## 450-Dead In Japan, On Island

TOKYO, June 29 (UPI)—Floods and landslides triggered by six weeks of typhoons spread new death and destruction today through southern Japan and the Philippines. More rain was predicted.

At least 400 persons were dead or missing. Hundreds were injured. Tens of thousands were displaced. Property damages ran into tens of millions of dollars.

Japan's national police agency reported that 231 persons had been killed in southern Japan, reeling under the most devastating typhoon since 1924. Police said 17 men, women and children were missing and 251 persons were injured.

The Philippines reported seven more deaths today, raising the toll to 16. Heavy rain continued missing at sea and feared dead.

Damage to crops and public and private property in the Philippines was estimated at more than \$100 million. There was no official overall estimate of destruction in Japan but the construction ministry estimated 445 million dollars damage to bridges and roads alone.

Hundreds of homes near flooding areas were destroyed. Property damaged. More than 10,000 Filipino families were homeless or in need of immediate relief, the state authorities said.

An estimated 320,000 homes in Japan were destroyed. In the Philippines, reports said 688 houses were destroyed, 823 badly damaged and 200 partially damaged.

Communications were paralyzed in many areas of Japan. Land and air traffic in the area of completely halted by the weather.

Highways were washed out, bridges destroyed, and tracks damaged and airports flooded.

## Triple Play Space Shot Takes Atomic Battery Into Orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., June 29 (AP)—The United States has hurled the first atomic battery into space as a spectacular sky-high triple play in which one rocket rammed three satellites into orbit. The successful orbiting of the nuclear device in one of the satellites gives American scientists a significant lead over the Soviet Union in the race to harness atomic power for space exploration. A Thor-Able-Star rocket blasted off from Cape Canaveral yesterday with the satellites stashed in its nose like a three-scoped ice cream cone.

One of the 50-ton rockets clucked with drill-like precision and threw the entire package into orbit at a distance of 100 miles above the earth. 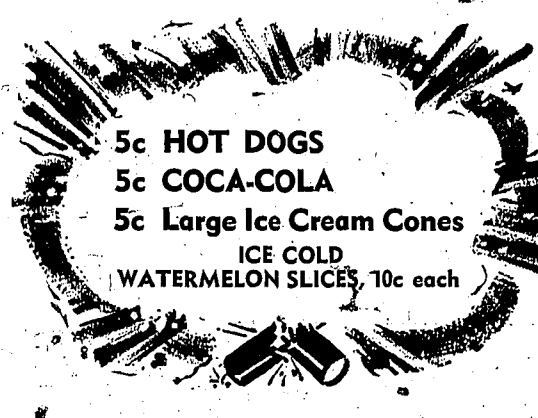

### House Okays Defense Plan For Kennedy

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The House yesterday voted 471-111 to approve a \$4.7 billion defense program for President Kennedy's stepped-up defense program.

The roll call vote was 412-0. The bill, which now goes to the Senate, provides for the military establishment for the year starting July 1. The total is 621 million dollars short of the amount requested by the administration.

The measure fully supported all the major weapons and missile programs that were being up by the administration as well as the more modest increases for land, air and sea forces and equipment.

The major departure from the defense department's spending plans was the addition of \$488 million for the continued production of atomic bombs. This action was taken despite the repeated statements by Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara that he did not intend to spend the money even if it were provided.

The House also added money, beyond Pentagon requests, to maintain a ready military force of about 1,600,000 or 70,000 more than the administration scheduled.

The measure provides funds to support an active duty military force of 2,511,000—72,000 more than the average strength during the current year.

It will finance the operation of 30,000 military aircraft, 817 naval ships and pay in full for a fleet of 29 Polaris missile submarines.

The bill includes about 25 billion dollars for intercontinental ballistic missiles, 13 billion dollars for military space developments and operations, including an additional 85 million dollars to speed the Dyna-Soar manned space glider.

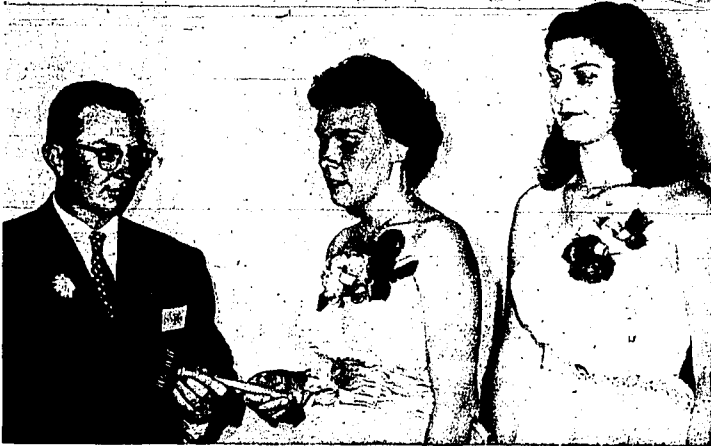
### Wagner Receives Party's Support

### Senate Okays Initial Phase Of Space Bill

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The Senate unanimously passed last night the first authorization for President Kennedy's expanded multibillion-dollar space program.

It includes an effort to send the Soviet Union to the moon and back with a manned spacecraft.

Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D., Okla., chairman of the senate space committee, won voice vote passage after brief debate of a 1.3 billion dollar authorization for the civilian space program during the next 12 months.

Kerr told the few senators present that programs now planned for the national aeronautics and space administration will cost between 20 billion dollars and 25 billion dollars in the next 10 years.

The authorization bill now goes back to the house for consideration of increases of more than 402 million dollars. It is some 820 million dollars more than Congress voted NASA last year. The money will be provided later in separate appropriation bills.

SOIL MAP STARTED

ROME, June 29 (AP)—Two U. N. agencies have begun preparing the first comprehensive soil map of the world. The schedule worked out in a recent meeting here calls for the 40-page atlas to be completed in seven years.

### Senate Okays 450 May Die in Fourth Mishaps

CHICAGO, June 29 (AP)—The National Safety Council (NSC) has estimated 450 persons may die on the nation's highways over the four-day Fourth of July week-end.

NSC Executive Vice President George C. Stewart said an additional 20,000 persons could undergo disabling injuries over the 12-hour holiday period from tomorrow at 6 p.m. local time through midnight Tuesday, July 4.

Traffic fatalities could run 25 per cent higher "than over a comparable non-holiday period," Stewart said, since nearly all the nation's 74 million cars will be used, traveling a total of 10 billion miles.

Japan in the face of communist organized demonstrations, he added.

"To refute the charge that we are an unstable and unreliable ally is difficult on the basis of Washington's performance, or lack of performance," Swin stated.

"Personally, I am not willing to throw in the sponge and give up hope that the American people will not yet repudiate the timidity, incompetence and in some cases subversion emanating from Washington, and in a rebirth of that glorious moral and intellectual integrity, buoyant courage and wise, clear-sighted realism reassert the thrilling type of leadership that was and is the mark of Theodore Roosevelt," he affirmed.

"When the Cuban invasion occurred I was in nearby Puerto Rico," Swin stated. "I saw the entire populace was rooting for the United States and we could not contain the United States upon the military support needed to see that the United States could follow the path that followed was 'appalling,' Swin noted.

"Swin labeled the anti-American demonstration which occurred a few nights ago in downtown City 'phony through and through.' 'A few agents of Moscow really created the riot, and the small, motley gang to stage this demonstration,' he explained, adding that it was in no sense a reflection of public opinion in Guatemala.

"The immediate inauguration of a powerful, realistic program can still dispore the pessimistic view of America's future and avert a 'awful disaster,' he maintained.

"Swin outlined a seven-step program that he felt this country should follow in order to avert another disaster:

- (1) "Demand and get tough, courageous, realistic leadership. The rubbish 'allied system' of the Soviets brings to the top case-hardened gangsters for whom the easy products of our civil service and left-wing demagoguery have been no match.
- (2) "Completely outlaw the Communist party and deport or intern all known communists as agents of an enemy foreign power. The subversion in our bureaucracy, schools, press, 'do-good' organizations and associations leaves us in mortal danger.
- (3) "The red corruption of our free press, our police institutions should not be permitted. We are far along in World War III. In World War II we promptly clamped into jail Hitler's agents. Why should the communists enjoy any special immunity in this war?"
- (4) "In our schools the leftists scream academic freedom to shield their own communist and many university presidents are sufficiently timid to let them get away with it. But if someone unfurled a swastika on a college campus, would these same leftists claim academic freedom for him or would they passionately demand this arrest for disturbing the peace?"
- (5) "Our wells of learning should be protected from poisoning by admitted purveyors of deceit and intellectual corruption.

### Slaughter of Jews Denied By Eichmann

JERUSALEM, Israel, June 29 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann, denying for the eighth day on the witness stand all responsibility for the Nazi mass slaughter of Jews, today repudiated a Red China report which held him a powerful man in the past.

"I had no role, I had no authority," testified the former Gestapo lieutenant colonel in charge of Jewish affairs in the third reich.

"This was his reaction to the Red Cross after a visit to the Theresienstadt concentration camp in 1944, a few weeks before the Nazi collapse.

"The report told of meeting with Eichmann at the huge Hohenburg palace in Prague and described him as a man 'who played a first rate part in all these concentration camps—a rich plenipotentiary in the SS.'"

"To this Eichmann said: 'No, I had no role, who played in the camp, I had no function, I had no authority.'"

Defense counsel Robert Servatius told the defendant of a series of prosecution documents linking him with measures against the Jews in France, Belgium and Luxembourg and in each instance Eichmann portrayed his Berlin TV-4 headquarters as merely a relay point for instructions and correspondence.

Eichmann put the onus for the persecutions of the Jews eastward to their death on Otto Abetz, Hitler's hand-picked ambassador in the French-speaking lands overrun by Nazi troops.

### Russ Terms U.S. Flights 'Stunts'



Care of Your Children

Grownup people are likely to speak lightly of children's play. It's only playing, they say. But for some, that the child can be interrupted, taken from his occupation shortly after he begins to play, is a consideration of the utmost importance. He has a right to do before the fifth birthday. When it is essential to call him during his playing, it is a good practice to give him a warning call. For five minutes more, then time for him. When the bell rings you will have to stop. The timer on the bell has an impressive call and is not likely to be resisted. ### Need to Preserve, Restore Watershed Stressed in Tour North of Fairfield

FAIRFIELD, June 29.—The need to preserve and restore the mountain country of Idaho, to protect one of the prime watersheds of the West, was stressed today as week-end as the forest service sponsored a range tour of the Fairfield and Shako Creek districts of the Sawtooth national forest.

Twenty-four persons took the two-day, horseback trip from base camp on the south fork of the Boise river to the crest of the Sawtooth range, where they viewed the headwaters of four major drainages—Big Snake, Spiny Creek, Emma creek, and Little Snake creek.

Some of the conditions they graphically illustrated the need for action to assure continued efficiency of the area in the role of a major watershed. They also saw some satisfactory results of voluntary cooperation in the forest service is getting from grazing permittees in managing and cutting the number of stock on allotments.

The tour was an information and educational aspect of the forest service's multiple use program. It was the third such annual outing conducted in cooperation with the Camas Rod and Gun club, Fairfield.

Where the other tours had stressed range management, the 1944 tour was concerned primarily with giving an impressive picture of the area's role in supplying water to not only southern Idaho, but the entire Pacific Northwest.

Little was needed in the way of talk to impress this importance on those taking the tour. Reeling along the divide, separating the Boise river drainage, they could see draws, gullies and canyons stretching away in all directions each carrying the start of a small rivulet that grows as it descends, turning into racing torrents and then surging rivers as they converge on their way to the sea.

### Oregon Man Is Named as Most Wanted

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—A 36-year-old Portland, Ore., fugitive, accused of the blood-lust butchery of a housewife, was placed on the FBI's list of 10 most wanted criminals today.

The wanted man, Richard Lawrence Marquette, has been hunted for this grisly murder and dismemberment of the 23-year-old victim since June 14 when part of her remains were found in a refrigerator in his home.

The crime which led to the nationwide manhunt for Marquette began June 8 when the Portland housewife was reported missing from her home.

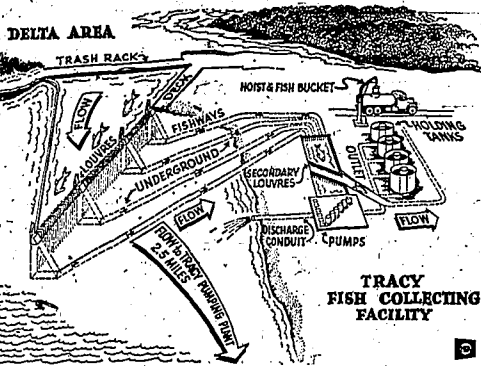

Twelve million fish a year should satisfy any angler but for the operators of the Delta Mendota canal in California's Central valley it's all catching and no eating. Fish kept fending the irrigation canal's pumps and the Tracy fish collecting facility was built to keep them out. The canal's waters normally flow north toward the San Francisco bay area and fish instinctively swim seaward, too. Periodically though, the Tracy pumps at the head of the canal are reversed and water flows south, towards Fresno, causing the fish who think they're bound downstream with the current. The fish are drawn into huge holding tanks, transferred to tank trucks, carried downstream and dumped at Antioch, near the sea. The U. S. bureau of reclamation figures its fish-eliminator savings in hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Beefsteak leads the parade of bargains among Fourth of July week-end specials featured by supermarkets and neighborhood stores.

Prices of steaks are down seven to 20 cents a pound from last week, depending on the area.

Best pork and lamb prices have been reduced because of the competition from poultry, which is at the lowest level since World war II.

Fryers, because of their attractive price, are widely featured.

Sixty-cent tops the fish—specials. Others include crab, salmon, lobster and halibut.

Egg prices are moving up. Increases from last week ranged in various areas from four to five cents a dozen for large whites.

Best buys among vegetables are beefs, carrots, Florida celery, endive, escarole, green onions, radishes, parsley, all varieties of greens, lettuce and green and yellow squash.

Among good buys are asparagus, cabbage, California celery, corn, cucumbers, eggplants, potatoes from Virginia and the Carolinas, Chinese cabbage, water-cress, Italian peppers, broccoli and green peas.

Best buys among fruits are strawberries, lemons, mangoes, plums and onions.
