California Sizzles in Heat, Fire

NEWHALL, Calif., June 15 (UPI)—Increased winds caused concern for firefighters working in 100 degree heat today as they attempted to contain a fire that has blackened 5,000 acres of brushland north of this Los Angeles suburb.

Temperature of 106 degrees and more and a low humidity of 10 per cent added to the difficulties as eight air tankers circled the area in case they were needed to drop 100 tons on the ground.

Firemen had little hope of containing the blaze before this week's up to 15 miles an hour hampering winds.

The flames broke out yesterday and edged into sun-scorched, Angeles national forest.

Rapidly as a result of 100-degree heat and 30-mile-an-hour winds. At one time the fire burned 2,000 acres of brush within an hour.

A fire official said with luck the fire around the blaze started when a trash fire exploded out of control—could be contained.

There were no major injuries reported and flames are said to have been involved in the blaze which centered in Mint Canyon, about 10 miles north of Los Angeles.

San Francisco's sizzling 100.8-degree temperature and stifling thick smog led at least 30 persons yesterday.

The reading was the third highest temperature ever recorded in San Francisco, where residents usually flee mattering to the beaches while the mercury rises in the air.

The all-time record of 101.2 was set on Sept. 19, 1913, while a reading of 101.0 was recorded on Sept. 8, 1954.

At San Francisco International airport, 10 miles south of the city, it was the first time in the airport's 34-year history.

The spectators and an unbracketed at Castellote, just north of the San Francisco suburb, collapsed from the heat.

Goldberg to Try to Stall Ports Strike

NEW YORK, June 15 (UPI)—Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg will fly here today to take personal charge of negotiations to avert a midnight strike of 82,000 seamen in most U. S. ports.

"Goldberg's arrival in Washington to which he will fly to New York at the request of President Kennedy and the intervention of five maritime unions and owners of about 1,000 passenger ships, and the collars which would be immobilized by the strike.

Ralph E. Carey, president of the American Maritime Union, in Seattle, and J. Paul St. Sure, president of Pacific Maritime association, sent Goldberg a telegram in behalf of the shipowners this morning warning of a "protracted and disastrous" strike.

No meetings were scheduled between the disputants prior to Goldberg's arrival. The labor secretary not only had to deal with long feuding issues between the seamen and shipowners, but also with power politics among the unions, which are dominated by the 700,000-member National Maritime union.

WASHINGTON, June 15 (UPI)—The Senate today confirmed Joseph C. Swidler, a long-time partisan of the Democratic party, as a member of the federal power commission.

Republicans raised an opposition yesterday. Swidler, a lawyer from Knoxville, Tenn., and former general counsel of the Tennessee authority.

They served notice that President Kennedy may face a difficult fight if he tries to oust Republican Jerome K. Kyndland as FCC chairman and replace him with Swidler.

The President has indicated Swidler is his choice for the chairmanship. He has not yet said whether he would try to elevate Swidler to the post before Kyndland's term ends a year from now.

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U.S. Cuba Trade Committee Given Riotous Greeting at U.S. Return

MIAMI, June 15 (UPI)—Four American fair experts of the U.S. Cuba Trade Committee fled home today to meet riotous reception. Four hundred Cubans cheered them, and an irate U. S. citizen collared two of the delegates and attempted to place them under a citizen's arrest. In the ensuing melee a television newscaster camera was toppled. The man who tried to make the arrest was Douglas R. Vorhees, a real estate broker. He grabbed the first member of the group—Duane P. Greenhouse—who stepped out of the U. S. customs and said: "You, sir, are under arrest for violating the Export Administration Act."

Idaho Group Asks Reactor Blast Probe

BOISE, June 15 (UPI)—Workers at eastern Idaho's national reactor testing station appealed to Congress today to conduct an investigation of January's fatal reactor explosion and urged enactment of legislation "very needed to protect atomic workers."

The appeal was presented to the House Energy and Atomic Energy Committee by George Draslich, Idaho Falls, president of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers' Union.

The union's proposed testimony on the accident is presented here by Donald E. Seifer, legislative representative of the local and area nuclear industry. The investigation of January's fatal reactor explosion and urged enactment of legislation "very needed to protect atomic workers."

Committee Approves Lower Retiring Age

WASHINGTON, June 15 (UPI)—The Senate finance committee today approved legislation to liberalize social security benefits for 4.4 million Americans and permit them to retire at age 62.

The House-passed bill also would increase the minimum retirement benefit from \$33 to \$40 a month and hike benefits 10 per cent for widows and other persons receiving social security survivor payments. Under the bill, men could elect benefits, the same as presently provided for women. Men now must wait until age 65. Officials estimate 360,000 men will take advantage of the new law.

Relief at Last Resuming of Nuclear Test

WASHINGTON, June 15 (UPI)—A television industry body has decreed shorter commercials.

The television board of the National Association of Broadcasters has amended its television code to change its regulations.

The most important change will reduce the maximum commercial time during a half-hour program from 12 to 10 minutes.

Another change would reduce the number of spot commercials between shows during the evening time from three to two.

The code amendments take effect Oct. 29.

Polaris No. 8 Is Launched Under Guard

GRONTOON, Canada, June 15 (UPI)—The navy's eighth Polaris missile-firing nuclear submarine was launched today and fast. They declared the growing fleet of mobile launching systems independent of the number of prisoners available for release.

Venezuelans Burn Car of U. S. Official

CARACAS, June 15 (UPI)—Venezuelan authorities set police into the "autonomous" Central University today to investigate the night's burning of U. S. Ambassador Theodore Moscoso's car.

The unprecedented action indicated that President Romulo Betancourt, a personal friend of Moscoso, had ordered a new "tough" policy against communists and leftists at the university which has always been hostile to police or other authorities.

U. S. Fund in U. N. to Help Castro Cuba

WASHINGTON, June 15 (UPI)—Sen. Billie Bridges, R., N.H., told the Senate today that U. S. funds are going to be used through a United Nations agency to bolster the Fidel Castro regime in Cuba.

Bridges, who is a moderate Republican policy committee, attacked a decision of the U. S. National Security Council to provide million dollars available for exploration to relieve Cuban agriculture from dependence on sugar as its chief crop.

Lowered Phone Rate Considered

WASHINGTON, June 15 (UPI)—The federal communications commission (FCC) is considering a rate reduction on long distance telephone rates, it was disclosed today.

Chairman Newton N. Minow told the "house" anti-trust subcommittee that "comprehensive" rate reductions "are being looked on the matter."

Labor Board Protests Result Of Voting in Heyburn Plant

HEYBURN, June 15—Results of an election at the J. R. Slumpton company plant here last month in which the union was turned down, has led to a series of protests at the National Labor Relations Board in Seattle.

Plant officials report they have been ordered to pay \$100,000 in back wages and a report in Washington, D. C., is also being prepared.

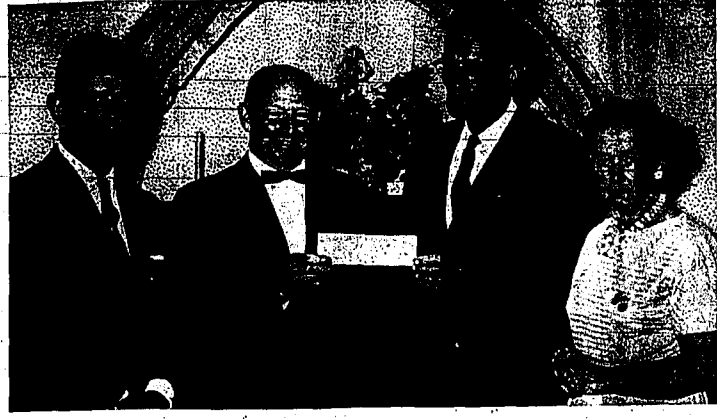

When the Leidenfrost first went to Africa they lived in a mud stick house with a concrete floor and metal roof but now they have much better living conditions. Their home is much like those seen in the "Hill" magazines with modern plumbing and they have a generator for electricity three hours in the evening. Like most buildings in that area their home is made of blocks made by cement and mud, because termites are such a problem. Mr. and Mrs. Leidenfrost have a 10-month-old son, Chaba Tokpa. His first name is Hanganar, since his father is a native of that country and died in 1945. The baby's middle name is Africa. The family is able to come to this country for three months every two years. They are visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Meyer, Gooding. She is the former Jane Meyer.

New Law to Require Soft Drink Labels

WASHINGTON, June 15 (AP) — All non-alcoholic carbonated beverages — soft drinks — will be required to bear a label listing the ingredients after June 16, 1962, the food and drug administration announced yesterday.

Loring F. Overman, public relations director for the American Bottlers of Carbonated Beverages, said 7-1/2 is one of the few such beverages that now lists ingredients on the bottle.

He added that such well known bottled drinks as Coca-Cola and Pepsi-Cola do not list them, although the industry has been expanding something like new requirements for some 20 years.

Overman said the industry is "absolutely" to meet estimates of the requirements' cost.

Overman said the industry in 35 billion bottles annually. He said studies have shown that the average bottle is sold at 12 times the price of the soft, strayed or broken. The industry buys about 1.44 billion bottles a year.

The FDA said the soft drinks have been exempted from the labeling requirement since Jan. 21, 1941, and FDA Commissioner George P. Larrick said, "There have been a number of consumer complaints because of the failure of carbonated beverages to bear a statement of ingredients."

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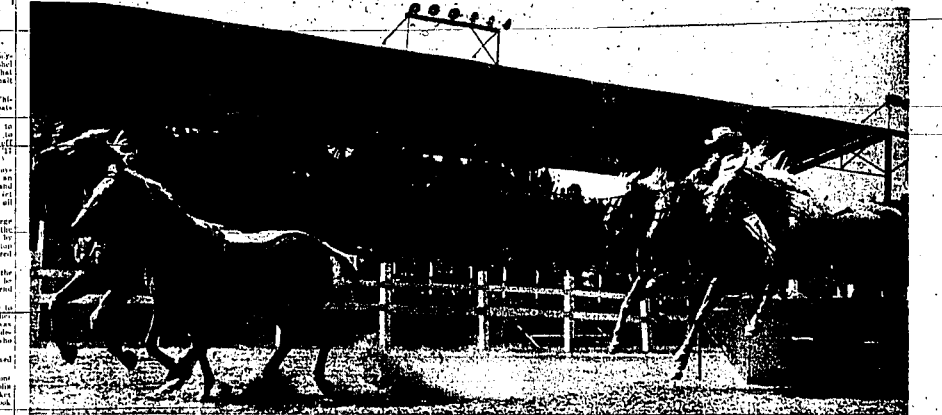

Nothing annoys grownup people more than the child who blantly interrupts their conversation with a bright but irrelevant remark. The interruption is disconcerting, it is so annoying that for an instant, and sometimes even permanently, the theme of the talk is lost.

This interrupting of adult work and conversation while a child is present is a bad habit. It is then that he must be firmly and gently taught not to speak while others are talking but to wait until they give him their attention. The small child who keeps tugging at his mother's skirt to attract her attention while she is talking should be checked and there, otherwise, as an older child he, who should have learned his manners, will be breaking into conversations.

One way of saving the situation is to keep the uninvited children out of the party room when entertaining guests. When only the family is present they can be taught about listening and waiting their turn; they must learn by experience and the family circle is the best place.

As always, the example of the parents teaches the children. What they do the children will surely do, no matter how they teach to the contrary.

MINI-CASSIA GOLF MEET SLATED JUNE 23-24

Carter to Shoot for Third Straight Crown; \$1,250 Prize List Is Anticipated

BURLEY, June 15—An enlarged Mini-Cassia amateur golf tournament, offering \$1,250 in merchandise awards, will be conducted at the Burley municipal golf course June 23 and 24. New Athletic League, Including ISC and Idaho, Eyed by Montana

BOZEMAN, Mont., June 15 (AP)—A new athletic conference, "affiliation among Montana State university, Montana State college and six other schools was proposed Wednesday by MSC athletic director Gene Bourdet.

Bourdet, in a telephone interview with John Campbell, sports-caster for radio station KYAN in Missoula, said:

"I would like to see a league composed of the two Montana schools, Colorado State university, Utah State university, the University of Idaho, Idaho State college, and the University of Nevada."
