Industrial Revolt

When it comes to the business of getting materials and making goods, the people in this country are, in effect, slowly working themselves out of a job.

Right now only about 25 million Americans are directly engaged in product effort. That means manufacturing, construction, mining, farming, and such transportation is involved.

The big cry today is "automation," but this is in fact merely the dramatic new phase of an economic trend that has been trending long under way and most certainly destined to continue indefinitely.

Gerard Piel, in a document written for the Ford Foundation's Fund for the Republic, suggests that by the year 2000 factory workers may be as scarce as farmers today.

In his view, not just factory hands but white collar workers and even managers will be in short supply.

Machines today are beginning to do the work of the human nervous system as well as human muscle.

As a decision maker, the computer can subject much larger masses of data than more sophisticated analysis in much shorter periods of time.

As few as a hundred people produces more than enough to supply the nation's growing millions the means to buy industry's products?

The answer is multifold. As many as a million in factory production are engaged in producing goods.

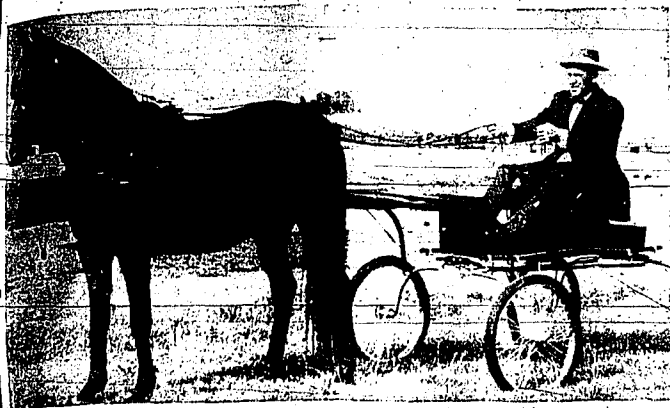

HAWAII, Alaska, Cuba—there along the Atlantic coast. The Idaho Travelers have toured since they began "seeing the world" in 1952. U.S. Facing Growing Crisis In Americas, Minister Says

The United States faces a growing crisis in its relations with Latin America during the coming years, the State Department minister said today.

This threat is advanced by the Rev. Spurgeon L. Hendrix, who is visiting the First Church of the Nazarens in Twin Falls, where he will preach Sunday.

Castro's present regime in Cuba, Hendrix said, is a threat to the United States. The low rent (rent) money they have exploited the masses in Cuba, a situation which exists throughout Latin America, he said.

One involvement in the Cuban revolution was caused by American business interests, which supported the Batista government, Hendrix said. Batista was a dictator, an economic colony of the United States, according to the minister.

In addition, the steady influx of American tourists in Havana added to the ill-will, since many Americans spent money there on gambling and prostitution, he said.

Although most Cubans at first supported Castro because of corruption and brutality within the Batista regime, today the majority of Cubans still back Castro, Hendrix said. "Most Cubans," he said, "are persecuted because of their race, religion or political beliefs. They are very zealous, very fanatical."

The ill-starred American-backed attempt to land an anti-Castro army on Cuban soil stood little chance of success from the very first, he commented.

"Our basic problem throughout Latin America," the missionary contended, "is the people have never been taught to think for themselves. Because a great gap exists between rich and poor, and there is no large, well-educated middle class, the situation is fertile for communism."

The Rev. Mr. Hendrix, therefore, favors a large investment

long period of time, will eventually lead to unrest. This occurred in Cuba, he noted, and was a basic cause of Castro's success.

Direct intervention in Cuba, he said, will result in some form of action by Russia—exactly what, no one knows. He feels it is a very real possibility that the USSR would "attack" the USA if we invaded Cuba.

The Rev. Mr. Hendrix now lives in Bethany, Okla., with his wife and three children. He is touring churches of Nazarenes throughout this country and Canada to discuss the church's missionary work.

glass kits came into being a few years ago. It became possible for even amateurs to find in their own yards the trunk handle and lock assembly is taken off, the holes are "reamed" or filed in, rounded and then pointed to blend with the rest of the trunk lid in a smooth surface. Kits are available for either manually or electrically operated locks which click and unlock the trunk from the dashboard.
The manual kits are economical and are also a do-it-yourself project.
While much of the equipment and parts used in engine modification can be purchased locally, most of the customizing gear is found in catalogue from large firms specializing in car parts.
These firms stock items such as custom grills to replace the stock, or standard grills, which can be installed by the owner. Not content with replacing grills, Frenching head and tail-lights, stripping chrome off and putting fresh coats of paint on the enthusiasts spend even more time and money to refurbish the interiors with new upholstery or even new seats and dashboard.
Some owners, after having the body painted, change their cars' names usually at the expense of painting in artistic lettering on the fenders. Movies, popular songs, television shows and serial books influence the selection of car's name. Some of the names found in this area include Twilight Zone, Friendly Persuasion, Lady Chatterley, Miss Owl, Alley Cat, Lil' Brown Jug, Blue Grass, Blue Angel, Rebel Rover and the Stouffer.

Even more radical customizing is done in larger cities with a majority of the expense in new vehicles coming from California, the center of hot rodding and customizing. It has been noted little actual "customizing" is done in this area, other than the basic body changes and general re-upholstering.
"The Magic Valley Timing Association evolved from two other groups. A club originally was formed a few years ago called the Road Lords. This group eventually changed its name to the Coachmen and about a year ago the MVTVA was organized.
For a while, the association had an auxiliary for wives or girl friends, called the Magic Valley Timettes. They held rummage sales and sponsored other fund raising projects. However, the Timettes is not organized at present.
The association's primary goal is to build a dragstrip somewhere in Magic Valley. Currently, the local group is frequently represented at the "drags" in Boise.

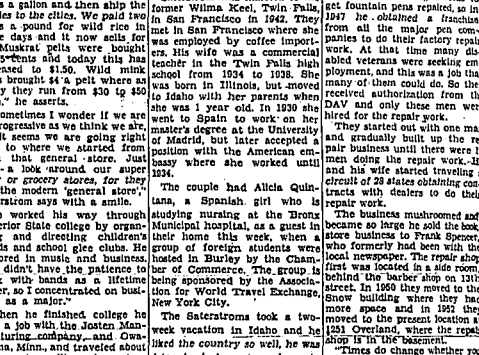
MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT PALMER SATERSTROM, Burley, Believes Strongly In Future of Magic Valley

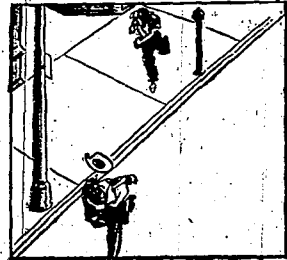
