officials said the jetliner took off into a still northerly wind with a gusty breeze. Conditions were "not especially bad."

The passengers and crew included 10 children, 10 Portuguese, 10 Italian, 10 Dutch, New Zealanders and 2 French women.

Woman Files \$50,000 Case Against Store

WASHINGTON, May 30—Democratic leaders have called to vote for a cooling-off period until Republican political attacks until President Kennedy has talked with Soviet Premier Khrushchev in Vienna.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Montana, urged a truce to suspend at least temporarily the kind of foreign policy blunts at the President with which the GOP has the political battle over the week-end.

"This is not the time, with the Khrushchev talks approaching, for anyone to become political or partisan in the foreign policy arena," Mansfield said. "Rather it is the time for all Americans to come to the aid and support of their President."

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, Minnesota, the assistant Democratic leader, in a separate interview he recognizes the Republicans' right to criticize foreign policy decisions, but he said he thinks the country would benefit by a little more unity behind their President.

Republicans gave no sign, however, of any let-up in wide-ranging criticism of Kennedy's foreign and domestic policies in which they have been busy since the Vienna meeting.

Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois, senate Republican leader, said the situation in the case that he believes Kennedy could blunder the nation into war was "unfathomable."

Republican National Chairman Thurston B. Morton told an Albuquerque, N. M., audience that the prestige of the United States had "plummeted to an all-time low."

Summit Talks Might Become Verbal Battle

PARIS, May 30—President Kennedy's Vienna meeting with Premier Khrushchev can develop into a free-ranging verbal assault that would leave each leader with few illusions about the other, advance pronouncements from Moscow indicate.

Joseph G. Thompson, a Washington correspondent, says that the President of the United States has no choice but to expect a verbal battle with Khrushchev and his associates.

Warn Russia, GOP Officials Tell Kennedy

WASHINGTON, May 30—GOP congressional leaders have urged President Kennedy to tell Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev that their meeting next week-end may be his last unless Russia shows evidence of good faith.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen and House GOP Leader Charles A. Halleck said in a joint statement that the President also should caution Khrushchev against any further Soviet stalling in negotiations.

The statement was made among an outpouring of remarks by members of both political parties in the House and Senate.

House Speaker Carl Albert said he would like to see the President talk to be held next Saturday and Sunday in Vienna. "Other statements included that the President should make it clear to Khrushchev that the meeting could be his last unless Russia shows evidence of good faith."

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Optimistic

LONDON, May 30—The East European communist press and radio are cautiously optimistic about the Vienna meeting of President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Khrushchev.

Some British official papers see the President going into the talks the underdog.

"They are not saying it will solve important world problems, as they did last year of the abortive May summit session in Paris. But they are expressing hope it will lead to a series of summit conferences where such problems can be solved."

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Mrs. Khrushchev Shadows Mrs. Kennedy's Paris Visit

PARIS, May 30—She is a plump, motherly looking woman but her darting eyes and flashing intelligence belie the homely impression she tries hard to convey.

Her name is Mrs. Nikita Khrushchev. And her shadow will fall over Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy for at least the first few hours of the state visit President John F. Kennedy and his wife will make to Paris this week.

Mrs. Khrushchev was here a little over a year ago, but her personal conquest is still fresh in French memories. She shook many hands, answered many questions, allowed herself to be mobbed by the people in a department store where she escorted her two daughters.

It was all so delightfully informal—on the surface. And all so shrewdly calculated—in the opinion of some observers—down to the last warm smile at the plane's door.

The American Embassy was convinced today that given the choice Mrs. Kennedy could easily make a more lasting impression on the French than the wife of the Russian leader.

She starts with two qualities which have never been admired by Frenchmen—youth and beauty. She is of French descent and she speaks French, which is almost enough by itself to endear her to everybody in the country (except the communists).

But she may be handicapped by the official program which places her in the White House for barely three days. The Khrushchevs were here a week.

Thus—Mrs. Khrushchev, even though she also attended all the official functions that accompanied the Khrushchev-De Gaulle talks, had more time in which to impress her public image as the mother of a happy family, typical of many in her own country.

She never put a foot wrong. If she had a security guard it kept well out of sight. Whenever she went to a children's hospital and to a school, for example—the in-laws of the Kennedy-Khrushchev marriage suggested the visit to a big department store and a crowd of 10,000 turned up to see her.

The Kennedy's will be here Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The tight schedule does not allow Mrs. Kennedy much opportunity to go out among the people. She has only Thursday morning free and with so many friends in this city where she was a student she may spend some of the time renewing old acquaintances.

Even so Mrs. Kennedy, her photogenic face already adorning many magazines and newspapers, figures to give the other Mrs. K. quite a run for the French popularity.

Jerome Will Be Site for Annual Area Iris Show

JEROME, May 30—The tenth annual Magic Valley Iris show will be held Saturday and Sunday at the Jefferson school, North Pole, Jerome. The theme will be "Parade of Iris."

All entries should be in between 8 and 11 a.m. Saturday, judging will begin at 11 a.m. The show will open to the public at 2 p.m. The show will be open from noon to 2 p.m. Sunday. Exhibitors may pick up their arrangements from 8 to 10 p.m. Sunday.

Everyone in Magic Valley is invited to exhibit. There is no entry fee. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in each class, except the seedling class.

Cultural classes will be judged by accredited exhibition judges of

the American Iris society. The show committee will not be responsible for loss or breakage, but will exercise every effort possible to protect exhibitors' property, according to Mrs. S. M. Hargis, show chairman.

Certificate for silver medal of the American Iris society will be awarded the exhibitor winning the most first prize points in the cultural division. Certificate for bronze medal of the American Iris society will be awarded the exhibitor winning the second greatest number of first prize points in the cultural division. In case of tie, second and third prize will be counted.

A purple rosette ribbon of the American Iris society will be awarded to the best Iris specimen in the show and the sweepstakes class. A purple rosette ribbon will be awarded to the best arrangement. A special prize will be given to arrangement receiving the most

popular vote of the public. Exhibition certificates may be awarded to the outstanding numbered seedling as the judge deems desirable. The prize lists, blue first prize, yellow second prize, white third prize will be given in all classes entries merit. Additional prizes of Iris rhizomes will be offered by local growers as shown on lists of awards.

Trophies will be awarded to the sweepstakes winner of the entire show with the most blue ribbon, the winner of the show, artistic sweepstakes and the best seedlings. Special prizes will be awarded in the invitation class.

All Iris in the cultural classes must be grown by the exhibitor and must be correctly named and labeled. Containers for specimen classes will be furnished by the show committee. Containers for the collection classes must be furnished by the exhibitors and should be marked on the bottom with the owner's name.

Entries in the cultural division may be groomed if necessary; dried flowers should be carefully removed. Mrs. Hargis stated.

The various classifications include Group A, specimen stalk, tall bearded Iris, one stalk to contain; Group B, includes miscellaneous bearded Iris, one stalk to contain; Group C, three stalks, same variety, tall bearded Iris, any stalk; Group D, is a collection of tall bearded Iris, each a different variety; Group E, special display of iris—educational display—advance entry required. This classification is for commercial growers only and is non-competitive.

Group F is a collection of Iris other than tall bearded. Group G is the seedlings which must be numbered and raised from seed by exhibitor. Numbered seedlings sold commercially must not be entered.

In group G the seedlings should be one stalk, preferably one variety. Limit is five varieties of any type, such as bearded or beardless and they may be only one stalk to a container.

The flowers will be judged with

a total of 35 possible points including 10 points for color, according to variety; 5 points for size, 10, form, and 10 substitute. The stalk will be judged 15 points for branch balance and bud placement. Fifteen points will be given for the grooming of the specimen and 20 for cultural perfection.

The collections will be judged with 10 points for uniformity of height; 20 points, spectacle value including color harmony; 30 points, cultural perfection, and 20 points condition (well groomed).

There are two basket classifications, low basket and tall basket. There is also two corsage classifications, Iris alone and Iris with other flowers.

In the junior division there are four classifications; arrangement with Iris only, arrangement with Iris and other flowers; unnamed Iris, one stalk, and unnamed or unidentified Iris, collection of three different stalks.

In the non-competitive classification includes Iris received after entries close at 11 a.m. and display of single named variety in individual container and collection of three different small bearded Iris.

The judging standards for the artistic designs include 25 points for design including balance and color; 25 points, color harmony; 20 points, distinction and originality; 20 points, suitability and adherence to schedule; and 10 points on condition.

Chrysler Moves New Car Review

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., May 29 (AP)—The annual press preview of Chrysler corporation's new automobile models will be moved away from Miami Beach this fall, but the auto firm didn't announce when.

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Senator Cites New Frontier Inconsistency

Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Id., demonstrated the inconsistency in benefit distribution formulas of the "new frontier" federal aid programs.

"Both bills define which are the poor states and which are the rich states, and set out that the rich states . . . can afford to pay for the poor states. But the states keep switching sides," he said.

Pennsylvania, for example, was listed as a "poor" state under the unemployment, compensation, extension bill (H.R. 4506), and Idaho was a "rich" state, Senator Dworshak said.

Senator Dworshak submitted facts and figures showing that under the education bill Pennsylvania would "provide an extra \$1.9 million dollars for the same states from which three months ago it collected \$4.3 million dollars."

Continuing his remarks, Senator Dworshak said: "Under the 'new frontier' there is a trend toward the philosophy that someone can get something for nothing from the U.S. government."

He would like to emphasize that the government has no access to mysterious sources of income. The only money that we can distribute is the money we take either directly or indirectly from the pockets of the taxpayers."
