Report Says Dominican's Chief Killed

Dominican strongman Rafael Leonidas Trujillo, most durable dictator of the western hemisphere, was reported today to have been assassinated. White House Press Secretary Philip Salinger announced the assassination of President Trujillo to newsmen in Paris. But in Washington a state department spokesman said that while the assassination report "seems to be true" the department could not flatly confirm it. Salinger said he got his information from a source who Kennedy who had talked in detail with Secretary of State Dean Rusk, but in Washington officials raised the possibility that the facts may have been garbled. While reporters rushed to telephone the source, Salinger left for a reception at Elizee palace and was not immediately available for further questioning. Trujillo has held a tight grip on the country for 31 years while other South American despots have come and gone. "It is our understanding that Rafael Trujillo has been assassinated," Salinger said. "President Kennedy has instructed Secretary of State Rusk to stay in Washington and keep close watch on events in the Dominican Republic. He has also instructed the reference to 'President Trujillo' was an error. Rafael Trujillo and his brother Hector both have served as presidents of the Dominican Republic. Rafael resigned Aug. 3, 1960, and was succeeded as president by Vice President Juan Bautista Tabares. (In Washington, a high state official today said that the assassination report "seems to be true," but that the department could not flatly confirm the report until further proof is available. SALT LAKE CITY, May 31 (AP)—Who blew apart three telephone relay stations in the West? Almost any theory asks.

Cranks? Someone with a grudge against the telephone company? It's cannot be ruled out, says Henry T. Killingsworth, a vice president of American Telephone and Telegraph company who inspected the damage yesterday.

Spies? Espionage agents out to sabotage our defense network? At least two responsible officials in Utah say this likelihood, or some variant of it, is no more fantastic than the devil itself.

If the federal bureau of investigation has any theories it is slipping them like everyting else it knows in this case to itself. Here's what it knows:

The stations, two microwave radio relay towers and a cable relay, or booster, installation, blew up simultaneously just before sunrise Sunday. The three are within 65 miles of each other—one just west of the Utah border in Nevada, the other two in western Utah.

The blasts knocked the stations out of a T and T's nation-wide communications network, but messages they were relaying were automatically switched to other circuits. This switching caused some electronic equipment elsewhere to become overloaded, blowing out some tubes and creating "chirp-falseto," it turned out—that similar installations had been blown up in other parts of the country.

Army demolition experts found some unexploded blocks of World war II-type explosives at one tower. They didn't say—perhaps they didn't learn—what type of device was used to touch them off. They said the explosives had been placed for maximum effect—and expertly. The demolition work had taken time to do.

The towers, though unattended, are checked frequently. Sheriff Fay Gillette of Toole county, in which two of the damaged stations are located, said the man who refuels the stations had been

asked: It wasn't a one-man job. "I've always felt that more than one person was behind this," Sheriff Gillette said yesterday. "The distance between them, the amount of work involved, and the amount of explosives that was used— I can't see that one or even two men could do it."

"That's why I've always eliminated a crank . . . Because usually those types don't get along with themselves, much less with other people in an undertaking like this." Utah's national guard commander, Maj. Gen. Maxuzell E. Huch, has suggested it could be

enemy agents trying to find out what would happen, and how this country would react. Utah Highway Patrol Supl. Lyle E. Huch said, "What happens that agree that this is possible. The housing experts' conservative guesses are that the nation will need 19 million new houses in the 1960's. Just to keep pace with the expected new family formation...

Prospects for getting these two major housing jobs done do not at this time seem unduly bright. Since 1960 saw only 1.27 million housing starts...

Most hope evidently is pinned to the prospect for down-payment, 40-year mortgage financing on homes costing \$9,000 to \$16,000.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The imposition of secrecy on key portions of the new and revised defense program has stirred Pentagon and congressional associates.

Like the Polaris nuclear submarine, they would present a movable target for enemy missile support teams. The first launching area for the missile man, which is eventually expected to have a range of 6,500 miles.

Following a test run on the Western and Midwest railroads, the program is to be launched in the 30 new proposed launching areas.

"Elusive target"—A recent article in "Modern Railroads" gave a detailed picture of a nuclear defense force on the first of its kind.

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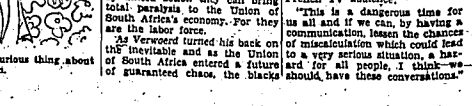

GOP Expects IKE to Attack Demo Policies

WASHINGTON, May 31—Republicans are looking to Dwight D. Eisenhower for a re-announced attack on the Kennedy administration's domestic policies at a party rally here tomorrow night.

The former president was represented by those who have talked to him recently as being in favor of a return to small government's new frontiers program as well as likely to call for a spending freeze threatening the stability of the dollar.

With Kennedy scheduled to begin informal talks in Vienna Saturday with Soviet Premier Khrushchev, Eisenhower is expected to refrain from any attacks on foreign policy at this time.

The presence of his brother, Dr. Milton Eisenhower, on the Tractors for Freedom committee is regarded as an indication that the former president will not join other Republicans in criticizing the administration's domestic policies.

While Democrats don't think they will like what he says, they are cooperating with Republicans to out the cost of staging the dinner. The GOP helped reduce the expenses of a similar 6,000-pole party in Kennedy's domestic policy program last Saturday night.

While the offices of the two national committees have gone about their usual business of exchanging political insults in public, they have collaborated privately to share the cost of building "platforms," training outfits, and transporting tables and chairs. Both committees thus saved several thousand dollars.

State's Roads Not Adequate For Increase

NEW YORK, May 31—Idaho's registered passenger cars will increase by about 20,000 by 1965, according to a study disclosed by the nation's largest industrial finance company.

The economics department of CIT corporation said this 12 per cent increase will overburden the Gem state road system unless the state takes full advantage of the stepped-up federal highway program.

The department said the passenger car registration will be about 268,800 by 1965 compared with the mid-1959 total of 240,037. The study also forecast a population gain since the 1950 census of 64 per cent, or more than 42,775 persons, within five years, bringing the state's total to 700,975.

The latest burden of public roads reports on Idaho's road system showed that at the start of 1960 it totaled 42,534 miles, of which 16,365 miles were unimproved and thus inadequate.

The study said a large amount of the state's 26,033 miles of surfaced roads were not up to the standard to safely and efficiently handle modern traffic.

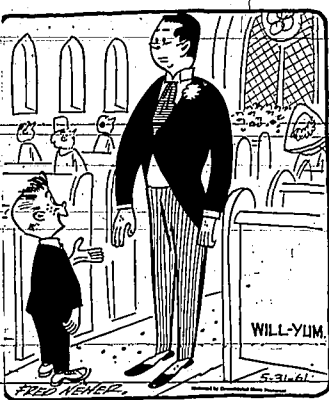

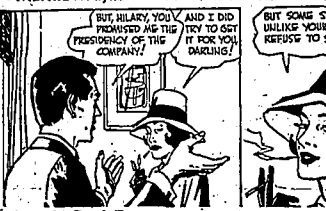

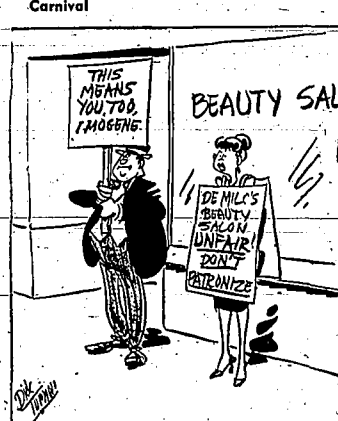
