Shop Sanitation Budgets Given Tentative Approval

Shop and sanitation department budgets were tentatively approved at the Wednesday city board hearing on streets and sanitation department budgets and police department budget. Action on future budgets was deferred until later hearings.

City Engineer Paul Newton said the department's budget for the fiscal year ending June 30 would be raised \$100 to \$3,536. The total cost for the department's salaries and wages would be \$12,000, compared to \$12,740 last year.

Farm Bill Is Given OK of Senate Unit

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—The Senate agriculture committee last night agreed upon an omnibus farm bill which lacks many of the features recommended by the Kennedy administration. Chairman Allen J. Ellender, D-La., predicted that the catch-all measure would win eventual approval of congress. "The main idea of this is to raise income of the farmers and that was the announced goal of the administration," he said. Ellender said the senate version is similar to a bill on which the house agriculture committee is reported to be near final agreement. Stricken from both bills was the key request by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman to let representative farm groups develop their own programs, subject to a congressional veto without amendment, and later power approval in referendum. Instead the senate bill would retain firm congressional control over writing most farm legislation, except that the secretary of agriculture would be given limited authority to extend farm marketing agreements and orders.

Details Noted Of Unclaimed Property Act

BOISE, July 13 (AP)—Idaho's unclaimed property act, intended to give the state possession of money and valuables which lack a rightful owner, explains Vernon Z. Drown, state tax collector.

Drown emphasized that even after such property has been turned over to the state it could still be claimed by the rightful owners, if they should turn up.

"In the past," Drown said, "such unclaimed property has remained with the holders for their individual use and benefit. The uniform disposition of unclaimed property act now makes available this unclaimed property in all of the people of the state of Idaho."

Properties held by banking or financial organizations, unclaimed funds held by insurance corporations, deposits and refunds held by utilities, undistributed dividends and distributions of business associations, property of

their possession and which has been unclaimed for a period of six years.

Drown emphasized that the act does not apply to real property. The 1961 legislation enacted by public officers and agencies and earmarked the revenue it brings for the building fund.

Probable revenue for the act for 1961 was estimated at \$400,000 but Drown said that is "only speculative."

"Until such time as the act has been in operation for a period of time," he said, "it cannot be estimated what amounts will be collected."

He said Oregon has a similar law on its books for 14 years and during the period has received about one million dollars.

The Idaho law exempts religious, educational, charitable and fraternal organizations. Drown said. He said the law lists applicable items covered are:

Properties held by banking or financial organizations, unclaimed funds held by insurance corporations, deposits and refunds held by utilities, undistributed dividends and distributions of business associations, property of

associations and banks or financial corporations held in the course of dissolution, property held by state courts and public officers and agencies and miscellaneous personal property.

"Such property, when unclaimed and abandoned and must be reported to the state tax collector," Drown said.

Idaho Students' Physical Fitness Above Average



Tests of physical fitness of Idaho students conducted at the University of Idaho department of physical education over a two-year period indicate Gem state youths rank above the national average in many test areas.

Tests Determine Idaho Youths Above National Average in Physical Fitness

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, July 10—Idaho youths, between ages 15 and 19, ranked above the national norms in physical fitness, according to a report from the University of Idaho department of physical education on recently completed tests of nearly 19,000 students from 88 schools in the state.

The study, supported by a research grant from the university, was directed by Professor Mabel Locke, chairman of physical education for women. She was assisted by Carol Ford and Shirley Shute, instructors of physical education who traveled to 13 different "climate areas" during the two-year study.

Seven tests for boys and girls were conducted, including pull ups, all up, shuttle run, standing broad jump, 50-yard dash, football throw, 400-yard run, and abdominal and trunk flexor strength.

The lowest scores were in the shuttle run, standing broad jump, and 50-yard dash—all areas requiring endurance, arm and shoulder strength, and abdominal and trunk flexor strength.

Highest scores were found in the junior high school age group (seventh, eighth, and ninth grades). The lowest were in the fifth, sixth, 11th, and 12th grades.

Drawing from the fitness test results, the physical education department suggested a common minimum level of physical fitness of Idaho youth even greater than that of the national group, requiring physical education in grades one through 12.
