The government announced today a communique issued by the army forces of Trujillo's chauffeur, Capt. Zacarias de la Cruz, also died from wounds received in the attack but lived long enough to give authorities details of the slaying.

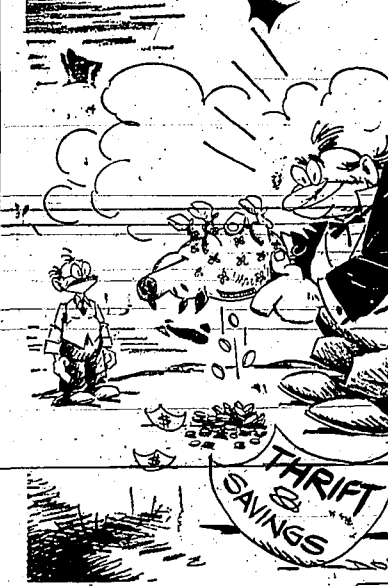

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Turncoat Gets Fined \$500 in In Traffic Suit

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. June 1 (AP)—Claude Batchelor, 38, one of the rascals of the Jordan star, was fined \$500 and had his driver's license suspended for six months yesterday at his trial for manslaughter in a traffic accident.

Batchelor pleaded nolo contendere (neither way), hoping to save himself from having his federal parole revoked and having to serve 18 years remaining of a 20-year sentence for collaborating with the Chinese communists.

If Batchelor had contested the manslaughter charge and been found guilty, he would have served in danger of having his parole revoked.

District Judge Charles Orme gave Batchelor 30 days to raise the \$500 fine.

Interstate Bill Of Million Per Mile Is Eyed

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—A million dollars a mile—that's the price the Interstate Commerce Commission is considering for the 41,000-mile interstate highway network.

The senate public works committee yesterday approved a house-passed bill that would bring to 41 billion dollars the authorization for spending on the federal highway system, first enacted by congress in 1954.

The new legislation would hike the authorization by 11.5 billion dollars to keep construction on schedule. The 41 billion dollar total would include the 10 per cent matching share paid by the states.

Just as the house had done, the senate committee refused to extend the program of bonus payments to states which agreed to limit billboards along the interstate routes. President Kennedy had recommended that the payments be doubled. They are due to expire June 30.

The public works committee also approved a program designed to guard against pollution of the nation's rivers and streams. The current version of an administration proposal called for \$40 million dollars in grants over five years to states and communities to build waste treatment facilities.

Hot Weather Due for West

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The weather bureau says it expects temperatures during the next 30 days to average below seasonal normals over most of the eastern half of the nation with greatest departures over the Midwest.

Above normal temperatures are predicted for Texas and for areas west of the continental divide except for near to below normal over the far Southwest.

Precipitation is expected to equal or exceed normal over most of the nation except for sub-normal amounts in the Pacific Northwest, the west Gulf states and the upper Great Lakes.

Mrs. Clara Boag Dies in Colorado

DENVER, June 1 (AP)—Mrs. Clara Boag, 23, widow of a cowboy who was fatally injured in a rodeo accident three years ago, died Tuesday in Colorado General hospital.

She had been hospitalized since March 19 for a heart ailment.

Mrs. Boag's husband, Bill, died in New York City Sept. 30, 1958, four days after he was pinned under a barbed wire fence during a Madison Square Garden rodeo event. Boag, 25, was from Denver and Portland, Ore.

Mrs. Boag was arena secretary for the Rodeo Cowboys association. She was a native of Idaho. She was a granddaughter of D. M. McGary, Nampa, Ida., and the daughter of Mrs. Nola Albertson, Boise.

New Machine Can Massage Human Heart

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1 (AP)—A machine capable of massaging the heart without surgery has been successfully tested on human patients. It was announced here Tuesday.

The machine, developed by Dr. George A. Harkins and Mr. L. Branson at the Professor's Presbyterian Medical center, was first demonstrated at a scientific meeting in Boston last month.

Harkins is a surgeon and Branson is an engineer.

Consisting of a pulsing device and a padded plunger mounted above a hard mattress, the machine is designed to be actuated by gas pressure, its designers said in a report prepared for the Journal of Experimental Surgery.

The mechanical beat can be geared directly to even feeble electric current from the heart muscle itself, the report said.

The machine is based on a technique for closed-chest heart massage announced by researchers at Johns Hopkins university last year. Before the external method of massage was developed, surgeons could only restore the heartbeat by opening the chest cavity and squeezing the heart by hand.

Way Eased to Acquire Land For Park Use

WASHINGTON, June 10—Two new steps designed to speed state and local acquisition of public park and recreational lands were announced yesterday by the Interior Department.

One new regulation will permit state and local governments to purchase recreation areas from the national land reserve for \$100 an acre or less, down from \$200 an acre per year.

Under the new rule, the state or local government will pay as high as 50 percent of the fair market value for recreation lands. The other change substantially increases the amount of land that may be acquired annually for park purposes.

The limit is raised from 647 acres to 12,000 acres a year, in not more than six tracts, through 1967.

In subsequent years the limit will be 6,400 acres, involving not more than three tracts.

The secretary also announced two joint agreements with the conservation field.

One agreement spells out 13 specific responsibilities relating to timber, sales practices of the department. The other provides for opportunities for interested officials to work with a committee of three Canadians on common conservation problems.

The uniform timber practice agreement applies to 10 states in western Oregon by the forest service of the agriculture department and the state bureau of land management.

Some provisions have wider scope and apply to all states and apply to certain practices of interior's Indian bureau on Indian lands in the Pacific Northwest.

On other matters Udel said:

24-Hour Alert Kept on River By 1,000 Men

BONNERS FERRY, June 10—More than 1,000 men kept a 24-hour watch on the Kootenai river today but the flood threat seemed to have passed as the water continued to recede.

Dikes have been affected by the river and rainfall earlier this week, however, and this still left some element of danger.

Included among those patrolling the dikes were army engineers, civilian volunteers and national guardsmen.

Army engineer spokesman Gil Bean said no further recruiting of manpower would be required at the present time. He said the men patrolled since the flood threat started on May 26 when adequate to keep the dikes bolstered and watch for bolts or seepage.

The Kootenai hit a crest of 31.3 feet Monday. Late yesterday the level dropped to an even 30 feet.

Some 1,000 acres have been flooded by the river. The area flooded included 800 acres in a drainage district across the river from here, and 165 acres where dikes broke this week near the Canadian border.

Water flooding was reported in basements of homes of the homes near Twin Falls and in the Bonners Ferry high school basement. The schoolyard also had been turned into a small lake from more than 20,000 sandbags have been piled against seepage dikes during the past week at all available manpower was put to work to protect this town of 1,700—the largest city in Blaine county.

Some 44,000 acres of rich wheat and pastureland were protected by dikes to a 37-foot level. But the army engineers moved in when the Kootenai rose to a 33-foot level and bolstered the dikes to withstand higher levels.

The town itself had experienced major flooding in 1948 although some dikes broke and pastureland was flooded in 1955.

Soviets Block Plan to Help Team in Laos

GENEVA, June 10—The Soviet Union has again blocked a western attempt to strengthen the hand of troops in the main areas of Laos to help the anti-communist government.

The Soviets countered by charging the West with trying to avoid getting to the main areas of Laos to help the future of the Southeast Asian kingdom along the path of independence and neutrality.

The East-West conference was still bogged down today on what to discuss in the largest meeting of the kind since the war. The talks have really been restored in Laos.

U. S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman charged the communist Premier Lao with delay tactics. He said the rebels refused to discuss the terms of the talks behind their backs.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Grigori Pavlov said the meeting has been in effect since the beginning of May. He brushed aside the charge that the West was trying to force the issue and declared they did not need any more authority.

British Ambassador MacDonald backed Harriman and declared he did not see how the Indo-China talks could be carried out unless it is to carry out his investigation whenever and wherever it is desired.

The Soviet Union and Britain as co-chairmen of the East-West conference must both approve any instructions to the commission.

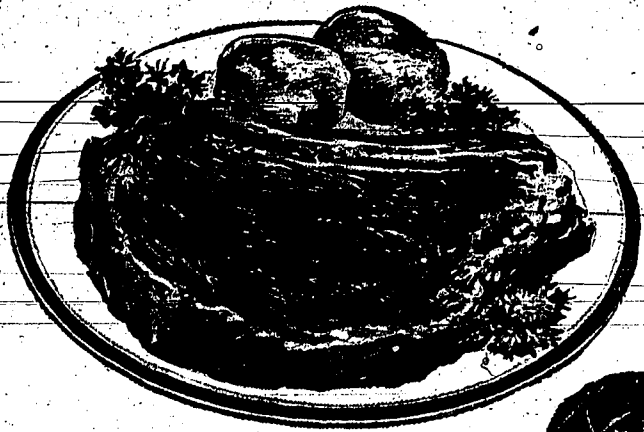

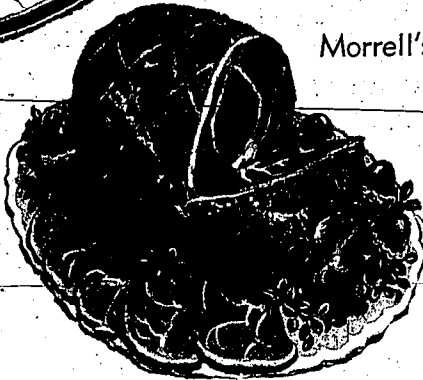

Trujillo's Death May Mean Violent Results for Nation

NEW YORK, June 1.—The death of Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo could have violent results in the Dominican Republic, according to observers here.

Alfonso Cano, a leader of the Dominican liberation movement, predicted last night there might be a "bloody revolt" in the Caribbean country.

Cano, long associated with anti-Trujillo movements here, said the revolt might erupt because "no result of Trujillo's death, even more terror has befallen our enslaved nation."

He said the movement was "confident that the Dominican people will increase the effort to bring freedom to the Dominican Republic."

But Cano said "as of this date the death of Trujillo has caused no change in the dictatorial government which oppresses the Dominican people. President Joaquin Balaguer has been a puppet of Trujillo. We expect no more from him than from his late master."

"The killing of Trujillo does not guarantee freedom in the Dominican Republic."

A Latin American affairs expert at Columbia University, Prof. Frank Tannenbaum said Trujillo's death "could have very explosive results."

"If the killing was at the hands of insiders in the ruling clique," he said, "it could only mean a shift of dictators."

"But, if it is the work of an agent of liberal forces, it could have very explosive results—and rapidly."

The Dominican consul, Dr. Luis Sotero, had no comment on Trujillo's assassination.

A spokesman for three Dominican exile groups said they believed Trujillo's death "should give impetus to a great democratic movement in the Dominican Republic."

The good-buy list consists of asparagus, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, celery, eggplant, western iceberg lettuce, new-crop green onions, New Jersey big Boston lettuce, California new crop potatoes, green Italian squash and watermelon.

Best buys among fruits are oranges, grapefruit, strawberries and watermelon.

Cantaloupes, honeydew melons, pineapples and lemons are good buys.



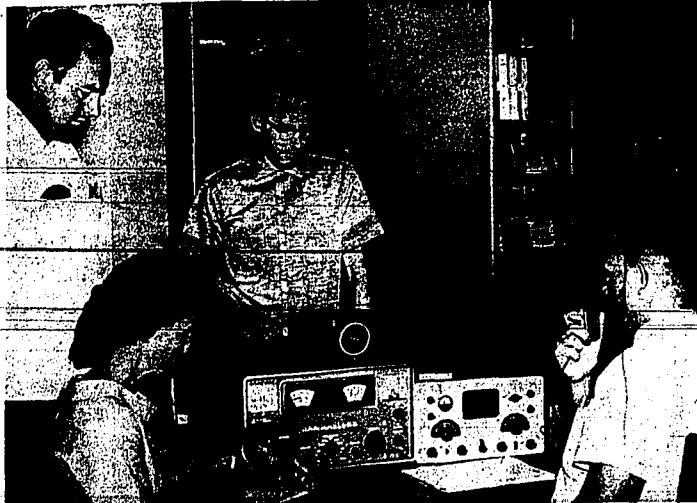

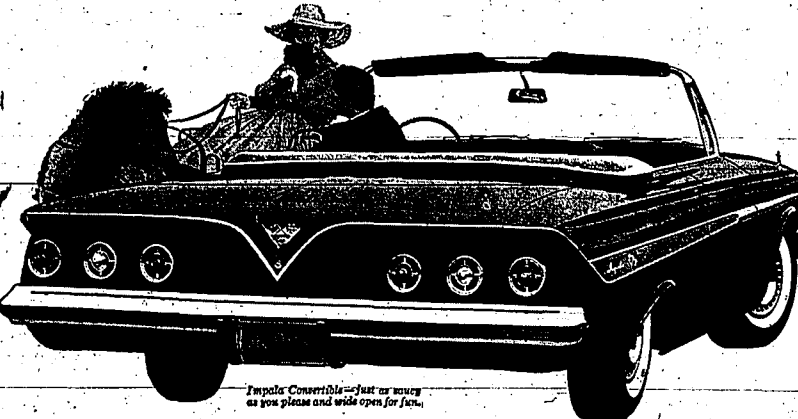

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges has reported more good news about the economy.

U. S. Trouble In Dominican Only Starting

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—This country's problem with the Dominican Republic is just beginning. The assassination of Benigno Batista Leonidas Trujillo did not solve anything.

The 69-year-old Trujillo, after 31 years of tyranny, had cultivated his particular time.

The middle class had risen to him. Batista had invited him. The Catholic church had denounced him. And all Latin American nations had broken relations with him.

He survived as long as he did on sheer muscle at a time when social revolutions were sweeping not only Latin America but the world. What cultivated him was this:

While all around him the masses of Latin America were demanding greater gratification of their desire for a better life, and a better part in it, he kept his

so-called republic frozen in the old ways.

Fidel Castro in Cuba is no less a dictator, with the same contempt for democratic processes. He would like to see the U.S. withdraw its troops from the island.

He is a rich life and a sense of belonging for the Cuban masses.

The United States understood this and learned to distinguish, through the disaster of the April invasion, that many Cubans promised better living, support Castro without apparent concern whether he is left or right.

It's an old lesson being relearned painfully around the world: Democracy to people who never really had it means nothing. What they want is to live longer better.

2 French Generals Sentenced To Serve 15 Years in Prison

PARIS, June 1 (AP)—Two generals who once held top posts in the French army were each sentenced to 15 years in prison last night for leading the Foreign Legion in Algeria two months ago.

Maurice Challe, 53, and Andre Zeller, 51, were spared from death by the special court of nine officers and civilian jurists set up under the emergency powers of the man they defied, President Charles de Gaulle.

The prosecution had asked life sentences for Challe, former commander of allied forces in Central Europe, and Zeller, former French army chief of staff. Only De Gaulle can lift their penalties—about 450 Armenians—33 per 100,000 population—are 100 years old or older.

Two other retired generals had joined Challe and Zeller in the military junta that seized power in Algeria in April and held it four days. Raoul Salan and Edmond

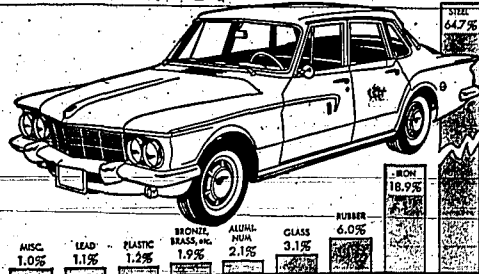

Intensive Study Started on Lead Contamination in Air

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The U.S. public health service today announced the start of intensive studies of lead contamination in the air over Cincinnati, Philadelphia and Los Angeles. Lead poisoning—from auto exhaust and other sources—can produce brain, liver and kidney damage. Results from preliminary studies conducted in the three cities do not provide any cause for alarm. But officials said they want to determine exact information about safe levels of human lead intake. The project, which is part of the health service's air pollution program, will begin almost immediately, continue for about a year and cost an estimated \$100,000. In reporting on preliminary results, officials said the level of lead found in the blood and urine of test groups in Philadelphia were well below the level generally regarded as safe.

The studies are an outgrowth of recommendations made two years ago by a special advisory committee. The air pollution division of the EPA will conduct the community studies in Philadelphia and Los Angeles in cooperation with city and state health officials. In Cincinnati, the study will be conducted by the Kettering laboratory of the University of Cincinnati, supported by funds from the Ebyl corporation and the E. DuPont de Nemours and company.

Senators Eye U. S. Failures On Aid Plans

BY J. M. ROBERTS

The spectre of a small Asiatic country, where millions of dollars and years of effort had failed to produce either government or people for their own defense against communism, hung over the senate foreign relations committee room Wednesday.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk opened the Kennedy government's campaign for a five-year foreign aid program envisioning the expenditure of nearly five billion dollars in the first year.

A message from the White House asked "40 million dollars" to get the peace corps experiment started.

Senators asked what was wrong with administrative measures which despite plenty of money and personnel on hand, permitted the development of such situations as Laos.

The diplomatic answer, as it developed beyond the broad general statement of need given by Rusk, is that the aid program over the years has restricted European commitments which are only inspected by its failures. And that its success will be greatly enhanced through the confidence inspired an dthe new stability promised by a continuing program.

The diplomats do not pretend to have found the answers in such cases as Laos, Ghana, Guinea and Cuba. The trouble-in-Poland-and-Yugoslavia are debatable. Only a beginning is being made in Latin America, where there has been a great deal of fumbling in an area where the United States should have known best how to act.

There are cross currents in Pakistan. They are due largely to jealousies and suspicions over the results of aid to India, and to Middle Eastern religious and political forces stemming from success in Israel and failure in Egypt. Korea is in ferment, weakening the worldwide defense line against communism. Friendship with everyone has proved only pious, not feasible.

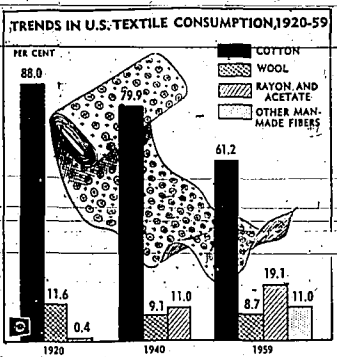
But Greece and Turkey stand firm on the southern flank of the European monument to the aid program. It has helped alleviate both political and economic consequences of the retreat of America's allies from Colombia, and so contributed to stability in the aftermath of worldwide revolution.

It has been administered by wise Americans, ugly Americans and run-of-mine Americans, even as the government in Washington. It has not been all good, all bad, or all indifferent, nor will it be.

T.F. Chamber Warns About Sales Scheme

"Unscrupulous people are coming out of the walls" with fantastic schemes, including correspondence courses, roofing and adding schemes and tips to foreign countries, reported William Grange, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce secretary-manager, Wednesday afternoon.

"One of the most recent plans to exploit local people is built around a series of correspondence lessons, costing approximately \$300, that could be had at our local business college for less than half of that amount," Grange stated. He noted that the business college course is more comprehensive, far more beneficial and takes about three months less time than the "correspondence course."

He added that the local college also offers the course on a residence basis with personal instruction and business machines with which to work.

Grange explained that the salesmen or solicitors are educated and good salesmen, and it's easy for them to sell a "bill of goods."

He noted that a woman called him recently and told of a man soliciting students for a "correspondence school." The man made an appointment with her on a recent legal holiday, when all offices were closed. He gave her almost no information and did his best to get her to sign a contract for the course that day.

Mrs. Rodney Tegan, chamber office manager, contacted the state department of education Wednesday to obtain information about the "correspondence school" and Donald Douglas, who is in

charge of correspondence school registration, told her that the course being solicited in Twin Falls had not been registered. He explained that all correspondence schools must be registered and receive a license before they can solicit students in Idaho.

Grange warned Twin Falls residents that if a solicitor visits them they should insist on seeing a copy of their license. He warned further that if the salesman or solicitor is suspicious-looking, to call the Chamber of Commerce office and give him an opportunity to check the salesman out before a contract is signed. The Chamber of Commerce telephone number is 232-3974.

He added that magazine salesmen are the toughest salesmen the Chamber of Commerce has to ride herd on. "They usually offer two magazine subscriptions and a free bonus magazine subscription for what sounds like a low price. However, Grange noted, the total is usually more than what subscriptions for all three magazines would be if ordered through each magazine."
