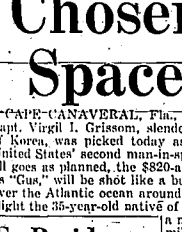

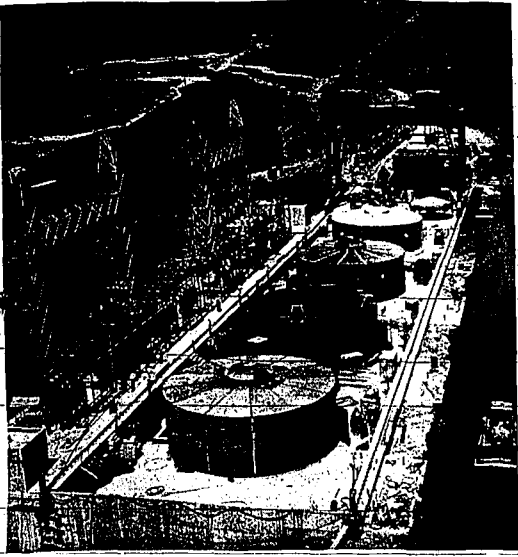

GOP to Back Tough Stand On Germany

WASHINGTON, July 17—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R., said today Republicans will support any "firm, tough position" President Kennedy takes on the defense of West Berlin. Bridger, who heads the senate Republicans' policy committee, said members of his party are against "any further weakening of the American position in and about the world." He expressed confidence that Kennedy will make it clear to Soviet Premier Khrushchev this week that there will be no western backdown in Berlin and follow this up with a request to congress for additional defense funds. "We Republicans will stand behind the president if he takes a firm position," Bridger said. House Speaker Sam Rayburn, D., Tex., said yesterday he was certain Kennedy had a promise to meet the rising danger of the Berlin crisis. Sen. Frank Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Montana, in a separate interview with a newsman, promised the Republican stance he said Republicans generally are taking in the foreign policy field.

Hot Weather Having Effect On Crops in Magic Valley

Beet peas were beginning to come into warehouses the end of this week. It is too early yet, say all warehousemen, to determine how the yields will be, but one thing is sure—heat this summer has cut down the potential development of the plants. Some grain is near the cutting stage, particularly barley, and some farmers are thinking of having those fields washed so that neither wind nor hail can do damage, and so the grain will cure out in the windrow. More fields of grain are down this year because of more bad weather than is normal, and where those fields were seeded down, the alfalfa or clover probably will be considered out. As for the development to maturity of these down-fields, those fields will ripen just like others, but will be harder for the combine to pick up. No Pen aphids have shown up in hay fields, and none may, according to earlier survey counts made by the "butterfly" nets. Late spuds are having to develop from now on in hot weather, and if the hot nights and hot days continue, rough spuds will follow just as sure as day follows night. The harvest of red spuds is now going on in the King Hill area and north into Ontario, Ore. The price for these isn't favorable at present, and the last reported price at mid-week was \$2 per 100 delivered loaded at the track. Corn and beans like hot weather. Except for the danger of mildew, which follows when surface soil is wet and the air looks at the stem, beans will do better if the weather stays hot until the end of the month. Corn is growing tall and is ahead of where it was this time last year. However, even though hot nights along with hot days, farmers who came from the Midwest corn belt say that when corn stays curled from the heat over a period of a week or more, it is time to start worrying. Of course, in irrigated areas a shot of water every other row will go a long way to uncurling the large leaves at night.

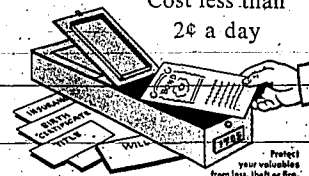

WASHINGTON, July 17. (AP)—The postoffice department said today a plan to speed delivery of urgent mail by attacking the chronic late-day log-jam in most postoffices will get into high gear Wednesday.

On that day, breakfast and luncheon sessions sponsored by business organizations will be held in several score cities to enlist large-scale support for the program, described as a new approach to the old "after 5 p.m." congestion problem.

The problem, postoffice officials contend, stems from a long-standing custom of business concerns of dumping all of the day's outgoing mail into mailboxes or on postoffice platforms at the close of the business day.
