## Plan for Strike Is Rejected

NEW YORK, June 23 (UPI)—Two maritime unions representing 33,000 strikers today rejected the government's proposal in a 60-day suspension of the nationwide maritime strike, shortly after workers of 90 per cent of the affected ships accepted it.

The Seafarers International Union and the Marine Engineers Beneficial Association said they rejected Labor Secretary Arthur Goldberg's proposal to accept a plan of preserving the principle of free collective bargaining and rights of the union to negotiate and protect the validity of agreements already negotiated.

The strikers and unions make up one of the two rival labor forces involved in the week-old strike. The other, the 31,000-member National Maritime Union, will make public its decision on the proposal later this afternoon.

The NMU, together with the Masters, Mates and Pilots and the American Red Cross, will speak for some 49,000 strikers.

The American Merchant Marine Institute, largest of the unions' groups, and two other management groups announced acceptance of the Goldberg proposal earlier this afternoon.

"We accept the proposal contained in your telegram of June 22," the institute said in a wire to Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg, who yesterday made the formal announcement.

## Tractor Offer of Unit Is Rejected By Cuba Leader

KEY WEST, Fla., June 23 (AP)—Prime Minister Fidel Castro rejected today the latest offer of the Tractor for Freedom committee but said he would accept captured rebels back to the United States to explain his position to the American public. In the rejection, reported by Havana radio, Castro charged that the committee lied when it accused Castro of changing his position. He said the committee tried to confuse public opinion. The Tractor for Freedom committee had set a meet in exile-line today in a take-it-or-leave-it ultimatum that capped nearly a month of negotiations. ## Kennedy Is "Fine" Has Full Agenda

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—President Kennedy, "feeling fine" in the words of an aide, deserted his sick bed today and played host to Japanese Prime Minister Hayato Kikaya.

Kennedy, confined to bed yesterday by a bacterial virus infection, posed for photographs with the prime minister and then walked into the driveway of the executive mansion to bid a personal farewell.

Kikaya paid a farewell call closing out three days of high-level talks.

The crutches that a back strain had forced Kennedy to use before he was felled by illness were nowhere in sight. He walked slowly, but if he limped at all it was so slightly as to be hardly discernible.

Kennedy canceled a scheduled lunch conference with 1200 delegates yesterday after coming down with the virus infection which shot his temperature to 101.4 degrees before it broke. His doctor reported late yesterday that he was recovering very slowly. Kennedy set out to prove it today.

He did, however, yield to advice from the White House physician. Dr. Janet Travell, and agreed to remain in his second-floor living quarters. The "mild" Kennedy had passed the word that he planned to divide his time between the White House and his office in the west wing.

Dr. Travell made it clear that she would prefer him to stay in his upstairs quarters. He receded 1200 yards.

## Water Situation in T.F. "Kind of Bad"

The water situation in Twin Falls was described as "kind of bad," Friday morning by Kenneth Leazer, Twin Falls filter plant superintendent. He noted that the plant has been using about 12,354,000 gallons of water per day for the past five days. The filter plant, operating at a 10 per cent overload has been producing about 1.1 million gallons per day. The city's wells have been producing 1,250,000 per day. WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—President Kennedy called cabinet members to a parley today to discuss a White House luncheon conference today, primarily to discuss the Berlin situation.

Kennedy, recovering from a sleep throat and mild virus attack, arranged the 1 p.m. meeting late in the morning. It was announced shortly after he concluded a long conference with Ambassador Adlai Stevenson on his recent trip to South America.

At first, the White House did not give the purpose of the meeting. But it later was learned that Berlin would be one of the topics of conversation.

**Back in Office**

Hamer Budge is back in public office and will assume his duties as third district judge officially on July 1. Until the next general election, Idaho again will have the services of Mr. Budge's considerable talents.

But Mr. Budge is not taking himself from the Idaho political scene for all time. When asked about future political aspirations, he would go no farther than to point out that judges are appointed on a non-political basis and "I shall, of course, be nonpartisan as provided by law" so long as he serves as a judge.

Most politicians will find little comfort in the Budge statement. A good many Idahoans have expected Hamer Budge to return to the political arena in the 1962 election. There has been some speculation he will attempt to regain the second congressional district post which he served Idaho well for 10 years. And Mr. Budge has been mentioned as a possibility to oppose Sen. Frank Church.

The senate race would be the better of the two chances as a Budge-Church fight for the senate would make an interesting campaign. Not too many people would be willing to crawl out on a limb to predict the winner of such a race. Unless Mr. Budge does a violent about-face by renouncing his old congressional seat, there is little reason to expect him to file for representative. It's no secret that he objected to the necessity of campaigning for reelection every two years while a senate goes through only one election every six years.

There's another possibility that hasn't been given too much attention, that Mr. Budge might have ideas of following the lead of his father-in-law, the late U.S. congressman. The elder Budge served on the high bench for a good many years and his son is a capable lawyer. If he entertains ideas of serving eventually on Idaho's supreme court, the appointment of third district judge might be the first step in that direction.

At any rate, the important present fact is that Hamer Budge is back in public office where Idaho can benefit from his experience and talents. The fact he has few public servants of the Budge caliber. And no one is likely to miss the significance of Mr. Budge's return to public office. Had he intended to retire to a quiet civilian existence, he would have done so long ago. Budge would have accepted the judge's appointment.

All of which means that politicians and voters alike can appreciate on the course Mr. Budge will select. He intends to remain in the judicial branch and will be likely to be a judge candidate in the next general election. But if he has other plans, he might show up as a candidate for the U. S. senate. Or even as a candidate for governor.

In the meantime Idaho can benefit from his services.

**COSTLY MISSILE AGE**

Quoting as another way of saying that today's faster jet planes and missiles have changed military concepts and requirements.

Defense department personnel who talk about "savings" from abandoning obsolete bases, arms and methods are talking through their hats. It's like pointing to "savings" resulting from discontinuing the cavalry because the horses can't be fed. So today the cavalry can't be fed and how many horses could be fed with what one tank costs?

The very nature of military modernization adds to the cost. Today's supersonic, high-flying jet bombers are expensive almost beyond comprehension, costing upwards of eight million dollars each. Hundreds of times more than the "model T" airplanes of World War I.

The military might take on the push-button aspect some day, but with skyrocketing costs, no one will be able to afford it. One thing for certain is that weapons of the missile age aren't cheap and aren't regardless of irresponsible talk about savings.

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### Rupert Group Hears Talk by Hospital Head

Rupert, June 23—There are very few large industries in the area than your hospital," Melvin Engstrom, manager of the Cassia Chamber of Commerce Thursday.

Engstrom pointed out that the local hospital had one of the largest payrolls, and that it was one of the largest employers in the county. Contrary to some pessimistic predictions, the hospital is operating at capacity and above most days, Engstrom said.

He announced the addition of a laboratory technician to the staff, making it possible for various types of lab work to be done here instead of being sent out of town, and in some cases, out of state, to be done.

He explained how the improved facilities actually save money for local patients by saving the expense of long distance travel. Members of the family accompany the patients going out of town for hospitalization.

The hospital is one of the most complex, both in the building plans and in the organization. Engstrom said, with some of the most complex instruments and equipment used in any plant of comparable size.

He pointed out the importance of the X-ray machine and physical therapy equipment, both of which, if not handled by a properly trained person, can be very dangerous. He said that patients who come to the hospital are laden with illnesses and that it is the task of the hospital staff to minister to those needs as well as to the physical needs.

Praise was given to the hospital staff and to the talents to help the regular staff in caring for the patients, especially the nurses. He told him the women make dolls for all the children who come into the hospital, take care for patients in the geriatric ward, present a small bouquet to each patient, and in many other ways, contribute to their well-being.

Engstrom reported an average daily patient population for the first month of the hospital operated which was 40 per cent of the capacity; for February, the average rose to 70 per cent, with 85 per cent for March. The average is more than 80 per cent, he said, and pointed out that the hospital figures show that the area should have seven hospital beds for each 1000 population, and with 14,000 in Minidoka county, the present hospital is undermanned.

Robert Jones, program chairman, introduced Dr. W. L. James, staff member, who then introduced Engstrom. Dr. James reported that doctors from other areas who had toured the new hospital had expressed their admiration for such a well equipped and staffed hospital. He said that the modern features included in the hospital, such as suction and oxygen being piped to each room. He said that the necessity of enlarging the present number of rooms was already being considered.

Chamber President William Lott spoke of the possibility being considered of changing the twice-monthly meetings to one each week, and asked the group to consider the suggestion which will be discussed at a later date. He also reminded sponsors of Rodde queen contestants to plan a parade on Saturday night at the jamboree to introduce their candidates.

### Famous Show Retiring, but Team Doesn't

HOLLYWOOD, June 23 (AP)—"Amos 'n' Andy" may have retired, but the longtime team of Carroll O'Connor and Gosden is carrying on. The boys are signing a whole new career—in whiteface, so to speak. "We even had to join the Screen Actors guild for the first time," says Freeman Gosden, who played Amos and the Kingfish. Charles Correll, the deep-voiced Andy, couldn't make it to lunch. His partner explained: "Charlie had back from trying to see 20 countries in 20 days. It's resting up."

Gosden has enough enthusiasm for both of them, and he was excited about their new venture. They are planning the roles of a new television cartoon series, "Calvin and Colonel."

"I like a Southern colonel," says Gosden. "That comes easy to me since I was born in the South (Richmond) and my father fought in the Civil war with Mosby's rangers. Charlie's family was originally from the South. He plays a bear—a lazy bear with an eye for females. I'm a fox. They're both Southerners, but not colored."

This is the first time in 45 years that Correll and Gosden haven't played in blackface—usually as stereotypes. Both started in minstrel shows in the South. They met and joined forces in Durham, N. C., in 1916. The next year they did their first broadcast in New Orleans. They began their "Amos 'n' Andy" radio show in Chicago in 1925 and switched to "Amos 'n' Andy" two years later. 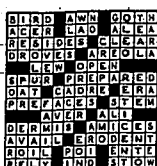

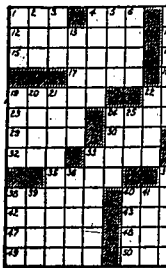

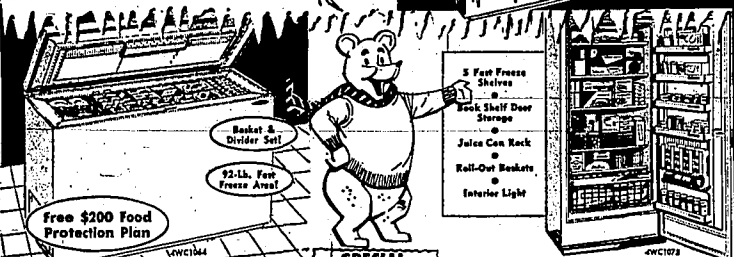
