### Editor of Red Paper Speaks To President

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—President Kennedy conferred today with Alexander Adabiev, son-in-law of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and editor of Izvestia.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said Kennedy met for a half hour with Adabiev and Mikhail Khramov, chief of the press section of the Soviet foreign ministry. They discussed a variety of subjects.

Salinger said that Kennedy made some points which he considered "adabiev will carry back to his father-in-law" when he meets with the Soviet leader on Wednesday.

Adabiev and Khramov appeared on an NBC-TV program called "The Nation's Future" Saturday night and debated freedom of the press with Salinger and the New York Times Soviet expert, Harrison Salisbury.

The two Soviet panelists watched the program, which had been put on tape earlier in the day, at a dinner party at Salinger's home Saturday night.

They also visited with the press secretary at his home in Washington and paid a farewell call at the White House today.

Salinger told Salinger that he would be seeing his father-in-law on Wednesday and would convey the essence of his talks with the President to Khrushchev.

The White House press secretary had said on the TV program that the Khramov had promised that the debate would be shown in the Soviet Union. Adabiev said today, Salinger said, "they have asked for a kinescope of the show and it is our hope it will be shown."

### Goldberg Will Now Use Labor Law He Once Fought in Court

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg, who fought the Taft-Hartley law's strike-stopping provisions before the supreme court in 1959, is relying on it for help now.

Goldberg was the attorney for the steelworkers' union who unsuccessfully challenged the 10-day no-strike injunction during the 116-day walkout that idled 500,000 steelworkers two years ago.

Now, as the President's chief adviser on labor matters, it fell to him—on the basis of reports from government agencies—to recommend that the government invoke the same legal machinery to end the crippling maritime strike.

The labor secretary admits that he is unhappy about the decision, but he says the law is the only way to protect the nation's health and safety.

### Disaster Help To Gem Flood Areas Oked

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—President Kennedy today authorized \$250,000 in federal disaster assistance for flooded areas of Idaho.

Kennedy acted on the recommendation of Frank B. Miles, director of the office of civil and defense mobilization.

Miles said surveys indicated damage in excess of \$250,000 and suggested that Kennedy declare the floods a "major disaster."

Gov. Robert E. Smythe, Idaho, had estimated his state would need \$500,000 in federal aid to relieve areas hit by floods that began in mid-May. This recommendation included an initial outlay of \$250,000, based on surveys and previous experience.

Kennedy also allowed three percent for administrative expenses. He found damage caused by the floods "to be of sufficient severity and magnitude" to warrant federal assistance.

### Iraqi Leader Says He Will Annex Shiek

BAHJADAD, Iraq, June 26 (UPI)—Iraqi has announced she will annex her fabulously oil-rich neighbor, the little shirkdom of Kuwait, raising speculation whether the ruling shiek will call on Britain to aid the former British protectorate. There was also speculation that neighboring Saudi Arabia might object to Kassem's grabbing such a rich prize.

Iraqi Premier Abdel Karim Kassem said his government will issue an ordinance today carrying out the annexation of the world's richest oil reserves. Kassem declared Kuwait was Iraq's by historical right. Kassem told a news conference Sunday night the takeover would be peaceful and the ruling shiek, Sir Abdullah Al-Salim, 67, would be named chief administrator of the 8,000-square-mile territory.

Kassem, who led the revolt that toppled Iraq's Hashemite monarchy in 1958, warned the shiek, however, that if he misused his office he would be considered rebellious.

The British foreign office's first comment was that "it is a Kuwaiti affair now." Diplomatic sources suggested, however, that Britain would be ready to move in with aid if Kuwait sought it.

When it ended the protectorate last week, Britain announced it would continue to guarantee Kuwait against aggression provided the shirkdom asked for aid.

### Two Separate Road Mishaps Take 13 Lives

**By United Press International**

Two separate road mishaps in California took the lives of 13 people last night and three others in a head-on collision on a road overpass at Depey, N. Y. A fourth member of the family was injured.

Six persons were killed in another head-on crash on U. S. 80 near San Bernardino. Seven children were hurt, two of them critically.

In California, a family of three was killed late Saturday night in a two-car collision at a Lynnwood intersection.

Three young Sacramento, Calif., residents were killed and a fourth man was injured critically when one of them apparently fell asleep at the wheel yesterday. Their car crashed into a concrete abutment along U. S. 40 near Roseville, Calif.

Three of nine persons riding in a car on Staten Island, N. Y., were killed early yesterday when the car struck a tree. The other six survivors in the car were injured, but the bus driver escaped unhurt.

At Newark, N. J., 37 persons were injured in a rear-end collision on the New Jersey turnpike Saturday. Twelve of them still were hospitalized yesterday.

At Chicago, 21 persons were injured when a bus crashed into the center pier of a windowed stadium. Virginia state police blamed the fatal-accident on a station wagon that swung into the left lane to pass and rammed a car coming from the other direction.

### Space Chief Predicts U. S. to Beat Reds With Man on Moon

WASHINGTON, June 26—The U. S. Space Chief James E. Webb predicted today the United States will beat the Russians in the race to put a man on the moon and bring back to Earth.

Webb, director of the national aeronautics and space administration, said the first manned lunar landing would put three Americans on the moon "before the end of the decade."

"The kind of overall spacecraft that President Kennedy has planned to use will put us there first," he said.

Webb said the United States will have a "man on the moon" by the end of the decade. He said the achievement will cost between 20 billion dollars and 40 billion dollars, "probably toward the 20 billion dollar level," he said.

Webb added it will have "side products in developing scientific and technical knowledge that will be most valuable in other parts of our economy."

"When it comes to all the technology to make a 'soft' landing and bring the men back—things we're starting slightly ahead," Webb said.

But he conceded the advantage was with Russia in being first to orbit.

Other developments:

—Sen. Stuart Symington, also, today urged support of the president's goal of "a clearly leading role in space achievement."

—Symington, a member of the senate space sciences and armed services committee, said he had administration and power struggles among the military services cost the United States a two-year lead over Russia in space developments.

—The federal space agency announced last night it would try to orbit around the Earth this week a six-foot long, 167-pound satellite designed to gather data "vital" to future space flight systems.

—The agency said it would record impacts of larger sizes of meteorites than previous satellites.
