Two, Almost Three Fires Are Controlled

Two major fires in Idaho forests were reported controlled today, and firefighters thought they were getting the upper hand over a third. Reported controlled were the Killy mountain fire which burned over 200 acres in the Nez Perce national forest in northern Idaho, and the Brushy gulch fire in the Salmon forest, just 25 miles west of Salmon. This had burned 2,000 acres.

About 90 per cent controlled was the Corn creek which has burned some 16,000 acres near the Salmon river valley west of Salmon. Forest service firefighters on the ground said they have reduced the fire to a few acres in several days. Ready to Go Home Threatened By Russian

MOSCOW, Aug. 7 (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev accused the United States tonight of plotting to start a war and accused President Kennedy of using "threats" in his recent report to the American people on the Berlin crisis. He poured in a four-hour and a half nation-wide radio and television address that if a war starts, the Soviet Union can launch a massive strike with atomic and hydrogen warheads against the United States, its overseas bases and its allies. Khrushchev said that an obvious answer to President Kennedy's moves to beat up American military might, that it may be necessary for the Soviet Union to strengthen its own position and recall reserves.

He said that Kennedy spoke in the language of an ultimatum. As a result of the President's "threats," Khrushchev said, there is a "spread of war hysteria" in the United States.

"It is crying out loud," he said, "that the American leadership on the part of the American leaders who think that once the war starts it can be limited."

"Neither country which has nuclear weapons will strike a first-untill unless they are tried out."

He said that Americans, who have not experienced war in their own country in a long time, are afraid to start a war. "We do not want this," he said. "But if war starts, Khrushchev said, the Soviet Union will strike a crushing blow not only at the United States, but at all allied nations which are based throughout the world.

"Any state," Khrushchev said, "is in danger of the Soviet Union and the world, which would be used as a springboard for attacking the world camp will experience the full devastating power of our blow."

"It goes without saying that world war III, should it start, would not be limited to a duel between the two great powers."

Life Spaceman is Fine; Night Equals Trip to Moon and Back

MOSCOW, Aug. 7 (UPI)—Cosmonaut Gherman S. Titov returned to Earth in good health and high spirits today after orbiting the globe 17 times—a feat Soviet science—immediately heralded as the "prototype" of interplanetary travel. The 25-year-old "Eagle," promoted by the Russian air force from captain-to-major while he was whirling at 17,700 miles an hour in his spaceship, landed after 25 hours and 18 minutes of flight equal to going to the moon and back.

Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev hailed Titov as the "dearest son" of the Soviet Union and told him he had passed from probationary to full member of the communist party because every moment of your stay in space can be counted as years.

Other scientific sources predicted there would be another multi-orbital flight before October with perhaps three or four aboard, including a scientist. Next stop, the moon.

Red scientist Nikolay Barabashov said:

"This is no longer a mere leap into space but a real voyage into space. The prototype of the future interplanetary journey."

Moscow said the rocket took 434,000 miles, it indicated he still was in his capsule when it landed but gave no details on how the descent was accomplished.

MOSCOW, Aug. 7 (UPI)—Gherman Sepanovich Titov dreamed his father's wishes in order to become a pilot.

Titov, the Soviet Union's second cosmonaut, was born 28 years ago in the village of Verkhny Zilino in the vast territory of eastern Siberia.

His father, retired school-teacher Stepan Titov, 61, said he wanted his son to attend a university.

"He decided to become a pilot and his dream came true," the elder Titov said.

The dream took the young boy from Siberian village school where his marks were excellent," to the military aviation school in 1949.

Two years later, Titov entered the "Balanced-military-pilot" school where he was graduated in 1951 with "first category" pilot's certificate in the first flying.

"The young pilot already had received his certificate of merit from the Leningrad oblast before he entered training for space flight."

A candidate for membership in the Communist party, Moscow radio said, he has qualifications for "combat training and socialist preparation and for exemplary military discipline."

During his historic flight, Titov received a message from his mother who told him the way into space—apparently a close personal friend—Maj. Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space.

"I embrace you, old chap, and kiss you... see you soon," Gagarin said. Titov whirled around the Earth.

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Judge Notes Court Files Of Juveniles

Statistics for the year ending June 30 reveal 77 of 86 juvenile delinquents who appeared in Twin Falls juvenile court during that period were boys. Judge Zoe Warberg announced Friday.

Of these boys, 22 were charged with burglary, 11 with larceny, 11 with assault, 11 with violation of liquor laws, 11 with violation of truancy laws, 11 with violation of curfew laws, 11 with violation of other laws.

Among the girls, three appeared in court under criminal charges. Other offenses for which boys and girls are lumped together include truancy, running away, etc.

The judge noted 10 children were turned over to the custody of the state industrial school at St. Anthony. Judge Warberg sentenced six of these children while her predecessor, J. Dean Mosher, sentenced the other four during the past year.

Of the cases, 17 were dismissed after an official hearing and four were dismissed after an unofficial hearing, the judge said, and 10 children were placed on probation.

Three children were placed in their homes and 23 cases were referred to other counties during the year, Judge Warberg said.

Six children were placed in the custody of the Twin Falls sheriff prior to their hearings, the official noted, adding that, although the children are placed in the county jail separate facilities apart from those provided for adult offenders are available.

This information is contained in a report the judge's office has prepared for the state board of health, Judge Warberg said.

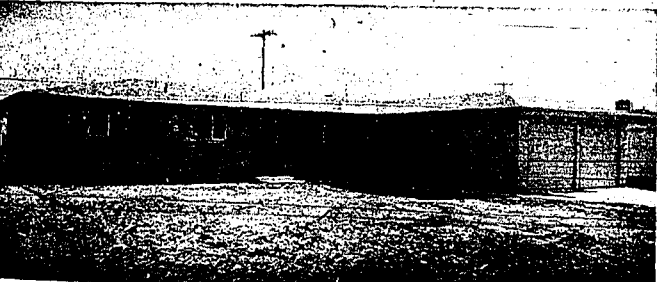

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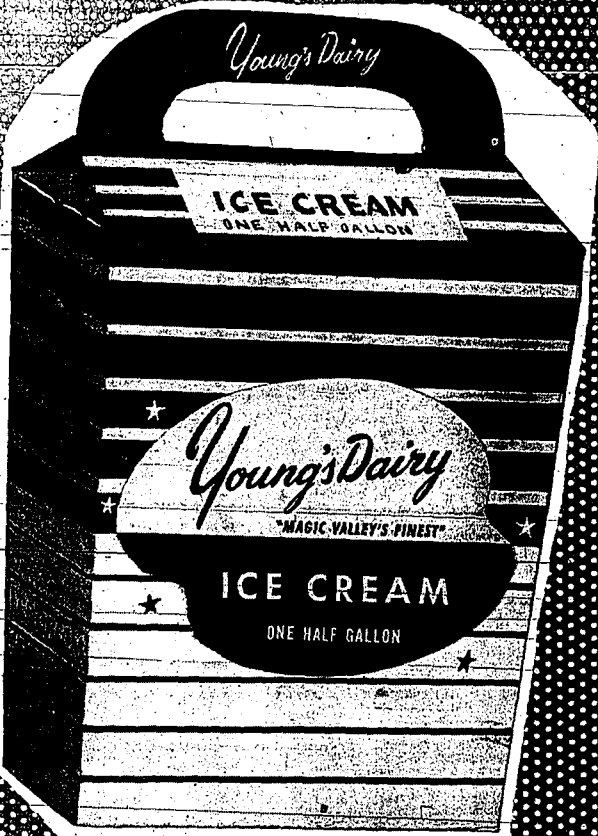

Surprise Possible

Richard M. Nixon had no idea of retreating into obscurity when he attached himself to a Los Angeles law firm... Perhaps even he is surprised at the number of people who have in recent months...

Reports out of California say that a new Nixon aide, Murray, is stumping the state to get new Republican clubs... Others speak with more caution, but say "if I had to bet" the wager would be Nixon will win in California.

He does not have to announce candidacy until early next year... Reports are likely to produce a denial, Nixon does not allow others to arrange his political timing.

Assuming he has largely made up his mind, he can still change it if the presently quiet hopeful GOP prospects in California should grow dimmer.

As matters stand today, a decision by him not to go in 1962 is the only thing that could really surprise the political world.

MERGING SPIRIT Is it just coincidence that the movement for the merging and union of churches has occurred at the time when mergers in the business and industrial world have become so dominant?

The late Prof. James Mavor of the University of Toronto used to stress what he called "the ebb and flow of social ideas" in which dominant trends were often reversed.

In religion and the churches the disruption does not always wait for the ebb. In the so-called movement of "ecumenicalism" which sometimes represents a majority movement and great gains in spirit and organization, well publicized events tend to conceal the extent and nature of the opposition.

It is the nature of the determination with which both ultraconservative and ultra-liberal groups hold to beliefs and convictions... Its extent is indicated in the way such conservative groups specifically maintain independence.

HOLD THE CURTAIN Trends are tricky. Sometimes things work out a lot better when you combat them instead of roll with them.

In the theatrical world, for instance, the knowledgeable folk are being saying for years that "the road is dying."

But up in Toronto a brewing firm named "O'Keefe" is doing a roaring business that is not notably as a town theater spot, the company laid out 12 million dollars for a huge, new, 3,200-seat theater.

Thereupon they transformed Toronto into one of the two or three best "road cities" on the U. S.-Canadian circuit. Every major stage show wants to play there. Business volume is terrific. Reservations are in the air, even other theaters have gained.

The whole circuit has perked up. Other cities such as Detroit are planning to follow Toronto's lead. The town's bold venture offers a lesson that could be not being lost.

SATELLITES MAY NOT REMAIN LOYAL—The current stampede on East Germany to West Berlin indicates that this spirit of hatred and defiance, this estimate of conventional force was too strong to be held in check on the ground.

With proper preparation, NATO's 22 divisions can be increased to at least 35, or enough to meet the present danger.

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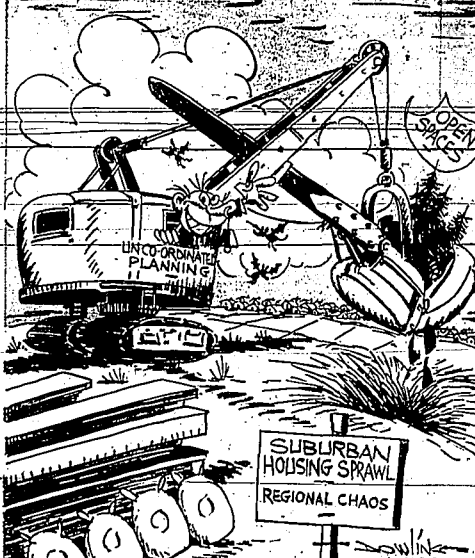

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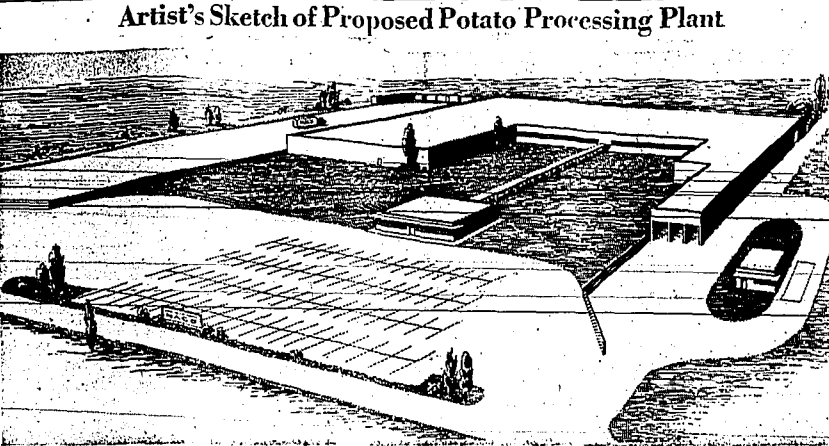

Additional Processing Line Planned To Increase Potato Plant's Capacity

Plant capacity of Northwest Agricultural corporation's potato processing plant, scheduled to go into operation this winter, will be increased by the addition of a second processing line, the company announced.

The company has been removing fences and installing sewer and water lines prior to field leveling last month. The plant will be built on 55 acres directly across from the Twin Falls municipal golf course.

The company hopes to have the plant built and all equipment installed this winter to permit the firm to process 16 million pounds of finished potato products during the winter peak season, a company spokesman explained.

If present plans are accomplished the company hopes to gross approximately \$22,000,000 during the first processing season.

These figures, drawn up recently by the company's board of directors and checked by an independent accountant, reflect current sales prices, including rubber discounts and lower prices for institutional orders. They include prices for packaged French fried potatoes, potato pellets and hash-browned potatoes, the spokesman notified.

Company officials presently are working on interim financing. It is hoped to arrange lease-purchase agreements for much of the processing equipment. Cost of the plant, grounds and equipment is estimated at \$2,800,000.
