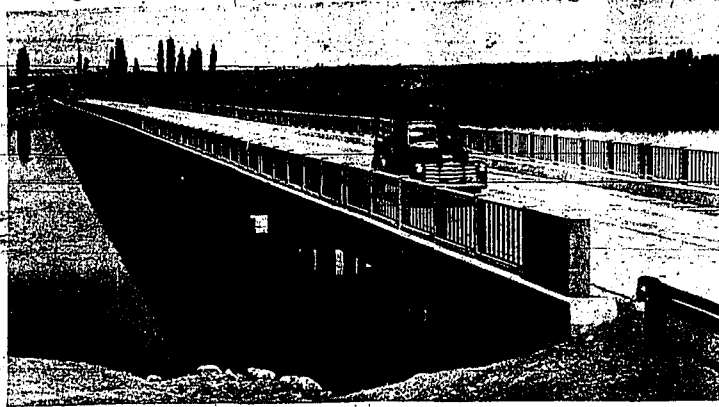

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### Postponing of Algeria Talks Raises Threat

RVIAN-LES-BAINS, France, June 14 (AP)—Indignation adjoining a summit of the French-Algerian peace talks raised the grim prospect today of increased bloodshed in Algeria. The first solid effort to end the 6 1/2-year war in the North African territory broke down yesterday when the French delegation called for a "reflection period" of 10 to 15 days apparently believing that the exiled rebel regime in Tunis would ease its tough, non-negotiable stance. No date was set for the talks to resume. The impression after three weeks of talks, strenuous negotiations were not likely to resume in the foreseeable future. Louis Aker, French minister for Algerian affairs heading the French negotiators, indicated his government had enough of the rebel insistence on setting all their demands and their refusal to even open an avenue to compromise. Rebel spokesman Redin Malek said the French delegation had refused to set an eight-day limit on the adjustment to meet today or tomorrow with the rebels to consider ways of easing the blockade.

### Aid Bill Will Need Boosts For Passage

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP) — Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., said today President Kennedy will have to exert the strongest kind of leadership to obtain passage of his 14-billion-dollar foreign aid bill.

Fulbright is chairman of the senate foreign relations committee which continued hearings on the legislation today with public testimony from Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara and Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chief of the joint chiefs of staff.

Fulbright said in an interview that despite the fact that the bill's passage is not certain, its prospects "follow too closely the old pattern of the past."

He said the bill should be directed to the application of more selective and discriminating aid.

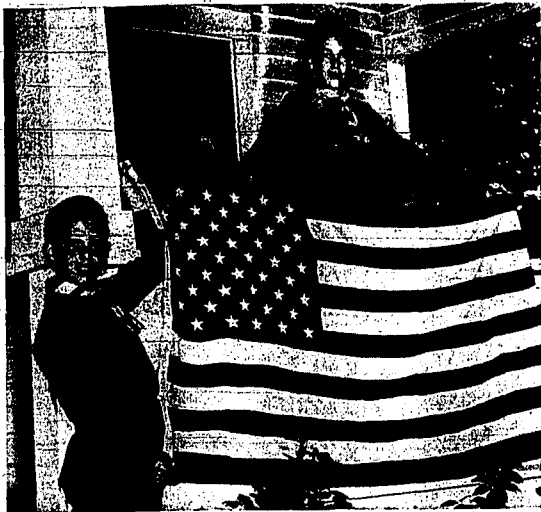
Fulbright said that passage of the President's program in anything like the amount he asked "will require one of the toughest fights of the year."

He added that Kennedy and his administration will have to give strong support to the measure on both sides of the capital.

An appeal was made by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., to direct foreign aid only to nations which will undertake meaningful political and economic reform.

Humphrey, assistant secretary of state for international affairs, said that both congress and the American people "are sick and tired of foreign aid going to governments that are unresponsive to human need, unwilling to bring about social reform."

### Pilot Is Alive But 'Critical' After Mishap

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—An Idaho national guard pilot can thank a farmer and two young boys today for dragging him to safety after his F4U jet plane crashed and burned near a populated area west of here.

However, Second Lieut. Robert D. Shupine, Jr., 26, who was 23 years old Monday, was in serious condition at the Veterans hospital here when he was injured when the plane crashed on takeoff Tuesday from Gowen field at Boise.

He received a spinal fracture, an injured left lung and internal injuries, surgery will be performed to restore breathing. His condition was considered critical. Shupine was pulled from the blazing aircraft by Jake Lepore, and his two sons, 10-year-old Fred and 12-year-old Jim. They were having in a field a short distance from where the plane came to rest.

They were about 200 yards on its belly, said Gen. James S. Trail, assistant Idaho adjutant general. Trail said that apparently the crash resulted when an airframe failure failed as the jet was climbing after leaving the end of the runway. Investigation of the crash is continuing.

It was the second major crash survived by Shupine in the past two years. In February, 1959, he survived the crash-up of a chartered DC-3 airplane, carrying him and other Idaho air national guardsmen to basic training in Texas. Several days later, while the plane crashed near Kerrville, Tex.

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### Prepare for New A-Test, Official Says

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Chairman Chet E. Jensen of the House-Senate atomic energy committee, said today the United States should be ready for a "serious underground test" of nuclear weapons.

Hollifield said there was a good chance the Soviet-Union already has tested new atomic devices in secret tests in the "underground" test area of the Nevada desert.

In a speech prepared for delivery to the house, Hollifield said the United States should remain alert to the possibility of a "serious" test by the Soviet Union.

"But I believe also that concentration should proceed with the things that need to be done in our testing program," he said, "and we should proceed to get in readiness to resume testing as soon as the President determines that our national defense requires it."

While not recommending the immediate resumption of U. S. nuclear testing, Hollifield called for a "research and development program on seismic detection tests to include nuclear tests."

He said the Soviet Union should be given complete reports on all information received by the detection research program.

"Since the Soviet Union can have full access to the data on our tests," he said, "it will be difficult for them to claim they are covering up nuclear tests."

Hollifield's statement was regarded as an important indication of congressional reaction to President Kennedy's statement last week that hopes for a test ban agreement had been struck — a "serious blow" by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The California lawmaker said that in the face of the communist doctrine of world domination, the United States must consider the possibility or probability that the Soviets have been testing or will be shortly.

He said that if the Russians are secretly testing their nuclear weapons, then it is possible they have overcome the technological lead the United States has generally held since they have enjoyed in the fall of 1955.

"In any event," Hollifield said, "we cannot continue to gamble our destiny, when we base such a gamble on ignorance of our opponent's actions."

The youths, George R. York, 18, Jackson, Mo., and James D. Latham, 16, Mauriceville, Tex., waived extradition late yesterday from an army disciplinary unit at Ft. Hood, Tex., have admitted a series of seven killings in five states. Officers of Utah and other states agreed at a conference to let Kansas take custody.

Both, and York especially, had expressed a "preference" for Florida, which wants them for the May 29 slaying of two Valdosta, Ga., women near Jacksonville—Athena Ottavio, 43, and Patricia Ann Hewitt, 23.

They also are wanted in Illinois, where two were killed June 8, Albert E. Reed, 25, Elmhurst, Ill., and Martin Drenovac, 39, a Granite City service station operator. Colorado wants them for the June 10 slaying of Rachel Marian Moyer, 18, near Craig, Tennessee. A state then for the June 7 killing of John A. Whitaker, 71, a railroad porter, at Toisholm.

### Kennedy Will Be Oldtimer if He Wins, Serves Second Term

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—If President Kennedy serves two terms, he'll look like an oldtimer in world affairs when he leaves the White House in January, 1969.

The reasons:

1. At 44 he is now 23 years younger than any of 10 major world leaders.
2. By 1969 most of them probably will be out of the picture.

At the moment none of them shows signs of weakening, politically or physically.

But the three youngest are already 67, or 23 years older than Kennedy. Russia's Premier Khrushchev, Britain's Prime Minister Macmillan and Red China's boss, Mao Tse-tung, are the oldest.

If Kennedy and these three hang on till January, 1969, then Kennedy will be close to 64, Khrushchev and Macmillan will be nearing 75, and the Red Chinese leader will have reached 75.

The oldest world leader now, West Germany's Chancellor Adenauer, at 83, is 41 years older than the President. By American inauguration day, Jan. 20, 1969, he'd be 84.

Here, in the descending order of their years, are the other six leaders with their present age and, in parentheses, their age on the day Kennedy would finish a second term, if they're still around:

Chiang Kai-shek, boss of Nationalist China on Formosa, 73 (81).

Antonio Salazar, dictator of Portugal, 72 (79).

India's Prime Minister Nehru, 71 (78).

France's President de Gaulle, 70 (78).

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, 69 (76).

Francisco Franco, dictator of Spain, 68 (75).

These next eight years will take a toll in men and no doubt make a change in nations.

In eight years Red China probably will have nuclear bombs. Up till now the Chinese Communist lack the power with which the United States protects Chiang on Formosa, have limited themselves to nuisance bombardments of offshore islands—no real danger to Formosa 110 miles away.

But once they get nuclear structure, the picture in Asia will change, the threats to Formosa should become more fierce.

Dictator Salazar, Portugal, looked solid in his job so long as he lived. Then natives in the Portuguese African colony of Angola began storming for freedom, killing as they went and being killed.

Angola seems bound to blow up before another eight years have passed. If it does, Salazar may be destroyed in the ruins.

When India seems so solid with his people that he figures to run the show so long as he lives, unless within the next year there come explosions which now can't be guessed at.

In France, de Gaulle is no head man. But his presidency may not be so secure, particularly if the French problem with Algeria takes a new turn—average turn—the army turns on him.

In Yugoslavia Tito looks powerful enough to stay where he is, so de Franco in Spain—so long as he lives.

It doesn't seem likely Adenauer could stand the strain of office until he's 83. Even if he does, some terribly tense days lie ahead for his country in the western struggle with Russia over Berlin.

There's no sign anyone is trying to shove Khrushchev or Mao Tse-tung aside, in their case their only problem in continuing to boss the show would seem to depend on their health.

As for Britain's Macmillan—he's a busy man but the strain of office seems to be showing. He looks tired.
