### Educators Support New Drug Policy

**WARREN, Ind., July 19 (AP)**—Local educators yesterday showed their support for the new federal policy on drugs by endorsing a resolution of the American Medical Association which would allow physicians to prescribe narcotics more liberally.

The two witnesses, Dr. Louis B. Good and Dr. Charles D. Gossard, are members of AAHA's executive committee.

The resolution is a re-statement of the council's position. AAHA did not oppose the new policy because it lacks the group's advice before taking the proposal against the committee's position.

"This is a plan to give the AMA an advisory body that is not to have most of the control to make most of the decisions on the use of drugs," the two witnesses testified at the meeting of the AAHA advisory committee.

The resolution proposes a new federal regulation of the drug industry.

The bill, by Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., among other things would license manufacturers of prescription medicine and control the sale of new prescriptions without a prior finding by the food and drug administration that the preparation is as efficacious as well as safe.

It would also require a doctor's testimony, the AMA argued, that the AMA could do the job of the doctor in determining whether the drug was safe. The AMA cast doubts on this argument as well as the fact that the preparation is as efficacious as well as safe.

Dr. Gossard, a member of the AMA, said that the AMA would not be relied on to do the job of the doctor.

### Rescuers Recover Bodies of 2 Cave Explorers; Farmer Will Seal Cavern

**ORLEANS, Ind., July 19 (AP)**—Rescuers today recovered the bodies of two university students from a cave where they were trapped Sunday and a farmer vowed to seal the cavern forever.

The bodies of Ralph Moreland, 26, and Thomas Arnold, both 25, were brought to the surface from the fatal T-shaped intersection where they drowned in a mopping-up operation.

Wallace Shaul, whose farm was the scene of a 35-hour underground search, said "no one will ever go back in that cave again."

The bodies were found at 1 a.m. (CDD). A six-man rescue team, led by geologist Robert Armstrong, 46, and Robert Armstrong, 26, directed the four-hour recovery.

Armstrong, Indianapolis, Ind., said the men lay crumpled on the floor of the cave. "They were apparently right where they were when they were drowned. I couldn't tell whether they had been running from the water or back out of the cave."

He said Moreland and Arnold, both veteran cave explorers and classmates at Indiana university, were found several yards into the right arm of a T-shaped intersection. "Raspitus" probes only feet away in the left arm of the junction yesterday without seeing the bodies.

"They were just a little bit this side of the cave's only known high roof area," Armstrong said. "It was about five feet wide, and a little beyond that it went to 25 feet."

"But even if they had made it, it probably wouldn't have done any good," he said. Armstrong said the 26-foot ceiling was scratched from flood debris and Sunday's flooding probably sealed off all air.

The victims were taken to an Orleans funeral home for examination by the Cass county coroner, Dr. Charles X. McCalla III.

Moreland's wife, Karen, 26, was with a family friend at the Wallace Shaul farm a mile from the cave when police told her Moreland was dead. She cried softly.

The slender brunette began her vigil at the Shaul farm Monday night when she learned the bodies had been found. Moments earlier she had given a friend a list of persons to call if her husband were found dead.

"I've prepared myself for the worst," she had said. "But I'm still hoping for the best."

Authorities later sandbagged the entrance. An alk contractor furnished by a local contractor forced fresh air into the cave and sucked out flood debris that blocked two 16-inch-dia. crawl spaces at 1,000 and 2,000 feet.

Sunday's torrents washed out the only two bridges leading to Shaul's farm. Police and workers at the cave were stranded until Shaul, working 43 hours without rest, repaired the bridges Monday as Shaul's 55th birthday anniversary.

Shaul, whose 1,000-acre, heavily wooded stock farm lies atop the cave, never had penetrated the cave more than a half mile. He said the limestone walls were treacherously slick with few if any footholds. "That hole winds like a snake," he said.

### Castro Plans Surprise for Cuba Public

BY WILLIAM L. RYAN Associated Press News Analyst From Fidel Castro's surprise announcement by way of South American capitals, come reports these days that the Cuban public will be prepared for a "big surprise."

The government is preparing a holiday atmosphere for the occasion—which will coincide with a visit to Havana by Soviet premier Yuri Gagarin. On the afternoon of the 26th, information from inside Cuba relates, practically all work will come to a halt, and a holiday will be in force until after midnight. Workers will be told they can make up the time with extra hours of work later on.

# Idaho Is Concerned Over Proposed Power Transfer

BOISE, July 19—Proposed transmission of electrical power from the Pacific Northwest to California was described Saturday as having potentially tremendous impact on the state's future.

"It could," said Ralph Wickberg, chairman of the Idaho public utilities commission, "make the Hells canyon project look like peanuts."

The power line between California and the Pacific Northwest has been in the talking stages for years. But the talk has become more serious recently as expanding industry in California continues to increase the demand for power.

Wickberg and George Carter, state reclamation engineer, will represent Idaho at a conference Monday in Portland, Ore. Also attending will be representatives of other states and of federal agencies concerned with the proposal.

Legislation authorizing the transmission has been proposed in congress and suggested contracts have been drawn.

"What they're all talking about," Wickberg said, "is the surplus in the Pacific Northwest. But what is surplus power today may be vitally needed power tomorrow."

"We may be able at present to send to California power produced by hydroelectric plants in the Northwest without damage to our own economy. But the big question in my mind is what of the future?"

"It may well be that not too many years hence the demand for power in our own area will increase to such an extent that the amount left after meeting current requirements is insufficient for our own needs."

"What do we do then? California may have a firm hold on a big chunk of power produced in the Northwest and may not want to give it up. Conceivably we could be forced to build steam plants, perhaps using natural gas or coal as fuel, in order to meet our own needs."

"We would be forced to generate high priced power for delivery to California. The cost of shipping from the state to California power produced much more cheaply produced by hydroelectric plants."

Wickberg said "the interests offered by California interests in support of their proposal" are based on a series of suppositions.

"One is that a number of proposed Pacific Northwest dams, some of which are highly controversial and likely will not be built for many years, if ever. They also take into consideration power produced in Canada and at the atomic projects in the Hells canyon of Washington."

"And their own figures show," Wickberg added, "that if the growth in demand for power continues at its present rate, 6 per cent per year, the entire supply which would be available from the projects they list would be used up by 1977."

The basic reason for the transfer of power from the Northwest to California is to avert the necessity of raising rates for power produced in the Northwest. California utilities have built and some projects which are coming on are not completed then the intertie could be in the same financial shape as is the Bonneville grid.

Wickberg emphasized that the problem affects not only the privately owned utilities which provide the bulk of the electric power used in Idaho but also the many REA cooperatives which serve the smaller areas.

Wickberg's reference to making the Hells canyon project "look like peanuts" was to controversy developed over the years regarding development of power resources in the middle stretch of the Snake river.

A group of Washington state public utilities is seeking a permit for a dam at the Reservoir site downstream. Hearings by the federal power commission will take place in November.

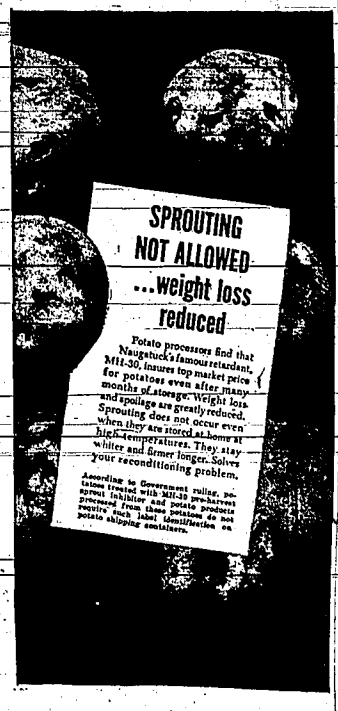

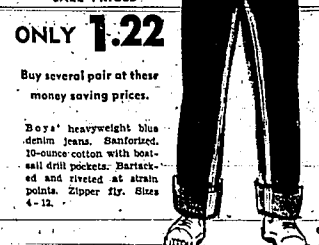

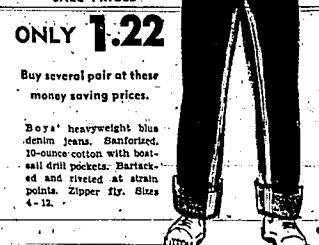

### N.Y. Official Tries to Halt Welfare Cuts

NEWYORK, N. Y., July 19 (AP)—The state attorney general yesterday tried to halt the city's drastic new welfare cuts. At the time the city council voted to reduce the welfare code, the attorney general was reported to have filed a writ of habeas corpus against the strike of social workers against the controversial legislation.

"We find no justification whatever for the measures Newburgh proposes to adopt," said the state social welfare board yesterday in a writ of habeas corpus. It was issued at a two-day meeting at Saranac Lake, N. Y.

The board directed Atty. Gen. Joseph J. Lefkowitz to prevent Newburgh from cutting welfare payments from the state treasury until the state revenue commission has ruled the cuts are legal. He immediately notified that he was assuming jurisdiction to look into the matter.

The welfare code took effect Saturday. Actuaries are expected to complete the mechanics of getting it into operation as soon as possible and no immediate effect on welfare clients is anticipated.

The law code, among other things, cuts unmet mothers off if they continue to beat up their children, and forces able-bodied men on relief to work for the city.

City Manager Joseph Mitchell has defended the new code as necessary to cut down welfare payments.

Newburgh's four full-time social case workers reportedly are planning a strike against the new code, which they regard as "unconstitutional."

Mitchell was quoted as saying they will refuse to carry out major points of the program.

This far, officials have conducted a review of the more than 800 clients on welfare in Newburgh, a city of 31,000. Only one man of those initially interviewed was deemed potentially able to work.

### AEC Plans Fission Test

IDAHO FALLS, July 19 (AP)—The atomic-energy commission announced today a series of controlled fission product field tests will be conducted in the next few months at the national reactor testing station in eastern Idaho.

The AEC said the tests are part of a joint safety analysis program approved by the AEC and the air force. Similar tests have been held since 1957.

The agency said no spread of radioactive materials is anticipated beyond the experimental area which is in the approximate size of the NRTS.

Purpose of the tests is to improve predictability of behavior of fission products when released to the atmosphere at surface.

The sampling network consists of six arc-shaped areas extending instruments spaced at intervals from about 100 feet to 2,000 yards from the reactor.

### Anti-Communist Force Forming

MEMPHIS, July 19 (AP)—An anti-communist force is forming in an undisclosed Latin American location to train for a possible attack on Cuba, a Cuban militia commander said yesterday.

Maj. Evilio Duque, 34, leader of the Cuban forces of the Embassy mounting, declined to say how many men are involved in the training.

Duque told a news conference the best invasion would be conducted with more men and supplies than were involved in the failed 19 landing, which met defeat.

### State Treasurer Receives Check

BOISE, July 19 (AP)—State Treasurer Helen Swensen received a one million-dollar check today for the amount due the state on U. S. Treasury bills which reached maturity this week.

Swensen said the state made a profit of \$2,312.50 on the transaction. That's the amount of interest the federal government paid for use of \$99,687.50 in state idle funds.

### Low Bidder for Road Job Listed

BOISE, July 19 (AP)—An Oregon firm, Rogers Construction Company, Portland, was listed as apparent low bidder for construction of a seven-mile stretch of interstate highway in southwestern Idaho.

The state highway department awarded Rogers \$1,372,957 bid for the stretch of interstate highway from Sand Hollow to junction with state Highway 44 northeast of Caldwell in Catoona county.

### Code Informs U.S. Officials Of 'Conflicts'

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—The Pentagon has issued a new code of conduct, this one telling those in the military establishment how they can avoid violating the conflict of interest rules. It also includes some old rules on receiving gifts and favors and holding outside jobs.

This is a more detailed version of a simpler directive Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara put out last April. Both cover military and civilian workers. Among other things, McNamara's new order requires that a retired officer—either of the regular or reserve forces—who had served on active duty for at least eight years, must file a notice with the defense department if he intends to sell or help sell anything to the armed forces.

A three-page form must be filled out, giving full details of military service and present employment by a contracting firm. The new directive also includes civilian employees of the defense department under a prohibition against using official titles in advertising or other publicity. This prohibition had previously applied only to military officers on active duty.

### Burley Plans Golf Course Development

BURLEY, July 19.—A resolution was passed Monday night at the city council meeting to begin development of the Burley golf course into an 18-hole course.

City officials said the SCS will be laying out a plan for the golf course and will be the prime responsibility for the course. The city will be responsible for the actual construction of the golf association.

The plan for the proposed 18-hole course was presented by Woodrow Kerbel, president of the golf association. Kerbel said the course would be one of the four additional holes. Plans call for five holes to be added to the city.

The 22 acres was purchased by the city for \$40,000 and will be in a 10-year period. It is estimated that the new holes will cost approximately \$700,000, according to Ben Daniele, city engineer.

The association reported there had been an increase of 1,257 members in the past year. Last year there were 7,458 members and 8,715 as of July 16. There has been a steady increase in family memberships in the city.

It was recommended that the membership be raised to \$50 for resident family to \$80 for non-resident family and \$25 for non-resident family. The fee for non-resident family would be lower than any other membership in the area.

The association also requested that the city help pay for the expansion of the golf course road will not be changed as was previous. It was felt the cost would be prohibitive.

The association suggested to be made into an old lane and to be better pit to be filled with gravel and would walk across the road. The road is located and 88 feet wide on the new addition.

It was started on the new addition and will be finished by the end of the summer and it work on the new area could begin in the fall of 1962. It could be completed by the summer of 1963. Play of the 18-hole course could begin in the summer of 1964, Kerbel says.

### Angry Eichmann Protests; 'Im Being Roasted Here'

JERUSALEM, July 19.—An angry, shaking Adolf Eichmann protested indignantly today that he is being "roasted" in the Jerusalem court trying him for mass murder "until the meat's done to a turn."

"They want me to go on until they get the answer they want from me," Eichmann snapped.

It was the nearest Eichmann had come to breaking in nine days of prodding grueling cross-examination by Israeli Atty. Gen. Gideon Hausner.

Eichmann's patience snapped suddenly after a continuous question by Hausner about the so-called "confession" he is alleged to have dictated while a fugitive in Buenos Aires in 1957 to former Dutch Ass. Atty. William Steenberg.

Eichmann suddenly denounced the document as "false."

"I will not answer that from now on," he said. "I will not answer any question about this document since I see that it's false," he shouted.

Presiding Justice Moche Landau rebuked him sternly with the words, "You will continue to answer questions until I tell you that you no longer have to answer questions."

Eichmann bowed, "Yes, your honor, this is true. But I have the feeling that the meat's done to a turn. They want me to go on until they get the answer they want from me."

Landau broke the tension by ordering the usual 20 minutes mid-morning recess.

Once again in the session Eichmann also lost his temper.

Landau—a question from Landau himself—was being translated, he jumped up as if about, ripped his

carphones from his head and indicated that the German translation from Hebrew, the court's official language, was "no action." 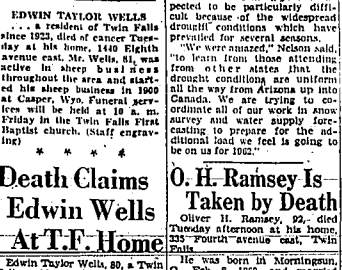

### Allies Hit at Red Policies On Self-Rule

The United States, Britain and France are making a strong effort to turn the Soviet Union into a boomerang in world public opinion.

Their three notes to Moscow represent not only a deterrent, through their pointedness, but also to Soviet recklessness in creating a dangerous crisis over Berlin unacceptably, but also initiate through their endorsement of self-determination, a positive counter-attack with wide appeal.

Here is a matter of principle on which major nations are in general agreement, and in which many of them have direct interests.

And here is a matter which vitally affects not only the Berlin matter, but also the foundations of Soviet hegemony in Eastern Europe. A matter which involves the lives of millions of people under Soviet rule.

The allies could hardly have struck at a point more embarrassing to Soviet interests, for the communists have taken up the fight to differentiate between the self-determination they advocate for former Axis countries and their weak case for the claim that the subversive portions of the new colonies actually represent self-determination.

Here the Soviet Union will be in a dangerous ground, attempting to uphold devices of self-determination, and to explain why, if the situation in Central Europe really represents self-determination, they do not go ahead and confirm it with free elections.

This point in the allied notes represents a direct bid to the neutral nations to take up the cudgels for an all-German settlement in the United Nations, a battle for which they are more eminently fitted than are the contending powers.

As the allies respect, presents a test of the willingness and ability of these nations to make their neutralism more than just a negative standoffishness, and to offset the dimmer impression given by some of them that they actually like the color war because of what they can get out of the contending parties.

There has been great criticism of Allied slowness in replying to the Soviet Premier Khrushchev gambit made at the meeting with President Kennedy in Vienna weeks ago. There has been fear that the communists would interpret the delay as evidence of an inability of the allies to agree.

### Anti-Malaria Units Target Of Viet Cong

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, July 19 (AP)—Squad fighting malaria seem to have become a special target for terrorists of the communist Viet Cong. Malaria workers have been slain in six months. Some were stabbed and thrown into a river, others tied to posts and beaten to death. One reason may be that these men represent an American aid program that reaches into virtually every zone. 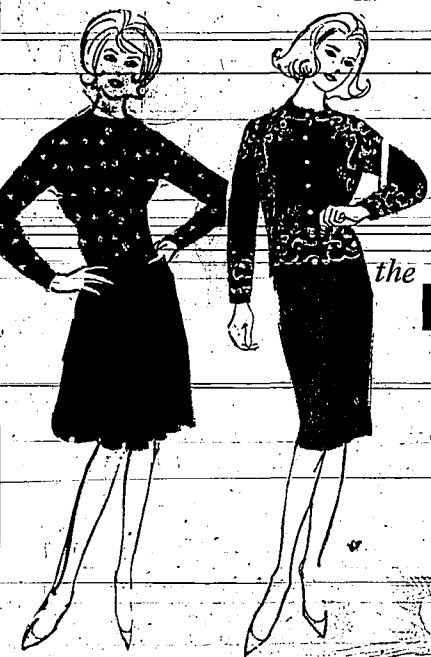
