Moslems Enraged; 50 Killed

ALGIERS, July 5 (AP)—Riotous Moslems attacked French security forces in many areas of Algeria today in a day-in-and-day-out struggle against a country, military sources said at least 50 persons were killed and several hundred wounded.

The violence broke out during a 24-hour general strike in Algeria. At least 100 Moslems were killed in the city of Algiers. The fighting was particularly bitter in the city of Algiers, where the Moslems attacked the French military forces. The Moslems were armed with rifles and hand grenades.

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2 Holiday Records Set on Holiday; Highway Toll Is 519, Overall Toll Is 892

The long Fourth of July week-end set two records for traffic jams. Never before had so many persons died in accidents over a holiday and never before had traffic accidents killed so many persons during a summertime holiday.

Final United Press International and National Safety Council tabulations showed the four-day Independence day holiday will go into the record books as "one of the most tragic week-ends in our history."

The two records for the holiday were—

1. A traffic death toll of 519, topping the previous summertime highway accident mark of 491 during the 1950 July 4 week-end.

2. The accidental death toll of 892, surpassing the previous record of 833 set during the 1958 Christmas week-end.

The figures covered the period between 5 p.m. Friday and midnight Saturday. Only a dramatic change in the traffic death rate during the holiday's last 12 hours kept the toll from climbing much higher.

George B. Stewart, executive vice president of the National Safety Council, said he was "not surprised" that the toll was so high.

He said thanks to the "constant barrage of safety messages issued by the nation's press, radio and television" the toll was "not as high as it might have been."

"During those last hours the traffic tolls dropped to half of the previous record," he said. "The traffic toll is 50 cents less than it might have been."

"We believe that this was in large part due to a greater control by drivers during the last hours for the necessity of extra care to meet the extra traffic," he said.

California led the traffic death parade with 13 fatalities. There were 11 deaths in Texas, 10 in Ohio, 9 in New York, 8 in Florida, 8 in Arizona, 8 in Illinois, 7 in Michigan, 7 in Missouri, 7 in North and South Carolina, and 7 in Minnesota.

Hemingway Funeral Slated for Thursday

KETCHUM, July 5—Famed author Ernest Hemingway will be paid final honors at funeral services scheduled at 10:30 a.m. Thursday at a grave here prepared in Ketchum's cemetery, located along U. S. highway 93 just north of Ketchum in sight of the author's home where he died early Sunday.

The grave was opened alongside that of Taylor Williams, hunting and fishing guide, close friend and companion of Hemingway for some 20 years.

Williams said he had never seen Hemingway's body since he had been on a safari.

Drug Industry Advised Price Angers Buyer

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—Sen. James Eastland, Tenn., told the drug industry today that the "patience of American people is wearing thin."

Eastland questioned why prices for such a common drug as aspirin have risen so much in the last few years. He said that a drug manufacturer only 13 cents to produce.

He said that drug prices "are generally unreasonable and excessive." He added: "They are not computed to costs, to profits, or to prices in the foreign countries."

The chairman of the senate antitrust and monopoly subcommittee put it up to the drug makers this way:

"Either accept a little more regulation, or find that their government support is the tougher approach of direct government control."

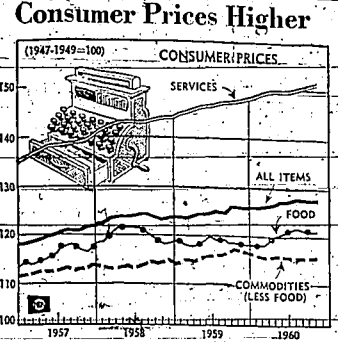
Eastland said that the industry is preparing for public hearings by its subcommittee on legislation designed to control drug prices.

The bill introduced by Eastland, which would limit the price of drugs, was introduced in December, 1959. More than 2,500 pages of testimony have been accumulated since then.

Among witnesses scheduled to testify during the current hearings were spokesmen for the American Medical Association.

Eastland was critical of what he called "wasteful and often misleading" advertising of "excessive prices and of 'monopolistic' profits and licensing agreements in the drug industry."

He said the bill would force the elderly who have no recourse, pay this bill for these practices.



Russian Pays 'Folksy' Visit To Thompson

MOSCOW, July 5 (AP)—Seventy-year-old Cherry Thompson, wife of Nikita S. Khrushchev by the hand and showed him the backyard vegetable garden.

Whatever political significance may be attached to the sudden visit at a time when Soviet-American relations seem so strained, it is clear that Khrushchev holds Thompson and his family in high regard. They chatted quite a bit during the evening.



New Freedom Rider's Tactics Are Promised

JACKSON, Miss., July 5 (AP)—A Negro leader has promised that the "freedom rider" movement would expand into new fields for a final attack upon racial segregation in the South.

The leader, James Farmer, 42, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, said the new assaults would include more freedom rides and "much more to follow along this and different lines in the spirit of nonviolence."

He did not elaborate.

Meanwhile, this capital city of 150,000 quietly observed Independence day as threats of a mass invasion of the segregation-defying riders failed to materialize.

Red Radio Goofs With Old Tape

LONDON, July 5 (AP)—Some of the Moscow radio goofs today. The radio broadcast a report that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev arrived in Finland to celebrate President Urho Kekkonen's 60th birthday anniversary.

Church Asks Peace Move

BOISE, July 5 (AP)—Sen. Frank Church, D. Idaho, said last night he would introduce a special bill to call for a national day of reflection and prayer for peace.

Church said that citizens of the United States must wholeheartedly speak a commitment for peace.

Speaking to celebrants gathered at the annual American Legion luncheon at the Boise fairground, Church said that peace must be pursued with the same zeal that the United States has waged in the past.

"The only way to preserve liberty and freedom is to conquer war in the world at large."

The Idaho legislator said that total war is the only "realistic" way to win. "A nuclear war could utterly destroy participants," Church said. But he added, "as long as other nations threaten war, arms must be strong enough to deter them."

Jobs, Skills Change Fast For America

NEW YORK (UPI)—What kind of job do you have? Well, don't count on it.

According to reliable U.S. management findings, more than 600 new kinds of jobs appear on the American scene each year—many of them replacing old jobs and skills. A few real life examples:

Statisticians went into orbit three years ago. In the space race today, the U.S. department of labor estimates our missile workers number nearly a half million.

RCA, a major brand name, reports that four out of every five of its products has been invented or commercially developed since the end of World War II.

Add items like automation, computers, frozen foods, nuclear power, space exploration, stable room—almost all kinds of things calling for new job specifications and a familiarity with new skills.

But how are men being fitted into this rapidly changing employment picture?

Poorly, say a growing number of job guidance counselors, management consultants and even psychiatrists—aptitude testers themselves.

Intelligence and aptitude testing take the biggest criticism.

At Columbia university, for example, a study covering 12 years and 100,000 tests of new jobs—both predictions and evaluations of individuals based on test scores were not nearly so good as current work based on personal observation and interviews.

"Several testers report they can't get their hands on the right tools how to take tests, or by offering understandable rewards like trophies for high scores."

Next on the critic list is the job application form. The problem is a concentration on personal history rather than on professional achievement.

"If you've never put a satellite into orbit before, the argument goes, how can you weed out those who have never launched a satellite? Aren't you really more interested in other things? What they think of as being satisfactory about a job, what kind of personal achievements take, etc?"

Hiring by job history alone, according to an employment guide called "How to Make a Habit of Success," leads to a "talent manpower. Studies reveal that the output gap between the most productive man and the least productive in a department differs by as much as 300 per cent."

Also in for its share of contempt is today's industry-wide recruitment policies from colleges and universities.

One of the nation's—and the world's—biggest—and best-known companies has just been advised by high priced management consultants to abandon its campus recruiting methods of going after the best men.

"Forget about the top 10 per cent in the class," the advice went. "They want challenge and you want to stock-pile them. Instead, pick the number of men you want at random from the rest of the top half of the class. All you're after is competence and mediocrity."

One top guidance expert, Bernard Haldane, reports that his studies show the best recruitment for a man hired by today's resort comes at age 24, instead of 64 when he's far wiser, far more experienced and "better educated."

WASHINGTON—The Kennedy administration's strong legal and political support for the "Freedom of Information Act" is being used to force school desegregation on a nationwide scale as well as to force school desegregation on the Democrats in national elections at least. President Kennedy, however, at a recent session when he called on U.S. soldiers to keep open a path for Negroes attending freedom schools, said that the most basic constitutional right to be safeguarded by the federal government is the right to the untrammeled freedom to register and to vote.

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WARRIOR-KENNEDY BEHIND EYE-TO-EYE
The supreme court, which has furnished the President and the attorney general with all of the necessary legal support, is now being used by the President at the recent session when he called on U.S. soldiers to keep open a path for Negroes attending freedom schools, said that the most basic constitutional right to be safeguarded by the federal government is the right to the untrammeled freedom to register and to vote.

Recently in a move to preserve the Kilmer Oak tradition, members of the Rutgers Student Forestry club planted acorns of the famous tree in a school greenhouse.

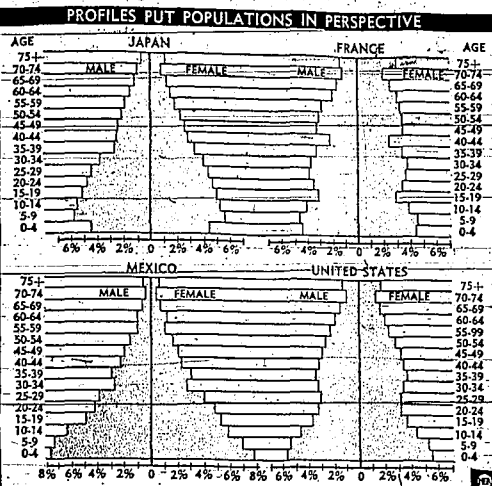
58 Police, 2,000 Rioters Scuffle

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—A rioting crowd on the Coney Island boardwalk last night grew into a riot with 58 policemen struggling to control a crowd of 2,000 youths.

Police restored order after half an hour they said the outburst apparently was just high-spirited among some youths.

Nations' Age Distribution Profiles Differ



Because of the different birth and death rates, each nation in the world has its own age distribution profile. A stable population, such as in France, shows a straight-up and-down shape. Number of people in each age group is fairly equal. Mexico's population, on the other hand, is pyramid shaped. Nearly 16 per cent of its rapidly growing population is under four. This means that fewer adults must support more and more nonproducing children. Most underdeveloped nations have a pyramid pattern. Japan, however, with a declining birth rate, is moving toward stability. Its proportion of children under four (about nine per cent) is now lower than that of the U.S. (11 per cent).

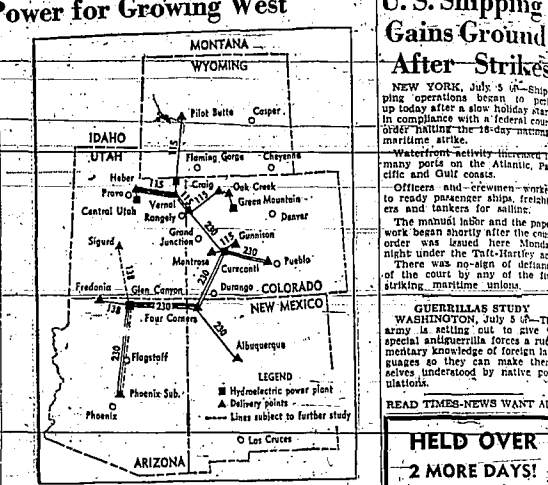

Nixon Lost to Perfectionist, Writer States

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—President Kennedy scored his razor-thin election victory over Richard M. Nixon because of perfectionist planning and execution in Nixon's overall strategy, according to a book appearing today in bookstores.

The volume, entitled "The Making of the President: New York: Atherton, \$6.95, was written by Theodore H. White, novelist and former foreign correspondent.

White, who explores the campaign from strategy conferences in 1959 through the Nov. 8 voting, believes Nixon lost because he has reversed the outcome. But he concludes that there were "both and fault" on the Kennedy and Nixon strategies.

He writes accidents befall both sides many "in" water for lack of it made the Republicans more vulnerable, he concludes.

He says the major elements in the Kennedy strategy included concentration on northeastern industrial states, emphasis on civil rights and abolition of suburban "the South" was left to Lyndon B. Johnson.

White suggests Nixon might have won the election if he had handled the civil rights issue differently.

He says the former vice president took a relatively liberal civil rights stand at the Republican convention and then, after the issue became blurred in an effort to win the South.

White believes that Nixon either should have struck boldly for the South or campaigned for the northern Negro vote. He says that Nixon lost both by trying to win both.

"This is one of Nixon's characteristic and fatal flaws—that he presumes to often a split image," the author says.

Investigators Find No Race Bias to Date

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—A special treasury investigating team—all Negroes—is probing complaints of discrimination against Negroes in the government's money-printing activity.

The team learned recently that after nearly a month of investigation of the federal bureau of printing and engraving it had found no proof of discrimination yet.

The government has received 35 complaints about the bureau, a branch of the treasury which prints U. S. currency and postage stamps. They allege general discrimination against Negroes in hiring and promotion practices.

Henry J. Holtzclaw, director of the bureau since 1954, said it is conceivable but highly unlikely there is some merit to the charges.

"I hold a pretty tight rein on all personnel actions and I review most of them," he said. "I have never discriminated in any way against anyone."

Holtzclaw said the three investigators told him last week that they had found no evidence of discrimination.

Treasury sources confirmed that the inquiry had turned up no proof of discrimination, but the claims are disturbed about two instances.

—Machinists: About 17 have been hired in the past two years. All had lost jobs at the nearby naval shipyard in 1954 because of a pay cut. The men were rehired at a lower pay rate. Holtzclaw said he is equally quick, spelled negatively.

—Printing tradesmen: In 1953, 1954 and 1955 the bureau, taking advantage of new labor-saving equipment, discharged or reduced in grade 30 journeymen printers and 10 apprentices. The Negroes among them, it has been alleged, were assigned to "dead end" jobs which had little opportunity for advancement.

Tommies Win Kuwait Battle Of Ice Cream

KUWAIT, Kuwait, July 5 (AP)—British soldiers today won their first battle in Kuwait—over ice cream peddlers.

With the temperature at the 130-degree mark, the "Tommies" became hot under the collar when Kuwaiti ice-cream vendors tried to charge them 1 cent.

The Britons refused to pay more than two cents. The vendors capitulated and did a hand of business.

The British also have ordered 16,000 cans of fruit juice and daily delivery of 45 cases of fresh oranges to help combat the heat.

Christian laborers packed cakes of ice around free aluminum water coolers from Great Britain's plants for their British protectors.

There have been a number of cases of heat prostration and sunburn.

Many soldiers have been stricken while working and digging in the positions while stripped to the waist.

The Britons also are bothered by the constant dust storms, which are frequent this time of the year.

29 Fireworks Viewers Hurt

KANSASVILLE, Ill., July 5 (AP)—A bomb exploded 25 feet above a crowd watching a Fourth of July fireworks show last night, injuring 29 persons.

There was no warning when it hit, police officer Ken Hermes said. Several people in the crowd clothes burned.

"It's just lucky nothing more serious happened," Hermes, a witness to the mishap.

A police ambulance and two private ambulances took the injured to Hillside hospital and hospital.

One was seriously injured, a hospital spokesman said. They were treated for burns on various parts of the body.

A crowd estimated by police at 4,000 was standing and sitting on the grass at the Madison school grounds watching the show. The show had been on about 15 minutes when the bomb exploded 20 to 30 feet above the spectators' heads.

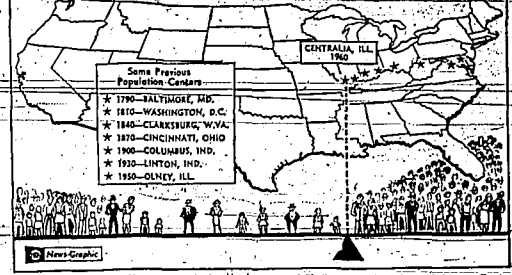

Dreiser's Hemingway's ill did when he stopped running to face Achilles, armament of a man who was not Hemingway said 20 years ago, long before illness overtook him, "I must write because if I do not write a certain amount I do not enjoy the rest of my life."

It is a reasonable guess that the prospect of years of invalidism, or at least marginal vitality, took the joy of life from him.

This may be too simple for future analysts seeking the meaning of the Aborigine that which killed him last Sunday. You can almost read them now.

That his concern with death, which dominated all, he wrote, meant he was obsessed with fear of it and that he sought to buy time through the years by marching character after character inevitable doom as a substitute for himself.

The literary pigeon-fanciers who like copies of a message insulted him. But he was no snob-sayer, he used words like rocks and the beginning had no message.

Lawrence Sanders, editor of "The Sun," wrote that Hemingway's people "act as if thought is unthinkable." This was true. He was an artist, writes about the muscles of the heart, not the capillaries of the brain.

The muscles got tired as he grew older. His best work was his early work, the short stories, "The Sun Also Rises" and "Farewell to Arms," some parts of "Death in the Afternoon," some parts of "To Have and Have Not."

It was downhill after that—although for him was up on the mountain for most of his contemporaries—as if he had listened too much to the critics who wanted a message, who said he had no social consciousness.

In those early days he showed some of it. Why should he have? He was an artist writing about people in trouble as he saw them, without moral judgments. He had one measuring rod: to write truthfully. It was his own word, but no one can ever really understand—perhaps that is a better word—what Hemingway really means to American literature. He was as alive and young in those middle 1920s when Hemingway's work began.

The words were full of literary frauds and second-raters who were strictly for bucks, suffered from Victorian anemia, or pumped-out showboaters who had disappeared in the garbage can.

There were some honest men writing for money. Ernest Hemingway and Sherwood Anderson, who tried to cut new roads with stories about the world as they say it "themselves."

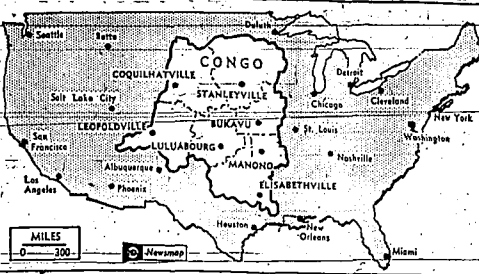

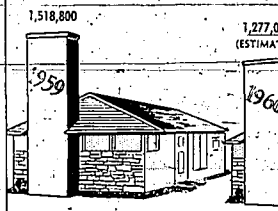

Cuban Told To Be on 'A'

KEY WEST, Fla., (AP)—Fidel Castro announced today that the rationing of meat and fat in Cuba until the current acute shortage is solved perhaps in a year and a half.

The rationing will be Cuban consumption of fats by about one-half.

Castro appeared on a nationwide radio-television hookup that was monitored by a Miami firm of 18 contacts of Iard that had been en route to Cuba.

Castro called this the latest act of "imperialist aggression" and said that Cubans "would have to reduce their consumption of oil and one pound of oil and one pound of fat per person per month, Cuban normal consumption, he said, is about 40 pounds of fat per person per year.

Castro led up to his rationing announcement with a long recount of old and recent grievances against the United States.

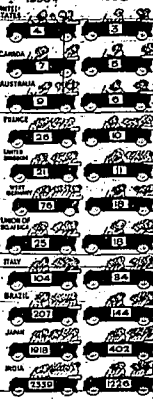
He said that Cuba had purchased in the United States total of \$2 million dollars annually.

Castro said the embargoed shipments of Iard already had been paid for. "We lost about \$600,000," he said.

The Cuban prime minister also announced that the Soviet Union had made available 10,000 tons of Iard for Cuba, although that would not be enough to supply the island's needs.

He said that by the end of 1959 Cuba would be producing its total fat requirements.

U. N.-Witnessed U. S. Nuclear Tests Suggested by Senator

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—The clear tests for peaceful purposes of the United Nations should be invited, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D., said today to monitor and inspect a limited program of U. S. underground nuclear tests.

He also proposed turning over to the United Nations the data and results of such tests.

Humphrey, assistant senate Democratic leader and chairman of the senate disarmament subcommittee, said in a statement that U. N. inspection of the tests would give the Soviet Union a clear alternative to the impact which now exists in the less than

negotiations. "Its delegates may vote to join this project of testing for peaceful purposes to face the capture of world opinion by voting against our resolution."

Humphrey stressed he was not suggesting a resumption of military nuclear tests.

25 Dominicans Are Sent Free

CIAUDAD TRUJILLO, July 8 (AP)—Twenty-five persons charged with conspiracy have been released from prison in accordance with a new amnesty law, the govern-

ment announced. Official sources said there were 10 or 12 persons involved in the conspiracy charges and that their cases were being reviewed to determine if they could be released.

Anti-Castroites Rally, Arrested

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Twelve anti-Castro demonstrators were held on the playing field at Yankee stadium during a July 4 double-header yesterday in a plea for Cuban independence.

Their bannered parade stopped play briefly at the start of the seventh inning of the first game between the Yankees and the Detroit Tigers.

"Help us fight communism in Cuba or you'll cry tomorrow," read one banner. "Cuba, yes, Russia, no," read another.

The dozen demonstrators were held off the field by stadium security police and waters, and turned over to police.

Canada Rejects OAS Invitation

OTTAWA, July 8 (AP)—The Canadian government has decided to defer joining the Organization of American States but intends to play a bigger direct role in Latin American affairs, the Canadian Press reports.

Quoting informed sources, the news agency said the decision amounts to polite rejection of President Kennedy's strong plea that Canada accept the 18-nation invitation to become a full-fledged member of the western hemisphere association.
