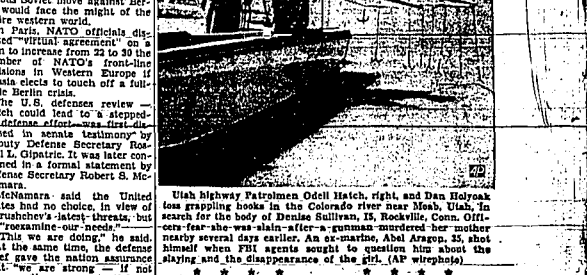

### Junior Rifleman Gets Top Medal

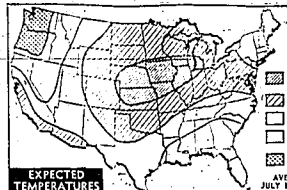

Blakely became one of America's top junior riflemen by filling 14 lower National Rifle association ratings.

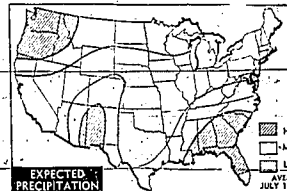

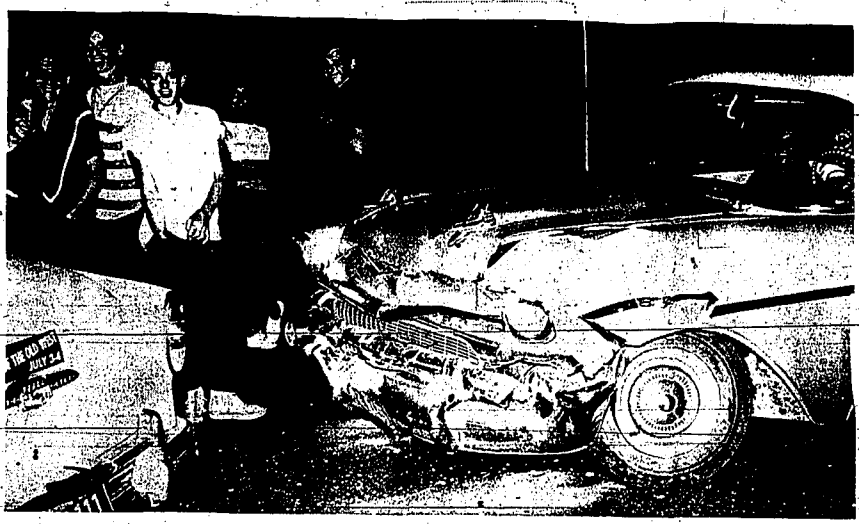

### Formosa Bus Accident Toll Jumps to 49

TAIPEI, Formosa, July 10 (AP)—The toll from a train-bus collision in southern Formosa rose today to 49 dead.

Twenty-seven persons were still on the critical list. Blood transfusions were being administered to all of them.

The disaster yesterday, worst of its kind in Formosa history, occurred when an express train rammed into a bus near Chilai. The bus was split in two and the wreckage toppled into a canal.

Both the bus driver and the conductor, a girl, were among those killed.

Police said they failed to heed a regulation requiring the driver to stop the bus before the crossing while the conductor ran across to signal whether a train was coming.
