Red Avers He's Ready to Talk; Hits "Threats"

MOSCOW, Aug. 11 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev, reiterating his readiness to negotiate, today welcomed President Kennedy's expression of hope for a peaceful solution in Germany. "We believe common sense will win," he said. But in almost the same breath he insisted that the United States respect the Soviet Union as a great power "not afraid of any threats." Analysts in speech power "not afraid of any threats" and "not afraid of any threats" and arm waving, he declared hundreds of millions will die if a new war is set off. He said western leaders who claim that only seven million will die are talking nonsense.

Peace Treaty Talks Begun, Reds Declare

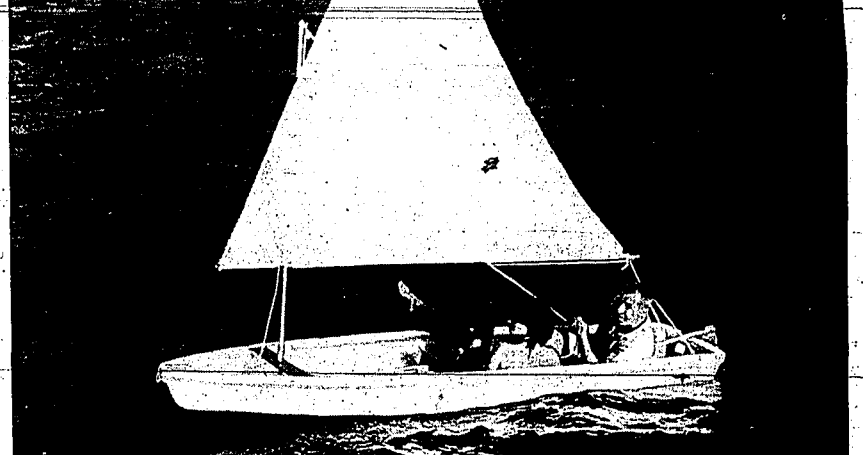

Experts Say Super Bomb 'Too Potent'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev might be able to get a bomb packing the wallop of 100 million tons of TNT but some American experts think he'd be foolish to do so. Reason: It would be too potent.

Such a super-superbomb "would overkill and overdestroy" far beyond the limits of military strategy, they say of the 2000 which Khrushchev threatened Wednesday to have created by real scientists. And it could not match the efficiency of equivalent smaller bombs, they say.

They add that greater destruction and killing could be accomplished with from five to 10 bombs with the equivalent of 10 million to 20 million tons of TNT as compared with a one-shot drop of a 100-million tonner.

U. S. civil defense planning presently is designed to cope with bombs of up to and including 20 megatons as the ones most likely to be used in any all-out attack. So, while no official will talk about the power of available American bombs, it can be presumed that this country has weapons ranging up to at least the 20-megaton class.

Could a 100-megaton bomb be made and how would it compare with a 20-megatonner in destructiveness?

Charles Shafer, chief of the plans office for chemical, biological and radiological defense for the federal office of civil and defense mobilization, says he personally does not know whether a 100-megaton bomb could be made. But he says the capabilities of such a weapon can be roughly approximated.

Simply Designed Harrow-Carrier to Be Manufactured by Krengel's Firm

MURTAUGH, Aug. 11—A harrow-carrier built for road travel and for simple loading and unloading will soon be commercially manufactured by Krengel's Manufacturing company, Twin Falls, according to Julius E. Neumann, farmer east of Murtaugh, inventor of the harrow-carrier. Neumann designed and built the original carrier with his son-in-law, Farnum Warr, who also farms east of Murtaugh. A patent is pending.

Neumann said when a representative of Krengel's came out to look over the carrier the first time he was astonished at the simplicity, and by the ease with which the harrow can be loaded on the carrier, then he said, "Why it's so simple, it's actually foolhardy."

The harrow-carrier is designed so that the tractor driver can pull the four-sections of harrows on

to the roadside of the carrier, uncouple the clevis from the drawbar, drive the tractor to the front of the carrier and then pull harrows and all down a road, across railroad tracks, through a narrow fence-gate, across the headland and bottomland of a dropped field to get to another field, and then unload the harrows again. Unloading and hitching to the drawbar will take about 10 minutes, said Neumann.

The carrier is built with four two and one-half inch pipes, which lay on the ground when the tractor drives over it. At one end, where the four pipes are bent to converge, is a tongue for hitching to the tractor drawbar. At the back are the axle and the wheels, and an inexpensive mechanical jack. The jack, worked by a ratchet lever, both pushes and pulls so that in a few min-

Production of Meat in 1960 Is Increased

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—The foreign agricultural service (FAS) reports meat production in 41 leading countries which produced 85 per cent of the world meat supply totaled 99 billion pounds in 1960. This was one per cent more than a year earlier and 23 per cent above the 1951-55 average.

FAS said the increase in meat production during 1960 was not large enough to keep pace with the growth of the human population. The rise in production since 1951, however, has more than matched population growth. Per capita meat consumption has increased in most countries. Despite the record output price of meat, particularly beef, continued relatively high, FAS said.

A further rise in meat output in the 41 countries was expected during 1961, with prospective increases in beef, pork and lamb and mutton.

Total meat production during 1960 in all of the 12 leading countries except Argentina was above average. The increase, ranging from one per cent in Brazil to 58 per cent in the Soviet Union.

Output in Argentina was five per cent below the 1951-55 average. U. S. production was 20 per cent above average.

Compared with a year earlier, 1960 production rose in the United States, France, Italy, Poland and Denmark.

Production changed little in Argentina, but declined in Brazil, Australia and Canada. The 12 leading producers accounted for 78 per cent of the total output in the 41 countries. The United States produced about 28 per cent of the total.

FAS said Red China probably was the second largest meat producer, although no production figures were available. Production in China, mostly pork, was up considerably in 1959 and 1960, but was declining sharply this year, FAS said.

Insect Activity in Magic Valley Has Caused Speculation, Damage, Benefit

Most activity this season, particularly in alfalfa, alfalfa, beans and grains, has caused much speculation around Magic Valley, some damage, and some apparent benefits.

Grasshoppers have damaged some desert wheatgrass fields near Amsterdam and grain fields on the Camas trail, particularly near Fairfield, Keith Evans, Twin Falls, said a control division, USDA, said grasshoppers have done intensive damage in the Swan Valley area.

As many as 1,000 thrips insects to a spud plant, have been reported by Virgil Cross, Minidoka extension potato agent. Cross pointed out that thrip, which often hit at the underside of the bean leaves, normally are found in potato fields, but this year seems to be an exception.

Damage symptoms on spuds hit by thrip are a darkening color to the plants, plus the appearance of dryness. In severe cases, the lower leaves may fall off without turning yellow. The underside of the leaf will be a silver color.

A cross pointed out that thrip are difficult to see and he suggested tapping one potato stalk on a sheet of yellow paper and then counting the number that fall onto it. If more than 15 thrip are counted per stalk he suggested a chemical treatment.

A few fields of beans have been attacked by red spider, and farmers are dusting these fields with sulfur, Vance Smith, Minidoka county agent, reports he found some two-spotted mites in a bean field near Rupert, and these fields didn't show up on the scout or the leaves.

As for pea aphids in hay fields, they have reported the presence of these green lice. Experts hard to report these insects to appear in alfalfa fields this season in numbers large enough to delay the growth of third crop hay.

Walter Peay, USDA entomologist, Twin Falls, said that the soil temperature at the surface of the ground was 120 degrees a week ago, and that this temperature probably was not enough to cook any pea-aphid accumulating on the second-cut hay fields.

Moreover, sweep counts of pea aphids in hay fields have been extremely low all season, and entomologists have assumed that few of these lice overwintered despite the enormous buildup in hay last year. Another factor contributing to a low pea aphid count so far, is the enormous population of ladybugs (ladybugs) in the fields all spring.

Glen Hedly, Casata county agent, who has been observing ladybug activity all season, attributes the lack of aphids in Burley gardens and yard this summer to these beneficial insects. He also has watched them eating Colorado potato beetle eggs in spud fields for many weeks, and points out that many spud men in Casata county have been able to escape spraying at

fly swarms for homes or for alfalfa. He said also that the moth for beetles aphid species in alfalfa fields this season, and that this time has been ladybugs eating the same observations have noted by other farmers throughout the valley.

The ladybugs, which have been enormous in numbers this year, eat only the eggs, and one farmer added that what the bugs don't eat, she pinches prevents them from developing.

Irrigation Water Used Up in Areas of Nevada

RENO, Nev., Aug. 11—Irrigation water from streams is virtually gone in all areas of Nevada, according to a water summary prepared by the University of Nevada.

A survey of Nevada county agents indicates hay crops will be about the same as last year, and that higher summer ranges are a little better but low ranges are worse. Some ranchers have developed wells, however, and are producing normal crops.

Elko county streams, south of Elko, still have some flow. Irrigating new seedlings and some ranchers are expected to get a second cutting of hay. The higher ranges in this county are better than was expected, said the report.

West of Elko, in Humboldt county, southwest of the Idaho border, all stream water for irrigation purposes has been used and the hay crop is expected to be very short. Livestock ranges are in good condition, however.

In counties near the California border, good crops of hay are reported where large numbers of wells have been dug. In Lyon county, more water is reported to have been pumped from wells this year than the total capacity of two reservoirs serving this area. No decreed water is left for crops in these reservoirs.

In Churchill county, which includes the city of Fallon, the hay crop is about 70 per cent normal.

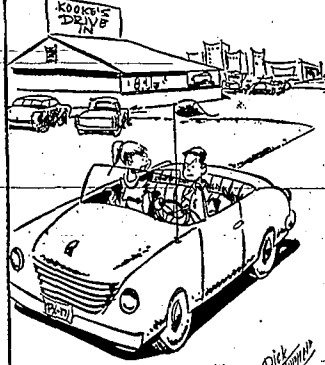

Aide Reports Outlook for Water in '62

RUPERT, Aug. 11—An increase of from 110 per cent to 120 per cent in the moisture content of the watershed is needed if the area is to escape another short year, perhaps worse than the present season, Merle Tillery, project superintendent for the bureau of reclamation, said Chamber of Commerce members here Thursday.

Tillery, speaker at the regular Thursday luncheon meeting, gave a report on bureau activities in the area during the past several years, with special reference to the current water situation.

He explained there are six reservoirs on the Snake river with some four million acre feet of water in average years. The 1960 season began with a little more than one and one-half million acre feet, and this year there are one million acre feet less than the previous year. Bureau predictions, based on past trends, is for less than 180,000 acre feet in the system next year.

Tillery explained there was plenty of moisture on the watershed the past winter, but a cold, slow spring season interfered with the normal melting of the snow, allowing the ground to take up what would usually run off into the network of waterways feeding the reservoirs.

The local area is more fortunate, he said, than some farther up the river where a number of canals are already empty, with no prospect for any more water this season. Here, officials hope to be able to capture enough to allow a harvest time watering on the best crop, Tillery reported.

The superintendent pointed out that, throughout the entire irrigation system, the Northside and the Michael project near Pocatello are the only ones with an apparently unlimited supply of water.

An exchange of water rights by areas with storage in Jackson Lake for water in the American Falls reservoir, offered in contracts by the bureau some eight years ago, was implemented for the first time this year, Tillery said. He noted the exchange worked out successfully to all concerned. He pointed out that Minidoka county irrigating interests had voted down the proposition.

Tillery reported that with the Aug. 19 land drawings, some 77,480 acres will be brought into cultivation. He said that 100 names will be drawn to conclude all land units left on the project.

The gross crop returns from the Northside project since it was opened in 1954 were listed by the speaker at just under 40 million dollars. The project started with 7,000 acres and has been built up by subsequent drawings to 74,642 acres.

Asked about the underground water table from which the pump project draws its water, Tillery said that geologists' reports show no significant drop in the level. He said that in drilling the northside irrigation wells, only one, maybe two, had proved to be dry out of the 174 now operating.

William Lott, chamber president, announced the appointment of a four-man committee to plan a suitable highway sign for the chamber to install on the new road. Don Ballantine is chairman, assisted by Larry Copeland, George McDonald and Mrs. Hazel Dean Hunter.

Lott announced a director's meeting for Monday night and a merchant's committee meeting at 7 a.m. Tuesday.

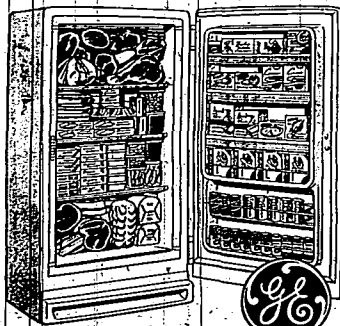

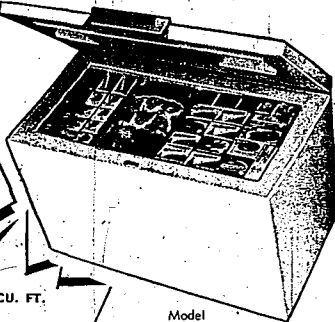

Cooper Said Idea Okay for Movie, but Not in Real Life

It's one of the bitter facts of life that people are always ready to believe the worst. "I don't like the idea any more than anyone else does," Gary Cooper observed philosophically on the set of his last film, "but I gotta admit—that's what gives this picture its wallop."

The "this picture" is the production "The Naked Edge," which marked the lanky actor's big switch from left to right to starlet Roseanna. In it, Cooper plays a successful American businessman whose business and his martial life with co-star Deborah Kerr are threatened by a blackmail letter.

"This is exactly the kind of thing I mean," Cooper mused. "Even a guy's life can be bitten by the bug of suspicion."

In the case of "The Naked Edge," the making suspicion is an ugly one; the blackmail letter charges that Cooper's affluence is based on the murder and robbery of his former employer. The letter arrives five years late, having finally been recovered from a mail sack stolen in a train robbery, but its date coincides with a dramatic change

In Cooper's fortune. And since his wife has never known the source of the money that set him up in business for himself, the letter arouses nagging questions that she had hitherto put out of her mind.

The effects on a seemingly normal life of one of these letters provides the mounting tension in the United Artists release—for as Miss Kerr doggedly searches for evidence that will refute the letter, she becomes more and more convinced that there is fire behind the smoke.

"That's fine in pictures," Cooper pointed out, "but look at the charge; this could cause in real life. Sometimes there's no way in which a man can refute charges that have been made about his past life."

"How I'm not suddenly trying to influence lives. I'm just a performer, not a reformer. But now and then you get involved in a situation which points a big moral. And this is one of those cases."

The new silhouette is an elegant one. It will show off a high bosom, slender midriff, small waist and fire-trimmed hips. (No advice has been distributed as to what to do if you have none of these specifications.)

To this silhouette, each designer has supplied individual touches. It was Marie Bohan's collection for the House of Dior that once again kicked up a big fuss. It like form-fitted, long-sleeved dresses, bias-cut skirts that flare and wasp waists.

Skirt lengths at Dior barely graze the knee.

Gadgets Are Planned for Soon

CHICAGO, Aug. 11 (AP)—Battery operated sawing machines and vibrating carving knives are in the offing for American homemakers.

These were among the thousands of kitchen gadgets and household items displayed by the National Housewares Manufacturers association here recently.

They will be available this fall when the orders of the more than 50,000 buyers attending the show reach retail store shelves. Apparently the backyard chef still is an elusive figure. Houseware producers have him very much in mind in many new charcoal broilers of many designs—motorized spits and all.

One of the newest chef aids is a cordless motorized carrying knife.

The portable cutting, slicing and carving appliance is powered by two flashlight batteries. A push button causes the knife to vibrate as it cuts with ease and without jacking.

Washing outside windows now is one step from washing a car. A new attachment for a garden hose is fitted with a revolving scrub brush, a sprayer and a pistol-grip container for detergent.

Distal controls on the grip enable changes from suds to clear water. Its handle extends from two to four feet.

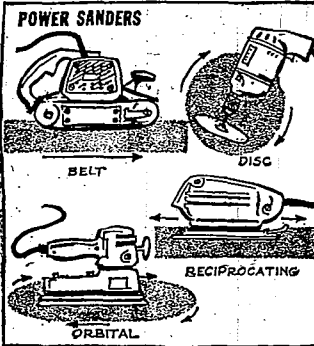

Power Sanders Have Advantages, Also Can Be Dangerous if Used Improperly

Hand sanding is still the technique that gives the perfect finish touch to any project in wood. But hand sanding as a method to do all the necessary smoothing and finishing is made obsolete by modern, inexpensive methods of power sanding. You can power sand to the point where only a light once-over with hand sanding is needed and on some jobs you can skip that.

Belt Sander Familiar
Most familiar is the disc sander, generally in the form of an attachment for an electric drill. This tool is inexpensive, efficient, fast, and it can run your work faster than any other type. The tool is perfect for rough sanding, but since its rotary motion results in circular scars, it is not suitable for finishing. With careful handling, it will have surfaces that are too badly marked up, even during rough sanding.

Hold the Disc Sander
Holding the disc sander in one spot too long will result in scoring—in it doesn't take long to dig out a deep groove. Too light a pressure results in a large number of broken marks as the disc tumbles over the work.

Keep Steady Pressure
Maintain an even, steady pressure. Thinning the sanding disc to only the outer third of the disc touches the surface will cut down on efficient marks.

A disc sander can be dangerous, too. Watch your step when the disc sander is used where the disc is tilted. It will jerk the tool right out of your hand.

The belt sander uses a continuous sanding belt that is fitted over revolving drums at each end. The belt moves in one direction so you needn't worry about cross-grain marks unless you apply the tool that way. This type of sander takes the surface down fast over a wide area.

Portable belt sanders are more expensive than other portable sanders, but they can be rented for an occasional big job.

If the surface you are sanding is narrower than the belt, sanding along only one part of the belt. The belt will wear unevenly later.

The reciprocating sander is a small hand tool that has a surface that moves back and forth with a fast motion. The abrasive material clings to the moving surface. This does a fine job—it's

easy to stay with the grain. But the reciprocating sander is slow, is best used in conjunction with other sanders or on small jobs.

The orbital sander is very much like the reciprocating sander except that as the sanding surface vibrates back and forth it also moves in a tight little orbit. Because of this motion it cuts fast, moves both across and with the grain. The finish won't be quite so good as with a reciprocating sander, and if you bear down you may get little circular marks.

Whichever type of sander you use (or even if you are hand sanding) use the finest grade abrasive you can get to do the job. Deep scratches are hard to remove. If you must use a series of grits, start with the coarsest of the series and then use the next finest grit each time.

Seal bottles with adhesive tape or plastic tape so they will not break. American Express experts making this point also suggest that you wrap the tape around the base of the bottle when you remove it. It will be at hand when you need it next time around.

Grass Work Made Safer By New Kit

Approximately 50,000 toes are victims of rotary lawnmower accidents annually, according to insurance statistics. A new accessory on the market is designed to reduce the hazard and improve mowing.

The item is a set of two hand-work rollers 13 1/2 inches long that may be fitted fore and after your mower. The difference between these rollers and those on reel mowers is that they do not touch the ground unless the side wheels dip into a depression or trench of a flower bed. The inventor says that if the rollers are properly set, three-fourths of an inch off the ground they will guard against personal injury by lifting the mower and blade clear of the feet.

On the lawn, the rollers permit the mower to climb over high spots and bridge low ones. They reduce the need for an edger to trim lawn because they hold the machine in a fairly level position even when the wheels drop over an edge. This prevents scaping lawns and assures a neater cut.

The rollers give advance warning of obstructions higher than three-fourths of an inch; act as a buffer to protect blades, crankshaft and metal casing.

"I've made my living and supported my children for 17 years of the whole 13 1/2 years in various ways, but I don't want to go into that."
