Millions Lured to U.S. Roads; Toll Continues Climb

Traffic deaths mounted last night as near-perfect weather covered most of the nation through the early stages of the four-day Fourth of July holiday. Law enforcement authorities and safety officials appealed for caution, common sense and courtesy on the highways as millions of motorists and the normal flow of vehicles and travel. The National Safety Council estimated 450 persons may die in traffic accidents during the 120-hour period between 6 p.m. local time Friday and midnight Tuesday.

A distressing start was made toward this estimate last night when 11 persons were killed in a head-on collision in Nevada. It was the worst traffic accident in Nevada's history.

George C. Stewart, executive vice president of the safety council, said the Nevada accident was a "tragic reminder of what can happen on the highways." He urged the council's plea for caution and common sense on the road.

Stewart said the rate of traffic deaths was running ahead of last year's Fourth of July, which had the highest on record with 103 deaths. There is one more day of this year's holiday.

The council predicted that most of the nation's 74 million vehicles will be on the road during the holiday. They will log approximately 11 billion miles, the council estimates.

The record traffic death toll for Independence day is 401 set in 1957. The record for the holiday's first day is 196 set for a four-day Independence day occurred in 1957 when there were 231 traffic deaths.

The company's death toll for this Independence day with a non-holiday period, the Associated Press reported, according to figures from 5 p.m. Friday, June 16 to midnight Tuesday, June 20. During that period, 203 traffic deaths occurred in 107 accidents involving 231 fatalities.

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Accidents in Idaho Claim Three Lives

No fatal accidents have been reported so far, but law enforcement authorities are keeping a watch on the holiday traffic, expected to be heavy.

The first fatality of the weekend occurred today.

At Whitehall, near Oshosh, George A. Dismore, 41, fatally injured when he was dragged or kicked by a saddle horse he had just purchased.

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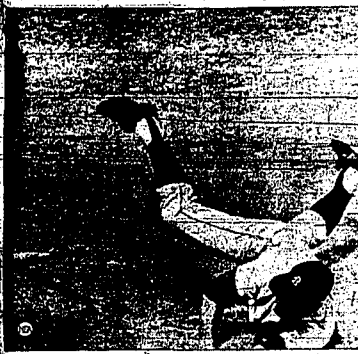

Tissue Group for Local Hospital Aids in Improving Surgical Care



Many elements of the part of medical men across the nation have been made to improve the quality of medical care. One of the efforts is exemplified by the tissue committee at the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. A member of the committee that works at maintaining and improving the statistics of the hospital. The tissue committee's main function is that of improving surgical care of patients by the review of documented work. The committee is composed of five members who meet monthly at the hospital. The committee receives from the pathologist a list that shows the pre-operative and post-operative and pathological diagnoses and where they do not agree. The committee reviews all medical records where the records do not agree, receives reports and all medical records from the hospital administrator of all death cases for the prior month, reviews and audits all death records, studies and reports autopsy percentages and refers any medical records which the committee finds inadequate to the chief of the clinical department for review and disposition. In brief, the committee studies the results of operations, studying the pathologist's report on autopsies to determine if the action taken in the case was justified. This is a step that must be taken to insure that high professional and ethical standards are maintained. Thus, in one way, the work of the committee is to insure that there is a program of continuing education undertaken at the hospital. The influence of the committee is of a positive nature. It isn't just an insulating influence. It not only abolishes outmoded or discarded techniques and procedures, but also strives for the adoption of better methods of treating patients and curing diseases. This is done through continuous analysis, review and education.

Dynamite Used to Blast Channel for Boats

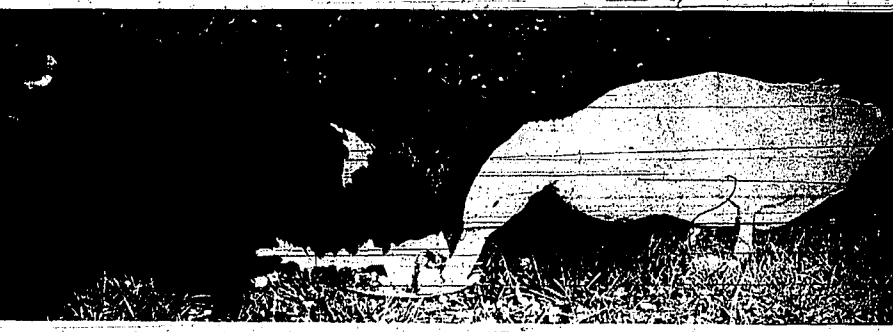

FARFIELD, July 1.—Managing his father's sheep outfit, as Torrington and Camp leader, back in his high school days, Lloyd Barron, 37, has proven invaluable training for Camas County Solon. Lloyd Barron who has since become one of Idaho's leading Aberdeen Angus breeders.

From 1929 to 1933 he located and purchased the property of the Barron's 6,000 acre wheat and hay farms. He was a partner and later owner of the Barron ranches and the Sun Valley farms in 1935 and is still operating.

Barron got acquainted with Aberdeen Angus cattle while on a trading trip to the mountains of Idaho. He purchased his first herd in 1930 and his first registered Angus in 1932. His cattle have been shown very successfully at the major western cattle shows. He is the organizer and first president (two terms) of the Idaho Aberdeen Angus association. He was president of the Camas Solon and Aberdeen Angus association in 1946.

Lloyd Barron has about 100 head of Angus on his ranch consisting of 8,000 acres of land plus 1,000 acres of irrigated land. His mother, Mrs. Laura Barron, Boise, is in partnership with the cattle venture. Mr. and Mrs. Barron are staunch Republicans and have taken an active part in GOP campaigns.

Barron was elected to the house of representatives from Camas county in 1939, 1941 and 1943. He was assistant majority floor leader in the 1943 session. He was assistant chief clerk of the house in the 1943-44 session. He was elected to the Idaho senate in 1945 and served in that office until 1947. He is now serving as chairman of the highway committee.

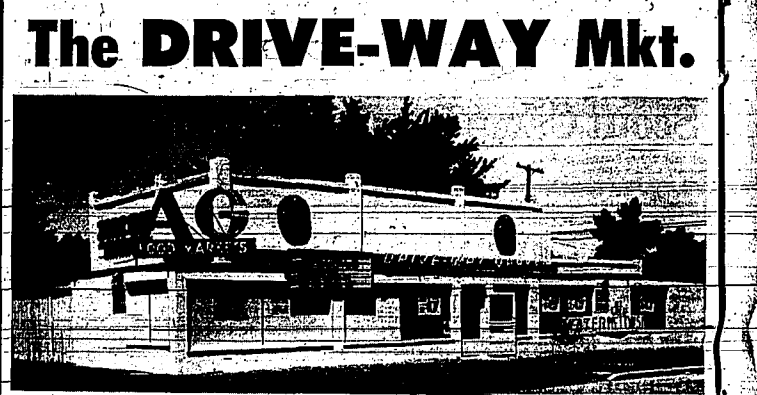

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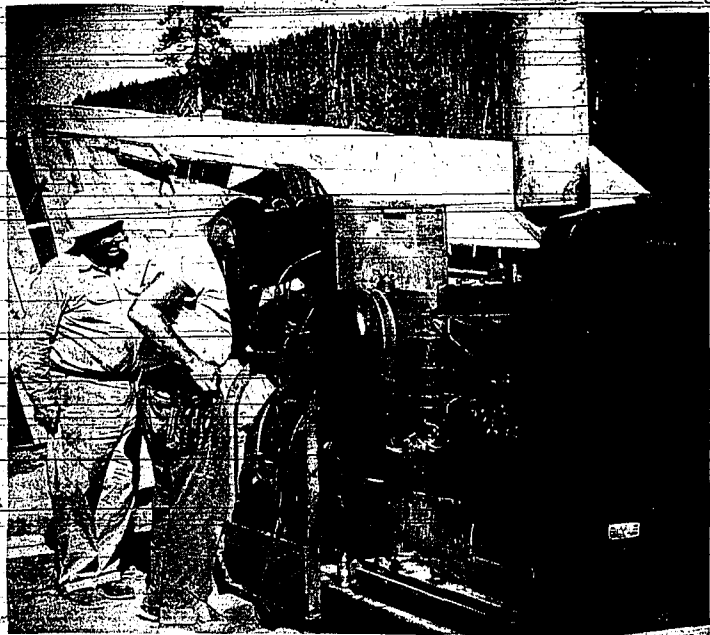
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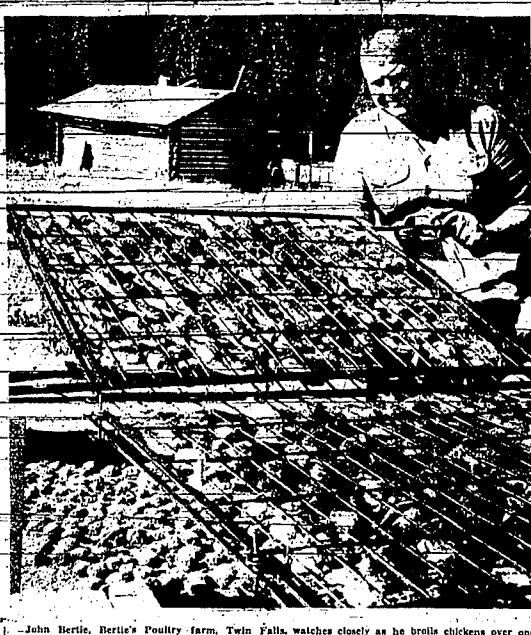

Department Claims Gem Hatchery Fish Are 'Equal' in All Ways to Wild Trout

BY JIM HUMPHREY

Idaho Fish and Game Department More vigorous, faster growing fish are being produced for less money now than ever before in the 15 hatcheries of the Idaho fish-and-game department. Here are the figures:

Food costs are down from 32 cents a pound in 1957 to 25 cents a pound last year.

The reason is that a switch was made from slaughterhouse by-products to fish meal pellets and the conversion rate is lower. This means that it takes less feed to produce a pound of trout now than with the older-type fish foods.

"The big change-over from the use of liver, ground fish, fish viscera and slaughterhouse offal as food in the hatcheries was in 1957. That year the department bought over one and one-half million pounds of such meat and only about one-half million pounds of meal and meal products.

By last year the trend was reversed. Only about 247,000 pounds of slaughterhouse foods were used while over 1,615,000 pounds of meal products were fed.

The clincher is that fish production has gone up by 40 per cent while total food costs increased only 10 per cent.

Fish thrive on this dry diet. It contains fish meal, brewers yeast, wheat middlings, cottonseed meal and vitamin and mineral supplements.

"The result in many cases is fish that cannot be told from their wild brethren. While it is true that many catchable-sized hatchery trout can be detected by their abnormal fins, not all domesticated fish develop these characteristics.

"Fectoral fins, for example, sometimes are worn or small stubs from rubbing against concrete raceways. However, but now on the other hand, many hatchery fish have fins which correspond to forefins in higher vertebrates, therefore not always deformed.

"The dorsal fin, on the contrary, never rubs against anything be-

cause. Some are bitten only by a few on the line while the majority seem to be the toothless object of every fish in the area. However, when compared when they're put back.

"Some fishermen even disagreed (disputed) and claim unerring, infallible skills to separate wild fish from hatchery stock by other means. They contend that the color of artificially propagated trout is different from wild fish. Even the flesh is unlike white for hatchery stock.

"This is not necessarily so. Catchable-sized trout over six or seven inches long usually lose their color and they do not look like a more silvery wild look.

"In fact, a large number of hatchery-produced fish are released as fingerlings and these generally do not enter the creel until the following year. This means they have all the characteristics of wild fish every time they're fished. Saw the fish of day in the hatchery.

Including pink flesh, hatchery trout change the color of their flesh from white to pink in a few weeks after switching to natural foods found in the wild. This is because they lack the natural carotene pigmented oils found in fresh water shrimp, crayfish, daphnia and even herring. Only a small amount of this oil is needed to color the flesh of a trout.

"Every year the department releases some 18 million fish into lakes and streams to meet increasing pressure and to restock chronically treated waters. This is only part of the huge total harvest taken by anglers every month of the year but especially between June and September.

"It takes all expert to tell the difference between hatchery trout and wild ones. And the usually is the first to say that there is no difference in quality and taste.

Heat Causes Grain Market Futures Hike

CHICAGO, July 1 (AP)—Dry weather in the northwest and the prospect of a hard summer for grain futures sharply upward on the Chicago Board of Trade. The wheat contract rose 1/2 cent to 3 1/2, corn 1/4 cent to 1 1/4, and soybeans 1/4 cent to 1 1/4. The market was active and drummed hard up 3/4 to 50 points.

Deferred corn contracts enjoyed a brisk commission demand despite good crop reports from the Midwest. New July futures advanced Friday on fairly large delivery contracts. Sizable CCC sales held the cash level down.

Onis jumped sharply on the weather news. Commission and local buying set off stop order buying.

Eye futures followed the active buying spree in the Winnipeg market, where most contracts made new highs for the season. Profit selling late in the week shaved much of the earlier gains.

Stoyman recovered strongly on Friday on higher prices for oil and meal. The July soybean delivery soared up 10 cents daily limit before profit-taking set in. Deferred tenders were below take expectations.

At the time, both Mr. and Mrs. Moore lived in Hagerman. She was Sarah Peterson, daughter of Mrs. Elizabeth Peterson. Moore worked as a barber. They were friends of the construction engineer, E. W. Buck. Buck convinced Mr. and Mrs. Moore to get married on the bridge. The bridge was dedicated, they originally planned to be married in the fall. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Carey, Hagerman, served as minister of honor and best man. At the time they were married, they both had lived in Hagerman for six years. They had known each other since they were children, when they lived in Cumberland, Wyo. It was almost tradition that the Moore boys marry the Peterson girls. Moore's two older brothers had married her older sisters. Mr. and Mrs. Moore were married by Dr. J. W. Tenney, then superintendent of Gooding college. 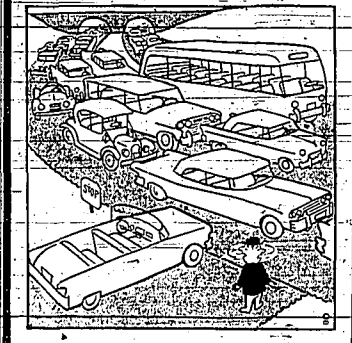
