

Granger Defends New Bill

FILER, July 8—National Grange Master Herschel D. Newsum endorsed a "commodity-by-commodity" approach to marketing controls of U. S. agriculture, when he spoke at Filer Saturday night.

Newsum, a vocal critic of the present omnibus agricultural bill before the U. S. Congress, said that the bill is "a lot of trouble, but will be passed." He said the bill "probably will be passed" and that the "similar legislation" will be introduced in a talk at Burley on Monday.

The official cited the dairy, sugar and citrus-producing industries as examples of a sound approach to marketing controls. He explained the "new deal" on the dairy industry, which provides for a "quota" on milk production and a "price support" on milk. He said the "new deal" on the citrus industry, which provides for a "quota" on citrus production and a "price support" on citrus.

Opposition to the present omnibus bill, which the Grange opposes in principle, Newsum said, comes from two sources, the American Farm Bureau, which opposes a commodity-by-commodity approach, and the Republican Party, which opposes a commodity-by-commodity approach.

At Filer, Newsum spoke at the high school auditorium before a crowd of 150 Grange members and guests. He reviewed previous sessions to commerce and industry, first endorsed by Alexander Hamilton during the 1790s, and a labor and land law passed during the new deal era of the 1930s.

Newsum contended, "We have had a revolving door of legislative structure in the course of 175 years" and urged support for the "new deal" legislation, which would provide assistance to farmers and to that already recognized by organized business and labor.

The Washington, D.C.-based Grange official contended price supports have been in effect since 1933 when the agricultural adjustment act was passed, and that the "new deal" legislation is "a lot of trouble, but will be passed."

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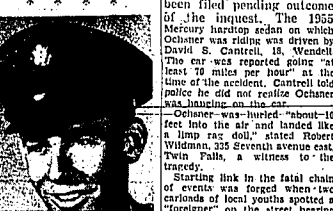
Early Start Set On Potato Plant

Construction of the Northwest Agricultural corporation's potato processing plant will begin within two weeks, directors of the company announced Saturday. Approximately \$500,000 has been assigned to the company, more than the required \$300,000 needed to break escrow and permit directors to authorize expenditures of company funds for construction. The company announced that approximately one-third of the \$500,000 shares of common stock at \$2-per-share have been sold. Northwest Agricultural's finance committee, Ed Harper, Twin Falls; Cecil Brim, Kimberly; and Lewis Roberts, announced the company hopes to raise between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000 borrowed from sources such as lease companies, vendors, the small business administration, and a warehouse receipts credit line.

Initial plant facilities, to be built on 32 acres near the Twin Falls mill course in the Grand View area, will cost approximately \$800,000 and will produce about 100,000 pounds daily of processed potato products, officials explain. The construction firm of Stinson and Miller, Twin Falls, has been selected as the general contractor.

Members of the finance committee of the board of directors, says the new plant should be completed by Nov. 1. In time for this season's potato harvest, it will incorporate the most modern processing equipment.

Russians to Up Military Funds, Halt Troop Cuts

MOSCOW, July 8 (AP and UPI)—Premier Khrushchev announced today that the Soviet Union is increasing military spending and halting the cutback in its military manpower because of what he called threatening gestures by the West in the Berlin crisis. But at the same time he called for a summit conference on Germany. "Once we must call for war but for peace," he said, without suggesting either time or place for such a conference. Naming President Kennedy, British Prime Minister Harold Wilson, and French President Charles de Gaulle, he said the Soviet Union has the right to demand reciprocal to them to "display wisdom in the solution of the German problem," to attend a conference together with other peace-loving states—and to conclude a "peace treaty on Germany."

"Common sense and once again common sense is needed above all," Khrushchev said.

"Khrushchev is particularly interested in the sovereignty of communist East Germany, which the western powers refuse to recognize."

Killer Suspect Dead; Girl Is Not With Him

MOAB, Utah, July 8 (UPI)—Western officers, left without clues by the suicide of the prime suspect, searched the Utah deserts today for a teen-aged girl who was kidnapped by a highway robber after a murder her mother.

"They said they are certain they will find the girl," said the Connecticut trooper who was probably killed by her abductor soon after he fled with her down a desert road Tuesday night.

While one man who might have known lay dead in the Moab morgue, the highway robber's supporters pledged to check every water hole, every clump of bushes for a trace of the girl.

The dead man was Abel D. Aragon, 36, an unemployed coal miner who won the Navy Cross, the nation's second highest medal for valor, as a 19-year-old marine who fought the Japanese on Guam in 1944.

Aragon, father of five children and a motherless 12-year-old girl, was stopped at a highway junction near here last night by "FBI" Probe "I," he said, rolling up the windows and locking the trunk. As the highway robber pulled his badges, they said Aragon

Riots Leave Dominicans Capital Edgy

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic, July 8 (AP)—Riots in the capital, Santo Domingo, left the city today and dispersed 300 students who ran through downtown streets shouting anti-government slogans.

Spontaneous disturbances flared up throughout the capital, still reeling after a night of arson and rioting that followed the first public opinion poll in the Dominican Republic since 1954.

President Joaquin Balaguer, who has promised to accept a political opposition, announced "drastic instructions" have been issued to the police to prevent further disorders.

Balaguer ordered an investigation into the capital's riots, which he said were the work of pro-Castro elements who were involved in a mob attack last night on the radio station WJ Radio. The radio station was burned.

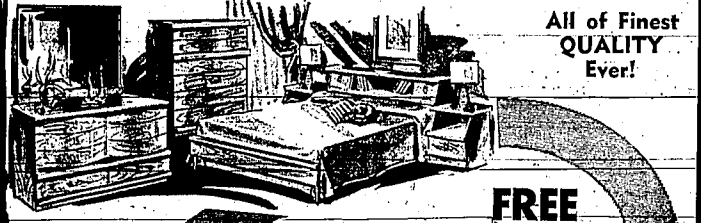

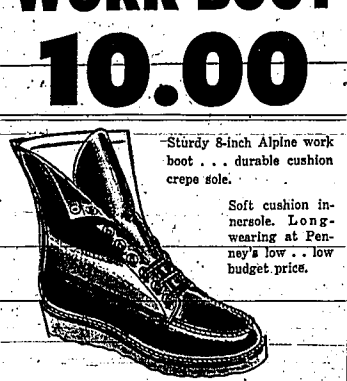

Board Orders

Area Worker Be Reinstated

TUESDAY, July 8—Bureau officials were notified Saturday morning of the national labor relations board's decision to reinstate Mrs. Lucille Hoodenpile. Bureau plans to processing plant employee, discharged for giving aid to a union organizer.

The NLRB directed the plant to pay Mrs. Hoodenpile back pay for wages lost from the time she was discharged and further directed the plant to cease and desist from discouraging membership in the union and any other labor organization by its employees.

Mrs. Hoodenpile had been interested in the Grain Millers union after organizer Jack Gulfin had contacted and urged her to join by handing out union authorization cards in the plant.

At the hearing it was charged that Mrs. Hoodenpile was discharged for discriminatory reasons, and not for unsatisfactory work as the management members claimed.

The company was directed to post for 60 days the action recommended by the NLRB, and to concure with any employee organization, to bargain collectively with union organizers.

The manager of the plant was out of town and was unable to be reached for comment.

17,800 Acre Feet Remains at Magic

SHOSHONE, July 8—As of Wednesday morning, Magic reservoir contained 17,800 acre feet of water. Planned to last next week, 12 more days remain in Magic.

However, there is some sediment precipitating water and the dam will retain some water if it cannot be removed. Considering this 10 days would be a realistic expectation for water.

The Magic-Woodcock company board of directors voted to drain as much out of the reservoir for as long as possible. This means removing the coffer dam by line, if at all possible.

Two-Thirds of Legislators Asking for Special Session

BOISE, July 8—Idaho legislators are divided widely over how soon a special session of the state legislature should be called to enact a school bond law, but they support by about a two-thirds majority the calling such a session.

Those views are shown in a poll by the Associated Press of the 10 members of the legislature. Fifty-five responded and 40 of them said they favored a special session if a survey showed there is definite need for reenactment of the bond law.

The state department of education said this week that such a need. It reported 11 districts face critical difficulties if the bond limit is not raised, and about a dozen others have a need that is only a bit less serious.

The state board of education today approved a resolution urging the calling of a special session. Gov. Robert E. Smylie, who alone has the power to call the lawmakers into special session, said he has not yet decided.

He indicated he will have a decision in the Associated Press poll 25 legislators said finally they favor a special session and 14 more do if they do if the need is shown to exist. Then they were asked to oppose to a special session if they did not answer the question.

Of the 45 members of the legislature, 33 said they favor reenactment of the 15 per cent debt limit law which was outlawed by the supreme court and four others said they favor such action at the next regular session. Six said they are opposed to raising the debt limit from the present 10 per cent and nine did not answer.

Talk of a special session requested from action by the supreme court in invalidating a bill passed by the 1961 session which would have raised the limit to 15 per cent of a district's assessed property valuation. That limit had been in effect for several years on a temporary basis but the 1961 bill made it permanent.

He is Quinlan Pholsena, bitterly anti-American minister of information in Souvanna's government.

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Killer Suspect Is Recalled as Quiet Marine

PRIMO, Utah, July 8 (AP)—A former marine boot camp buddy remembers Abel Aragon as a quiet soldier who became one of the best in his platoon.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Charles Benken, Carson county, Utah, enlisted with Aragon in the marine corps and went through boot camp in June 1942 at San Diego, Calif. Aragon shot and killed Primo last night when FBI agents stopped him for questioning about the murder of a Connecticut woman, Mrs. Jeanette Sullivan, 41, and the kidnapping of her 15-year-old daughter, Paula.

"He was always sort of a low guy and he was worried about whether he could make it. But he turned out to be one of the best rifle shots I ever saw," Benken said.

A year after his boot-training Aragon, a mortar man, won the Bronze Star and a Purple Heart on Guam. On July 22, 1944, he was pinned under withering enemy fire. He and eight others tried to assault the crest of a barren hill near Chontio ridge. Only Aragon and eight others survived.

The other six were killed or wounded. "After the war Aragon repeatedly exposed himself to enemy fire for four hours and an hour later he seriously wounded in the left hip, went without medical aid for two hours while continuing to fire on the enemy."

Maj. Gen. Graves B. Eakin, commander of the third marine division, decorated Aragon in a ceremony in February 1945. After the war Aragon returned here and worked as a coal miner, but was laid off last February.

"He was always a drinker or anything. He was a good hard worker. He would associate with violence of that type," Benken said. "I think something must have snapped."

Mrs. Pruett, 70, Is Claimed by Death

BOISE, July 8 (AP)—Support for a special session of the Idaho legislature to reenact a bond law voided by the supreme court was rejected today by the state board of education.

The agency, concluding a three-day meeting, said prompt action by the legislature is needed "to remedy this dire existing situation" in Idaho school districts.

The court voided a law which permitted districts to issue bonds equal to 15 per cent of their assessed valuation. Without that law the limit drops to 10 per cent.

D. F. Engelsing, state superintendent of public instruction, said a survey showed 11 districts will be in critical shape with their buildings programs if they cannot use the 15 per cent limit. He said 100,000 more dollars will be affected, less seriously.

"These will be on church premises," he said, "and cannot be affected by any ban."

The spokesman denied a communist charge that the rally was part of a cold war. He pointed out that Bishop Herman Kunst, chief Evangelical chaplain of the West German armed forces, had asked soldiers not to go to the meeting.

They are due to start July 10 and end five days later with a mass meeting in West Berlin's Olympic stadium.

About 200,000 participants are expected from West Germany. Many additional thousands would have been expected from Poland, East Germany, but the communist leaders have begun a campaign that is bound to frighten large numbers away.

An order from Maj. Gen. Fritz Eismann, communist and East Berlin's police chief, said, "In the interest of preserving calm and order among our people, the Evangelical Kirchtag is forbidden in the capital of the German Democratic republic (East Berlin)."

Visitors from West Germany have to cross 10 miles of communist territory to get to West Berlin.

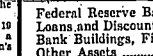

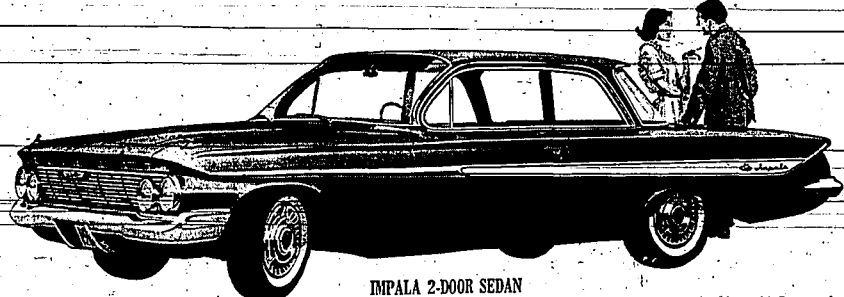

Project Study Is Urged for U.S. Agencies

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(Special)—Sen. Henry Dworak, today suggested officials of the department of interior and the other major federal departments and agencies decide just what state and local projects they deem in the national interest.

"The Idaho solution referred to in the report of the committee that unreserved public domain be made available for educational, health and other community needs at the same \$250 per acre as the department of interior recently accorded these groups for land to be used for recreation and park uses."

"In Idaho, where about 65 per cent of the total acreage of our state is in federal ownership, we have need for public lands for many public purposes other than for parks and recreation," Senator Dworak pointed out in his request letter.

"The reply to my request, which just received from the department of interior, rejects this suggestion, stating that the standard low price was based on the premise that the lands transferred to the states or local governments for public recreation and park purposes would become part of a nationwide system from which all the people of the country might benefit."

"The department of interior also stated that there is a distinct difference between this broad usage and many of the other public uses mentioned by Senator Dworak in his request, which are of only local significance."

"While the department of interior might not classify local projects such as schools, hospitals, youth camps, county fairgrounds, protective watershed management areas and sewage disposal plants as being of national interest enough to get the same consideration as parks and recreation, most other departments and agencies of the new frontier do think so."

"I have only to check the unending flow of federal aid legislation that has been sent to Capitol Hill from the White House to see that these types of projects to verify this contention," he noted.

Vets Advised on Address Change

Thousands of dollars in monthly veterans administration payments for compensation, pension and other benefits for veterans of World War I, were being returned to the U. S. treasury discharging office as "undeliverable" last month, says Arnold Helwege, officer in charge of the veterans administration office in Twin Falls.

"The checks were 'undeliverable' because the addressees had moved and failed to notify the VA and the postoffice of a change of address, according to Helwege."

Helwege pointed out that a few minutes spent at the postoffice filling out a change of address card and in dropping a short note to the VA office at Boise could eliminate most of this problem.

"Notifying both the postoffice and the VA is stressed by Helwege."

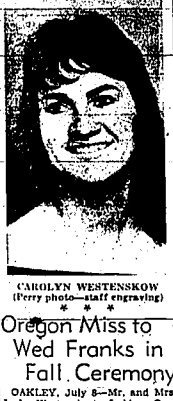

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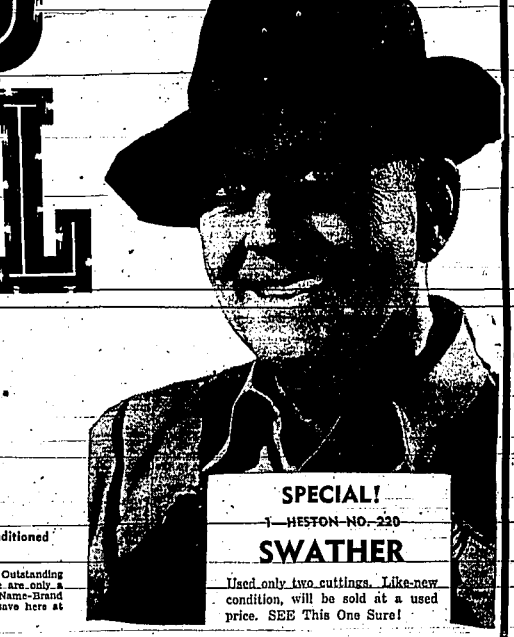
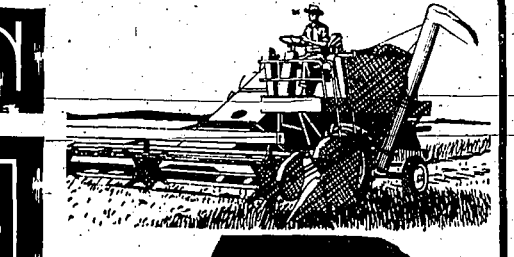

"Milo" Is Wendell Man's Copilot, Perhaps Area's Only Flying Dog

WENDELL July 8—About the time you think you've thought of all the uses a dog can be put to someone comes up with a new use. Morris Perkins, dog-lover and pilot, uses his German Shepherd for a copilot, well almost. At least the dog likes to ride in airplanes and he has logged nearly as many hours as Perkins owned his own plane. He now owns a Cessna-140-A with a special compartment behind the pilot's seat complete with flying harness for "Milo." In seven years of flying Perkins says the dog has never been air sick, which is more than many an experienced pilot can say.

Discarded Tin Cans Used In Filer Woman's Hobby

FILER, July 8—The kind of person who has to find something to keep myself out of this is a self-conscious recent arrival who has found to do is available to anyone. Mrs. J. H. Sharp is the art of making something out of nothing, namely, the type of tin cans that find their way into thousands of wastebaskets in this area. Perkins says he was quite careful when he first started flying with the dog. First he put the dog in the cockpit and just let him sit there for about 30 minutes. This is all he did the first day. On the second day he put "Milo" in the cockpit, started the engine and just let it idle for a few minutes. On the third day he taxied the dog around for a few minutes. And on the fourth day...

Watches From Ground

Perkins notes that even when the dog doesn't fly "Milo" keeps track of the airplane from the ground. Perkins explains that with their fine sense of hearing a dog can easily distinguish the sound of a certain plane. When Perkins leaves the dog in the hangar at Gooding, where he keeps the airplane, the dog will charge out of the hangar as soon as he hears the airplane in the sky and stand on the runway and wait for Perkins to take him on an air trip to Henry's lake. It takes about 10 minutes to fly there and the only precaution Perkins ever takes with the dog previous to a long trip is to skip "Milo's" meal the evening before the flight.

Carries Dog Food

But the dog will be fed immediately upon landing, for Perkins always carries a supply of dog food in the cockpit. He explains that since he devised his survival kit a few years ago he has kept a tin of dog food in the kit. "Milo" would eat, even if he were downed in a remote area. Perkins says he flies to another air strip he leaves the dog in the cockpit. Perkins says "Milo" is usually just out of the kit at the same time serves as a stern guard dog for the parked airplane. Perkins is enthusiastic about flying and says he regards each flight as a separate adventure. He flies all over the south-west part of the state, and as far as he knows "Milo" is the only regular canine copilot in the area.

Stocks Close Out Week on Sizable Gain

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Three consecutive advances and a single decline on Friday set the market for the week on a sizable gain for the week.

Volume dipped to a new eight-month low on Monday with many traders saying an unofficial four-day trading halt was expected.

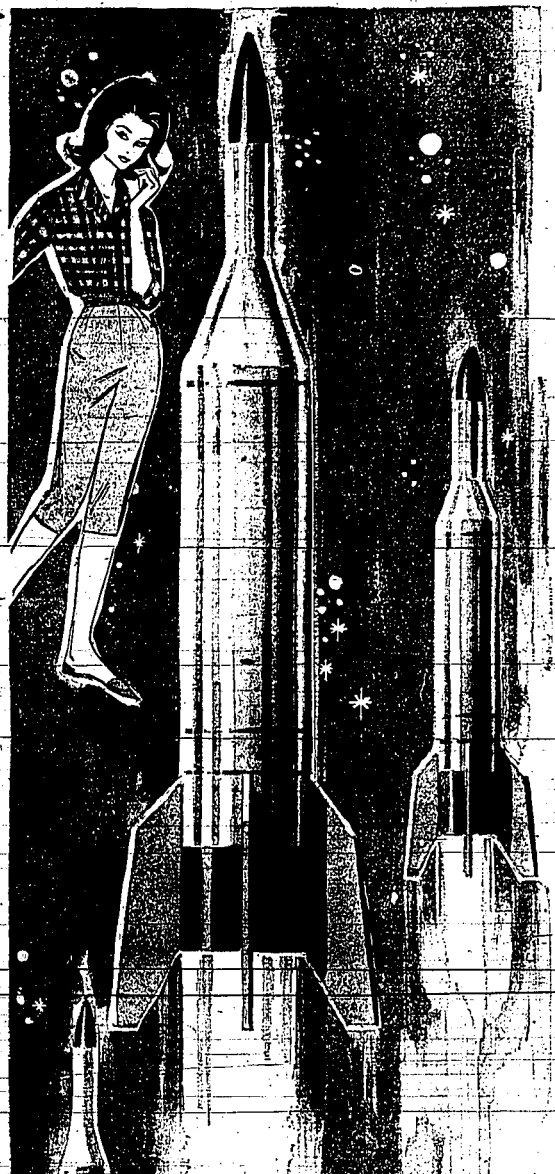
