

# Nazi Claims He Didn't Know of Plans for Jews

JERUSALEM, June 26 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann swore under oath today he never realized what the Nazi party intended to do to the Jews when he joined it in 1932. By the time the extermination plot unfolded, Eichmann said, he was powerless to influence it. The former Gestapo official accused of a key role in the extermination of six million Jews during World War II took the stand in his own defense this morning after hearing 10 weeks of prosecution evidence against him.

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### Foreign Help Cut Asked by U.S. Chamber

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—The U.S. Chamber of Commerce today urged congress to cut the administration's 4.8 billion dollars foreign aid request by about one-third.

The business organization, in testimony prepared for the senate foreign relations committee, endorsed the principle of foreign aid as a "vital instrument" of United States foreign policy.

Forrest D. Murden, government relations counselor for the Chamber and of Community of New Jersey, was scheduled to present the chamber's views. He was among a parade of public witnesses on the bill.

The testimony came as the administration made increasingly aware of senate dissatisfaction with its presentation of the aid program, particularly as it related to Latin America.

Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey advised the senate department he would not vote for the new aid program until he "receives some answers" on improvements in the Latin American program.

Humphrey said little was being done to foster cooperation in Latin America and too much emphasis was still being given military assistance. He said in a closed-door foreign relations committee hearing that the United States was not in the "race" with the communists in Latin America.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce opposed the Kennedy plan to provide 4.8 billion dollars in long-term development loans over the next five years through treasury borrowing.

As an alternative, Murden said, congress should make "multi-year authorizations and appropriations." He said this would permit long-range plans, but keep spending control in congress.

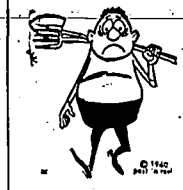

NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—Sherman Adams says that as he looks back on the "whole unhappy episode" of the mistakes in judgment that he made in the Goldline case are plain enough.

Adams resigned his White House post in 1958 after admitting he had accepted favors from Boston businessman Bernard Goldline and had made phone calls to government agencies on Goldline's behalf.

### Church Says Science Nearing Break-Through on Wheat Use

WASHINGTON, June 20 (Special)—Sen. Frank Church, D. Ida today said department of agriculture scientists are nearing a "break-through" on a key problem which may result in an enormous new market for wheat in underdeveloped nations.

Church said researchers are convinced they can develop a fast, milk-like wheat product at low cost for people in countries with millions of underfed citizens who cannot afford meat in their diet.

Church said the agricultural research service hopes to combine wheat with other grains, such as corn, to make a whole-kernel wheat with some gluten and various seasonings to make sausages and canned foods similar to hamburger and other meat products.

Presently, research is progressing on such problems as flavor, physical properties and long storage life.

New wheat markets also are being developed for baby foods, special diet foods and bakery meat rolls, according to information provided Church by Dr. B. T. Shaw, administrator of the agricultural research service.

Baby foods and special diet foods require high protein content, and new milling processes make it feasible to extract high-protein concentrates from wheat flour.

The concentrates can be blended with water to form bland, milk-like products for infant feeding and for instant soups, stews and porridges.

Dr. Shaw also said new methods are being sought to use wheat substances in adhesives, plastics, coatings and additives for paints and paper products.

WASHINGTON—A new feud involving the food and drug administration, the pharmaceutical industry and the nation's medical profession is blazing across the country...

Nothing Is Certain

Some weeks ago, the weather bureau announced through Idaho's congressmen that an agricultural weather service had been approved for southern Idaho...

With everyone in favor of the proposal, it was thought that nothing would be merely routine. But such is not the case. The bill containing authorization for the southern Idaho weather service came before the house of representatives last week...

Then Monday the measure came before the senate appropriations committee without provisions for southern Idaho. Both Idaho's senators stepped up on the bill, urging a change to provide funds. Whether the Idaho senators will succeed in restoring funds for the station remains to be seen...

At any rate, the incident serves to point out the fact that nothing is certain when dealing with congress. Actions of that law-making body emphasize only too often that the wheel squeaking the loudest is likely to get the most grease.

Twin Falls owns a vote of thanks to an alert Chamber of Commerce which moved the station to the present location when it became known. Secretary-Manager Grange has worked many months for the weather station which would be of real value to all southern Idaho, not just Twin Falls and Magic Valley.

STRANGER THAN FICTION
Description of three communications towers May 28 was enough to fire the imagination even the most casually interested person. Naturally, communist activity and disgruntled employees of the American Telephone and Telegraph company were the first to appear...

The "American republican army" came immediately into the spotlight, as was immediately the man dreamed up by destruction of the three towers. Anyway, he claims the tower destruction was designed to publicize his "army." If that was the only goal, it certainly has been achieved now.

It's rather difficult to reconcile the army's avowed purposes of being anti-communist, anti-big business and yet still favoring nationalization of public utilities. Just to add another quirk to the picture, the army's chief, Bernard J. Brous, is described as a man who ran a \$40,000 inheritance into a spectacular fortune.

Although few people are likely to understand the intricate details of the sabotage, undoubtedly will follow the news that the saboteurs have been found. No one could feel right so long as people capable of such destruction were still at large.

Senseless as the whole incident has been, it still has been of some value, however small it may appear. Spogging on such a scale has been rare in the isolated stretches of the West. In fact, the possibility may not have occurred to either utility people or public officials involved...

MORE LIKE HIM NEEDED
More than a few observers are saying that President Kennedy needs to achieve national unity in foreign affairs. Republican like the late Sen. Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan.

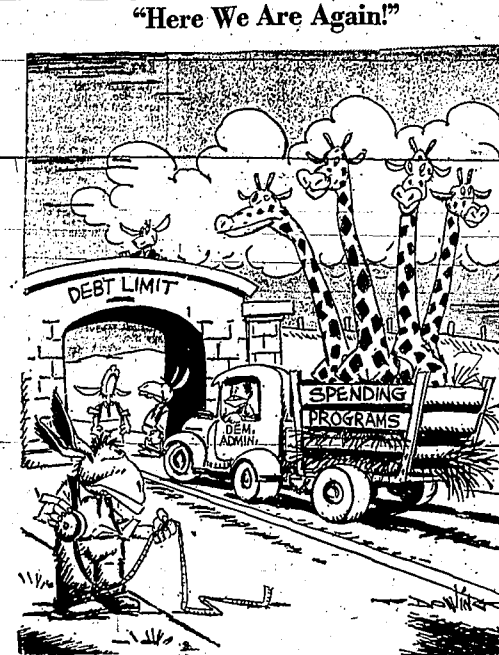

### Plan on Tax Is Welcomed By President

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—President Kennedy received warm-weather recommendations which would give the White House emergency income tax relief proposals a stronger voice in federal reserve board operations.

But both proposals drew some quick congressional frowns along with a few smiles.

Kennedy met for 45 minutes with the privately created commission on money and credit report containing recommendations which, if carried out, would have profound effects on the nation's financial life.

Most eye-catching of the proposals were ones which would authorize the President to cut basic income tax rate by as much as 23 cents a year and to raise it a like amount to curb boom-days inflation. His action would be subject only to veto by congress.

Less spectacular but perhaps more basically important was the recommendation to reduce the size of the federal reserve board from seven to five members, make the term of office 14 years and allow the President to select a chairman and vice chairman whose terms of office would coincide with his. The net effect of this would be to curtail the board's present very wide independent powers over the nation's financial practices and tie it more closely to administration policy.

In a statement released by the White House, Kennedy commended the report to all Americans and said the program "could make an important contribution to the health and strength of our economy."

The commission was created by the committee for economic development and financed largely by the Ford Foundation. Its three members are: Walter Wriston, chairman, of the field of money and credit in half a century.

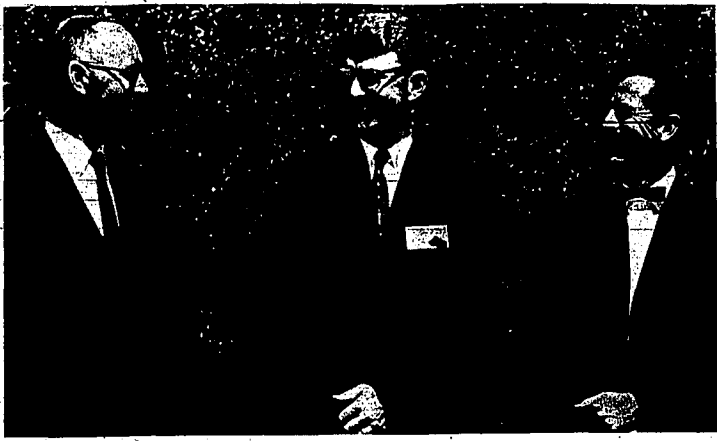

### Added Spending, Higher Debt Heads Nation to Collapse, Dworshak Claims

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—If Americans permit their representatives in government to drift irresponsibly along into more spending, deeper debt, the nation is headed toward an economic collapse that will plunge us to the status of a second-class nation just as surely as a military reverse would, declares Sen. Henry Dworshak, a member of the senate appropriations committee.

"The Kennedy administration states that it is not important to balance the budget in any one year but over a period of years; but what assurance has been given that the budget will be balanced?" Dworshak is predicted for 1961 and 1962 to the tune of \$100 million dollars and they are almost certain to run higher," Dworshak asserted in a statement.

"Despite his call for fiscal integrity, President Kennedy's programs call for increased back door spending," a means by which certain amounts of money may be used by an agency without requiring authorization or appropriation through congress. The "back door" spending measure already passed near passage will boost this uncontrolled outpouring of tax

dollars into the billions through such bills as the housing bill, depressed areas, foreign aid, airport grants, federal highway program and federal aid to education.

"While some of these programs are desirable, there is a great amount of political pork barrel in the bills. With the programs already approved and those proposed by the new frontier, 100 billion dollar budget will be a reality within a few years. Our national spending has leaped from millions to billions in a short span of years. It is now time for the people who pay the bill to decide how much government spending they are willing to support, especially in non-defense items which make up the major portion of all budget request hereafter.

"Our government," he said, "has reached extremely dangerous proportions and must be reduced by one of two ways: Higher taxes or less government spending."

"I believe that most taxpayers will agree with me that taxes are high enough already. This leaves us with the alternative of paring down government spending. Of the \$4 billion dollar increase the President has asked for in his 1962 budget, 2.3 billion dollars or 67 per cent are for nondefense spending proposals. While it is true that this country can afford to take care of those who cannot take care of themselves, it cannot afford to support welfare programs which will create inflation — a bigger problem than any they might be attempting to solve," the senator declared.

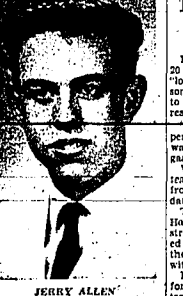

"I'm sick to my stomach of their desecrating of their reception and get exactly what was to be expected," he said.

Kennedy told Ellender the riders had no difficulties when they were in Alabama, but he was told the Louisiana officials for their handling of the situation.

**Water Supply Future Needs Are Stressed**

MCCALL, June 20 (AP)—The U.S. commissioner of reclamation yesterday asked members of the Farm Bureau from 11 western states to be missionaries in promoting understanding for conserved water resources.

Floyd E. Dornly told the 330 Farm Bureau members here for the three-day western regional conference "It is quite natural for people" from the more humid areas of the nation "to be concerned" for a regional resource development such as reclamation in arid and semi-arid states. It is necessary to meet the needs of the future.

During the next 20 years, he said, the 17 western states will increase in population 50 per cent from 44 million to 71 million, while the nation as a whole will increase 45 per cent in population.

The eight Rocky Mountain states will increase 67 per cent and the three Pacific Coast states will increase 42 per cent, he said.

Unless timely actions are taken, he said, we may find ourselves with a shortage of farmland. He said "We are losing more than one million acres annually to non-agricultural purposes." He said "At the same time," Dornly said, "we are told that by 1980 our domestic and export needs are expected to be from 70 to 80 per cent greater. To meet these needs will require continued gains in technology to provide crop yields 42 per cent greater and we will need a net gain of 20 million acres of cropland."

Dornly said reclamation projects pay for themselves. He said the total of all projects constructed now under construction and authorized are estimated to cost about eight billion dollars. Of this amount 90 per cent will be returned to the treasury, he said.

At the same time, he said, "reclamation farms and adjacent towns are paying into the treasury each year about 400 million dollars in federal taxes. This is one-third greater than the level of expenditures for reclamation development."

Reclamation projects, he said, contribute only about two per cent in surplus production, he said. He said 31 per cent of reclamation acreage is largely complementary and supplementary to the vast range livestock industry.
