### Report Notes Lincoln Area Pay on Wool

SHOSHONE, July 15 — Payment under the 1960 national wool program made to the Lincoln county, 2323 Eugene Lusk, chairman of the agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

The payments are in connection with marketing of wool and lamb skins from April 1, 1960, through March 31, 1961. Payment to the county for the year amounted to \$101,000. Applications for payment had to be filed May 1.

On shorn wool, the rate of payment is 47 1/2 per cent of the dollar value of the producer's wool during the year, or \$4750 per acre for every 400 received. This is the amount necessary to bring the wool price to a level of 62 cents per pound under the national wool act. On unshorn wool, the rate is 50 cents per pound of live animals and 50 cents per pound of one cent per pound from shorn wool, and five cents per 100 pounds of weight from lamb payments.

Provision will be made for advertising, promotion and other activities on wool and lamb.

The self-help program, authorized by the national wool act, is carried out by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., which was established for that purpose. Deductions from payment are approved by the wool board in a referendum in 1959.

The incentive level for shorn wool for the year 1960-61 was 47 1/2 per cent, covering marketings from April 1, 1961, through March 31, 1962, the same as the previous year.

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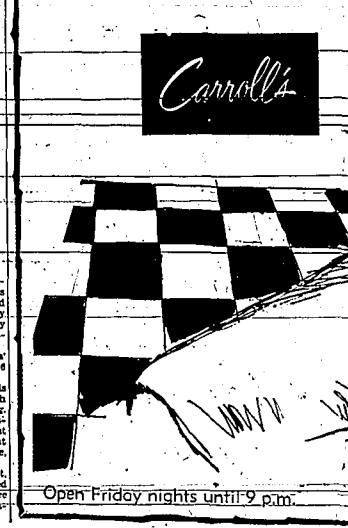

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



U.S. Finding Beer Can Is Big Problem

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—The ordinary beer can is only 4 1/2 inches long and 2 1/2 inches in diameter. Empty, it weighs less than three ounces. Yet it's become an enormous nuisance—thanks to people who throw cans by the thousands onto the roadides of the country. They've enraged farmers, angered and robbed the taxpayers. But now comes the word that the appalling mess created by these beer cans and other litterbugs can be cleaned up. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has announced that it will begin a program to remove beer cans and other litter from the roadsides. The program will be a two-year campaign. The council, which has done effective public service work for higher education, the United States mental health and infantile paralysis programs, will be a nonprofit organization, which has been working since 1953 for the eradication of litter. The program, despite all that has been done—and there has been much—has grown mountain-high. Every year the population is larger, the beckoning highway is longer, the work week shorter. The chances for outdoor recreation are better. of operations a day means that a tremendous number of persons use the airport a year. For example, it was estimated that 15,500 passengers boarded the commercial airline flights in 1960 and about 14,500 left the airport in 1961. West Coast airlines has 2,000 flights into Twin Falls annually. The number of passengers using the commercial airlines increased by about 1,000 over the previous year. The number of private pilots who own airplanes is also an impressive figure. There are about 50 private airplanes based at the airport—and an undetermined number scattered throughout the valley at the other airports and on individual ranches and farms. Woods estimates there are about 200 licensed pilots in the Magic Valley area.

These pilots and their airplanes will consume a tremendous amount of supplies during the year. At Joslin field alone, 110,000 gallons of gas and 24,000 gallons of jet fuel were sold last year. According to Woods, all the fuel is purchased locally. This amount has doubled over a three year period.

Much of the activity at the airport is concerned with agriculture and forestry. More than 450,000 worth of chemicals was purchased last year for agricultural spraying and dusting in south-central Idaho and portions of northern Nevada, and was used to spray more than 100,000 acres of cropland, resulting in untold savings to area farmers and ranchers.

Airplanes used to fight fires on forest service and bureau of land management lands are also based at the airport and are constantly ready to speed to the scene of fires.

### Idaho Family Groups of All Ages Are Camping on Fishing-Hunting Outings

Most people enjoy going back to nature for a week-end, week or even a fortnight in the hope that fishing or hunting will be unexcelled off the beaten track. Beginning with the simple aspect of roughing it under conditions ranging from mildly unsettled to primitively rugged, their tastes go off in all directions from that point onward. As a place to get away from it all, Idaho has plenty of elbow room and scenic splendor—some 2,000 acres of wilderness here in all. The easiest way to reach most of it is to fly to a nearby airport, then to take a short, although hardy adventures pack in on horses, or load back-packs and hike.

...serving for him the best of both worlds.  
Many Idaho families conduct week-end camping trips as adventure for all hands, for mother and the baby, for the "little" kids and their teen-aged siblings. And for Dad, who has been saved from becoming a roadblock and a portable shelter, probably by the most important item on the family group campers' list: Whether house trailer, tent, or pick-up truck unit, it serves to exclude dampness, dust, insects and ailments.  
Another camping necessity: Three days is an ice-box or two. On a primitive site, place up for the other for eggs, meats and vegetables.  
High on the list of essentials are: ...for an enjoyable outing also are these:  
Folding table and chairs, cooking and eating utensils, wooden box to serve as camp pantry, sleeping bags and extra blankets. Frequently, both parents sleep in a double bag, with the youngest child between them.  
Wide variations in temperature day to day often are encountered, especially at higher elevations. Sometimes ill-equipped campers sit down to breakfast and find their blankets "soaked" because they were frozen solid. Green grass, while not yet a portable commodity, adds so much to otherwise hot, dry and dusty conditions that it must be grouped with other essentials on the list. Some popular spots that are constantly struck up by cars and trailers, hence, it may be considered a luxury to have a tent, irrespective of place, this truly is "togetherness" without mauling sentimentality. Somewhere, however, something usually happens that brings a kind of communion, situations which make a man report that the drive was the return-to-day-to-day frustrations and boredom.

Whether a week's back into the "back country" or just an overnight camp-out under the stars along a neighboring pond or nearby woods, some advance planning is needed to avoid heading for experiences which may be somewhat less than pleasant on the whole.  
Only Boy Scouts and Scouts go into the woods to "rough" it. Others make outdoor living as smooth as possible, as well as exciting and exhilarating.  
Sleeping on the bare ground may be fine for kids and cowboy. For others an air mattress always makes things a bit more brighter long before sunup.  
Cooking over an open fire has its merits and is a test that everyone probably should try. Rainstorms blow up quickly in the hills, however, and there's nothing like a little gas stove to restore the serenity of the "hiker" man, when he's cold, wet, tired and hungry.  
Ditto for gasoline lantern and sundry other camping essentials. Indeed much of the fun of backyard trek lies in anticipation and planning, sometimes weeks before—the early morning dawns, similarly, much of the creature comfort of the trip rests there, too.

"Food, clothing, cooking utensils—first-aid kit—bedding—portable shelter, fishing tackle, and so on—all items that need careful planning long before the car is loaded.  
Probably the first determination to make is how many people will be involved in the camp-out, and their age grouping.  
One of the most remarkable facts of modern living is that camping, as a prerequisite to successful fishing and hunting, no longer is for men only. Today's newly-learned bachelor no longer must choose between his outdoor pursuits and family life. If his wife turns out to be imaginative and adaptable, a compromise can be worked out pre-

## Otto Florence, jr., Has Had Active Role in T. F. Community's Affairs

For the last 15 years, Otto Florence, jr., has been one of the more active citizens in various community affairs, including the Chamber of Commerce, school activities and church work. He also plays a leading role in western states livestock industry activities.

He returned to Twin Falls after service for two years of the South Pacific in 1945, rejoined the business his father was operating, the International Meat company, and entered the partnership with his father and two brothers, Ted and Frank.

The plant produces processed cured and fresh meats and serves all of southern Idaho. Last year the plant processed 8,500 cattle.

Since he was a child, he had worked at the meat company, at every conceivable job. He continued to work in every department and became general manager, his present title, in 1947. There he oversees the work of the company's 55 employees.

He has been a member of the chamber since 1945, and returned to Twin Falls after World War II. In the year 1945 he served as the second chairman of the newly-formed Agricultural division of the chamber, a division designed to bring the best of the best of the entire area.

While he was chairman, the division sponsored the Southern Idaho Bean promotion week of 1946 and 1947.

He served as a school trustee until this year. He has been active in church work, as a member of St. Edward's church, for about 15 years. Florence is a member of the religious census project, sponsored by the church, in 1948. He is also a member of the progressive survey of every citizen in Twin Falls county. He was in charge of the work of 250 census takers. Florence has also been active in Cub Scout work at the church.

Florence's work keeps him in contact with the livestock industry. For many years he has undertaken many volunteer jobs of this line, currently he is on the swine advisory committee of the University of Idaho extension service.

He also is a director of the Idaho council of the National Livestock and Meat board, an organization to promote meat and meat products.

These volunteer activities take much time and Florence credits his "brothers," Tom, production manager, Frank, sales and credit manager, and Harry Whitmore, plant superintendent, with operating the plant as efficiently as that he is able to devote to the time to work.

Florence was born in Veneta, Calif., in 1924, where his father was working in a meat market, and came to Twin Falls in 1941. He and his family moved to Twin Falls.
