Smylie Alarmed By Signs of State Financial Crisis

BOISE, Aug. 3 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie told Idaho lawmakers today that he should not be unduly alarmed over the state's financial condition despite indications that "there may be a fiscal problem in the making." Control of Fire Still Days Away

The battle against a raging forest fire in central Idaho turned its 10th day today with 2,000 men, using every firefighting device at their disposal, doggedly attempting to bring it under control. But control is still days away. The blaze broke out July 24 near a small campground along the Salmon river in Idaho's primitive area about 40 miles west of Salmon. It has cut a swath 15 miles long and five miles wide through the Salmon-national forest and destroyed approximately 15,000 acres of forest. Firefighters were hampered yesterday by temperatures to 100 degrees. But they maintained control over three sides of the fire. Efforts to bring the fourth under control. ## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The repeated refusal of congressional enactments so-called "fair trade" laws have employed a tactic which is said to be a new twist to the courts for aid in enforcing what opponents designate as "unfair price fixing."

## Battle of Newburgh

Let's take a look at the Battle of Newburgh, N. Y., which now is joined in earnest after weeks of noisy skirmishing. There may be some lessons for a lot of communities.  
 To City Manager Joseph Mitchell and the four of five councilmen who back him up, much more is at stake than just the Newburgh-New York state differences over the city's 13 tough new rules. Mitchell and his councilmen are determined to nip loafers and chiselers from welfare rolls.  
 As Mitchell and others see it, the question is whether Newburgh, or perhaps any city, shall have reasonable command of its own destiny or must surrender to rules, enacted from a distance, which might help in the end to "wreck the city."

What, specifically, are they talking about when they pose that question?  
 1. Newburgh, historically a city of action, mounted a "board attack" on its large and growing blighted area, a sector found in 1958 and 1960-61 surveys to be heavily scarred with crime and violence, disease, illegitimacy, fire hazard, deteriorating housing, the flight of retail business.  
 The attack embraced fire law and zoning inspections, a new fire code, zoning changes, buildings renovated or condemned, renewal programs, fire hazard, deteriorating housing, the flight of retail business.  
 2. This same blighted area is also Newburgh's "welfare area," the portion of the city where most of its annual one million dollars in welfare payments are made. City welfare officials declared all co-operation with the city's board-assault-and-held-fast-to-existing-logic rules governing payments and eligibility.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (U.P.)—A substantial portion of the 71 air combat divisions to be activated in the national guard and reserve units alerted for possible active duty may be sent to Europe in the developing Berlin crisis.

This and other plans and proposals are being worked up by a light aircraft division to be transferred into Pentagon preparations.

The alert to the 71 air units, announced Tuesday by the defense department, was the first since the end of the second world war.

On the basis of known information, the possibility loomed large: The tempo of the military build-up, even that for the regular army, probably will be far less than a crash program.

A few weeks ago there were expressions of urgency about getting ready for trouble which might come during the next six or eight months.

Now the idea seems to be one of fitting and timing the buildup to unfolding events and to allowing a deliberate schedule.

Expansion of the regular army could turn out to be notably less than a swift increase by 132,000 men to bring total strength over the million-man mark.

Any extensive call-up of reserves or guardsmen is now no more than a possibility, even though congress has voted authority for a 250,000-man mobilization.

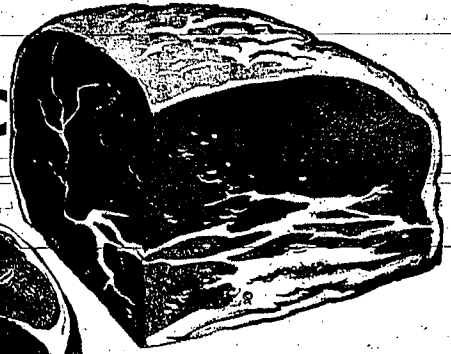

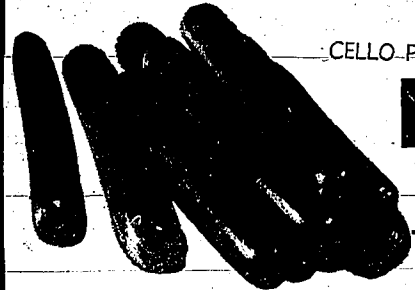

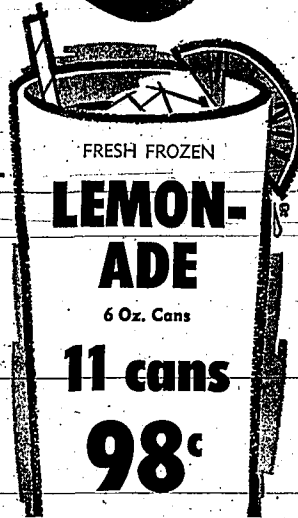

### Congo Picks New Leader To End Rifts

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo, Aug. 7 (AP) — Cyrille Adoula, a moderate in politics and personality, was approved by parliament yesterday as the Congo's new premier and head of a unity government pledged to end violent political strife.

Adoula, 36, is second to take the premiership with parliamentary endorsement since the Congo moved from Belgian colonialism to independence to chaos little more than a year ago. The first was Patrice Lumumba, who was ousted and subsequently assassinated.

With all outsiders barred from the parliament session to prevent any pressure on the deputies, the results of the vote were reported by reliable sources. They said Adoula's government won a unanimous vote in the senate. Only two abstentions were recorded in the chamber of deputies.

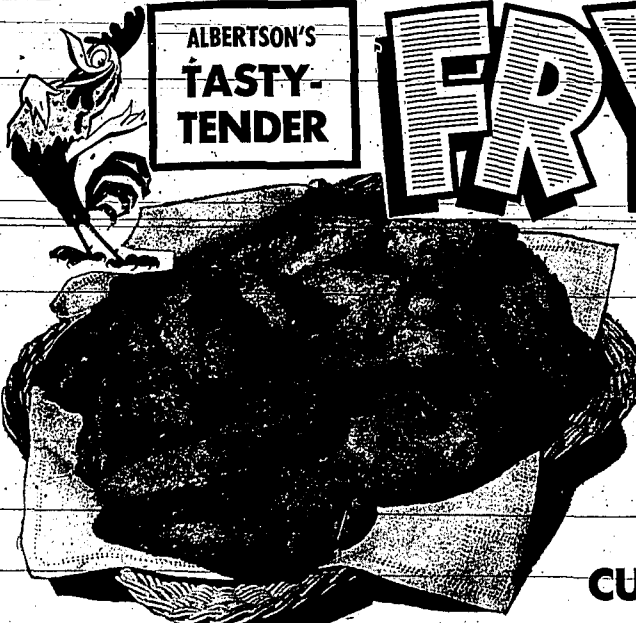
Adoula's government is the result of a delicate political balance according to places to all forces in the Congo except the separatist regime of Katanga. There, President Moïse Tshombe

persisted in regarding his rich province as independent from the Congo and refused to allow Katanga deputies to attend parliament unless he won concessions. Congolese President Joseph Kasavubu refused to accept Tshombe's demands.

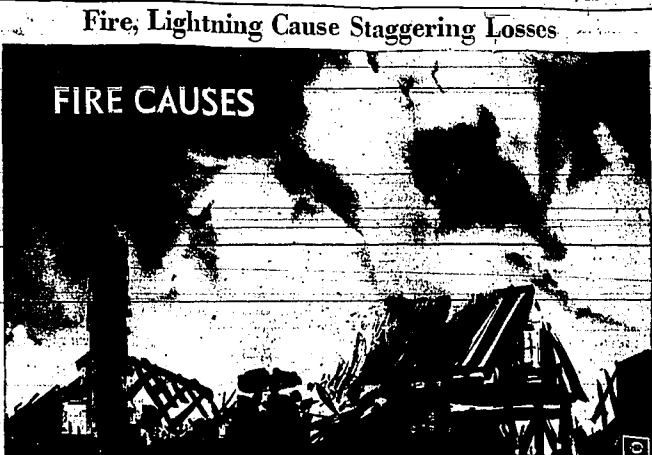

### Turkeys Are Top Bargain For Markets

 Turkeys jumped into mid-summer popularity among weekend shoppers offered by supermarkets and neighborhood stores this week.

They are featured by chains in widely scattered cities and are bringing the lowest prices since 1942. Live weight prices in July were down 15 per cent from year ago.

Frying chickens and ducks were on the bargain list in some stores.

However, beef continued to be the heaviest advertised item among the specials. Prices are low and the supply is heavy. Featured cuts are round, rib and chuck pot roasts and round and rib steaks.

Pork chops are being pushed in some areas. Prices are down six to 20 cents a pound from last week.

Pain specials are generally limited to award-winning articles and colossal shrimp.

Egg prices are down as much as 10 cents a dozen from last week.

The agriculture department reported supplies of vegetables for the fresh market, excluding melons, will be somewhat smaller this summer than a year ago due to adverse weather in growing areas. However, unusually heavy supplies have driven down the price of potatoes.

Best vegetable buys are beet, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, Chinese cabbage, squash, tomatoes and eastern potatoes.

Among good buys are beans, carrots, greens, spinach, egg plant, artichoke, escarole, green onions, radishes, parsley, field peas, peppers, okra and California potatoes.

Best buys among fruits are cantaloupes, watermelons, cherries and lemons.

### Khrushchev to "OK German Pact, Give up Berlin Claim"

MOSCOW, Aug. 3 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev told Italian Berlin people have chosen the night that he is still determined to sign a peace treaty with Communist East Germany but is ready to give "absolute guarantee" it would be for West Berlin.

Italian newsmen accompanying Pantani reported Khrushchev told the visiting premier: "It is not an obstacle that the two sections of Berlin live in different social regimes. If West Berlin people have chosen the night that he is still determined to sign a peace treaty with Communist East Germany but is ready to give 'absolute guarantee' it would be for West Berlin."

Khrushchev was quoted as saying the Soviet signing of a peace treaty with East Germany "would not mean war—the Americans and their allies say so because they want war."

In a two-hour lecture on foreign affairs to the Italian leader, Khrushchev reportedly went on: "We do not have any threatening intention. If there is a possibility to reduce talks, we will exploit it entirely."

But Khrushchev was reported to go ahead with the treaty, saying he would sign it at a date "which has already been fixed."

An Italian spokesman said the Soviet leader "began using strong terms" when the subject of Berlin came up at the opening talks in the Kremlin. Pantani replied irregularly strong terms, putting forward the western position.
