### Canada Aids Expert Who Flees Russia

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (AP)—A private investigator, Soviet chemist, Mikhail A. Klotchko, remained in a secret hideout today after slipping away from a party of visiting Soviet scientists and taking political asylum in a Canadian city.

Klotchko, 39, had been awarded the Stalin prize and order of Lenin for his work in the field of Soviet scientific circles. He is a specialist in organic chemistry.

In Moscow, the Soviet foreign ministry declined comment on the defection. Spokesmen at the Soviet Academy of Science and the Soviet Academy of Organic Chemistry claimed they had never heard of Klotchko.

Commissioner G. W. Harvison, who took Klotchko under this protection, described him as a chemist of "considerable world importance."

Harvison said last night he preferred to let Klotchko live on his own story of what motivated his defection but that the Russians wanted a good story before deciding whether to meet newsmen.

The 1930s Klotchko was in a group of Soviet scientists that came to Canada early in August for the 18th International Congress on Pure and Applied Chemistry in Montreal and stayed on to do research.

Klotchko is a widower, 50 years old, who lived in the Soviet Union.

Dr. Alan D. West, assistant professor of chemistry at the University of Ottawa, said he had a contact over whom Klotchko's published work and on the basis of this contact he decided to give Klotchko "strong strategic importance to Canada."

### Nations Not Taking Sides Over Berlin

LONDON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Leaders of many of the world's noncommunist nations, according to reports, are avoiding taking sides in the Berlin crisis. A check by The Associated Press shows that among the 58 states in the United Nations, the Western powers appear to be winning most support among the neutrals.

The nonaligned countries tend to support moves toward a "cold peace" by many of the big-power groupings. But neutral leaders would like to see a settlement between East and West Germany.

Peking has shown carefully, he told the Indian parliament, one side of the Berlin crisis, but he fears if the question of western access rights to Berlin was considered, he would have to advise Chinese officials to travel to Berlin.

Nehru has received a letter from Soviet Premier Khrushchev setting out the Soviet Union's position on the Berlin crisis, but the contents have not been disclosed. Last week Nehru held long discussions with the British, U.S. and West German.

Hensel said they hope to complete their trip to Seattle tomorrow at Atlantic City, N. J.

### Exports Hit Record Mark During Year

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Exports of U. S. farm products hit a record \$4,844,000,000 in the year ending June 30, according to a report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The 1950 exports were 10 percent more than the previous year and were five per cent larger than the previous record of \$4,758,000,000 in 1949-50, when exports were stimulated by the Korean crisis.

Substantial increases in wheat and cotton shipments accounted for much of the gain in 1950-51. Exports increased also for soybeans, tobacco, hides and skins, poultry products and meat. Feed grains, rice and dairy products changed relatively little.

Exports for totals totaled \$2,400,000,000 in 1950-51, compared with \$2,213,000,000 in the previous year. Government product shipments increased to \$1,549,000,000 in 1950-51 from \$1,514,000,000 in the previous year.

Wheat and flour made up more than half of the shipments under the government program.

### Exiles Plan Invasion of Cuba Again

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 17 (AP)—A second invasion of Cuba is planned in the work of a spokesman for a right-wing junta of Cuban exiles, said a source here today.

Oscar Delgado, an exiled Cuban, said some 250 "communist" were being trained in a Latin American country, which he declined to name.

He said his group, the United Organization for the Liberation of Cuba, has the support of 30 Cuban exile groups in the United States.

Delgado said his organization was not aligned with the Revolutionary Committee of Dr. Jose Miro Cardona, but considered him "too socialist."

The contemplated invasion is to be staged within six months and is led by former high Cuban army and navy leaders under the Paignenio Batista regime.

He said it would succeed where the April landing failed because the junta has the support of 100,000 land owners in Cuba.

Delgado's headquarters here on a road will mission, said the aim of his organization is to overthrow Fidel Castro, restore the democratic constitution and guarantee private property rights.

### Sugar Plan Blasted by West Solon

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Domestic sugar producers are being criticized before the House today by a West Solon.

Rep. Peter H. Dominick, R., Colo., declared "Domestic" is "Secretary of Agriculture Freeman early this morning in a speech before the committee on foreign affairs."

Mr. Dominick said that sugar legislation would not be considered until next year.

"Sugar is a basic necessity of our people, and its future production should not be left to hang in limbo," Dominick said.

"I have been required to govern their operations on a year-to-year basis because a long range program has not been enacted. But the administration now seems to indicate that it couldn't care less about this farm product."

Statements of Freeman and Cooley show, according to Dominick, that the program he is planning the same fate for our sugar growers and the sugar industry as he made up his mind to train for our steel and industrial workers to be sacrificed to the altar of foreign policy.

### Freeman Now Busy Pushing Wheat Policy

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 17 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman announced today he would be busy with the wheat stabilization program in the Aug. 24 referendum.

Freeman said "farmer support of the wheat program is needed in order to maintain the momentum needed for the enactment of future farm legislation."

Freeman said that his trip to the heart of the northern wheat producing area—Freeman added the last of a series of speeches on the wheat situation to department field personnel.

Other speeches in the series would be made at Oklahoma City and Nashville. All were before audiences made up of home country businessmen and conservative state committee members.

Freeman said that the success of the 1951 food grain program triggered now being legislated in order to maintain the momentum in this one-year wheat program will be significant and important in working out a long-range program.

He reiterated that the new program would be "to bring about a decrease in government stocks of about 100 million bushels, to increase in income to wheat producers by 10 to 15 per cent."

"Duke's name for the dog 'almost certainly' saved the little girl's life."

In addition to his medal and collar, Duke was awarded a gold-plated tag, a dog blanket, a year's supply of dog food, and a \$100 U. S. bond in his owner's name.

Ceremonies bestowing Duke's heroism marked the award presentation yesterday.

### Idaho Potato Forecast for '51 Lowered

BOISE, Aug. 17 (AP)—A record Idaho potato crop this year of 270 million tons was forecast yesterday by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The USDA's forecast on this year's fall crop, which was released yesterday, said a yield of 264 million tons is expected. The USDA said the late summer crop will be eight per cent less than that forecast a month ago because of a drought in the state, but it is still 14 per cent greater than last year's summer crop.

The forecast for late summer potatoes is for 131,100 tons, bringing this year's total crop to 270 million tons, practically 20 per cent greater than the 216 million tons produced in Idaho last year.

Total potato crop in the nation is forecast at 12,78 million tons as compared to last year's crop of 12,71 million tons.

Last year, Idaho produced 37 per cent of the nation's potatoes, Clarence E. White, statistician for the USDA in Boise, said.

### Hijacked Jet Returned to U. S. Safely

MIAMI, Aug. 17 (AP)—A hijacked Eastern Airlines prop jet plane was brought back to the United States yesterday by the same crew which took it to Havana at sunset on July 24.

The pilot, Capt. William E. Buchanan, said on his return here the flight was "quite uneventful" except "attempts to steal American passenger planes by hijackers."

Buchanan quoted Cuba's minister of aviation, who signed the release for the 22 million dollar airplane, as saying: "Anyone who would do this thing is crazy."

An 11-man team of mechanics and crewmen was sent to Havana to retrieve the big plane and reported it was in excellent condition.

"I looked as if no one had touched a switch," Buchanan said. "Every paper was left in it was there."

The only markings appeared to be a few "viva Cuba" slogans scrawled in grease on the plane's fuselage.

Still jailed in Havana is the plane's hijacker, former Miami Beach waiter Albert Oquendo, Buchanan reported.

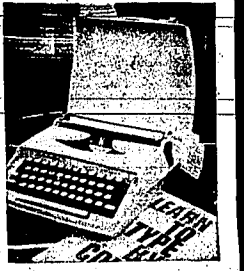

### Atom Power Issue Alive, Solon States

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—Rep. John E. Moss, D., Calif., said today that house members who helped kill the Hanford, Wash., nuclear power proposal "have a surprise coming."

"The body isn't going to rest in peace," Moss said in a news letter to constituents.

"Any legislation that has to have many persuasive arguments in its favor as this measure is bound to come alive and start kicking."

Moss predicted the proposal will be reconsidered next year. Democrats and Republicans joined in killing legislation which would have added power facilities to the Hanford nuclear reactor.

Moss criticized arguments that the nuclear power unit "might imperil the coal industry."

"This myopic viewpoint is almost unbelievable in our nuclear age when we are fighting for our very lives against an enemy fast advancing in scientific achievement," he said.

### U.S. Winning Prestige Lost In Cuba Flop

PUNTA DEL ESTE, Uruguay, Aug. 17 (AP)—The United States has gone a long way at the conference table in Uruguay toward winning back prestige lost on the invasion beaches of Cuba.

It has done this by offering an entire hemisphere of 200 million people a dreamed-of opportunity for a better way of life.

It is called the Alliance for Progress, a 10-year, 20-billion-dollar aid program conceived by President Kennedy.

There is one big string attached. Latin America must do its part by breaking down age-old barriers to economic and social progress. It will not be easy.

Some observers at the Inter-American Economic conference feel that the program, although off to a promising start, may run into the ground with a sickening thud. They point to the obstacles—corrupt administrations, lethargic, greedy landowners unwilling to relinquish their favored plots, and the lack of funds.

But the urgency of the challenge was underlined for many by the presence of Cuba's pro-communist economic czar, Fidel Castro Guevara.

Although he lost no opportunity to take a poke at the United States, Guevara charged fellow Latin Americans, especially the powerful Brazilians, the Bolivians, the Ecuadorians and even the Chileans.

His aim here was to demonstrate with a surprising display of warmth that Cuba wants to stay in the family of democratic Latin American nations, although Prime Minister Fidel Castro's regime has cast its economic lot with the communist system and the communist bloc of nations.

It was a plea for coexistence, and Guevara assured the delegates the Castro regime is not exporting revolution. But he said his government "cannot promise that our example is not followed elsewhere" and that the first condition for economic improvement in Latin America is to put "political power in the hands of the working class."

It was a warning that was not lost on many of the delegates.

### Grizzly Bear To Broadcast Whereabouts

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—The poor grizzly bear in Yellowstone national park. Soon they will be wearing transistor radios that will broadcast, even while they hibernate.

Actually, it's a pity for the grizzly that's behind coupling the bears with plastic collars containing miniature radio sending sets. The National Geographic society said conservationists fear the grizzly may be on the way to extinction.

The society said yesterday, in announcing the project in cooperation with the National Science Foundation, that the radio will serve as a means of keeping tabs on the bears during their wanderings.

The radio will broadcast a continuous signal over a radius of five miles or more, even while the bears are hibernating. But there won't be any notes to disturb the slumbering grizzlies.

The project is part of a long-range study being conducted by Frank and John Creighthead of the Montana Cooperative Wildlife Research unit in an effort to help prevent extinction of the grizzly.

The Creighheads already have solved the problem of putting the collar on the bear. They will catch the bears in steel culvert traps baited with bacon, honey and pineapple juice. Then they will inject a harmless muscle relaxant to quiet the grizzlies while they affix the collar.

### Time Out Asks Fallout Shelter Plan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—The senate was in full debate of foreign aid when it was interrupted for "an important announcement."

The announcement came from Sen. Milton R. Young, R., N. D., who in a brief 10-minute address, advised his colleagues: "Roger Maris, a North Dakota farm-raised boy, hit two more home runs today. We expect him to break the world's record by quite a few."

Young sat down, beaming. The senate went back to work on the foreign aid bill.

Maris, a New York Yankee, with 48 homers, is running ahead of Babe Ruth's record homerun pace.

### County Unit Asks Fallout Shelter Plan

CHICAGO, Aug. 17 (AP)—A resolution urging the federal government to build fallout shelters around cities and to offer tax incentives to citizens building home shelters was adopted yesterday by the National Association of County Officials.

The resolution asked that group shelters be constructed in ecologically sound sites to complement President Kennedy's program of equipping existing buildings with survival facilities.

The 2,500 delegates, representing more than 8,000 elected county officials, called on congress to bolster construction of home shelters by providing income tax exemptions for money spent to build them.

The four-day convention closed after former words from Frank Bill, director of the office of civil and defense mobilization and Maj. Gen. Harold R. Maddux, vice commander of the continental air command.

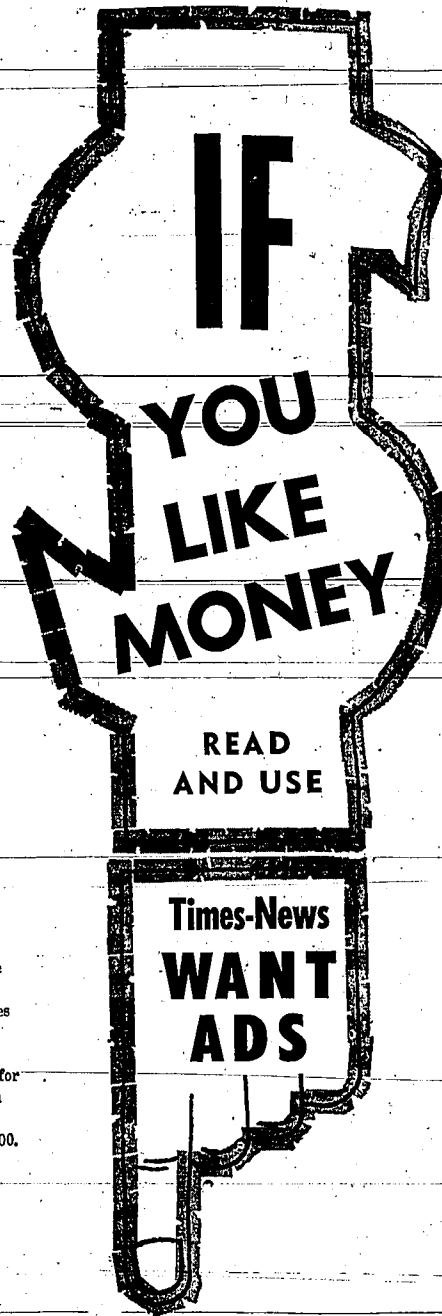
Bill, in the event of a nuclear attack, fallout shelters could save 40 to 50 million persons living in vulnerable target areas.

Maddux said 200 "recovery squadrons" are now being formed from 35,000 air force reservists. The special groups would coordinate operations at civilian air fields servicing planes from air bases which may be destroyed.

### French Meet Crisis; Slate Arms Boost

PARIS, Aug. 17 (AP) — France announced today it is boosting its military forces to meet the mounting Berlin crisis. President Charles de Gaulle interrupted his mid-August vacation to discuss Berlin with the national defense committee. Afterwards, the communist government said France is stepping up its army and air force strength both in West Germany and at home. Various decisions were taken concerning the reformation of ground and air defenses both in Germany and in the national territory, the announcement said. These decisions will be announced today they have been agreed on. They were made necessary by the state of tension resulting from the moves already undertaken by the British and those that might occur in the future. The statement added that the French government "while taking the necessary steps, remains ready to promote a broad and sincere international relaxation of tension which alone, in its opinion, would make it possible to undertake useful negotiations." The statement gave no indication of the steps France plans. However, France recently brought back a full division crack troops from battle-torn Algeria and was reported planning to bring back a second full division, which "is expected" to France recently, still is stationed in the Far East. The division has been turned over to the North Atlantic Treaty organization (NATO) command, although technically France should have four NATO divisions. In actual fact, it has only about two divisions in Germany under NATO command. The wording of the communiqué was couched in the type of language that indicated it had been drafted by De Gaulle himself, this further underscored the importance of the meeting.

Beef steaks, roasts, chops and shoulders—run beef a close second on the list of specialties.

Price of lamb is among the specials in some sections. Fish specials are shrimp, scallop, amlets and flounder. Egg prices are in a seasonal rise as production declines because of hot weather. Advantages range up to eight cents a dozen. Now arrivals continue to freshen the vegetable and fish markets.

Best vegetable buys are beta, cabbage, celery, cucumber, eggplant, romaine lettuce, peppers, eastern potato, onion, butter-nut and yellow acornish neck squash, and watercress.

Good buys include—broccoli, carrot, cauliflower, cauliflower, kale, iceberg, and big Boston lettuce, mushrooms, okra, yellow melon, tomatoes, parsley, western russet potato, radishes, green squash and tomato.

Best buys among fruits are watermelon, cantaloupe, honeydew melon, melons, limes, nectarines and lemons.

Apples—blueberries—cranberries—melons, mangoes, peaches, pears, plus small California oranges are good buys.

**Nearly Four Million People Flee Red Germany Since '45**

BERLIN, Aug. 17 (AP)—Since 1945 nearly four million persons have fled from East Germany into West Germany.

From 1949 when exact figures first were recorded, the total of refugees crossing the border into West Germany and West Berlin had reached 2,624,699 up to last June 30, the estimated number of refugees reaching West Germany from the East has been 46,000, missing the 1950 total to about 150,000.

The greatest mass exodus of refugees from East Germany to the West was in 1949, the year of the abortive East Berlin uprising, when 321,200 persons fled to the West.

Officials estimate that the number of persons fleeing East Germany has ebbed and flowed in close relation to East-West ties. In 1950, a relatively anti-Communist year, the figure jumped to 120,188 in 1950, the year of US and the disastrous summit.

Until this week's East German clampdown on the border between East and West Berlin, the 1951 refugee total appeared headed for an all-time record. In recent weeks refugees from East Germany were arriving at times at a rate of one every 30 seconds.

All bona fide refugees must register with West German authorities at the Marienriede reception center outside West Berlin. They are housed and fed by the West German government. The number of meals served at the center has run into the millions. The number of meals has not fanned. Every effort is made to speed the refugees out of the

**Such western "defectors," according to Berlin spokesmen, usually are in one of three categories: They are youths seeking to evade service in the West German army; men or women deserting their respective spouses, or people who are returning to former homes.**

At the center, each refugee must answer a detailed questionnaire on his background and why he has left the East for the West. Then there is a waiting period while he is investigated. Officials claim that the questionnaire-interrogation and investigations are pretty sure to turn up any "Trojan horse" communist spies.

Once a refugee has been accepted, he goes before an examining board of three men. They ask him where he would like to go in West Germany and he makes the choice on the basis either of where he has relatives or where the best jobs are available in his line of work.

West Germany, booming economically, has a ready labor market. When the destination is settled he gets a free airplane ticket and is sent on his way. Pioneers out of Tempehoid airport are crowded with refugees being flown to West Germany.

In contrast to the huge numbers of persons coming into West Germany from the East, there is a relative trickle of West Germans going the other way. No exact figures are available but West German authorities have estimated the number at about 30,000 a year in the last 15 years. They state that about 40 percent of those going to East Germany come back, usually within a year.

**Dickens Slept Only in Bed Facing North**

CHICAGO (AP)—Charles Dickens would also sleep in a bed only if the headboard faced north, according to E. W. Howe, the Kansas editor, once remarked. "There is only one thing people like that is good for them: good nights sleep."

These and other oddities concerning famous men and beds were collected recently by the World's Electronic Company, instrument manufacturers, in compiling "A Sleep Reader for Insomniacs."

They also discovered: The ancient Egyptians are credited with putting beds on legs in an attempt to get the sun to go under, not over, them while they were asleep.

The famous bed of Ware was accommodated 43 steps, it belonged to King Edward IV of England who could fit 34 or more persons in the trundle bed which slipped underneath.

Benjamin Franklin was of the opinion that women necessary more sleep than men. He advocated "six hours for a man, seven for a woman, and eight for a fool."
