GENEVA, June 9 (AP)—W. Averell Harriman, President Kennedy's ambassador at large, conferred with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko today in a new effort to end the fighting in Laos and get the 15-month conflict once started again. Harriman took in him a note from U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk, approved by the President. In effect, it urged the Soviets to keep the promise Soviet Premier Khrushchev made at Vienna to get an effective cease-fire in the Southeast Asian kingdom.

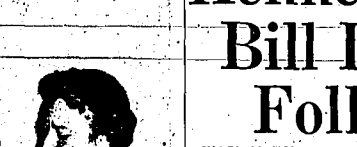

Rupert Hikes Penalties for Tippy Driving

## Another Rejection

Employees of another Magic Valley plant have rejected efforts of a union to represent them. This time, workers at the Snake River Trout company voted 22 to 6 against being represented by the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America, A.M.C. and B.W. Employees voted 343 to 239 against unionization of the Sliptop company potato processing plant at Heyburn.

Actually, the Trout company election at Buhl was the second to be held on the same day. Employees voted last Oct. 1 against the union which promptly protested to the national labor relations board that the firm had used unfair tactics. The NLRB investigated, denied union charges were unfounded, but the government agency is up with its own charges and ordered a new election.

The Buhl firm was charged with talking to employees in groups of two or more and the NLRB claimed "this technique of interviewing employees in small groups with the aim of coercing them to accept or reject the union, regardless of the non-coercive tenor of his remarks during the interview." The agency went on to explain that although management did nothing coercive, talking to employees in small groups was enough reason to void the results of the first election.

However, news reports indicated the union sent representatives to Buhl prior to the recent election. The outsiders not only held union meetings, but reported to the national labor relations board that the firm already had been slapped on the wrist for even talking to employees in small groups. Just to keep the record straight, the government agency should at least criticize the union publicly, otherwise the NLRB is emphasizing that unions are given an advantage denied to management.

There will be more union elections in Magic Valley in the future. As has been pointed out before, unions can be expected to continue to attempt to organize the potato processing plant and also at the Idaho Potato Processors, Inc. plant at Burley where employees voted last Dec. 14 against the unions. Perhaps there will be another attempt at the Buhl plant.

## TWO CHAPTERS

One of the first chapters in developing a vaccine against polio was opened at the same time as one of the latest chapters was developing. From Portland, it was reported that two more suits against Cutter Laboratories, makers of the family polio vaccine, had been rejected out of court to the tune of \$125,000 and \$75,000. At the same time, it was reported from Chicago that the new Sabin vaccine probably will be available in quantity in 1962 in the form of a safety tablet, or tablet.

Back several years ago when the Salk vaccine was being distributed on a wholesale basis, one batch of the serum containing live polio virus was distributed. Some of the vaccine was administered in Magic Valley, resulting in a mild epidemic of polio. The tragedy was a blow to the polio vaccination program at the time. Safeguards in the manufacturing process eliminated chances of repeating the tragedy, but the damage had been done. The polio vaccination program and to those patients who needlessly acquired the disease.

At the time, a doctor commented that any patient who had been shot with the "hot" vaccine and didn't acquire the disease probably had life immunity.

Now the latest chapter in developing polio vaccines centers around use of live virus, but weakened considerably. Even so, the Sabin vaccine is capable of immunizing people who do not take it but associate closely with those who do.

The Sabin vaccine, developed in Cincinnati, O., has been used widely abroad, notably in iron curtain countries and in Latin America, with considerable success. Children who find the vaccine more agreeable are given two counts, because it will be included in a tasty pill and because it doesn't involve a shot.

Perhaps the day will arrive when other dangerous diseases can be defeated merely by gulping a tasty pill.

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON (AP)—Despite the additional billions which President Kennedy plans to spend on the military, there still will be a shortage of jobs for the young men who will be drafted into the armed forces.

While they preferred an additional \$1 billion in military spending, the economic advisers doubt that they will make any serious contribution to the job market.

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They are figuring a normal and manageable unemployment rate should be 4 per cent, or about three million or less.

NEW MILITARY JOBS—A breakdown of the 15 billion dollar expansion plan shows that there will still be a shortage of jobs for the young men who will be drafted into the armed forces.

Another 244 million dollars will be devoted to modernizing army weapons. The navy is also spending money on research and laboratory work, which will be conducted by an existing staff of 15,000 employees.

SAVES, NOT MAKES, JOBS—But the funds for small businesses will go to help them to survive, not to expand. In fact, modernization of the operations of their stores may enable them to get along with fewer employees.

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## WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON (AP)—Plus any unrefined crude and the 10,000 barrels of residual will be moved in big tankers to the U.S. East coast.

This has aroused the ire of the National Coal Policy conference and U.S. Chamber of Commerce officials. They claim this will mean greater uncontrolled import of Mexican produced fuel oil to compete with American-produced fuel.

President Joseph E. Moody of the coal organization says the 10,000 barrels of Mexican residual is equivalent to replacing the market for 2.6 million tons of coal a day and that it will wipe out the jobs of another 100,000 men.

The purpose of this is to satisfy the conditions of a proclamation issued by President Eisenhower in 1959. It permitted oil from 125 foreign U.S. countries to enter this country "without being subjected to quota restrictions."

By a second proclamation, oil from non-quota-producing countries is being imported. These quotas are now being attacked as too high, and are under review by the State Department.

Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall is being beat out by the head of the oil industry, who is now more for this Mexican deal, but he is apparently just the responsible official who had to sign the papers after he was briefed on the deal by the industry.

The amount of Mexican oil to be allowed under the new arrangement is 10,000 barrels of residual fuel oil, for three years.

What the arrangement with Mexico says is that petroleum transported in to the United States by pipeline, rail or other means of overland transport from the country where produced will not be subject to quota restrictions.

The real, unpublicized reason for this deal is that Pemex had a lot of surplus oil on its hands which it couldn't sell. Mexico was under pressure to sell oil to Cuba.

Since the U.S. oil embargo against the Castro government, Cuba has been hard put to get petroleum products. It has had to rely on the Soviet Union and other iron curtain countries with oil to sell. This involves a loss of revenue to the U.S.

To get the Mexican government to get the deal, the U.S. had to offer the communists not so much, but a spectacular propaganda help in the form of a "press release" which was pulling up. It was to satisfy all these loose ends that the deal evolved.

### Creamery's Plant Activities Illustrate Importance of Dairying in Magic Valley

**JEROME, June 9**—Some idea of how important dairying is to Magic Valley can be illustrated by some activities that take place at the plants of the Jerome Cooperative creamery.

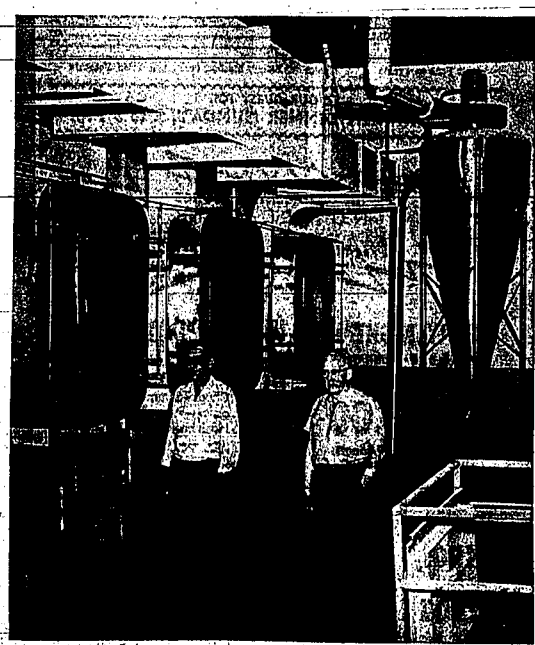
The creamery, which buys from about 1,800 dairymen—about half of those in Magic Valley—purchases between seven and eight million dollars in milk from local dairymen.

This would place the value of milk and cream sold by Magic Valley farmers in the vicinity of 12 million dollars. In addition, there is a large sum of money involved in the sale of Holstein steers for beef.

Presently the creamery is purchasing about 500,000 pounds of milk a day, which in turn is converted into packaged milk for market, cheese, butter, ice cream and dry milk products.

Only about 25 per cent of this amount, says Smith, is used locally. The rest is exported into other areas, and brings money

### Principle of Administration's Farm Program Endorsed by Wheat Group

**WASHINGTON, June 9**—The National Association of Wheat Growers endorses in principle the administration's proposed farm program according to association President Carl Brunns, Chappell, Nebr.

The principle of commodity programs as embodied in the administration-proposed "enabling" legislation has had the endorsement of the association for more than a decade, Brunns said.

The proposed program provides not only the basis for a sound, long-range program, but also contains the means of meeting an urgent situation, Brunns said.

"We are hopeful that this enabling legislation will be enacted promptly by congress," Brunns said. "There remains the possibility, however, that such legislation may be delayed beyond the time which would make it practicable to inaugurate a satisfactory wheat program effective for the 1962 crop year."

"In the event the enabling legislation has not progressed through the agriculture committee of the senate and house by May 15, the secretary (of agriculture) is urged to submit to the administration a wheat legislation, the plan which has been developed by the National Association of Wheat Growers, the National Farmers union, and the National Grange."

This plan would give farmers a marketing quota in bushels, limiting the number of bushels they could sell for domestic food and export. The quotas would be set the first year at 150 million bushels below the estimated total market, forcing private traders to come to the government for some of their normal needs.

Proponents say this would reduce government stocks and lessen storage costs. The government

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### Sugar Juice Held in Tanks

A new variety, Basin oats, was recently developed by Montana farmers through a project of the Aberdeen experiment station by Harold Stevens and F. A. Coffman. Coffman works at Belleville, Md., but spends his summers in research at Aberdeen.

The studies to improve grains are continuous at Aberdeen, and also for crop research will be spent at the station this year, according to Dr. H. H. Shaw, administrator of the USDA.

The largest part of this budget has been allocated for wheat research, about \$17,500. These wheat studies include investigations of genetic and breeding properties, studies on baking quality, winter mold disease. Potato research also is within the bounds of the budget. With emphasis on quality research on varieties used for processing potato products.

Don Thunderman, Aberdeen specialist who has taken Paul Pizzigallo's place in charge of USDA wheat research in that state, also is under way in the Kimberly experiment station, said present studies are long range.

These studies include breeding for wheat varieties that will be semi-resistant and will have even better qualities than those from Columbia on the dry farms. Studies also are under way for developing a winter wheat that can be raised under irrigated conditions. Winter wheat is current on this means, of course, a shorter, irrigated spring grain.

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

### New Processing System For Beet Sugar Reported

A new system for processing sugar beets has been developed in California by the Holly Sugar corporation.

Under this system the sugar beet is only partially refined, then stored in steel tanks while the rest of the crop each day is refined entirely at the plant.

Robert Day, Twin Falls manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company, said this system seems to be a good one, especially in warm areas like the Imperial Valley where the sugar beets can't be stored for four or five months on account of the heat. In this area, the value is limited, though under certain circumstances it could be useful.

### Water Struck at New Oakley Well

OAKLEY, June 9—Water was struck for four or five feet on account of the heat. In this area, the value is limited, though under certain circumstances it could be useful.

What makes this new system so interesting is that it will permit many companies to expand easily if the sugar beet acreage is expanded in the 21 sugar beet-growing states.

### First Hay Crop Prospects Look Good; Some Damage Caused by Hail and Rain

Some hay in Twin Falls, Cassia and Jerome counties this week. Generally, the hay looks good in most areas and the yields, even when cut in the best year, should be high. For dairy cows, hay in this stage can boost milk production noticeably. Most fields won't go down for a week or more, however, as farmers like to see a few blooms. Grain in irrigated areas also looked good, with alfalfa generally being the best. Some fields were broken up early. In fields hit hard by hail last week, the alfalfa damage and bruised the berries, breaking them off, and turning those areas white.

### Damages From Wind Erosion in Great Plains States Are Higher Than in 1960

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—The soil conservation service said today about 2,650,000 acres of land in the Great Plains states had been damaged this growing season by wind erosion, more than double the amount damaged in 1960. The service said that about 78 per cent, more than the amount of land damaged reported a month ago. The new loss this season includes 1,692,000 acres of cropland, 322,000 acres of rangeland, and 40,000 acres of other lands. The southern Great Plains reported 595,000 acres damaged, and the northern plains area reported 1,458,000 acres. Damage in the southern plains was Colorado, 216,000 acres; Kansas, 250,000 acres; Oklahoma, 8,000 acres; and Texas, 277,000 acres. In the northern plains the damaged were: Montana, 400,000 acres; Nebraska, 250,000 acres; North Dakota, 350,000 acres; South Dakota, 116,000 acres; and Wyoming, 350,000 acres.

### Sizeable Reductions Slated In Corn and Grain Sorghum

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman today reported that the acreage planted in corn and grain sorghum this year will be reduced by 10 to 15 per cent under the administration's 1961 feed grain program. The summary of damage was based on reports from soil conservation service field offices covering 209 counties and 251 million acres. The damage so far this year over a week ago, harvested smooth, is 11 per cent less than that of a year ago.

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

### Milk Production In April Is 148 Million Pounds

BOZEMAN, June 9 (AP)—Idaho milk production in April totaled an estimated 148 million pounds, the U. S. agriculture department reports. That total, the USDA said, compared with 146 million pounds a year earlier—the 196 million pounds for the 1955-59 average April production. Seasonally, production increased six per cent this year from March to April compared with the 1955-59 average seasonal increase of seven per cent for the same period. The department said the April output of Swiss cheese and American cheese exceeded April of 1960 but that April production of ice cream and creamery butter was below the level last year.

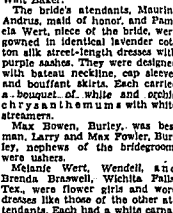

South Korea

Junta Claims 'Infiltration'

SEOUL, South Korea, June 9 (AP)—The ruling junta said Friday Communist North Korea sent 101 Red agents and subversive literature into South Korea last year to undermine the government.

A defense ministry spokesman said the government could not cope with this communist infiltration and that the military overthrew Chang last month to prevent the Reds from dominating the nation. A highly competent source with access to intelligence information said, however, there is no evidence Red infiltration reached a dangerous point during the Chang regime.

The junta also moved against the element most likely to challenge its rule—South Korea's outspoken students and their professors. Students, accused of communist and procommunism, were barred from political activities and labor unions, along with their teachers.
