Buhl Reports Schedule for School Dates

Buhl, Aug. 10 - Registration schedules for Buhl public schools which will begin Aug. 28 have been announced by Rex Engelking, superintendent.

Junior and senior high school students may register Monday, Aug. 21, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and Tuesday, Aug. 22, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Registration will be in room 206 near the senior high school gymnasium.

All students new to the Buhl junior and senior high school should report to the high school Aug. 16-17 at which time their credits will be evaluated and complete placement information given. Students are urged to complete registration early to avoid congestion. All late registrants will report at 8 a.m. Aug. 28 in the auditorium of the senior high building. Lockers will be assigned the first day of school by home room teachers.

P. H. Buhl and Lincoln school students, grades one through six, are required to report to their respective schools Aug. 21, 22, 23 of August. The elementary lockers will be open between 9 a.m. and noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

Students entering the first grade who have not previously registered their high certificates and dues are to be collected at the time of registration. Registration fees and other particulars will be announced next week, according to Engelking.

Wednesday, Aug. 23, grade 12, 9 a.m. to noon; Wednesday, Aug. 23, grades 11 and 12, 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Thursday, Aug. 24, grade 10, 9 a.m. to noon, and Thursday, Aug. 24, grade nine, 1 to 4 p.m.

Book fees will be \$3 for grades one to five inclusive, with a \$1 refund at the end of the year if the books have had reasonable care; grades six to eight inclusive \$2 with \$1 refund, and grades nine to 12, \$3 with \$1 refund. Laboratory fees are \$1.

First graders must be 6 years of age before midnight Oct. 15. Parents registering first graders should present birth certificates. The hot lunch program will start Monday, Aug. 28, and prices will remain the same as last year: grades one to five, 20 cents, and grades six to 12, 25 cents.

At 3:15 p.m. the last Friday of each month in the elementary auditorium there will be a meeting of hot lunch personnel.

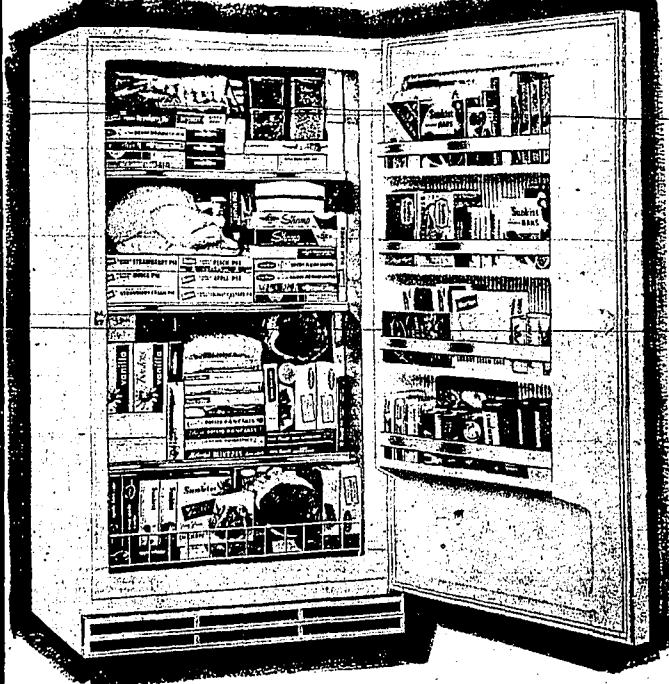
Defeated

School and Day Camp Strive To Help Deteriorating Area

BALTIMORE, Aug. 9 (AP)—On a school which opens its doors to the community around it help relate the level of a deteriorating urban area?

Baltimore educators are hoping to find the answer in a two-year-old program which combines schooling with day camp programs, health services, and travel experiences new to the school.

Some of this broad-visited program is the Mt. Royal elementary school in the heart of a 92-acre urban renewal area, one and a half miles northwest of downtown Baltimore.

Teaching the young students live in the area goes hand and hand with school work. The children are taught to read traffic signs since the onslaught of a forthcoming superhighway, some parents makes making school a hazardous

Parents and their parents study neighborhood maps and are instructed in store prices, so they'll recognize good buys and be able to count their change.

A major problem on the school playground was the tendency of two angry youngsters to settle their differences by their fists, which have now persuaded them to arbitrate their quarrels, and as a consequence, the number of playground fights has dropped so much that one teacher says she "no longer allows to go to playground duty."

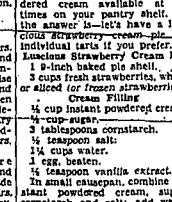

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No National Move Found To Eliminate Relief Cheats

Welfare officials in New York, N. Y., said today they have found no national move to eliminate relief cheats. The United Press International said welfare officials in New York are taking similar measures to help the welfare cheats.

The subject of welfare payments was wide attention this summer when officials of Newburgh, N. Y., revealed a plan to tighten relief standards.

A debate boiled over whether the Newburgh officials could carry out their program and the issue has been taken to court. United Press International surveyed the situation in areas faced with similar problems and found that:

- There is no national clamor for cracking down on suspected relief cheats.
- Newburgh does not have a monopoly on the problem or on at least one of the suggested remedies.
- Newburgh's city manager, Joseph McEl Mitchell said his city's relief rolls account for five per cent of the population and cost the municipal government one million dollars a year, leaving two million dollars for other expenses.
- He outlined a plan that, among other things, would:
 - Require able-bodied men to prefer to work 40 hours a week for the city.
 - Banish from the welfare rolls unworked mothers if they have any more illegitimate children.
 - Propose to take action against unworked mothers has not found as much support in the community as the work plan.

New York state officials contended that such restrictions violate the rules under which federal funds are channeled into the states for redistribution to the needy. Lack of enabling legislation has blocked similar programs in other states. State legislatures have a great deal to say about distribution of relief money.

Loss of these votes could be costly to future coal area programs.

The majority of Democratic congressmen from the coal belts teamed up with House conservatives to vote down the project Thursday in the house.

Those expressing fears pointed out that, in the past, they have put over their bills with a vital assist from liberals in the Rocky mountain, northwestern and New England states.

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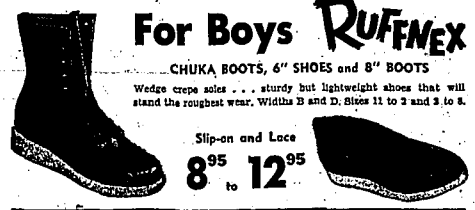
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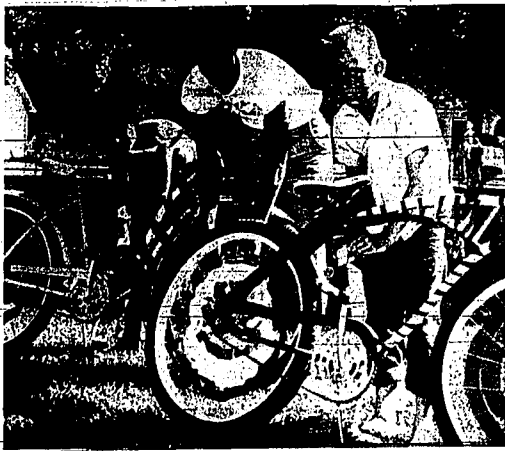

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 9 (AP) — Not all pupils graduating from Pittsburgh public schools in 1962 will get diplomas. Some of them will receive certificates instead under a new plan announced by the board of education.

The new plan calls for certificates to be given to pupils who receive a grade average under 1.5. This is halfway between "C" and "D". The grade scale runs from "A" to "F" for "A" average to "F" for "F" average.
