The proposed ordinance scheduling city commission meetings the first and third Mondays of each month, instead of weekly as presently practiced, is not intended to provide for secret sessions, commission members emphasized Monday evening. On alternate Mondays, when the commission is not in formal session, meetings will be held to discuss problems confronting the city, reported James Norbeck, acting commission chairman in the absence of Mayor Riddler, commission chairman. "Any meeting held by the commission has to be public, according to state law, and any city commission meeting held in violation of this law is illegal," he said, adding that it was not the intent of the commission to hold secret meetings. "The sole purpose of the proposed ordinance is to enable the city to hold meetings on the first and third Mondays of the month," he said. "Why the secret aspect was brought up is a mystery," Norbeck remarked.

PHILADELPHIA, July 25 (AP)—An angry, jeering crowd of 2,000 persons hurled rocks and eggs toward Mayor Dilworth last night as he tried to defend his controversial 10-a-year parking fee plan.

Several persons reportedly were injured, including Councilman Giovanni P. Giordano, who opposes the plan.

Giordano, a Democrat as is Dilworth, represents the South Philadelphia district, where the mayor wants to set up the experimental plan. He pleaded for the crowd to hear the mayor out. He suffered a cut eye when hit by other rocks or pieces of glass in the school auditorium where the mayor spoke.

Financing for Centennial Is Opposed Now

BOISE, July 25—Secretary of State Arnold Williams spoke out today in opposition to appropriation at this time for activities of the Territorial Centennial Commission.

The state's finances are not quite sufficient to appropriate a large sum of money at this time, Williams said. "I believe the legislators had better take a good look at finances before they make any large sum appropriation for the centennial at this time."

Gov. Robert E. Smylie is calling a special session of the legislature for Aug. 3 to take up three matters, among them the question of centennial financing. The chief executive wants the lawmakers either to appropriate money for the commission or abolish the body.

It has been suggested that the legislature—which at its 1961 regular session cut off the commission without a cent in state aid—appropriate \$200,000 for the group.

Williams said he believes the state should have a centennial celebration in 1902—that it would be "good advertising for Idaho." But, rather than appropriate \$250,000 now, he said he would like to see the 1901 legislature give direct financial assistance to already-established events.

He suggested such money be used to expand such events as the eastern and western Idaho state fairs, the Lewiston roundup, Pioneer day events, the Snake River stampede at Nampa, Caldwell night rodeo, Diamond Cup races at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho Falls warbonnet roundup and similar shows.

"The best people, I think," he said, "would have more interest in it. And, they're very well qualified and organized. I think to put on local celebrations."

His subcommittee is examining the adequacy of the United States' missile and nuclear weapons delivery systems on compared with those of the Soviet bloc in the time of international tensions.

Stennis told reporters the general's report was quite reassuring. "As of now," Stennis said, "we are certainly superior" (in aerial strategic striking power), and we must keep it that way."

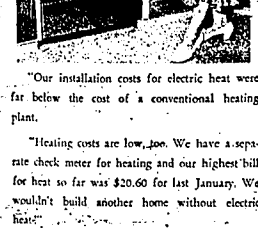
