American Gives U.S. Secrets to Reds in Poland

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Irvin Chambers Scarbeck, an American foreign service officer, was arrested here today on charges of turning over national security information to the communist government in Poland.

At Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, who announced the arrest, said FBI agents took Scarbeck into custody on a Washington street. Scarbeck, a long-time employee of the state department, has been serving as second secretary in the American embassy at Warsaw.

He returned here a week ago.

Scarbeck, 41, is a native of Brooklyn, N. Y. He attended the College of the City of New York and New York university from 1933 to 1939.

Two children, he has four children.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said Scarbeck was arrested on a warrant charging that from January through May of this year he transmitted classified information "affecting the security of the United States" to an agent of the Peoples Republic of Poland.

The FBI investigation, Hoover said, was based on information furnished by the state department of the American embassy in Warsaw.

The justice department did not disclose the nature of the information Scarbeck is accused of passing.

Arrangements were made for a prompt arraignment before U.S. Commissioner James H. McLaughlin. Conviction under the charges lodged against Scarbeck carries a term of 10 to 30 years imprisonment or both.

In June, 1958, Scarbeck was one of the 11 employees of the state department decorated with the meritorious service award. He got it, among other reasons for "loyalty."

Scarbeck was first employed by the state department in 1942, and was assigned here until 1954 when he was transferred to San Francisco. He was commissioned as a foreign service officer in late 1950. He received his assignment to Warsaw in December, 1959.

Broader Job Insurance for Nation Urged

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—President Kennedy today urged a broad expansion of the unemployment compensation system to increase the amount and duration of benefits and the payroll taxes to pay for them.

He said the system has provided extensive relief for the jobless insurance plan that has been proposed since it was enacted in 1935.

The program was accompanied by administration statements that the present state unemployment compensation system has long been in need of reform. It was said that the system has not kept pace with the needs of the economy in bad times.

No cost figures were immediately announced, but a preliminary estimate of the amount of additional revenue that would be required by the proposed higher payroll taxes.

Trains Crash in Germany, 20 Are Killed

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—President Kennedy and Prime Minister Amintore Fanfani, Italy, declared themselves agreed today on the need for strengthening the Atlantic community both as an instrument of peace and as a political and economic bloc.

A joint communique issued after the second meeting in two days—stressed the cordial and friendly character of the talks.

Italian informants added that Fanfani was extremely satisfied with the talks after meeting with members of the new administration.

New Blasts Hit Southern Tyrol

Stalled A-Ban Talk Headed for Merger With Arms Confab

GENEVA, June 13 (UPI)—The hopelessly deadlocked nuclear test ban talks appeared today to be headed for a merger with the forthcoming general disarmament conference despite strong western opposition. The Soviets told the West bluntly yesterday either they could conclude a test ban treaty on Russia's terms or merge these complicated talks into the East-West disarmament negotiations. In 31 months of bargaining, about two-thirds of the articles for a treaty have been agreed upon, but a number of major differences have not been settled.

The West feels it is unreasonable to meet the far from a treaty into a general disarmament conference which would open up every article for renegotiation among a larger group of conference delegations.

Soviet negotiator Semyon K. Tsvetkov read the new Russian draft into the record at yesterday's meeting. It was contained in the memorandum presented by Premier Nikita Khrushchev hand-delivered to the West.

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The government reported today a strong pickup in retail sales and employment in heavy industry in May, particularly in auto and steel.

A labor department report announced that retail sales advanced 1.1 percent in May over April. The report also said that the economy is continuing to show extra seasonal gains.

The work week of the average factory worker moved up more than 20 minutes in May, the fourth increase in working hours in as many months. The work week was increased 15 minutes in April and 20 minutes in May.

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Cassia Faces Double Class Session Soon

BURLEY, June 13—It may be necessary to have double sessions in the future in our schools if enrollment continues to increase.

"Some students may need to be transported from the Burley area to Oakley and Declo if funds are not made available for busses."

The enrollment in the Cassia county schools during the 1956-57 year was 3,254 with an increase of 440 over the previous year.

An election will be held on Tuesday, June 20, for an increase of three mills over the present school plant facilities levy.

The last bond issue for a million dollars approved in 1959 has a total interest charge of \$440,000 to be paid in 20 years.

If approved by an election of real property taxpayers of the district a school district may levy 10 mills.

A two-thirds vote will be needed to pass the levy. The additional levy will cost the taxpayer \$3 for each \$1,000 of the assessed value of the property which would pay approximately \$1.50 more per year.

During the school term of 1959-60 the county spent \$243.80 per student in average daily attendance.

Most of the increased enrollment has occurred in Burley. The increase in 1959 was 1,375 while the national average was 329.

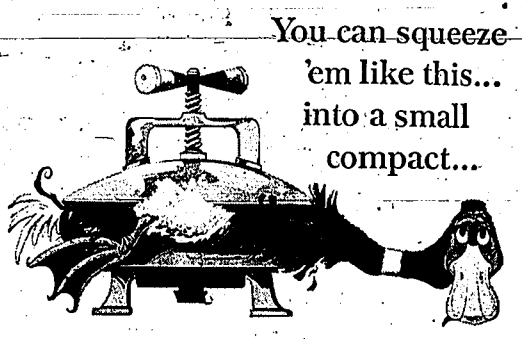

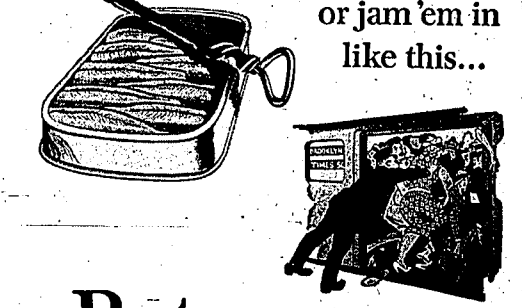

Western Area 'Is Backward Industrially'

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—A high official of the Martin Company, Denver, told Mountain States Association delegates from eight states yesterday that their area is "disastrously backward" industrially.

W. L. Whitson, vice president of the company which makes the Titan missile, said he meant the eight states are industrially underdeveloped on a per-capita basis.

He was the main speaker during the second day of the annual conference of Chambers of Commerce and Trade Executives from Montana, Colorado, Wyoming, Arizona, Utah, New Mexico, Nevada and Idaho.

Dr. Whitson said he wasn't using the Northeastern states as a basis of comparison but the so-called poor states of the deep South, which have similar economies with primitive and natural resources pivot points.

"Those 'poor' southern states," he said, "are producing, annually, manufactured goods worth about \$225 per capita."

"In a while," he said, "the states in your association have been producing, per capita, about \$120 worth of manufactured goods annually."

"Not one single state meets the average of the southern states. Utah comes the closest with roughly \$400, and Colorado is next with \$435. All the rest fall well under \$400, with Wyoming bringing up the rear at around \$175."

He said the trend is beginning to change but the upward trend isn't sharp enough to meet the competition of the space age.

Dworshak Is Seeking State Mineral Right

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Legislation designed to give rights to phosphate deposits on state lands in Caribou and Blaine counties has been introduced by Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Ida.

Dworshak explained that the deposits were situated on lands which the state had previously granted by the federal government. He said the state had previously granted by the federal government the right to mine phosphate on the land grants made by the Idaho admission act for the financing of roadways for public use.

In introducing the legislation, the senator noted that the Idaho admission act gave to the state certain specific lands from surveyed unreserved public lands.

"Each surveyed section is 36 and 36 in every township was granted for use and being of the schools," he said. "Where sections 18 or 36 were available, the reservations or transfers made by the federal government prior to the establishment of the state were permitted to select land in lieu from available unreserved, surveyed public lands. This was done very wisely set up permanent endowment funds to protect revenues from these lands."

Dworshak also noted that when Idaho selected its lands it was required to waive phosphate rights in the selected lands before the federal government would approve the selections.

"At that time little commercial importance was attached to phosphate beds in that area," he said. "However, today royalties from these phosphate beds represent considerable money which would be going to the endowment fund for public lands if they had rights to the phosphate."

Dworshak said that it was impractical for the state to manage leasing of its lands with the phosphate reservation in federal hands.

"Vanadium, which is owned by the state, is found in varying amounts along with phosphate," he said. "Oil and gas reserves in the same lands are made by the state and some coal deposits as well as other minerals are found in this locality. In some instances the surface has been leased or sold. This is a cumbersome, clumsy, management program."

Dworshak said "if we in Idaho can fully develop and use the total resources of these lands granted to us, we can give our education system without federal financial assistance or subsidies."

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 13 (AP)—Two teen-agers, in a tale of tragic irony, say they embarked on seven slayings in five states because, as long as they had killed one "we might as well keep on."

But the man they thought had killed didn't die. Had they quit there, they wouldn't be facing murder charges.

There's another irony. Both James Douglas Latham, 19, Murriceville, Tex., and George Tom and York, 18, Jacksonville, Fla., say they want to die. They'd prefer the electric chair. But the states with seemingly the strongest cases execute by other means—Kansas by hanging and Colorado by the gas chamber.

What started it? The army, they claimed at a news conference in Salt Lake county jail yesterday. They complained about army harassment in the army and to serving under Negro officers.

Though they expressed some offhand regret for some of the killings, they didn't for the slaying of John A. Whiteaker, an elderly Negro railroad porter in Tallahassee, Tenn., who was robbed a dash to death.

"He was black," York explained. And Latham added: "We don't feel bad about killing a nigger."

Both are AWOL from the army. They fled a disciplinary unit at Fort Hood, Tex., May 24. Latham was serving six months and was to get a bad-conduct discharge for taking \$40 from a fellow soldier. York had been given six months for being AWOL.

"We got what we were working for," said York, "to get out of this stinking rat race on the outside."

But York said he doubted they would have killed anyone else if they had known that Edward J. Ouldrone, the man slugged and left for dead near Baton Rouge, La., had survived.

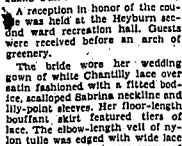

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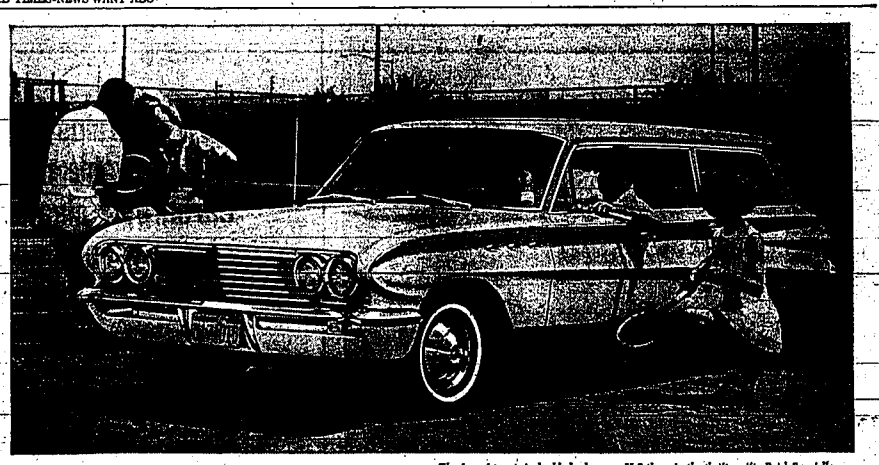
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Let Us Hear GOP Voices, Ike Declares

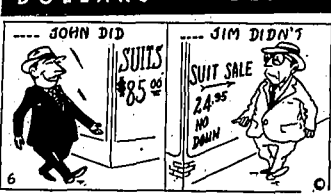

Light Beam Might Become New Communication System

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Not too many years ago, a beam of light brighter than sunshine, demonstrated publicly for the first time last week at the opening of the 10th annual convention of the International Brotherhood of Communications and Electronics Association.

Much of the discussion at the convention centered around other means of spreading air conversation around the world. Many attending the possibilities of the light beam might derive from communications satellites.

The light waves do it in phase as radio waves do. It thus can be directed in a narrow beam and sent a message which unfurled a flag and cut a ribbon at the convention.

It was considered important because the spectrum of radio frequencies is limited and is rapidly being used up.

One hundred color television channels, for instance, would completely fill the radio spectrum, leaving little room for radio and television transmission. Both radio communications and radio transmission use the same spectrum and its frequencies.

An AT and T spokesman said he knew how to use the radio frequencies might be used up but he was approaching the problem from a different angle.

The light beam, called coherent light, might raise the number of channels available for communications nearly 10,000 times.

"The amazing part of it," one spokesman said, "is that it is not affected by daylight. It is far more brilliant than daylight and just as bright as the sun. It can be used during the day or night."

Scientists also are investigating the possibility of using the light beam as an optical radar and as a precision instrument which could destroy selected living cells.

"It is only a gimmick today," the spokesman said, "but today's bridges still are IAWU Chief."

Specifically, the U.S. is helping build up economies elsewhere that are becoming self-sufficient. The big industrial gains in Europe and in Japan—helped along by U.S. foreign aid—have offered a market for American products of raw materials and machinery.

"Accurate figures on 1961 production of all feed grains and oilseeds will not be available until later in the year," the bureau said. "We would like to see more evidence of what actually has been accomplished by this expenditure before proceeding with any type of extension."

The agriculture department has said payments to farmers participating in the 1961 grain program will be in the neighborhood of 700 million dollars.

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20 Noses Are Training for Egg Smelling

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 13 (U) — Twenty recruits for the egg smellers corps America's first line of defense against one kind of food poisoning — are training in Kansas City.

They must learn to detect spoiled batches of frozen eggs in commercial markets.

"We use chemical and bacteriological tests to support the nose, but the nose is still our main line of defense," said Alfred Bernard, director of the pure food and drug administration, operator of the school.

Frozen eggs generally are sold in 30-pound cans. Bernard said chemical or biological tests can't determine if these contain rotten eggs.

"If more than 10 per cent of the 30 pounds is bad, it can be detected," he said. "If it is less, however, the sniffer has a difficult task."

"Some men can't smell. Just as some men can't see. We try to pick men with good noses."

"If they can't smell one or two bad packs, they can still be good snifflers, but if they call a good one bad, they are wanted out."

Applicants take preliminary tests before they are sent to smelling schools. They have to detect small quantities of vanilla and other substances in water.

At the school, recruits sniff holes into frozen eggs, then take a sniff. After several days of this, the sniffer is finally tested.

"There is nothing to do with smelling," Bernard said. "I knew one man who had a top-notch nose when he retired at 70."

NLRB Is Scored By Jewish Group

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP) — The American Jewish congress today criticized the national labor relations board (NLRB) for permitting "appeals to racial and religious bigotry" in collective bargaining elections.

Will Maslow, New York, executive director of the congress, asserted in testimony prepared for the house labor committee that the NLRB has consistently held that the Taft-Hartley law's guarantee of "free speech" extends to the use of racial and religious epithets by employers and unions involved in bargaining election disputes.

Maslow said the labor board was "wrong" in this interpretation of the law.

The act seeks to protect appeals to reason, not to emotion appeals to bigotry," he said. "Appeals to prejudice poison the atmosphere and make it impossible to conduct a free and fair election."

AEC Check of A-Plants OK'd

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP) — The supreme court has ruled that the atomic energy commission may wait until nuclear energy plants are built before deciding finally whether it can be operated safely.

The 7-2 decision upheld the AEC's award of a construction permit to Power Reactor Development company for a fast-neutron reactor for the generation of electric power.

Called the Enrico Fermi Plant, it is located at Lagoona Beach, near Monroe, Mich.

The plant is nearing completion since the litigation did not halt work.

Justice William J. Brennan spoke for the majority. Justice William O. Douglas and Justice Hugo L. Black, dissented.
