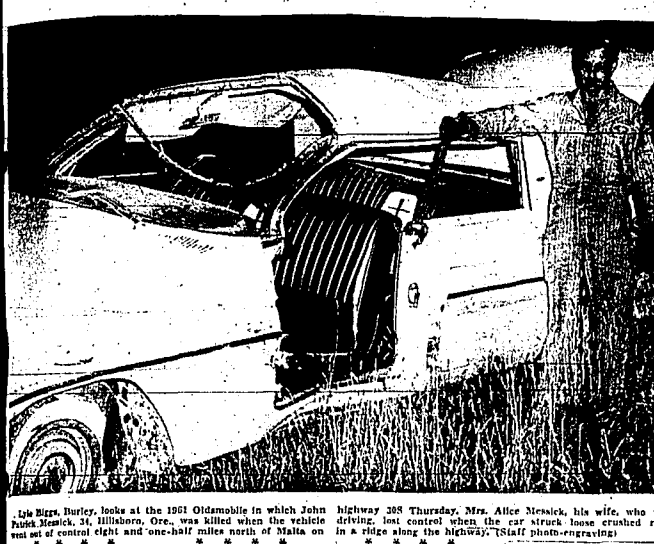

Multiple Listing Group in T-F. Boosts City Economy

At 8:30 a.m. every Thursday, a group of Twin Falls real estate brokers take a big risk. This is far from a tourist jaunt, however. All but two Twin Falls real estate operators belong to the association during the past year, according to Gordon Crockett, chairman of the Twin Falls Multiple Listing Association.

Representatives of 27 member real estate firms associated with the listing association pile on board the bus, parked in front of the Twin Falls city hall, at 8:15 a.m. each Thursday.

Purpose: "evaluating and appraising new listings" of homes, farms and ranches registered for sale with multiple listing member firms each week.

Crockett estimates "turnover in real estate is at least doubled." Thanks to cooperation among the 27 member real estate firms. For the fiscal year ended July 1, the Twin Falls Multiple Listing Association reported sales of \$6,850,000. If the real estate group's estimate is correct, somewhat less than half this money would have been spent if the association was not operating.

The association was organized in 1955 with nine member firms. All realtors who join the multiple listing group first must obtain membership in the Twin Falls Board of Realtors and state and national real estate groups, plus meet other professional requirements, Crockett explained.

Only the standard five per cent commission is charged for sales made through association listing. Realty firms which sell through Multiple Listing receive 75 per cent of the commission, while the realtor who obtains the property for listing receives 25 per cent of the commission, added Crockett.

The event is sponsored by the Oakley Chamber of Commerce and proceeds will go towards the swimming pool fund. There will be a program at 11 a.m. when the old timers can get together, Clark said.
