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Probe Asked for \$6,440 Shortage in Lunch Funds

The Twin Falls school board voted unanimously Monday night to request further investigation of a hot lunch fund shortage of \$6,440.35 during the last three years at Lincoln school. Cecil F. Olsen, school lunch officer for the state department, told the board the figure was preliminary and might vary somewhat in a final report being prepared by a federal investigator. The federal government is involved because surplus commodities are made available to the hot lunch program through the state department of education.

The preliminary check extended over a period of two weeks and was made by a federal auditor from San Francisco. Olsen outlined for the school board the various operational details that have been found responsible for similar shortages in other hot lunch programs. He emphasized that one of the possible situations had been found in the Twin Falls case, leaving the school board with the answer.

Olsen pointed out the shortage was rather difficult to trace because records had been destroyed and investigators had to go to the program in question. Mrs. Bertha Olik, supervisor of the hot lunch program in the Twin Falls school system, already had notified the school board of changes in the program in the past year, including changes of personnel.

Other action, trustees voted to hire Paul E. Kenny, former minister of the Christian church in Twin Falls, as instructor of a special education class in the high school building. It is a master's degree from Phillips University, Effie, Okla., and 13 years of teaching experience. His wife was Mrs. Helen E. Till, BS degree from Eastern Oregon College of Theology, La Grange, Ore., and she has five years of teaching experience.

Benson Says He Wouldn't Okay Funds

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—A member of the state emergency committee said today he would vote against any attempt to use part of the federal emergency fund for a territorial centennial celebration.

Walter E. Benson said the \$125,000 appropriated to the governor for emergency relief in the territory would be used for other purposes. He said he would vote against the measure.

While working he accidentally touched the cable with his right hand. Elmer Schenk, city electrician, said about 1,150 volts entered Anderson's body just about the hip and left his body about the right knee. Don Farmer, also an electrician, was working on the same pole when he arrived. Oxygen then was administered to Anderson. He was pronounced dead at an arrival at Minidoka Memorial hospital.

State Senator Assured That Help Planned

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Cool, Contaminated

In view of the wide recreational use made of Snake River for many miles along its length through Magic Valley, personnel of the district health department made a rather diplomatic statement concerning the health problem resulting from the contaminated river. Dr. Luther Thompson, director, pointed out that Snake River can't be endorsed for recreational use, but it can be condemned, either.

Actually, the director points out that no outbreaks of disease of epidemic proportions have been traced definitely to Snake River. On the other hand, it was carefully noted that "untreated surface waters are always potential health hazards." All of which points out to the individual that he'll have to make up his own mind about whether he'll fish, boat or water-ski on Snake River.

"We cannot say that there is not a possibility of contracting water-borne diseases," Dr. Thompson said. "But we can't justifiably say that individuals using the water for recreational purposes will become ill," the experts pointed out.

That's about as far as anyone could reasonably be expected to go. All residents of Magic Valley know that large amounts of city sewage and industrial wastes are dumped into the river and have been for years. Until the relatively recent addition of industrial wastes apparently the only source of pollution from city sewage. Of the two sources of contamination, it would appear that raw sewage would pose the greatest threat to health. Inquiries indicate many people are quite concerned now over contamination of Snake River. The reasons are quite clear when the wave of inquiries coincided with hot weather.

"Yes, Snake River is contaminated, but it's not as bad as you might think," Dr. Thompson said. "The water is not as great a threat to health now than it did last year, or the year before. But if you're water-skiing and happen to spill, it might be best to try to avoid swallowing too much of the water."

ADMISSION OF FAILURE

Ever since the Russian revolution which catapulted the communists into power, food—or the lack of it—has been the No. 1 complaint for Russia. The country has had a succession of five-year and seven-year plans, the main purpose of which has been to increase food production for home consumption. Apparently all the plans have had something in common, namely, failure. The latest admission of failure is Premier Khrushchev's suggestion for the use of horse meat and American-type hybrid corn to ease the Soviet food shortages. He went out on his word to tell his fellow Russians how good the food is. He said, "I put a rare good word for the U. S. and its experiments with 60-day corn and added, 'Our agronomists must work to develop such a variety.'"

S. and Russia having "liberated" its experts at the end of World War II. Apparently the Russian-liberated scientists are a notch ahead.

Any other claims of Russian leadership are open to question, particularly in the production of food. The free economy of the U. S. has excelled in food production to the point where surplus food is not only a national problem but a constant source of embarrassment. Russia is not behind that way.

Russians have been getting the same old story on food for so long that they should be getting suspicious. Even now they have a "doubt" in their mind. They'll probably around the next corner when they'll properly find just more horse meat.

The Russian plight serves to illustrate quite effectively that people can eat ham-berger all their lives and never know what it's like to eat steak.

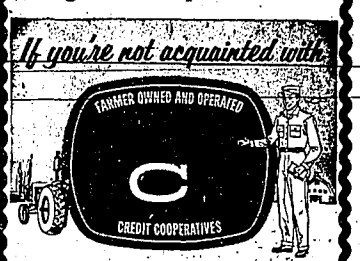

House Solons Okay Hike in National Debt

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The house voted yesterday for a five billion dollar temporary increase in the national debt ceiling. The legislation would set the ceiling at 298 billion dollars and make sure the treasury can pay its bills.

The vote was 211-147. For hours before the house acted on the bill, the senate, Republicans raked President Kennedy's administration with charges of reckless spending.

The senate is expected to act promptly on the legislation. Unless it approves it by Friday, the debt limit automatically will drop to its permanent level, 285 billion dollars.

Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon has told congress the debt at week's end will add four billion dollars higher than this figure, so reduction to the permanent figure would require a treasury crisis, which congress will not permit to develop.

The country has been operating for the past year under a 293 billion dollar debt limit — the permanent figure plus the additional 15 billion dollar increment authorized for one year only.

Explosion Rocks Texas City Area

DALLAS, Tex., June 27 (AP)—Two explosions, apparently triggered with a kitchen stove, and a dropped tank of propane gas demolished a large brick ice cream warehouse today and killed two persons, one of them critically.

The explosions were so violent that the brick walls of the warehouse were blown out and set the roof collapse on top of about 20 trucks parked nearby. Damage was expected to exceed \$100,000.

Bricks were blown as far as two blocks away. And whole sections of bricks were hurled through windows of neighboring buildings in the area, an industrial section just south of downtown Dallas.

Electing System Overhaul Asked

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Former President Eisenhower has endorsed efforts to overhaul the nation's all-electric college system of electing presidents.

In a letter to Sen. Estes Kefauver, D. Utah, the former president urged "thoughtful and constructive" attention to improving the electoral college.

Films on Idaho Being Processed

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—Idaho films were sent by the state department of commerce and development today to Hollywood to be processed.

State Commerce Secretary Louis Shaduck said that 27 films on 15,000 sportspersons of the U. S. along with other groups across the nation and in Idaho who were constantly requesting films on the Gem state.

Blimps Soon to Become Extinct

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The navy yesterday announced the blimp to the state of the extinct code bird.

Writing an end to nearly half a century of lighter-than-air flight, it announced that eight of its remaining silver-skinned blimps will be deflated and stored by Nov. 30.

2 Peace Corps Units Begin Training at U. S. Colleges

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., June 27 (AP)—The corps came, to life yesterday at Rutgers university and Texas Western university. Training units begin next week at the University of California's Berkeley campus.

They will be assigned to the South American country for two years to aid and instruct in such tasks as building roads, drilling wells and constructing schools and sanitary facilities.

The group will include physical examinations, psychological tests and orientation. The volunteers will be trained in 25 states and the District of Columbia.

The similar training program goes under way at the same time at Texas Western in El Paso. The volunteers there will be assigned to Tanganyika, Africa.

Of the 40 men who will train in 100-acre site near West Plains, Mo., their training coordinator, said: "I am pleased that the group will think the success of this project is highly indicated."

The real test of the peace corps, said, will be the performance of the volunteers in foreign countries. He said the corps "may number 100,000 in Latin America" than the entire 600 million dollars allotted for President Kennedy's Latin American aid program.

Idahoans Pay 56 Cents for Dollar in Aid

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—The Associated Taxpayers of Idaho said yesterday that Gem state taxpayers paid 56 cents in taxes for every dollar received in federal grants in 1960.

The group said Idaho taxpayers paid more for the federal dollar than any other state in the Union.

"Even though Idaho is a 'gainer state,' receiving more than we pay in federal grants, the increase in federal administrative costs and loss of local control of federal aid programs," said Executive Manager Max Yost.

He said Idaho received 432 million dollars in federal grants in aid during fiscal 1960.

The taxpayers group also said that federal grants in aid to education programs will have to be paid off by future generations — the very children the program is supposed to help.

It already appears certain, said Yost, that proposals for a national huge expenditure for federal aid, bringing the total to \$10 billion in federal grants or more, will require more borrowing, adding further to our already fantastic federal debt.

Solons Grant Approval for Highway Bill

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Congress gave final approval yesterday to a new highway bill designed to insure completion of the 40,000-mile interstate network by 1972.

One more step remains for its enactment — the signature of President Kennedy, and this is expected to come promptly. The bill, which contains most of the provisions he requested, was passed by wide votes in both chambers.

Administration officials have said they are doubtful they will get the measure up the 90 percent federal financing on continuing basis which will allow states to make their contracts with the federal government.

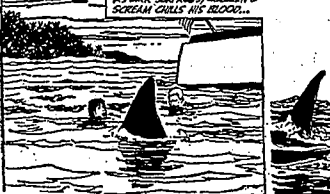

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 27 (AP)—Educational gimmicks and gadgets such as teaching machines and television sets are being attacked by the public like soap, cigarettes and lipstick. New Jersey's state commission on education charged yesterday.

Fredrick M. Raubinger, speaking at the annual convention of the National Education Association, accused a "blatant and unscrupulous" effort to "imprisonize, dehumanize teaching."

"We are not only moving toward lockstep and conformity," he said, "but I suspect that we may be on the road to doing actual damage to children and young people."

Raubinger's charge that all classroom devices must be used as tools by the teacher rather than substitutes for him, was echoed by other convention speakers.
