### Idaho Cases Of Gonorrhea Jump in 1961

BOISE, Aug. 15—The Idaho health department said yesterday cases of gonorrhea continue to be reported at an increased number than last year.

Seventeen cases were reported last week, bringing to 242 cases the number reported in the first 22 weeks of this year as compared to 160 reported in the same period last year.

Cases last week were reported in the counties of 2, Blaine, 4, Bonner, 1, Camia, 4, Kootenai, 1, Minidoka, 1, Nez Perce, 2 and Twin Falls, 2.

State Health Administrator Dr. Terrell O. Carver also announced the number of gonorrhea cases in Idaho officially reported this far this year is 12 as compared to five at this time last year.

Dr. Carver said the two cases were announced last week in connection with the closing of the municipal swimming pool at Orofino. Both were in Nez Perce county.

One is a 20-year-old housewife with non-paralytic polio. She had received her third polio immunization in 1958, but had not received the recommended fourth injection, Dr. Carver said.

The other case was that of a 37-year-old housewife with partial paralysis of the left arm and right leg. She had received her third polio immunization in 1958, but had not received the recommended fourth injection, Dr. Carver said.

This brings to four the number of cases reported from Nez Perce county since July 21. Dr. Carver said—all four were young adults, and in one case, that of a 33-year-old unvaccinated father, the disease was fatal.

WASHINGTON — At the moment, it looks as if Sen. Estes Kefauver, the Democrat from Chattanooga, may win the battle but lose the war.

The first contingent is scheduled to arrive in Manila on September 1, and will enter a tropical Eden. But the house where the four will live is something less than Eden.

It is a two-story dwelling with no electricity, no gas, no water. Public utilities have not yet come to this remote area.

The bath is a shed in the garden, fed by hand-pumped water. The house is a length of split bamboo. In the kitchen, there are two stoves and a wood fire for cooking. The rooms are large but nearly bare of furniture.

### Briefs Filed In Colorado Water Case

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—Attorneys for California, Arizona and Nevada filed answering briefs in the supreme court yesterday in a dispute over rights to Colorado river water.

The briefs state in a conflict over recommendations made last December by special master Edmund P. Sullivan in reports filed with the court, California asked that the report be rejected, while Arizona and Nevada sought only small changes.

California said in its answering brief that the "incredible result" of acceptance of the report and the views of the other states would be that California would receive only 38 million acre-feet of Colorado river water.

The brief maintained that this was less than the 4.5 million acre-feet to which it agreed in 1922 and which "Arizona stockmen have conceded to be ours beyond all controversy."

The California brief also said that Nevada's claim that it was the only state with an interest dependent on Colorado river water was "immaterial and irrelevant."

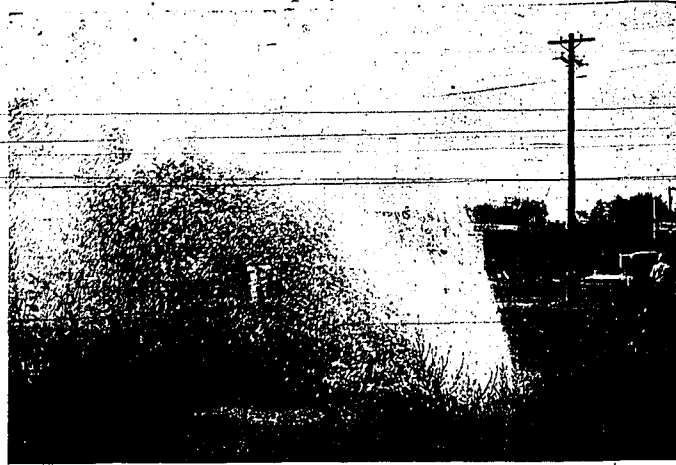
It ridiculed what it said was Nevada's contention that California could get needed water from the Fresno river project and through the conversion of sea water to fresh water.

"If Nevada's water rights predictions are as optimistic as her population forecasts, both should be taken as a large dose of salt," the brief said, in calling attention to a 66 per cent error in a Nevada population forecast for Clark county.

Arizona's brief accused California of taking an "unethical approach" to the case. It said "misrepresentation and misstatement" of the California department had produced a brief "designed to mislead rather than to inform."

The Nevada brief said it was clear from the opening briefs that California was "not in good faith" with California. It said the application to Nevada proposed by Fresno was "fair and just and should be sustained."

### Two Breaks Being Repaired In Old Water Main for City

Twin Falls water department personnel are repairing two breaks in a 24-inch wooden line which broke about 2 p.m. Monday two miles south of the city on highway 71.

One break, the larger of the two, is next to Pat's Grocery and the other is just north of there.

The wooden line was installed about 1918, reports Kenneth Leazer, superintendent of the filter plant. The line is two miles long and has not been taken out because it adds 20 pounds more pressure to the city water supply, says Paul Newton, city engineer.

Water from the large break, near Pat's Grocery, spurted water about 40 feet into the air. Engineer-Newton reported the break in the wooden main was the third major one this year. He said crews were attempting to patch the hole, which was as large as a man's fist, and expected to have repair work ready for testing by late afternoon.

Service to the city was not interrupted by the break, Newton said the only result that would be noticed in the city would be slightly less pressure.

### Rules Noted For Lincoln 4-H Entries

SHOSHONE, Aug. 13—All boys and girls enrolled in 4-H club work in Lincoln county in 1961 are eligible to compete for the various awards and in different classes or contests.

All record books and stories must be turned in to the county agent's office by Aug. 21. No exhibits will be judged unless this evening of Aug. 21 at the fairgrounds barn. Exhibits for some special reasons, exhibits must not be removed before 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 26.

Club members must provide both feed and straw and arrange for animals' care while on exhibit. Each club will be expected to clean its section of the barn. All animals will be judged on quality of animals by divisions and then all animals will be judged on fitting and showing by years of members in club work, first, second and third years and over.

Two entries for each member will be allowed to each division. Members can enter as many divisions as they wish, but cannot use the same animal in two divisions.

In fat animal class, a pen of five or less will be considered as one entry. Only one pen of animals will be allowed but a member can use one animal from the pen or another animal at the other entry.

In fitting and showing a 4-H member must show his own animal and only one animal in each project will be allowed, according to fair board members.

The areas are: West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Michigan and Minnesota.

The action makes the areas eligible to apply for federal financial assistance under the 200 million dollar program authorized by Congress this year. The assistance is given for specific economic development projects aimed at creating permanent new jobs.

The seven areas are northern Minnesota, Johnson, Pa., Logan, Miss. and Webster, W. Va., and Canton, Mich.

### Clues Found to Mental Disease

ORONO, Aug. 13 (AP)—A leading psychiatric researcher declared here yesterday that scientists are reaching a breakthrough in their search for the cause of an ailment affecting more than one-third of all hospitalized patients in the United States.

The disease is schizophrenia, more commonly called split-personality, a mental ailment characterized by loss of touch with reality and gradual disintegration of the human personality.

Schizophrenia is by far the most common of diseases requiring hospitalization as well as one of the most serious, said Dr. William Malmsted, New York City, but clues to the cause of the disease now are turning up after 27 years of research.

### Rehearing Is Called in San Joaquin Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13 (AP)—Two litigants in a dispute over San Joaquin river water stores behind the Friant dam were granted a rehearing yesterday by the U.S. court of appeal.

The court will reconsider its ruling of last March 21 that the U.S. bureau of reclamation had power to settle water from storage behind the dam—by directing downstream farmers in advance how much would be left for their use.

That decision came on an appeal of an injunction issued by U.S. District Judge Pison Hill in 1957. The injunction barred further operation of the dam east of Fresno unless farmers' water rights were observed.

Federal authorities said Hills' ruling threatened the huge Central valley project, of which Friant dam is a part. The appeals court said in its March ruling that the dam—its power to acquire the water in question and may do so through physical seizure.

The suit was begun by 13 Riverside landowners who said their water rights were violated without compensation. They were joined later by the city of Fresno and by local irrigation districts.

In yesterday's action, the appeals court granted rehearings asked by the California Department of Water Resources and the southern San Joaquin municipal utilities district.
