Warning that Moscow was using Berlin in an effort to split the allies, Brandt declared: "If the communists are not stopped at the Brandenburg gate, they will not be stopped at the Rhine."

As he spoke, West Berlin police recently leading a line of demonstrators to expand on their already existing ban on entry to the city.

But telephone calls from West Germany to West Berlin, which were not being accepted in East Germany, and German guards all along the border said the arrival of East Germans at crossing points was still stopped.

Freight trains and trucks were permitted to travel in both directions between East and West Berlin, going into East Germany.

Forest Fire Loss Big, and No End to Blazes in Sight

Although millions of dollars of timber have gone up in smoke in Idaho's wilderness lands this summer, forest officials say the monetary end still is not in sight because of "deadly tinder-dry" conditions.

In U. S. forest region four, which takes in all of southern Idaho and a wide swath of the states, about 36,325 acres of rich timber stands have been reduced to black stumps and ashes. Authorities are not attaching a price tag to the value of the trees lost, but they know that it has cost about 2 1/2 million dollars—just to stop—rampaging flames to date this summer.

The wild-burning Corp. crews fire, largest forest inferno in the Gen state this summer, took a 1/4 million dollar chunk of that figure before crews managed to tame the conflagration.

The rest of Idaho, which is part of region one with headquarters at Missoula, Mont., like region four, has already seen

a year ago. He said there were 327 blazes altogether last summer.

Twitcheil said 25,000 acres of range land have burned at a "put-out" cost of \$122,700 with about a month to go in the season.

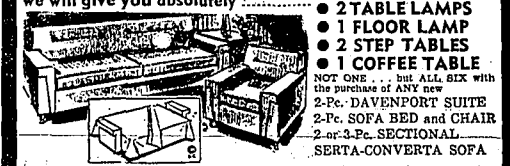

Incomes Hit New Record During July

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—The Commerce department disclosed today the total of individual incomes of all kinds climbed in July to a new high.

Based on industrial production, the month and the lofty money wage and salary rates, the figures reflect a strong mid-summer economy that is expected to generate still higher output, income and possibly employment.

The department said "payroll" in July was "outstanding" in the history of the nation, especially in manufacturing, construction, transportation and services. Increased defense spending promoted more progress in the last few months.

In the next few months, the department expects more take-home pay for wage and salary workers than in any month since the federal reserve board that the factory, mine and utility activity has a new high last month.

The Bureau's index of industrial production rose to 112—creating the former record of 111 which stood for 16 months. The new record means that industrial output last month was 12 per cent higher than in 1957, the last year represented as 100 on the index.

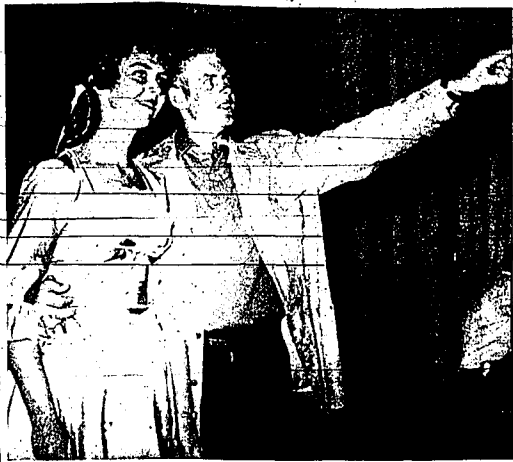
One important dark spot stood out in the otherwise bright economic picture. Unemployment has persisted at nearly seven per cent of the labor force, the rate which is the bottom of the 1961 recession. Labor economists are hopeful it will come down to six per cent by the end of the year.

With an eye on possible inflationary pressures stemming from the Berlin military buildup, the board said that "prices of basic commodities generally have advanced little change" since the increased defense spending was announced by President Kennedy on July 25. However, there have been some increases in prices of raw soap and a few other sensitive industrial materials," the board said.

Personal income reached a record annual rate of \$419.2-billion in July, the Commerce department said. Including payments of \$13 million dollars in dividends to more than 27 million veterans with GI benefits, the annual rate was \$414 billion dollars.

July was the sixth month in a row that personal income advanced and the fourth consecutive year high.

BERKLEY, Calif., Aug. 16 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson has called for a more powerful United Nations "if the world is to be saved from disaster."

He said the U. N. should be the policeman inspecting disarmament agreements and nuclear test bans, and ultimately "with the aid of a strong force capable of deterring or subduing the atomic combinations which might be used against it."

Stevenson, American ambassador to the U. N., spoke at outdoor ceremonies opening the 11th annual convocation of the International Astronomical union at the University of California, Berkeley.

About 1,000 astronomers and delegates from 58 nations are expected to attend the 11-day session, including 50 from Russia.

Extra 23.5 Millions Voted For Catching Tax Cheaters

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—Congress has voted an extra 23.5 million dollars to catch tax cheats.

The senate and house yesterday approved a treasury-vested appropriation bill under which 3,650 new employees will be hired by the internal revenue service. The figure includes an extra \$3 million spent on more field offices.

The treasury has said it loses \$1 billion in revenue partly because it lacks the manpower to check thoroughly every return.

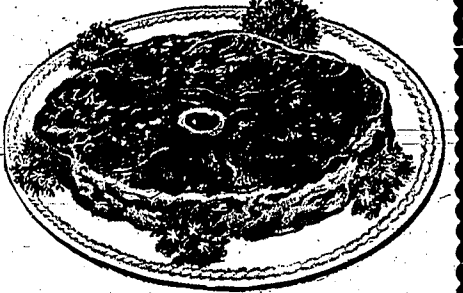

Reactions to Free Silver Market Mild

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Senators from the silver states reacted today with something less than elation to a proposal in opposition to a perennial call for a free silver market.

A bill introduced by Sen. John O. Pastore, D., R., I., to repeal the silver purchase laws resulted in a negative but cautious reaction from the "silver senators" of the West.

Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho, said he was "strongly opposed" to repeal or modification of the law under which the treasury is required to buy silver offered to it for 60 cents an ounce.

Compromise Sought For AEC Project

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—The senate has appointed conferees to seek a compromise agreement with the house over a disputed proposal to authorize an atomic generated public power project at Hanford, Wash.

The \$5 billion dollar project is the sole point of contention between rival senate and house versions of a bill authorizing appropriations totaling more than 400 million dollars to finance the atomic energy commission in the current fiscal year.

The conference committee of five senators and three house members now will take over and seek to thrash out an agreement on which the two chambers can agree.

The senate has voted to approve the project. The house, however, has rejected it and instructed its conferees to hold to this decision.

After the senate agreed to the conference, Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson then designated conferees including Henry Dvorak, R., Ida.

The Hanford project is backed by the Kennedy administration and opposed by private power interests and legislators from coal mining areas. It would add electric power generating facilities to a new plutonium reactor now under construction.

Japan's Tojo Saw U. S. and Russian War as Inevitable

TOKYO, Aug. 16 (AP)—Wartime Prime Minister Hideki Tojo predicted in a statement last before his execution on Dec. 23, 1948, that a third world war between the United States and the Soviet Union "is inevitable."

The statement was published by the newspaper Tokyo Shinjūn. The document was dictated to a Buddhist priest with instructions that it be made public.

"The third world war will be between the United States and the Soviet Union. It will take place in the Far East. I would like to say a few words to the Americans who are now in actual control of Japan. I would like to ask them not to alienate the feelings of the Japanese people. I would like to ask them not to allow Japan to become communized."

"They (Americans) must recognize the sincerity of the people of East Asia and cooperate with them. In fact, I believe that failure to obtain the cooperation of the people of East Asia was the cause of Japan's defeat."
