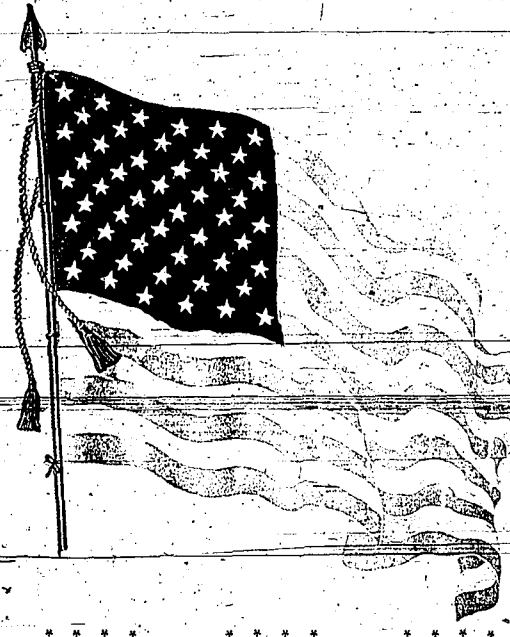

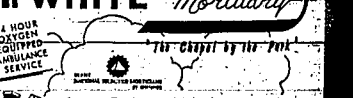

# Nuclear Boosts Needed If Man Really Plans to Get Anywhere on Space Trip

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—Man really expects to get anywhere in space he'll need a nuclear boost. Conventional fuels may support enough payload to make interplanetary trips feasible.

As the national aeronautics and space administration Plum Brook reactor facility near here, the reactor at this \$10 million dollar installation, which took four years to build, will be used to simulate the radiation environment of a nuclear rocket, so that difficulties that might arise can be eliminated before a prototype is built.

And at NASA's Lewis research center in nearby Cleveland, nuclear propulsion studies are being studied.

The need for a nuclear-powered rocket is explained by Dr. John C. Eward, assistant director at Lewis. "Chemical rockets are limited to only 100 pounds of take-off weight for each pound of payload in orbit. Most of this weight is fuel."

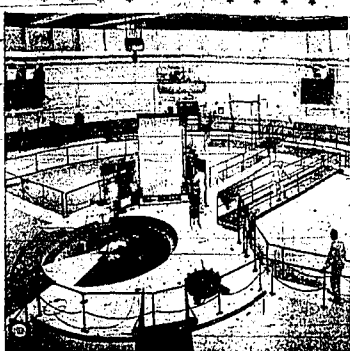
"Nuclear-powered rockets would be so great that the journey probably would not be feasible. But, with a nuclear rocket, the jet velocity could be at least 10 times that of a chemical rocket."

"And with nuclear-powered electric propulsion (utilizing 1 to 4 times as much electrical energy as a chemical rocket), a jet velocity perhaps 10 to 20 times that of a chemical rocket might be reached."

The men at Plum Brook are preparing for that eventuality. At the moment, they are particularly concerned about protecting the reactor. So, when Plum Brook is fired up to its full design power of 60 million watts, one to two million gallons of water will be drawn out of Lake Erie to cool and shield the reactor located 21 feet underground. This is to offset much of the tremendous heat generated by atomic fission.

The water also will go through an elaborate system of canals and sluices so that irradiated materials in the fluid can be transported to hot laboratories in the same building for study.

The Lake Erie water is brought to service a community of 15,000 persons—then will be returned to the lake purer than it was. The water utilized at Plum Brook will have a lower background radiation content than natural water. This project at Plum Brook is not one of those much talked about "breakthroughs." But it is on this groundwork, laid by some 100 men, that many of tomorrow's breakthroughs will be based.

## Mixed Groups of Christians Forming New Ship of Faith

PHILADELPHIA, July 4 (AP)—Singing, the strains of a ukulele and some Hawaiian kisses mingled as a mixed company of Christians prepared to launch their new ship of faith.

"It was almost like an embarkation from the shores of the Pacific Isles as the newly formed United Church of Christ opened its constitutional convention."

"Aloha—goodbye and hello was the word used for the occasion, a nostalgic farewell to the old denominations, and an affectionate embrace for the new one."

"Our Lord is building not just a new ship, but a new people, a people who hear His voice and who obey His call to be one," the Rev. Abraham Akaka, Honolulu, told the approximately 750 delegates.

"They represent the Congregational, Episcopal, Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, and Reformed churches, added to pass from the scene today when a constitution for the new two-million-member church is declared in force."

The historic merger is the first in the United States to end denominational differences and governmental structures.

"Joyful, joyful we adore Thee, the assembly sang; after a recitation of the 100th Psalm: 'Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands.'"

"It is an 'outstandingly happy moment,' said the Rev. Dr. Fred Hoskins, New York, chief Congregational Christian executive, as he quoted from Proverbs: 'Rejoice, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity.'"

Completion of the merger is expected after 21 years of planning, lawsuits, referendums and other preliminaries. It is "not so much a new church, as a counsel in unity," Dr. Hoskins said in his final report before the new church is constituted.

The Rev. Dr. James E. Wagner, Philadelphia, president of the Evangelical and Reformed church, said, "We have acted unceasingly as if we were one people and one body" during the long merger process.

He expressed hope that the union will send a "fresh movement of evangelistic zeal through our people" and that the new church will seek "an ever-deepening rootedness" in the biblical tradition.

It was the Rev. Mr. Akaka, an eloquent young Hawaiian minister in flowing white clericals and a bright red tie, who gave the opening prayer.

His wife presented leis, and the customary kiss, to Dr. Wagner and Dr. Hoskins.

Standing in the pulpit with a pleasant smile, the Rev. Mr. Akaka suggested that the four strains represented Congregational, Episcopal, Evangelical and Reformed churches, and that they were harmoniously in tune.

The Rev. Beth M. Herberst, Norwegian, led the assembly in prayer for God's "guidance and help."

Unofficial tabulations of votes showed that 3,547 Congregational

Christian churches voting, and 33 of 53 Evangelical and Reformed churches, have approved the new constitution. Far more than the two-thirds required to declare it in force.

It joins the more centrally regulated, creedal Evangelical and Reformed church, which had its origins in Germany; to the locally autonomous, nondenominational Christian churches, which grew out of England and the pilgrims.

## Soviets Won't Accept A-Ban With Controls

GENEVA, July 4 (AP)—The Soviet Union reaffirmed it will never accept a treaty to ban nuclear weapons tests that provides for inspection of communist territory.

Soviet Delegate Semyon P. Tsarukin returned the Soviet charge that the West wants international controls only in order to spy on communist territory.

And he demanded again that the conference be merged with the proposed East-West disarmament negotiations.

The British and U. S. delegates at the three-power test ban talks rejected the Soviet stand.

Said U. S. Delegate Charles G. Steller: "The Soviet position is very clear today. The Soviet government does not accept any workable treaty to ban nuclear weapons tests."

## Aid for Foreign Schools Advised

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—Edward R. Murrow, chief of the U. S. Information Agency (USIA), has proposed that the United States help new nations set up their own school systems by bringing foreign students to this country.

Murrow suggested that the United States should reexamine its student exchange program, particularly with India and certain African nations.

"He said foreign students who come to the United States and other western nations for schooling sometimes are reluctant to go home afterward."

### Bows, Arrows No Match for Sheriff's Gun

REULVILLE, Calif., July 4 (AP)—I just can't seem to get to the state there all day letting him shoot arrows at me," said Deputy Sheriff Allen Johnston.

Johnston's revolver yesterday proved a more effective weapon than the bow and arrow of Donald Lee Cooper, who ended up in the psychiatric ward of Reulville after a psychiatric ward of Reulville wound him with a bullet wound in his left arm.

"I've never had anything like it happen to me before and never expect to again," Johnston said. "It began when rancher and told Larsen phone called and told him someone had fired mislead him with an arrow while he was out working on irrigation ditches. Johnston said he had struck his arrow. Johnston went out to investigate and pretty soon this fellow comes out of the brush with a bow and a quiver of arrows. He set 100 yards away, kept down and put an arrow in his bow. We look over and he got up and came closer."

"The archer stopped at 75 feet away and sent a shaft whizzing over the Jeep. We followed him into the left fork and dropping his ancient weapon and surrender. Lynde then came and started to shoot again when rancher Larsen fired his rifle, knocking up dirt and hitting the archer. "He didn't even pay any attention," and shot again, said Johnston.

Johnston started to notch a bow to brace his arm for shooting. Johnston kept talking to him, but he dropped with his hatchet and after said a word.

"He started to raise the bow again and I shot in the dirt by his side," Johnston said. "When he raised the bow again, I shot him in the left forearm and he dropped the bow and came in on the road."

Johnston asked him why he did it and Lynde answered, "Well, I'm just crazy. I guess."

Johnston was held in the hospital on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon after an arrow showed his wound was not serious.

Officers said Lynde bought the bow and arrows and a hatchet here Friday to "live off the land."

"Then he said he shot the arrows because he wanted to show me to kill him and he didn't have the nerve."

"I have noted some suggestions in the press from well-intentioned people who say why doesn't President Kennedy invite Castro to Washington to discuss the Cuban situation."

"No greater mistake could be made," Nixon said.

New \$200,000 First Christian Church At Buhl to Be Dedicated Next Sunday

BOISE, July 4 - Formal dedication services for the recently completed \$200,000 First Christian church building here will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, according to the Rev. Delmar Talley, pastor. The Rev. Roy L. Tius, former pastor under whom most of the planning and building was done, will give the dedicatory address. The Rev. Mr. Tius is now retired and living in Boise. The Rev. Lloyd Balfour, Boise state secretary, and other ministers from throughout southern Idaho are expected. The dedication ceremony will include a communion service to be followed by a reception in the church fellowship hall. The public is invited. The new church structure of brick is located on the corner of Broadway and Poling streets. It is a U-shaped building and house the church sanctuary, educational wing and Fellowship hall. The sanctuary is a two-story brick building with a separate outside entrance. It features a wide, open interior with a high ceiling and a simple, clean design. The building is situated on a hillside. The dedication ceremony will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, according to the Rev. Delmar Talley, pastor. The Rev. Roy L. Tius, former pastor under whom most of the planning and building was done, will give the dedicatory address. The Rev. Mr. Tius is now retired and living in Boise. The Rev. Lloyd Balfour, Boise state secretary, and other ministers from throughout southern Idaho are expected. The dedication ceremony will include a communion service to be followed by a reception in the church fellowship hall. The public is invited. The new church structure of brick is located on the corner of Broadway and Poling streets. It is a U-shaped building and house the church sanctuary, educational wing and Fellowship hall. The sanctuary is a two-story brick building with a separate outside entrance. It features a wide, open interior with a high ceiling and a simple, clean design. The building is situated on a hillside.

There also is a ceramic-tiled, glass-fronted baptistery, two restrooms, a boy scout room in the basement with a separate entrance. A public address system has been installed in the sanctuary. The building has a seating capacity for 350 but can seat comfortably an overflow crowd of 500. The wing was just completed at a cost of more than \$70,000. Other buildings being completed and planned for use several years ago include a boys' club, consisting of a building with attractive lounge suite for the board of church members. The Disciples of Christ, Indianapolis, Ind., drew original plans for the building. The educational wing is a two-story unit and houses eight classrooms upstairs, three classrooms downstairs, lavatories and closet facilities. The Fellowship hall is a long, single-story unit which houses two classrooms as well as a large modern kitchen with all available cooking facilities. The entire three-in-one unit building is approximately 151 feet wide and 116 feet long. Heat is supplied by a separate three-unit hot-water heating system operated by a gas furnace. Glenn Denny, local contractor, supervised construction of the building. Much planning, volunteer work and fund-raising went into the church project. W. E. Luntz, who has served the church in many capacities through the years and is chairman of the present building committee, will be in charge of laying the cornerstone Sunday. Other building committee members include Glenn Denny, Milo Davis, E. M. Tomlinson, Glen Buckender and Ray Colquhoun. Buckender is also chairman of the building finance committee, assisted by Hoy Hopkins and Shelby Constant. Earl Allen is an ex-officio member. Dedication program committee members include Mrs. E. W. Taylor, Mrs. Tony Machacek and Mary Lou Unzicker. B. W. Goff, Homer Beuchamp and CTF members make up the committee in charge of invitations. In looking over the church history it is noted that the local church originated around 1918 under the supervision of the Rev. Walter E. Hays, who was then pastor of the First Christian church in Twin Falls. The Rev. Raymond Tinsley conducted services in the old theater building at Main and Eleventh streets south, and later in the Masonic temple. As membership increased it was decided to build a church. Three lots were purchased on the corner where the new church is located and a small single-story building was constructed. It was dedicated June 10, 1917. The Rev. A. J. Adams, Enterprise, Ore., served as first pastor. In the winter of 1924-25 an annex was added to the side of the original church with a full basement and a well-equipped kitchen by donated labor for a total cost of \$1,800. A folding partition separated the annex from the sanctuary and folding doors divide the two rooms into three classrooms. In 1929 several changes were made in the building and a parsonage was purchased. In the years to follow more lots were purchased and added to the present site. Improvements and additions were made to the old church. In February, 1950, the congregation voted to dispose of the old parsonage and the present parsonage was purchased at 405 Eighth street north. For years the congregation had hoped some day the church could have an educational plant with plenty of classrooms and a sanctuary free for worship only. Funds were accumulated gradually and with a gift of \$50,000 from one couple, the dream began to take shape. Construction of the educational plant and Fellowship hall began Oct. 2, 1949, and was completed in June, 1950, at a cost of \$61,139.09. Construction of a new sanctuary had to wait until a canvass or membership had produced enough cash and subscriptions to proceed. Work began April 18, 1950, and was completed in May of this year. The first service in the new sanctuary was held on Mother's day, May 14. The old church still remains near the new church construction but it will be removed soon for a parking area. Other ministers serving as pastors of the local church in addition to those mentioned include the Rev. O. E. Schmidt, the Rev. J. J. Reynolds, the Rev. J. Elliott Gilman, the Rev. Chris J. Two Russians Send Greeting To Americans

RYANIS PORT, Mass., July 4 (AP) - The White House last night made public an English translation of the Russian message to President Kennedy on the 181st anniversary of American independence. The translation: "Dear Mr. President: Personally and on behalf of the Soviet people we wish the American people and to you personally our sincere congratulations on the occasion of this important date in the life of the American people. The 181st anniversary of your country's independence. While sending our congratulations to you today, we want to express the hope that the recent Vienna meeting, and the exchange of opinions which took place there on questions of interest to both countries, will further the mutual efforts of our governments directed to the urgent solution of problems which, long ago, became pressing and which the last war left to us after the defeat of the aggressors. "History imposed on our peoples, on their governments and on their leaders an enormous share of the responsibility for the preservation of peace, for the future of humanity. 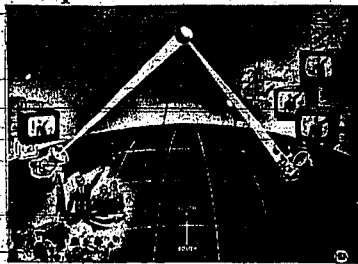

## U. S. Is Developing Celestial Phone While Russ Orbit Men

NEW YORK (AP)—As every businessman knows, when the boss is away, the phone calls will do just as well.

And so while Russia wastes her time and money sending men into orbit, our down-to-earth space developers are blundering a network of celestial telephone poles that probably will be put up within the next three years.

Not only will humanity get instantaneous world-wide phone service, researchers on the project say, but also universal and immediate television reception.

Is there no escape?

Space planners say no, because: We made nearly four million overseas telephone calls last year. That's 40 times as many as we made in 1949, but only one-third the number we'll make in 1970.

To meet the demand would require doubling our present undersea cable capacity within the next 10 years—at a cost of 475 million dollars and maybe more—because a lot of direct radio traffic is being curtailed by a change in sun spot activity.

A satellite system of world-wide communication, however, will cost only one-third to one-half that amount. And, with what we know about space now, we'll be able to keep talking despite storms, clouds, radiation or sunspots.

And besides, complete communication is the route to peace. A lot of folks would be better off with telephones to take out their aggressions. And there's nothing like a TV quiz scandal to keep your mind off your worries.

Now, the plans for the orbital telephone poles call for three to 20 satellites, depending on height and size, with built-in receivers and transmitters for moving impulses from one Earth point to another.

Solar energy will take care of most of the power requirement, with stand-by batteries taking over when the satellite is in eclipse.

Three plans for doing the job are under consideration for the First is Adven—a U. S. army plan calling for three equidistant satellites operating 21,000 miles above the Earth, just high enough to keep them hovering over fixed points.

With three ground stations below, the entire Earth, except for the Poles, can be covered with line-of-sight transmission and reception. With some modification, the Adven plan could be used by private industry for public communication—once the enormous and costly power and control problems are overcome.

In the meantime, the American Telephone and Telegraph company and General Electric's missile and space vehicle department have offered alternate complete plans.

GE would put up 10 equidistant satellites over the equator about 6,000 miles up. Cost: About 280 million dollars.

AT and T's plan calls for 50 satellites placed in "random" order about 2,700 miles up. Cost: About 170 million dollars.

Other plans, like those offered by Hughes Aircraft, Lockheed, RCA, etc., fall somewhere between. Regardless of which plan or compromise is finally adopted, communications economists say, your charge for an overseas phone call still will be top's quarter-cent per minute mile.

The really big difference will be old movies run everywhere in the world, working relentlessly for international understanding and peace.

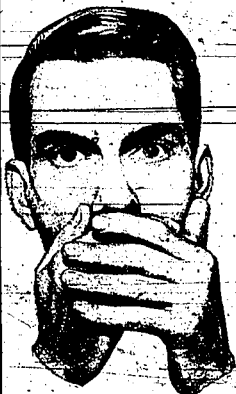

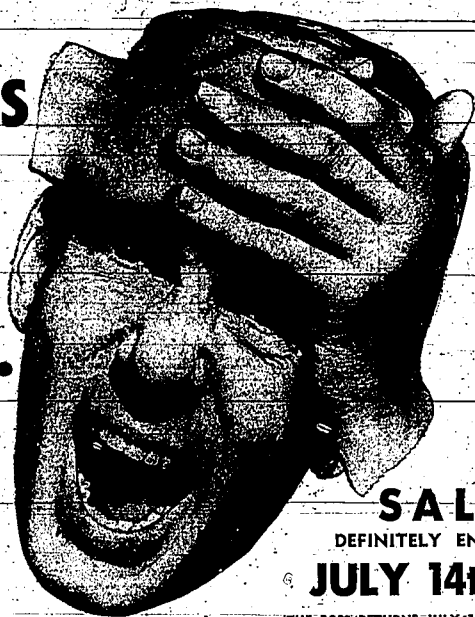

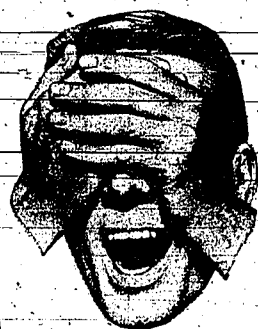
