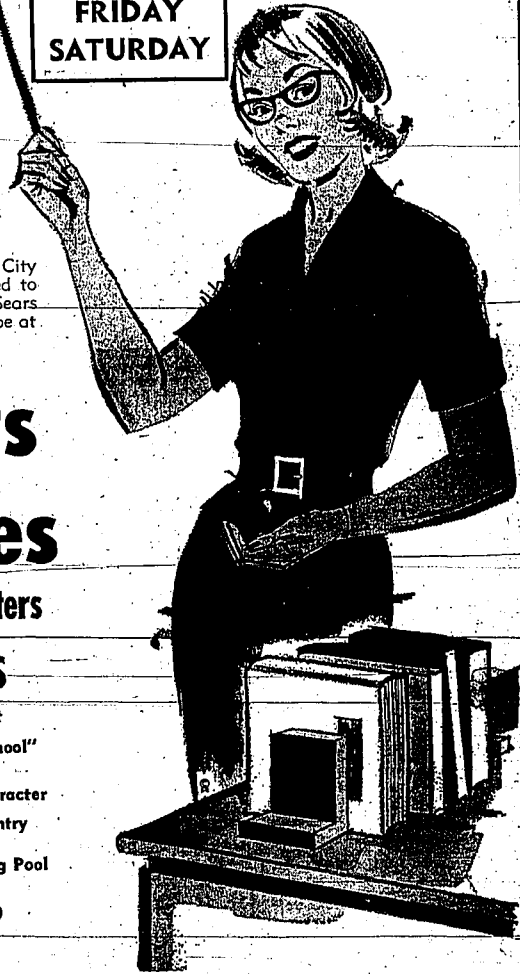

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—A single member of the house of representatives is blocking action on a needed atomic energy bill. He is Rep. Clarence Cannon, Missouri, the wily and powerful chairman of the house appropriations committee. He is as ardent and as partisan a Democrat as his fellow Missourian, Harry S. Truman. And, like the former president, Cannon believes a strong, centralized controlling force of government.

NO THEATRICAL DISPLAY OF POWER—In this instance, Chairman Cannon is not indulging in a mere theatrical display of his power. He is not making an "I've got you where you knuckle under to him, the great source of energy for the future—atomic power—may become a monopoly rather than a private enterprise development.

Compared with this controversy, which has attracted hardly any attention outside the North-west, the dispute between Cannon and the public power interests has been a mere skirmish. The current legislative fight centers around the atomic energy commission's bill authorizing the expansion of the public power program and the construction of a plutonium plant at Hanford, Wash. Public power advocates, led by Cannon, backed on a \$5 billion dollar plan for facilities that would generate 700,000 kilowatts of power and produce atomic power still usable after the production of plutonium.

CLAIM NONUSE WOULD BE WASTE—It would be an economic waste not to use this energy that is being produced, Cannon says. The amount of electricity produced at our greatest water power dams and sources. But its shape after Chairman Cannon's last-minute and private tinkering may depend on what he decides to do with the public power monopoly on the production of electricity by atomic power.

No Walls Separate Classes In Michigan Town's Test

CARSON CITY, Mich., Aug. 9 (AP)—Classes without any walls to separate them, lessons with no arbitrary endings by the clock, and the services of a high-powered teaching team, in lieu of a single classroom teacher, have put this tiny community way out on the educational frontier.

Research and advice from educational consultants. A need for a new school building gave rise to the new program. "We sought a way to improve instruction," says Mrs. Martin. "We have tried to bring all the good things of the self-contained classroom to our program. The pupils determine their places in the larger groups on the basis of interest. The teachers act as the smaller groups on pupil ability." The curriculum is that of traditional classrooms — with extra. "We teach the basics of reading, spelling, writing, mathematics and science," Vaughan explains. "But the program also

The \$225,000 building, specially designed for this flexibility — and intensity — of teaching, doesn't at all resemble the traditional school. There is a multi-purpose room for eating, exercise, and for special programs, which the student body of 550 can enjoy on mass.

First Scores For IQ Test May Be Low

NEW YORK, Aug. 9—If you think your child's IQ score is disappointingly low, don't take it too seriously.

He may have been tired, or bored, or scared, or just confused by the unfamiliar look of the test questions.

On future tests, he's likely to better your report—don't make a production out of it.

An authority in the testing field, Prof. Elizabeth Hagen of Teachers College, explains that it is only one cause of a child's brain power. Instead of measuring total intelligence which she says no one test can possibly do—it indicates scholastic ability only, and as such is a helpful guide in planning a child's academic work.

But early test scores may give a false picture of the child's ability. Some children get into an emotional dither over any examination and can't think clearly. A cool approach by the parent is a positive help to such a child, so he won't tense up at testing time.

Other children are thrown by the mechanics of their first test. The slow reader is handicapped too. His tests are predicated on reading ability. Give him some remedial reading help, and next time he'll forge ahead to a more realistic score.

Professor Hagen feels some children are tested much too early in their school careers. Often it's the over-anxious parent who pressures the kindergarten teacher into giving an IQ test. The educator throws out young and naive first graders, finding it hard to understand directions, stop and start, and wind up with an invalid score because of their confusion.

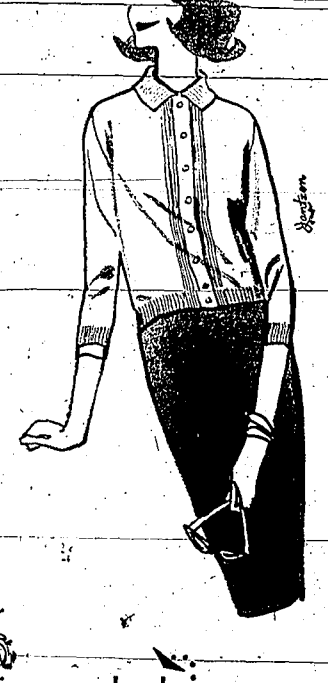

Accessories are important and should be colorful without being over-the-top. Accessories are for wardrobe accent, not shock value. Attention.

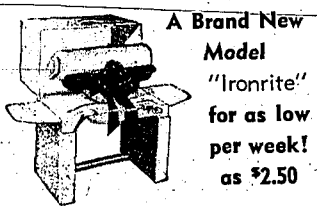
One dozen pairs of socks, all color coordinated with entire wardrobe.

Doctors Plan Vision Tests For Children

A free pre-school vision screening program to determine any vision defects a child should have corrected before starting school, will be given all pre-school age children Aug. 15.

Dr. Gertrude Fuller, Dr. John McNeer, Dr. George P. Scholer and Dr. Robert V.

Shaw, Twin Falls optometrist participating in the program, sponsored by the Idaho optometric association, will open their offices during the day as a community service to the youngsters.

Parents of pre-school children may call in advance for an appointment for that day, or they may bring their children to one of the above named optometrists at anytime during office hours during that day.

Dr. Gale A. Allen, Boise, president of the Idaho Optometric association, said that the program may help children to avoid the loss of a valuable year of schooling, since approximately 80 per cent of what a child learns comes through what he sees. The screening, however, will not substitute for a full vision examination. Dr. Allen continued, but it will be thorough enough to determine if a vision problem exists or if the child is suffering from an eye condition which needs treatment.

If further-vision examination is indicated, or should a vision difficulty be found, the child and his parents may select whomever they wish for the necessary professional care Dr. Allen added.

Tuttle Youth Facing Bypass Heart Surgery Second Time

TUTTLE, Aug. 8.—Bypass heart surgery for the second time in four months may be necessary in September for Ronald Miller, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forest Miller, Tuttle.

Ronald, a handsome, strapping, healthy looking youth, has returned from Salt Lake City where he was examined after surgery performed at the LDS hospital there last June 12. The surgery was to repair the aortic valve.

Physicians believe his condition is improved but necessitates further surgery scheduled for Sept. 26. Additional surgery for this type of heart trouble is unusual, a family says.

A fever which the youth developed after the surgery in June is blamed for the incomplete recovery.

During his high fever, breathing was difficult for the boy and doctors believe this may have been responsible for tearing out or weakening the stitches. Cause of the fever was undetermined.

Parents Are Urged to Get Health Okay

The first assignment for parents as school opens is checking the youngsters' well-being.

Is the boy or girl physically fit to face the challenges of the school year ahead?

Now's the time to check eyes, ears, teeth and a child's total health.

How about eyes? Every child should have an eye test once a year. If a child has a vision problem in school, make very sure you get both his vision and hearing checked. No child can learn well if he cannot see the blackboard or hear the teacher clearly.

How about weight and nutrition? Has your youngster gained enough and not too much? Maybe you need to plan his diet more carefully—too many snacks and not enough muscle building staples. Maybe it's a little extra step—he needs the child's teeth.

Plan an early visit to the dentist; have needed dental work done well ahead of fall.

Be sure that the youngster has all essential preventative vaccine shots. Check with the doctor on what's new and necessary.

Consider the child's posture, too. Are his muscles firm and strong? His coloring good?

Don't overlook securing professional help for the child who stutters his words, wets his bed, or dawdles over food and chores. Some of those problems are emotional; others have a physical origin.

Plan appointments for each of the children in the family well in advance of school opening. Be sure ample time is available for proper care and treatment of physical and emotional problems.

Both English; German Used In Unique Germany School

BERLIN, Aug. 9 (U) — Americans and Berliners have launched a unique project in this isolated city — an elementary school where the pupils do their work in two languages, English and German.

The goal is a high one: to have the children speak, read and write both tongues equally well and to give them a standard education, too.

The new institution is part of the Muehlenau school, which belongs to West Berlin's regular educational system, and occupies a modified after the German part of its installation. All the children must keep up with the standards set by the Berlin authorities.

There are six or seven hours of separate language instruction every week, so that the German youngsters can keep abreast of instruction in English, and the Americans get the most out of what was said in German.

The rest of the time, the two groups are together and the teachers switch from one language to another as seems useful.

In other ways, too, the school is modified after the German method rather than American. Classes are held only in the morning, six days a week. There are no study periods, and rather more homework than American children usually get.

Learning Factors Not Well Known; Individuals Varied

BY DR. GEORGE WEIGAND

Although a great number of experiments have been performed in the field, we still don't know what happens inside a person's brain when he learns. Conversely, no one can tell us what happens inside the brain that keeps people from learning. But these experiments haven't all gone for naught; they do point out some of the factors which have to do with learning, and learning effectively.

These factors fall into two familiar areas heretofore and environment. We might say that heredity determines the size of the learning container of the child, and environment determines what and how much is in the container.

It seems probable that little or no learning takes place without some purpose. The child may learn because he wishes to avoid punishment or because he wishes to please his parents. Or, he may learn for the sheer pleasure he gets from learning. By the same token, a child will not work at learning if he has no reason for it, any more than he will work at any other task without reason.

In the early years, negative motivations (such as to avoid punishment) may work fairly well. Later, however, when the child begins to mature, these negative forces lose their ef-

fectiveness, especially when the child is not directly under parental control.

This is one reason why fairly good high school students may become poor students in college. Parents, then, should emphasize the positive motivation, that is, get the child to learn because he wants to learn and for reasons which will satisfy him.

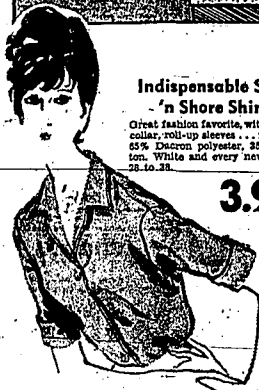
If the child really wants to learn but has minimum capabilities, the methods by which he learns become very important. Most parents and children and know how to learn the things children know how to learn; the things they want to learn, but they are not aware of how to use the same technique in learning school subjects.

For instance, if you want to learn a song, you sing it. If you want to learn a game, you play it.

Why then, if you want to learn to answer questions, or recite in class, or take a test, should you concentrate on reading? Reading, of course, is important for comprehension, but to retain the material you are trying to learn you must use it.

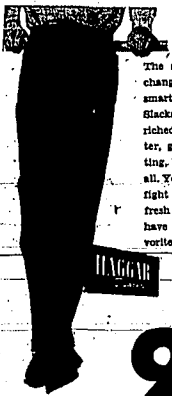

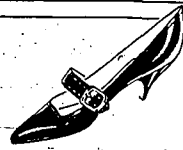

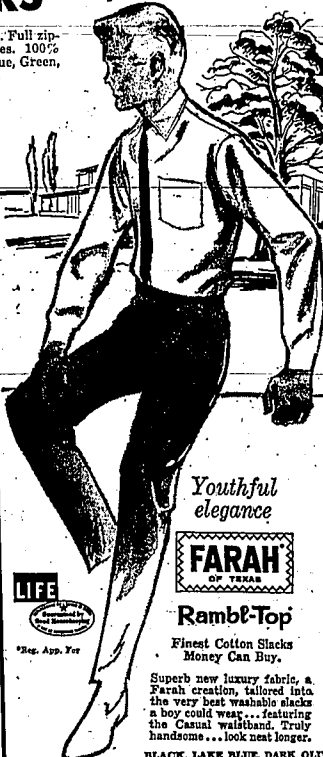

A good nursery school offers objective guidance (which is hard for some mothers to give), and the beginnings of experiences in social relations which the home and box may not offer. Finger paints, clay, poster paints, and lots of other messy materials are put in the nursery school classroom. Make them available at home, and the resulting messes may try the patience of the mother who's trying to feed the baby and get the kitchen straightened up. "Let's be honest about it," says Mrs. Daniels. "Having the exclusive company of small children all day just doesn't agree with all mothers. They're used to painting at home. Finger painting is an essential part of a school morning, and afterwards, even the child is completely washable. (Staff engraving)"

Informal play groups arranged among mothers on the same street don't always work either. Fights among the children can carry over to battles among the mothers, who instinctively take sides with their own offspring. The nursery school teacher, on the other hand, can give mother a big assist in understanding and guiding her child. Accustomed to the vagaries of 3-year-olds, she can share her knowledge and give some tips in handling what is her highly normal behavior. And if her charge appears to suffer from any emotional disturbances, she's able to consult the symptoms and work with the child's parents toward their correction. And if his mother stays with him at school for a few days, the break of separation won't be with all mothers. They're used to painting.
