Kootenai River Rising Along Weakened Dikes; More Workers on Duty

BONNERS FERRY, June 6 (AP)—Hundreds of additional workers were pressed into emergency duty along weakened dike today as the ever-threatening Kootenai river reached 37 feet here. "I don't know how, but those amazing crews are still holding the line against impossible odds all along the river," said Gilbert Bean, public information officer for the army corps of engineers. "But even with this superhuman effort something's got to give." The corps has thrown another 450 men into the flood fight since midnight, another 100 were on "tonic by bytes from Spokane and recruiting began in British Columbia, where the river doubles back into Canada.

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Idaho's Child Welfare Bad, Is Improving

BOISE, June 6 (AP)—Idaho's handling of the child welfare problem was described yesterday as a "horrible example" but the state was said to be doing something about it.

The director of the state's child welfare program was voiced by Mrs. J. A. Bell in Jones, Washington, D.C., executive director of the National Committee for Children and Youth.

She said that George K. Moore, superintendent of the Idaho Children's Home Finding society here, "Jones said in an interview, 'Idaho has been pointed out as a state which has a horrible example as far as child welfare is concerned. But the climate is changing and people here there is hope for it.'"

She said she came here to talk with Moore after hearing from friends that Idaho is doing something for children and youth. She said she regards the creation of a child's study commission which holds its first meeting tomorrow, as a "great promise" for the future.

"Out of the commission," she said, "can come some new looks for children and the needs for children. This is particularly true if it has a study by a professional group."

"Experience in other states shows these studies to be good investments. They save money later on in the most costly kind of services to the juvenile delinquent, mentally and emotionally disturbed children and broken homes. It is to mention the drain on state resources. The taxpayers will get their money's worth."

The 1951 legislature created the commission, gave it \$200,000 and asked it to study the entire field of problems associated with children. It was asked to make recommendations to the 1953 legislature.

Red Party to Keep up Plan Despite Court

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—The U. S. Communist party vowed today to keep up its activities despite the Supreme court decisions against it and its members.

"We have majesty and the reasonability forces for whom they speak think that in this way they can intimidate the Communist party of the United States and prevent it from carrying on its fight and program of democracy and peace they are seriously mistaken," said Gus Hall, general secretary of the party, in a statement yesterday.

"The Communist party is a legal political party operating within the framework of the United States," he said. Hall said the Communist party will continue to do its duty to the American people by alerting them as sharply as it can to the danger inherent in this court action, dangerous to the very base and fabric of democracy in this country."

The Communist party, once considered a growing group in the 1940s, has had a sharp drop in members and financial strength since the Hungarian revolution. It has been forced to close its daily newspaper here and has had at least one shakeup in its hierarchy.

Hall said the decisions were "a crushing blow at... the constitution." He charged that "fascist" John Birchler, the citizen council, and the Ku Klux Klan were left free to undermine U. S. rights.

Shepard Tells of Vibrations On Flight; Changes Planned

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Astronaut Alan B. Shepard, Jr., disclosed today that rocket vibrations during his vision trip in the early part of his historic 15-minute space flight a month ago. But he said just about everything else went well.

Shepard said that as the result of his difficulty some changes have been ordered in the Mercury capsule design to reduce vibrations during the crucial moments just after launching.

Shepard made the observation in a paper prepared for delivery to 300 physicians and research scientists at a conference on the medical results of the first U. S. manned suborbital space flight last May 2. He rocketed to an altitude of 116 1/2 miles before landing in the ocean 300 miles from Cape Canaveral, Fla., launching site.

Shepard said the roughest part of the flight came as the rocket accelerated through the speed of sound and then passed through the point of maximum dynamic pressure. That was the point at which the Redstone rocket and the capsule it carried were subjected to the most severe combination of acceleration forces and atmospheric resistance.

"Three events occurred very close together on the flight, and there was general vibration associated with them," Shepard said. "At one point my head vibration was such that my vision was blurred for a few seconds."

He intended to send a recording of this experience by providing more foam rubber for the head support and improving the spacecraft air filter.

Shepard said he had no other difficulties during the powered flight and found no problem in breathing, seeing, or reporting to the ground.

Shepard added that: 1. The water landing was not more severe than the catapulting of a plane from a carrier deck. 2. The so-called detritus caused during his two-day stay at Grant Bahama island, after the flight, was useful and will be available for future flights. 3. The five minutes of weightlessness was similar to floating and was not a free-fall motion. 4. The capsule periscope not only was a good device for viewing the sky and Earth, but also was a "backpack" aid for navigation and for monitoring the opening of the parachutes on the descent.

Special OAS Unit to Eye Dominicans

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—A five-nation special commission is expected to leave Thursday to determine whether the Dominican Republic is moving toward more freedom for its people or toward an even harsher dictatorship. A seven-nation committee of the Organization of American States voted yesterday to send the commission to investigate conditions in the Caribbean country week of dictator Rafael Trujillo, following the assassination last week of the president. The unanimous acceptance of a U.S. request for the investigation came after Dominican Foreign Minister Prodomo Hernandez Bass said his country would welcome the special mission. The decision marked the first victory in an inter-American agency for the administration of President Kennedy. The United States had strong support in the proposal from other American republics but the initiative clearly came from Washington. The OAS last August at San Jose, Costa Rica, charged that the Trujillo government plotted an assassination attempt on President Romulo Betancourt, Venezuela, and voted that all American republics should break diplomatic relations with the Trujillo regime. A special committee sent to Dominican Republic last year to conduct an investigation was not permitted to travel freely and conduct its business. OAS officials said it appeared probable the special five-nation commission would depart Thursday morning from New York. Its members are Panama, the United States, Argentina, Mexico and Uruguay.

JERUSALEM, June 6 (AP)—A young Jew told the Eichmann trial court today that at 13 he was forced to extract the gold teeth from bodies of gassed victims in the Chelmno concentration camp. Simon Srebnik, a Polish-born mechanic now in Israel, testified he saw an average of 1,200 Jews paraded to their deaths daily over a period of nine months. The routine was always the same, he said. The Jews were given towels and soap and 80 to 100 at a time were herded into a big van and driven away. "The doors were hermetically sealed," he said. "When the van moved on the gas would enter it and in this way they all were killed."

Republicans Launch Attack On Kennedy Farm Program

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Republicans launched an attack on the Kennedy administration's farm program today, contending it would greatly broaden powers of the secretary of agriculture.

In doing so at a hearing on the measure, before the senate agriculture committee, the Republicans took issue with secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

The secretary, answering questions of Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper, R., Ia., repeated previous declarations that the measure would reduce his field of authority.

Under the measure, the secretary, with the help of advisory committees picked by him from farmer-selected nominees, would draft farm commodity programs to go into effect if not vetoed within 60 days after passage of congress and if approved by two-thirds of the producers voting in a referendum.

Hickenlooper got from Freeman agreement that the secretary would have powers to determine which commodities would be subject to quotas and which would be exempt.

Freeman also said he would have authority to abide by or reject recommendations of the advisory committees and to disclaim them if he saw no further need for them.

But Freeman emphasized that any action proposed by him in the way of farm controls would be subject to a possible congressional veto and rejection by producers themselves at referendum.

Under present law, Freeman said, he has authority to set price supports on products and commodities or to submit for approval without submitting them to congress or to producers. These commodities would be subject to a referendum.

But when it comes to livestock and perishable products, this power is limited to price supports. For example, if a support price of \$14 a hundred pounds on hogs were set, but limited to farmers who curtailed hog production, many farmers would ignore the limitation.

About the only way the secretary could carry out a price support promise on hogs or other livestock would be to buy the live animals — which, of course, he would not do because he would not know what to do with them — or to set conditions of price supports for the animals.

Government purchase of the animals in the case of a supporting price of the non-cooperating farmer as well as the cooperating farmer would be ineffective. This is one place where the Kennedy program differs from the present law.

The bill would give the secretary to set up marketing quotas on livestock as well as the crops—subject course, a possible congressional veto and rejection at a farmer referendum.

The bill would give the secretary a device for making quotas effective — authority to make production payments. The secretary could offer payments from the government to farmers who cut back on production of hogs, cattle, milk, poultry, eggs and the like and deny them to non-cooperators. Too, it would give him authority to impose cash penalties on those selling not only crops but livestock in excess of their quotas. He now has this power only in the case of wheat, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts.

The Kennedy bill would broaden authority of the secretary to cut back on acreages of wheat, cotton, rice, tobacco and peanuts. Present law sets minimum acreage for these crops—minimums which, especially in the case of wheat, are ineffective in preventing overproduction. Again, any program cutting acreages of these crops below present minimums would have to survive a possible congressional veto and defeat at a grover referendum.

All in all, the Kennedy program would give the secretary and farmer advisory committees a broader list of goods and greater flexibility in their use to meet price and supply stabilization programs.

For example, marketing quotas or limitations on any of the more than 200 farm commodities produced in this country.

Present law limits quotas and limitations largely to wheat, cotton, tobacco, rice, peanuts, some specialty crops sold in special marketing orders. In case of the latter, the limitations are set largely on the basis of grade, quality and the like.

It should be pointed out that under the Kennedy program goal of management of supplies of various products, the authority to set quotas and limitations is a key device.

But it is this request for authority to make broader use of controls that brings the bulk of the opposition to the Kennedy program.

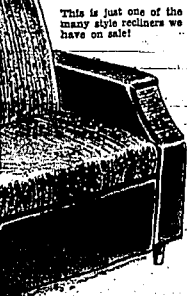

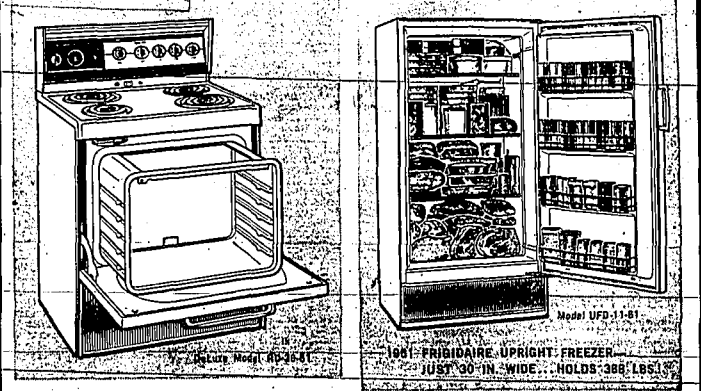
