4,000 Refugees Flock Into Berlin; Hopper Fatal for Boy

BERLIN, July 18—The communist threat to West Berlin sent a record 4,000 refugees fleeing into West Berlin over the weekend, raising once more the question of why the communist police did not cut off the flow that was a production shortage in East Germany and give the satellite regime a worse name.
 The question always arises when there is a spurt in the number fleeing to the West. "The communists' vast police apparatus undoubtedly could stop the traffic, 90 to 95 per cent of which funnels through East Berlin into West Berlin. There could be much tighter checks on travel into East Berlin, and then on the West Berlin each day to work. Tougher controls would righten away many escapes since flight from the communist republic is a crime punishable by two years in jail.

Fear of losing face is thought to be one powerful motive that keeps the communists from stronger measures. Berlin has been proclaimed the capital of their "German Democratic republic." It would look bad to this world if citizens were prevented from freely visiting their capital.
 The Soviets also may be taking a hand behind the scenes. In public, Moscow says that all political matters in East Germany are in German hands. In private the Soviets often show concern over the World War II agreements with the western allies that guarantee free movement within the city.
 Moscow may not want to give the West further reason to say that these agreements are being violated in Berlin.

U.S. Making Payments on Wool, Lambs

Payments for marketing wool and unfinished lamb under the 1960 national wool program from April 1, 1960 through March 31, 1961 are being made by the U.S. Wool Marketing Board, Twin Falls, Idaho. Carl Boyd, chairman of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, has announced.
 Applications for the payments must be filed by May 1, 1961. As far as 1960 program payments are concerned, the wool and lamb program have been announced in \$12,400,000.
 On shorn wool, the rate of payment is 47.6 per cent of the dollar returns the producer receives from the sale of shorn wool during the year, or \$47.60 more for each pound of wool for every \$100 received. This is the amount necessary to bring shorn wool prices up to the announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the national wool program.
 On unfinished lambs, the rate is 80 cents per hundredweight of live animals.
 Deductions of one cent per pound from shorn wool payments and five cents per 100 pounds of live weight from lamb payments will be made for advertising, promotion and education development activities on wool and lamb. This self-help program, authorized by the national wool act, is carried out by the American Sheep Producers' Association, which has established for that purpose. Deductions from payments were approved by Congress in a referendum held in 1959.

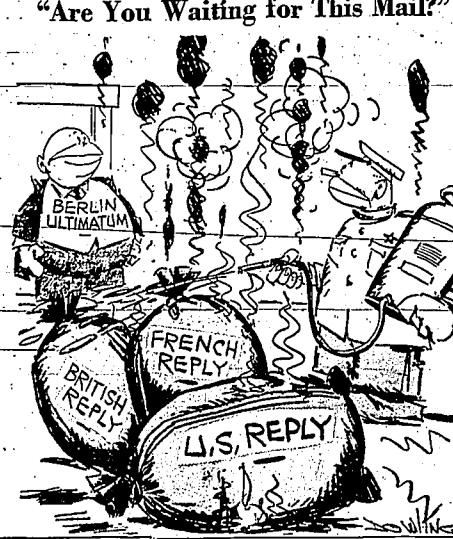

WILLOW, Ariz. (AP)—Six days a week Sid Coker buckles on his 33 caliber revolver and patrols the streets of this small southwestern Arizona community as a lawman.

On Sunday, he hangs up his S&W bullet and steps into the pulpit at the Church of Christ.

Coker, 40, has been serving the Lord and the law for three years. He says there is no conflict

between "the cross and the badge."

"You see," Coker adds, "a deputy is in a good position to help people, being on call to wherever trouble may be."

Many a night Coker has been summoned to minister to the sick and the troubled. He makes such pastoral calls in his cowboy boots and with his pistol jutting from the holster at his side.

A common sight in the small sheriff's office is Coker, his wearing hat pushed back on his head, studying the Bible before preparing next Sunday's sermon with a stack of "wanted" posters nearby.

Coker is not an ordained minister. Ordination is not required in the Church of Christ. However, he has been a student of the Bible for 25 years and a student for some under the guidance of a minister in West Texas.

He often calls on his experience as a law officer to drive home a point from the pulpit and uses his minister's authority in aid of minor lawbreakers.

Coker likes to quote from Romans 13 as justification for his dual role.

"For he is a minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which he will be afraid, for he beareth the sword in vain; for he is a minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil."

City's Budget Is Approved At Shoshone

SHOSHONE, July 18.—The city budget for the 1951-52 fiscal year was approved by city councilmen during a meeting Friday evening.

The budget, city accounts manager E. J. Cole, announced, includes a 37 1/2 mill levy, the same as last year. This includes 25 mills to raise \$15,000 for general fund; three mills, \$1,915 for library fund; one and one-half mills to raise \$657 for fire department; and one mill, \$1,271, recreation fund, and six mills, \$3,870, street lighting fund. A total of \$22,646 to be raised by the 37 1/2 mill levy.

Other anticipated revenues include \$750 from fines, \$23,500 water collections; \$385, dog and bicycle licenses; \$1,500, liquor license; \$250, beer license; \$5,500, state liquor apportionment; \$2,800, state highway revenue; \$1,000, state highway; \$1,250, Gooding-Mott ditch; \$125, miscellaneous permits, and \$700, other miscellaneous items.

Total expected revenue is \$78,500, including revenue from the 1950-51 fiscal year, in the amount of \$1,612.26.

Expected expenses include \$69,257.28, general fund; \$1,915, library fund; \$1,600, fire department; \$2,497, recreation fund, and \$5,074.50, street lighting fund.

Excess in the general fund amounting \$4,070, plus: \$200, attorney; \$700, treasurer; \$1,000, garbage collector; \$2,000, park caretaker; \$4,020, city overcost; \$3,590, assistant overcost; \$3,250, city employees; \$2,125, clerk; \$500, extra labor; \$4,000, repairs and upkeep; \$2,000, gas, and \$4,200, miscellaneous expenses. \$200, telephone; \$200, printing; \$100, audit; \$600, office expense; \$100, freight; \$200, insurance; \$200, bonds; \$200, elections; \$205, airport; \$11,087.28, capital outlay; \$100,000, street; \$2,500, for water works; \$2,000, water tax; \$100, prisoner board; \$1,000, school apportionment; and \$1,000, for miscellaneous.

Laos Faction Will Provide Truce Needs

GENEVA, July 18 (UPI)—The five-nation government of Laos said today it will provide military helicopters and jeeps to help the international control commission carry out its assigned supervising mission in Laos.

At the same time, the British and Soviet chairmen of the International Laos conference here were reported to have agreed "in principle and in substance" on the long-delayed start of negotiations for a Laotian unified state and long-term international controls over Laos.

Royal Laotian diplomat, Senek NA Chamsakha, nephew of Royal Oudom, said his government would provide "without condition" all the equipment that the ICC would need.

He said the three-nation control commission composed of British, French and Soviet members, will be able to use this equipment in any way it sees fit.

Sahara Grab Proposed by Tunisia Boss

TUNIS, Tunisia, July 18 (AP)—In a double-barreled diplomatic assault on France's President, Habib Bourguiba has threatened to seize part of the Sahara and to send to force French troops to retreat to their naval base.

The 50-man Tunisian national assembly has already passed approval of all measures that may be taken by the chief of state in this North African republic.

In a speech before a special assembly session, Bourguiba said he will send a force tomorrow to seize market No. 23, a geographical point in the barren, desolate desert 25 miles south of the Sahara.

The market is in the French part of the vast desert, and is a French military post in an area which France keeps under the control of 100 miles south of the high oil field of Edjeff, developed by France.

Bourguiba accused France of violating a 1957 treaty by keeping a garrison at the market.

"We have decided that, regardless of the consequences, we will send a Tunisian commando to plant our flag at market No. 23," Bourguiba said.

He reiterated his threat to capture a certain area by getting the French out of Bittern-hub, an air-naval stronghold where France keeps troops, was estimated to number 200,000-300,000.

The question didn't crop up in the Reichstag, but Goebbels said he was simply to obey.

Goebbels said he had relied on the Reichstag. "The fuhrer's word is the law."

Goebbels said he drew angry answers from hundreds of speakers and Judge Maibach Landau was forced to demand that Goebbels be removed from his podium.

Goebbels emerged from his half-hour glass box into the open courtroom this morning for the first time since he went on trial three months ago.

It was Goebbels' first day in court since the arrest of Adolf Hitler, Adolf Goebbels and the 10th section since the Nuremberg trial opened on April 11.

For the first time in the trial, Goebbels' precautions were relaxed for a few minutes, while he sat in the glass box to be heard by the court.

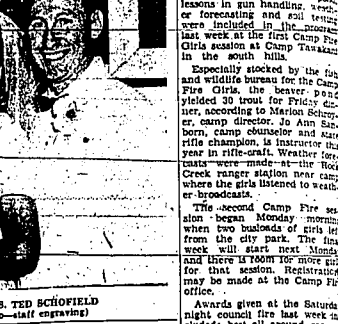

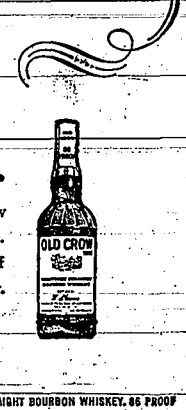
