Editor, Times-News: I read the story on mountain climbing in the 24 May edition of the Times-News with considerable interest. I am a number of years in Pocatello where my hobby is mountain climbing. It is a pleasure to discover that climbing is beginning to enter the classification of a sport. It is also a source of satisfaction to learn that there is an increasing awareness of the scenic and climbing excellence of some of the Idaho mountains.

One view with mixed emotions is climbing on the one hand, after having been one of a very small group for years, is assuming to have some kind of status at last. However, the advantage of enjoying the problems of dogging falling rock become greater and the problems of litter left by an increasing number of people spoils the enjoyment of the accomplishment of the climb to supplement one item in your story. Mention is made there of a recent climb of Leathernman peak on which was a party of five. I do not know whether we can claim a first climb of that peak. Roy Thomas, Arthur Cronquist, and I climbed Leathernman in late August of 1955, after having climbed Mt. Rogers, Idaho.

Bids Sought By Minidoka For Schools

RUPERT, June 17—Bids for additions to the present plant of the Minidoka County high school will be opened June 20, according to Camden Meyer, county superintendent.

A 100,000-square-foot room will be constructed back of the high school building and will be used for all junior-senior activities. The addition to the main building will extend the agricultural shop ward to almost double the present size.

Meyer reports satisfactory progress on the new Heyburn division elementary school, being built, and said that school officials hope to be able to have it ready for use by fall.

One new member of the board, Camden Meyer, reported that search in at the recent meeting of the group, and Harold Peterson was selected as chairman, with Russell Adams, Paul, as vice chairman.

Meyer issued another call for English teachers for the school system, explaining that four are needed. The need for 21 new teachers hired so far, he said, there has not been one English teacher hired since the superintendent's death at both the high school and the Washington Junior High school.

Vacancies still need filling in three or four other positions.

In order to help alleviate the overload on the buses, Meyer said that the board adopted a plan to run more 8 a.m. classes this year, with all these high school students in Rupert, and all those in the vicinity of Minico to start school at 8 a.m. This will allow buses to make a second run without being overloaded.

All county schools will open Aug. 22 to take care of a possible harvest vacation, Meyer said.

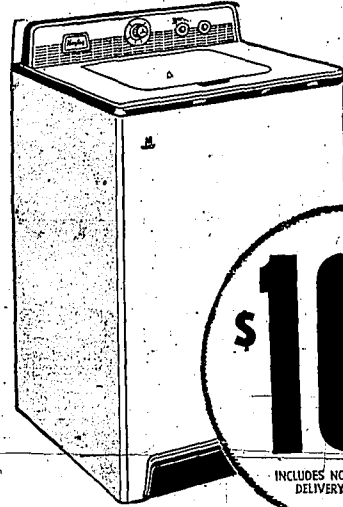

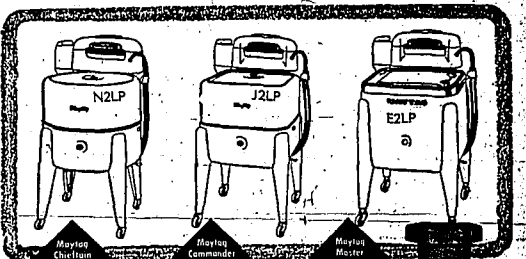
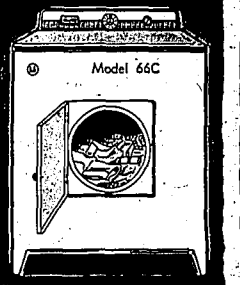

Rock Walls Mark Stage Station Site

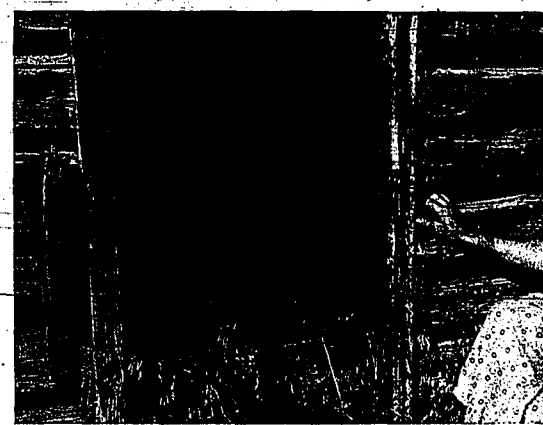

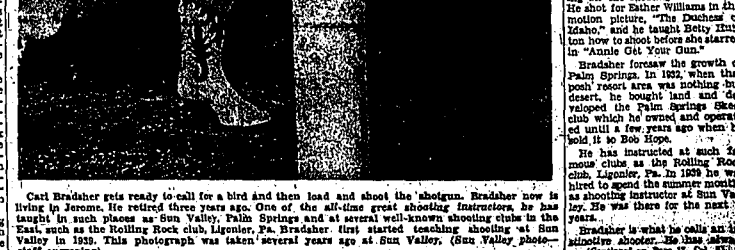

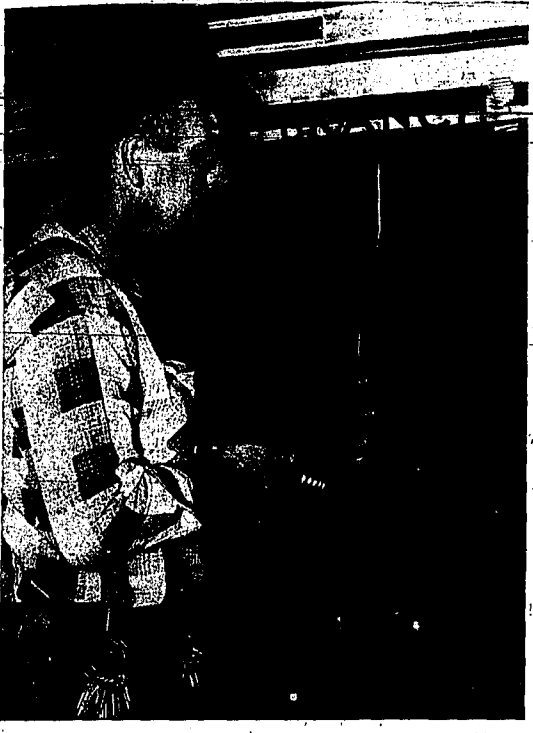

had success in transferring what he knows about shooting to his pupils and has created more than one champion. His record of success was recognized during World War II.
He served as a captain in the army air corps during the war, teaching gunnery instructors. He taught them how to shoot skeet and to coordinate hand-and-eye in combat shooting, especially to airplane machinegunners. During the war he taught more than 1,000 instructors, who in turn taught his methods to other students.
He was discharged after the war and returned to his business of teaching skeet and trap. Bradsher has always maintained the novice can be taught to shoot faster and better than the experienced shooter. This is because they have no bad shooting habits to overcome.
He has demonstrated on many occasions how a young boy can be turned into an expert shot after just a few lessons and he has even made expert shots of persons confined to wheelchairs.
Bradsher has always had a theory that has called more than one man—he believes a woman can become a better shot at skeet or trap than her husband. He has proved it much to the joy of the wife and sister of the husband.
He explains the reason is simple. A woman enters the man's world of shooting on thin ice. She is willing to listen and learn something that is strange to her. For this reason she is a good pupil and learns the fundamentals. But a man is too sure of himself and his own ego keeps him from equaling the woman as a student.
Bradsher laughs and says, "I've never taught a married couple to shoot. The woman eventually couldn't beat her husband if she really wanted to. But this isn't always the best thing. One couple almost got a divorce."

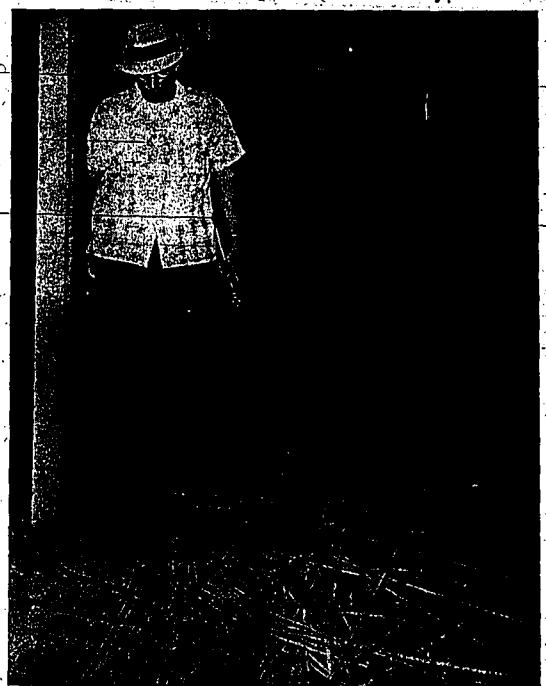

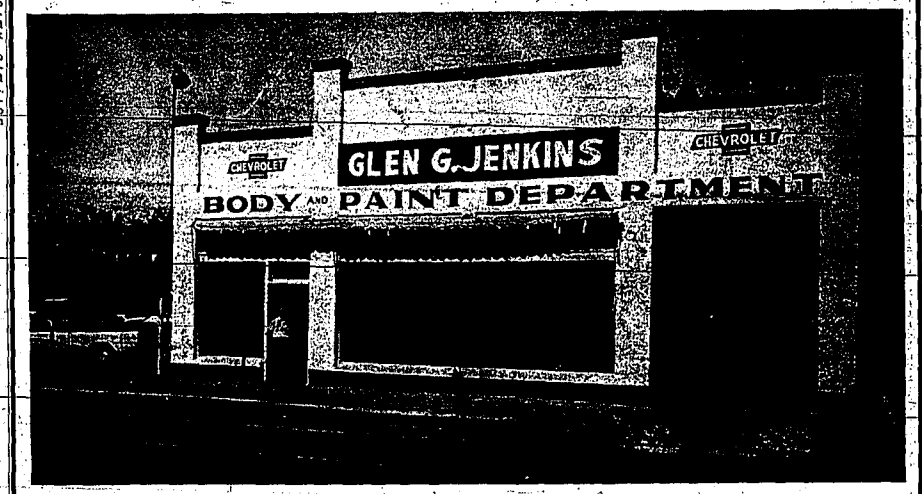

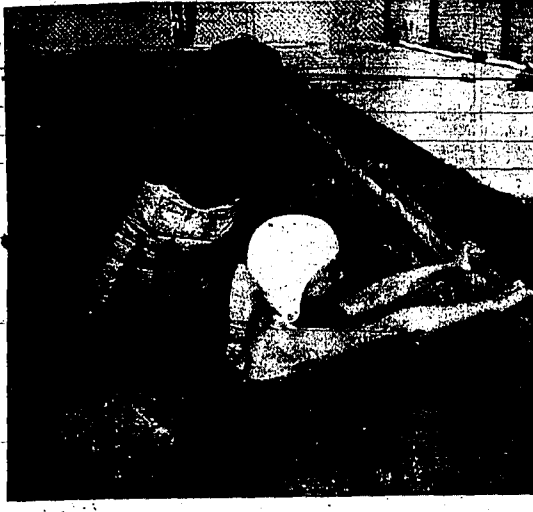

MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Cecil Calhoun, Buhl Farmer, Believes Taking Part in Public Affairs Is Duty

BUHL, June 17—It is a person's duty to take part in public affairs, Cecil Calhoun believes, and he has no right to gripe about how things are going.

Calhoun believes, and this is one of the basic philosophy that has guided him during his lifetime. He follows his own advice and has been active in various community affairs since he has lived here. He currently is in his second term as Twin Falls Pomona Grange master. He has been active in Grange work for 21 years and has held every office in the Grange in Twin Falls county. He has served two years as state overseer. He has served on the Deep Creek school board and as a farm representative for the Buhl Chamber of Commerce.

Never one to let his feelings go unexpressed, Calhoun always has been outspoken of public issues and is a frequent speaker before various groups throughout the area. Calhoun was born and raised on a working cattle ranch near North Platte, Neb. He was born in 1917. He attended public schools in North Platte and then went to work on the ranch. Both of his parents were pioneers in that part of Nebraska. His father came west from the Midwest in 1870. He returned to Northwestern university and got his degree in law. He married Calhoun's mother, who was a graduate of Michigan State Normal and they returned to the West and established the first ranch school at Rosebud, S. D. They taught there for several years and finally resigned because of their contempt for the way the American military treated the Indians. His father opened his practice in North Platte and started ranching. Calhoun planned to attend law school, but World War I broke out when he was in high school and ended just as he was called. This disrupted his plans. He worked on the ranch and eventually bought his father's interest in the ranch in 1942. It was a 16,000-acre-of-wooded-and-leveled land. Calhoun farmed and ranched until 1954. At that time the depression had raised havoc with his plans and with his ranch. He says for 11 years of operation he only had \$52 a year to show for it. "We were desperate," he says. "We had to find a place to start over again." In the late 1920's one of his brothers had traveled throughout the western states and Calhoun asked him what part of the country impressed him the most during his travels, and he recommended the Twin Falls area. Calhoun says the name always remained with him, and when he decided to move in the depression, he decided to come to this area and look around.
