St. Edward's Church Shop Is Ransacked

St. Edward's Catholic church was broken into and an unknown amount of clothing items and clothing was taken from the basement "thrift" shop sometime between 4-11 p.m. Tuesday and 4-11 p.m. Wednesday, Twin Falls police report.

Roland Kuckenburg, church janitor, discovered the break-in about 3 p.m. Wednesday and notified the P. Rogers, church member, who called police.

Rogers says various items such as rosary beads and medallions were missing, adding that an inventory would have to be taken to determine what was missing.

Mrs. Lloyd Kelly, who is in charge of the thrift shop, is ill and the Rev. Mr. Edmund R. Cody, R.C. of town, he noted.

Police report that a window on the second street side of the church and broke out, finding he could not gain entrance to the building at that point, he continued on down the steps and broke out another window.

This window opened into a room which gave access to the basement. The thief rummaged throughout the basement scattering boxes of religious items and donating clothing.

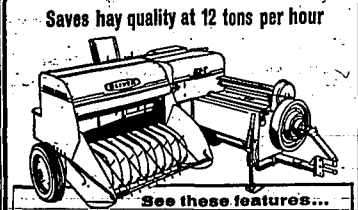

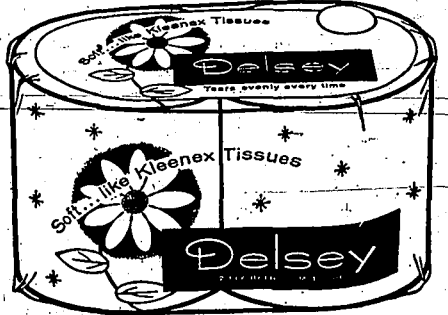

Leg of lamb and chuck roast offer the housewife the best opportunity to beat the high cost of living this week, judging by supermarket and grocery store advertisements.

Increased supplies of meat have resulted in lower prices in many areas in recent weeks. The outlook is for further reductions in volume and more rebates at the meat counter.

This week's specials in lamb turn up in New England, the East, Midwest and Far West.
Chuck roast is a headline attraction in New England, the South and Midwest. Other beef cuts, notably top and bottom round roasts also are featured in a number of places.

Some are climbing, with mark-ups over last week of two to 10 cents a dozen.

Barren hunters can find a bewildering variety of fresh fruits and vegetables at produce counters these days. This is chiefly due to an increasing number of items just in from nearby farms.

Produce men say the best vegetable buys are asparagus, corn, green onions, radishes, rhubarb, spinach, lettuce, potatoes, squash and assorted cooking greens and turnip tops.

Good buys include beef, cabbage, carrots, celery, escarole, mushrooms, onions, parsley, peppers and watercress.

Oranges, grapefruit, strawberries, bananas and, for a tropical flavor, mangoes are rated as outstanding buys. Good buys are watermelon, cantaloupe, honeydew melons, peaches, blueberries, lemons and plums.

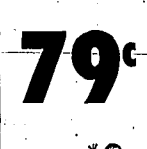

Nationalized Cuba School System OK'd

HAVANA, June 8—The council ministers approved a law last night nationalizing education. It is one of the most important laws adopted by the Cuban revolution.

Article No. 1 of the law says, "Education is a public function and it is to be given free." It adds that this function belongs to the state through organizations formed for that purpose.

Another article of the law adds that the nationalization of education is decreed and that therefore the state will take over all educational establishments existing at the present time or are directed by individuals or legal entities, as well as all the buildings, rights and assets which now constitute the assets of those establishments.

The evening of June 16 a concluding clinic will be held at the Grange hall here for residents of the Carey valley. Anyone missing the clinic for his particular community is welcome to attend one of the other clinics to learn this important information.

These clinics are being spearheaded by the Grange as a project of the organization's community service committee and is being made possible through the cooperation of the Sun Valley hospital group of doctors, technicians and nurses who are donating their services. A fee of \$2.00 is charged to help pay for supplies.

Such blood typing clinics are endorsed by the Idaho state and public health department and the American Medical Association. In a time of disaster this will save time and in some instances lives. In addition to the personal health information which is carried at all times by the recipient, those participating will receive a booklet "Your Family Health Record" published by the American Medical Association.

Film of Nazis Brings Smile To Eichmann

JERUSALEM, June 8—Adolf Eichmann strode from the courtroom smiling today while his three Jewish judges hurried out strategy and shocked after seeing films of the mad horror camps at which Eichmann was the alleged boss.

As the courtroom lights went up after 1 1/2 hours of what must be some of the most shocking films ever made, Israeli Prosecutor Gideon Hausner remarked, "I am sorry I had to introduce the court to all these atrocities, but this is how it was."

Only the three Israeli judges rose and walked out. Assistant Judge Yitzhak Rabin, his face twisted in anguish, almost rushed from the room.

Eichmann, who had sat deadpan throughout the showing, turned on his heel and, with a half-smile on his face, stepped from the court.

The films showed Jews being machine-gunned into mass graves by the SS extermination groups which the prosecution claims were under Eichmann's direct orders. Other shots ranged through Auschwitz, Birkenau and other extermination camps.

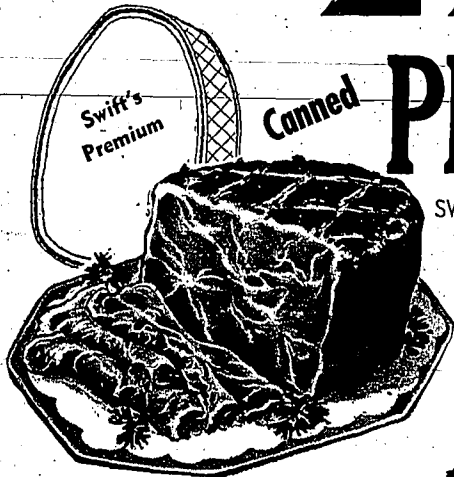

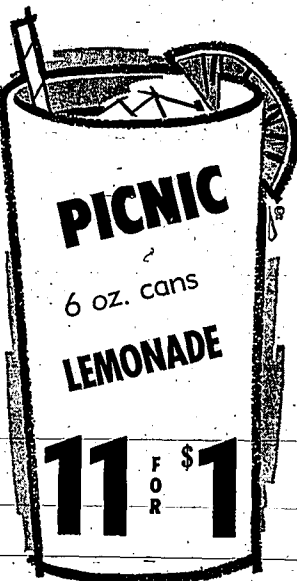

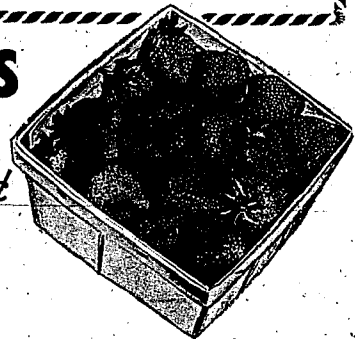

Khrushchev Raised Voice on Berlin Issue, Solons Advised

WASHINGTON, June 8 (U.P.)—President Kennedy has informed congressional leaders that Premier Khrushchev raised his voice when he told him in Vienna that West Berlin is a bone that must come out of the Soviet throat.

The President also reported Khrushchev indicated he regards Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro as "unstable and not a communist."

Kennedy briefed influential members of both parties at a 90-minute White House conference before he told the nation in a television-radio broadcast a few hours later that the West is ready to maintain its rights in Berlin "at any risk."

The briefing, during which the President read from his transcript of the transcript of some of the conversations, was said to have disclosed that Khrushchev was vitally interested in only two subjects at this time—Berlin and a change in the secretary's direction of the United Nations.

So reported by responsible sources, these were some of the major topics discussed and the positions taken in the 12 hours of conversations between the two leaders:

Berlin—Khrushchev has not changed his position of more than two years standing that he intends to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany. He fired no date for the action. He told Kennedy that nobody but the United States still believes East and West Germany can be reunited.

The only time Khrushchev raised his voice in the whole period of discussion was when he talked about Berlin and used the bone in the throat phrase he has employed before. Kennedy said in his broadcast to the nation "there was no discourtesy, no loss of temper, no threats or ultimatums by either side" during the Vienna conference.

The Soviet premier offered again to give Soviet and East German guarantees of continued allied status if the United States, French, British and Soviet troops remain in the city, and suggested stationing U. N. troops there.

Kennedy replied that the West is in Berlin legally, not merely by sufferance, and intends to stay there. He said Berlin is a contradiction stone in American security.

United Nations—Khrushchev contended the U. N. actions in the Congo, under the direction of Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld, were not neutral but were pointed against Soviet interests.

Never again, he said, would the Soviet Union be placed in a position where its national security policies could be interfered with by the international organization.

This was the beginning, he indicated of the "troika" policy under which the Soviets would trust the unanimous vote of a three-man board—on which the East, West and a neutral would be represented—direct the actions of international organizations, including the United Nations.

Cuba—Khrushchev does not regard Castro as a communist. But he told Kennedy "you are well on the way to making him a good one." The Soviet leader indicated he regards Castro as unstable.

Laos—Khrushchev said he wasn't interested in trying to make the Laotian government communist. He would be glad to settle for neutral rights. Kennedy asked if the Soviet leader would help get the Geneva conference on Laos off the ground and he promised to do so.

Wars—Khrushchev said there were three kinds. He predicted that there will never be a nuclear war. He drew a rough map of the Soviet Union's land mass, fringed with satellites. If it is a conventional war, he said, "we will put five divisions where you put one."

Nuclear Testing—Khrushchev stuck firmly by his demand for "troika" control. Kennedy got the definite impression the Soviet leader "was not interested in having any test ban and shows no alarm about the possible proliferation of weapons to other nations, including Communist China."

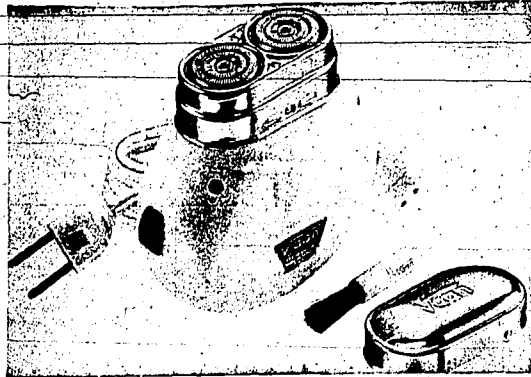
