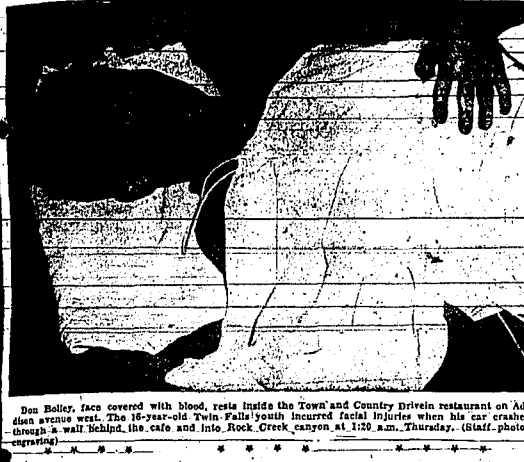

Local Youth, 16, Survives Plunge of His Car Into Canyon Back of Drivern

A young man dependent about 11 feet from the town and country drivern restaurant on Addison avenue west at 1:20 a.m. Thursday and crashed into the bottom of Rock Creek canyon. Don Bolter, 16, 4600 Quincy street, escaped with a cut lip and multiple fractures. He was taken to the Magic Valley Memorial hospital early Thursday after emergency treatment by a physician. Twin Falls police pressed no charges. Bolter's auto, a 1954 Ford, was a total loss.

Lloyd Williams, a cook at the establishment, reported Bolter was working on his car in front of the establishment just prior to the plunge into the canyon. "He really had the engine revved up," Williams said.

Williams said because of noise inside the cafe no one heard the crash. When Williams walked outside, he saw a hole in the fence. The cafe employee used his own auto to shine light over the edge to determine what happened.

Williams began to climb down the steep slope. He spotted Bolter climbing out of the canyon and assisted him to the top.

"About halfway up," Williams said, "he started vomiting about his breathing. He choked about it and said he wasn't hurt. I took him down in the cafe and called the police. Apparently shock set in because he started shaking pretty badly before the ambulance arrived."

Bolter had borrowed some tape from a neighbor to use to hold together the car. "I asked him how the shocks (shock absorbers) were on his car," Williams recalled. "He said he didn't have any left."

Bolter told Williams, before aid arrived, "That's a long way down and I won't do it all the way."

Burley Spud Plant Expansion Planned

JACKSON, Miss., July 6—The justice department today filed its first civil rights voting suit in Mississippi.

The suit, filed here, charged that voters in Clarke and Forrest counties have been denied the right to vote.

Miss. Gov. Robert P. Kennedy today announced the filing of the suit under the civil rights law of 1960 in federal district court in the southern district of Mississippi.

The suit accuses the voter registrars of the two counties and the county board of supervisors of discriminating against Negro applicants to register.

Caroline Slips Into Pool, but She's Rescued

WASHINGTON, July 6—Mrs. Caroline Kennedy slipped through an inner-tube into a swimming pool last night and was rescued by the daughter-in-law of a senator, the White House today reported.

The 23-year-old daughter of President Kennedy was pulled from the pool by Mrs. Virginia Dalton, daughter-in-law of Massachusetts Gov. Leverett Saltonstall.

The incident occurred at the suburban Washington home of Jacqueline Kennedy's step-sister, Mrs. Newton Steers.

FBI Joins Four-State Hunt for Slayer and Kidnaped Girl, 15; Little Hope Held for Her Life

MOAB, Utah, July 6 (UPI)—The FBI joined small town marshals today in the four-state hunt for a stocky killer and the teen-aged girl he kidnaped. Sheriff John Stocks said the odds were 1,000 to 1 that 15-year-old Denise Sullivan, Rockville, Conn., would be slain by the same man who killed her mother and wounded a traveling companion. "At first I thought there was about one chance in 100 the girl might be found alive," Stocks said.

Kennedy Ready to Set up Ties With Outer Mongolia

WASHINGTON, July 6 (UPI)—The Kennedy administration was reported ready today to set up diplomatic relations with the Soviet-sponsored Mongolian Peoples republic. Officials were being made to send a U. S. mission to the capital city of Ulan Bator to agree on the level of representation in each country. The U. S. decision is expected to spark strong criticism from some congressmen, who back Nationalist China's contention that the Peoples republic of Mongolia is not an independent country but a Russian satellite or territory tightly belonging to the Chinese.

Radar Tower Widows Sue U. S., 4 Firms

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)—The widows of eight men killed in the collapse of a giant air force radar tower off the West coast sued the U. S. government for 28 million dollars in damages.

The suits were filed yesterday in the federal admiralty court for the Southern District of New York.

The government named the U. S. government and four private contractors.

Each woman sued for \$350,000.

The widows are all widows of construction workers who were killed when the platform, known as Radar Tower 4, collapsed and sank in a storm the night of Jan. 16, 1961.

Twenty-eight air force and civilian personnel were killed when the tower went down. They had been sent to the site to make repairs on the pie-shaped tower, which was known as Radar Tower 4, after it was weakened by hurricane Donna a few months earlier.

Investigation determined that the cause of the air force tower was the part of those responsible for leaving the men aboard.

Jerome Rate On Water Is Parley Topic

SPRINGFIELD, July 6.—The chamber members voted to present a solution to the city council on reducing the sprinkling rates in Jerome.

Mayor Paul Pratt explained to the group that residents are charged 10 cents a thousand for the use of 20,000 gallons of water used for sprinkling. After the first 10,000 gallons are used the rate drops to 20 cents a gallon.

He said the city council has accepted the "bonding" company to do about making the city's water straight 10 cents per thousand.

The Chamber of Commerce resolution endorse the city council's plan.

There was an estimated \$20 damage to the White car and the front end of the pickup truck was demolished. The accident was investigated by Camas county Sheriff Allen Lawson.

Report Is Given On Youth Wrecks

BURLEY, July 6.—About a third of the accidents in Burley during June were caused by teenagers from the age of 16 to 18 years, according to a report of the Burley Police department.

Damages to vehicles were estimated \$10,000.

The youths were involved in 12 of the 34 accidents during June. Persons from 18 to 50 were involved in only 170 accidents for the month. There were 54 men involved in accidents compared to 21 women drivers.

Injured were six drivers, four passengers and two pedestrians.

The department reports there have been 35 more accidents in 1961 than during same period of 1960. There were 172 this year and 132 last year—from January to June.

Others May Soon Create Atom Power

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—Israel's successful firing of a space rocket was cited by experts here today as an example of technical ability that could lead even small nations to develop nuclear weapons.

The Israeli government repeatedly has denied reports that it was trying to develop an atomic bomb, but this was believed to be due to policy rather than lack of resources or ability.

Experts said that the firing yesterday of the Israeli weather rocket, apparently to an altitude of 30 or 40 miles, demonstrated that the Israelis have the kind of technical knowledge needed to build both missiles and nuclear warheads.

At present there are four nations in the "nuclear club"—those possessing the atomic bomb. They are the United States, Russia, Britain and France.

However, experts here predicted that the Chinese may have the atomic bomb within another year or two, and they say a slow but steady increase in the number of nuclear powers can be expected unless current restraints remain in testing.

Only six other countries—the members of the nuclear club, plus Italy and Japan—have built meteorological cockers of the atomic power by Israel.

If treaty and policy barriers are ignored, experts said, the list of countries with ability and resources to produce nuclear weapons is probably fairly long.

Spurned NAACP Meet Is Scheduled

NAPLES, Italy, July 6 (AP)—Kevin O'Connell, the Negro film biographer, said he had spurned a biplane mission for a flight in which a male elephant killed the female elephant who shared his cage.

The bull elephant, Barria, trampled the smaller female, Nansuwa, to death Tuesday as O'Connell watched in horror.

O'Connell said Barria had been making advances to Nansuwa who appeared to spurn him.

Crowds Wait In Rain, See U. S. General

MANILA, July 6 (AP)—Hungry crowds stood for hours in drenching monsoon rains today to catch a glimpse of General of the Army Douglas MacArthur as he returned the role his troops took to liberate Manila from the Japanese in World War II.

It was the fourth straight day that Filipinos have poured out their affection for the 61-year-old soldier here on a sentimental visit for 10 days.

School children stood under bare trees or palm trees, shaking as the rain poured down. They cheered every car that drove past.

When the colonel, retired American, they yelled "Hi, Joe," as Filipinos did to welcome American troops 16 years ago.

The National Park service is creating the historic, tree wilderness trail in Mississippi, as a scenic parkway.

NAACP Meet Is Scheduled

PHILADELPHIA, July 6.—The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People opens its 52nd annual convention here Monday featuring five topics listed in the convention program under "NAACP battle front."

Specifically, the subjects are: voter front, job front, school front, public accommodations front and housing front. The six-day convention is scheduled to conclude on July 13.

The keynote address is to be made at the evening session on the first day of the convention by Bishop Stephen Gill Spottswood, chairman of the NAACP's board of directors.

The headline business of the convention starts on July 12, the day after delegates heard "Freedom trains" to Washington for rights during action on civil and human rights bills. Three congressional bills will be discussed, and NAACP spokesmen said here.

Proposals to Boost House Size Refused

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—House leaders have quickly but firmly rejected all proposals to increase the size of the House in order to prevent some states from losing seats because of population declines.

The effect of the decision may be that the house elected in 1962 may contain dozens of members chosen in state-wide rather than district voting.

Of the 53 states whose congressional delegation will increase or decrease in the next House the size of that body is not enlarging only 11 have enacted redistricting laws. In two of those 11 states the legislative action has not been final.

The others presumably are waiting to see what congress will do. There have been no political obstacles in their redistricting efforts. Among them are Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Illinois, with a total of 63 seats in the new congress the size of the new congress is not changed. All may be elected in state-wide contests.

Several plans to save some seats from losing seats have been proposed in the house, but the current outlook is that none of them will get anywhere.

AMA Fights Proposal for Drug Checks

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—The American Medical Association declared its opposition yesterday to a proposal of Sen. Estes Kefauver, D. Tenn., that the government decide whether drugs should be sold without a prescription.

The AMA said Kefauver's proposal would curtail the marketing of drugs, and the exercise of discretion by the medical profession.

But Kefauver, maintaining that the public's patience "with price-inflating drugs is wearing thin," said his plan would reduce the cost of prescription drugs.

Kefauver's proposal, the food and drug administration, before approving drugs, would investigate whether they worked. At present, the FDA checks drugs only to see if they are safe.

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Humane sensitive animal-lovers now stand a good chance of enjoying a clear conscience with each bite of fresh pork, and mutton, because 354 of the nation's 430 federally inspected meat packing houses now employ painless butchers.

This bright spot in the generally dismal future of most farm animals is the result of the federal humane slaughtering act which became law July 1. It must be obeyed by all packers who want to sell meat to the federal government.

The enthusiastic public support for humane slaughter legislation is almost unmatched in U.S. history. From the day Sen. Robert Humphrey, D. Minn., introduced the bill in 1956 until its passage two years ago, senators and representatives were swamped with letters.

Sanders Adds Power, Flexibility To Magic Valley Cowboys Lineup

Bobby Sanders is a baseball player by vocation, a basketball player by avocation, and a Magic Valley and the Pioneer League leading home run hitter this year. Sanders, who is 23 years old, is a professional baseball player for four seasons but still makes the time to play basketball for the Pioneer League because his first two seasons were spent with the Birmingham Black Barons of the Negro American League. So far he has stamped himself one of the toughest men in the league when the clips are down and has won several games with late-inning heroics.



The first time he belted three homers in a game came when he nunging a pulled grounder into the outfield. Sanders had a liner and liner injuries Tuesday night. He wasn't listed on the original starting lineup by manager Phillips because of a bad back. However, he was shown in the game file minutes before Sanders, when Dennis Wagner, not knowing he'd been taken out of the lineup, decided to take in a move between the afternoon and evening games.

Although Jayce Park is the smallest in the league, Sanders hasn't been too partial to it. Of his 24 homers, 13 have come at home, and 10 on the road. The high fence hasn't bothered him either at home or on the road. Sanders generally has moon shots, lowering high over the field and high fences and then dropping over the wall. Bobby and first baseman John Shoemaker, the Cowboys' top two home run hitters, serve each other in fulfilling that role. Few pitchers will walk one to get to the other.

Twice he has belted three home runs in one game, his last "hat trick" coming Tuesday night. With about 50 games left in the Pioneer league season, Bobby has 22 and has been hitting about .325 all season.

Benji West has little impression on Bobby. He likes it, but he notes he'd like almost any pitcher providing he was playing baseball. Bobby signed as an infielder and prefers playing third base or shortstop. However, with a complete infield that is doing the job, Bobby has been shifted largely to leftfield, where the Cowboys have been having trouble with injuries. The assignment here gave manager Phillips a lot of flexibility and allows him to juggle his lineup before and during the game with facility. So far Sanders has played every position but pitcher and catcher.

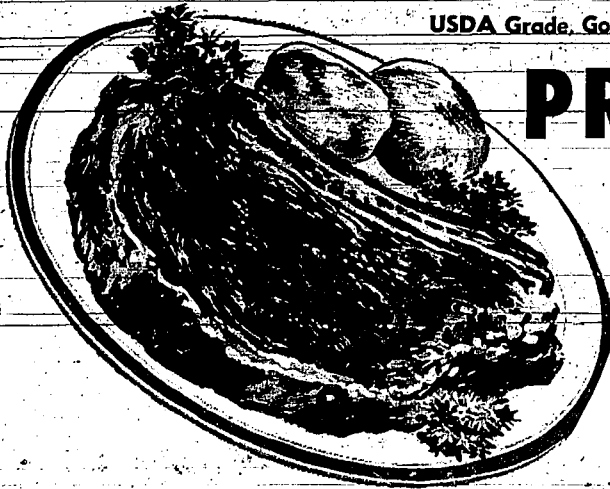
For Bobby that is quite a stretch. He never uses two words which one will do. He runs 90 mph. He is a starred-up player, second for being the quietest on the squad.

Fryers Crowd Beef for Top Stores Billing

Supermarket advertisements take on a more national summer look this week with frying chickens crowding beef for top billing.

Low prices for steaks and roasts have enabled beef to force chicken aside in recent weeks, but this week chickens are tops in the East, around Atlanta in the Middle Atlantic states and Midwest. Quotations of 33 to 38 cents a pound at one chain's New York metropolitan area stores are five to six cents less than a year ago.

Steaks still are the No. 1 attraction in many areas. Fillet and porterhouse are on the bill in the East, round steaks in the Detroit area and rib steaks around Chicago.

Leg of lamb is featured in New Zealand and the Midwest. Fish items are confined largely to scallop and halibut.

Egg prices continue to climb. Advances run from two to four cents a dozen this week, leaving prices four to eight cents above year-ago levels.

A considerable number of fresh vegetables and fruits are available. New arrivals include New Jersey carrots, onions and peppers; New York zucchini, strawberries, broccoli and spinach; Connecticut cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce; Pennsylvania beans and corn; South Carolina watermelons and regular plum-type tomatoes from Virginia.

Hot buys among vegetables are beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, celery, endive, escarot, miscellaneous leafy cooking greens including spinach, radishes, squash and green onions.

"Good buys" include beans, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, mushrooms, onions, parsley, peas, watercress and peppers.

Fruits are especially numerous. Apples, mangoes, lemons, plums, apricots and peaches are rated as outstanding buys and the "good" buy label adorns watermelons, large avocados, blueberries, cantaloupe, honey dew or melons, grapes, sour cherries, peaches, raspberries, strawberries and small California oranges.
