Now Prime the Pump

Record industrial production for the nation during July was announced by the other day and now the commerce department follows up with the report that individual incomes of all kinds also climbed to a new high in July.

How much time has elapsed since the Kennedy administration and this nation's business and industry have been in a recession? Only five months ago, the politicians—and bureaucrats—were scurrying around digging up money to "prime the pump" to help the nation out of a recession that reflected more gloomy talk than an actual decline in the nation's economy.

As a matter of fact, a good share of the money designed to prime the pump hasn't been spent yet. The added funds will be expended with the greatest economy by thumping away at a record rate. The net result can only be more inflation.

Actually, the situation is even worse than that. Funds to combat the recession are being spent at an increasing rate because of the Berlin crisis. The two factors combined probably will push the nation's economy to a new record rate every month for the remainder of the year.

Anyone who contends that inflationary forces will not gain along with production records and added personal income just isn't being realistic. Actually, the commerce department is quite mindful of the presence of inflation. Checking inflationary pressures as a result of the Berlin crisis, the department found some increases in prices of "steel scrap and a few other sensitive industrial materials."

Personal income records reported by the commerce department for 1951 revealed just how unnecessary it was to increase federal expenditures in an effort to fight Mr. Kennedy's recession. The department notes that July was the sixth consecutive month during which the national economy increased and the fourth consecutive month in which a new record was established.

Sometimes it's virtually impossible to escape the conclusion that politicians and bureaucrats spend public funds just for the sake of spending.

REBELLION

# Green Bean Harvester Used to Gather Crop in Contracted Job in Valley



This is the bean harvester that is used to harvest the contracted crop of green beans for California Packing corporation, south of Burley and Murlough. At the front end of the tractor are vito lifters and at the sides are the bean pickers, which take the green beans into the conveyor without the stems. (The stems remain on the field, still rooted in the ground. The green beans are partially cleaned by the vito lifters (below the motor near the umbrella), and they are carried to the boxes that ride the platform in back. The machine takes two rows at a time. ### Canning Firm Pleased With Area Crop Of Green Beans Used for Experiments

California Packing corporation, one of the largest canners of vegetables in the world, is harvesting a crop of green beans, right "off the stump" on several farms south of the Burley-Murlough area.

Yields have been running generally from two to four tons to the acre for this new experimental crop. James Countryman, Oregon, assistant to the company's division operations manager, said he is pleased with results for the second successive year of the experiment.

California uses mechanical pickers to harvest the crop of green beans and water-type beans, and after the machines roll down the rows, they leave behind them rows of green stems and twigs, which are burned.

Countryman said he and Paul Sharp, Burley, fieldman, are recommending to farmers that they disc under the green residue immediately after harvest. The harvesting of green beans is new to Magic Valley in industry which customarily raises garden beans for seed for canners in other parts of the United States. This experiment of California, some farmers are hoping will lead to the development of a canning industry in the valley.

Agreeing to contract this year with California Packing Corporation, which is known for its Del Monte line of canned products, is faster than it was last year, but it is still an experimental acreage.

Countryman said that California's long-range plan for the crop in the valley is still indefinite. It will be influenced largely by results of future experiments and marketing developments throughout the United States.

General yield averages have been running between two and four tons to the acre. The price of green beans is about 10 cents a bushel, and the first week in June, and the schedule is arranged by company fieldmen on least units basis for harvesting purposes.

Irrigation methods vary between fields and farms, but the green beans are supposed to be kept wet and irrigated within four or five days of harvest. Since the rows are spaced so widely apart, fieldmen for the company sometimes urge farmers to make two crops between each row of beans on every other row, or to make one crop in each row but close to

the beans. The beans begin readying for harvest, said Countryman, toward the latter part of July and are harvested up to the end of August. They are harvested when they are still green, fleshy and can make good grades and good yields. The mechanical picker is built to harvest beans only in 36 to 38-inch rows. One operator handles the tractor and another man rides on the platform in back watching the green beans as they fall down from the conveyor and for signs of machine malfunctioning. The machine takes two rows at a time, and averages about seven acres of beans a day. At the front of the machine are lifters, the same as on the front of standard bean cutters. 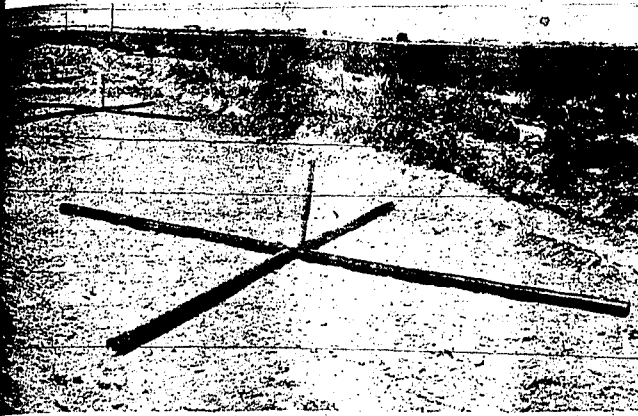
### Long-Term Credit Given Gem Farmers Is Highest

BOZEMAN, Aug. 13— Idaho farmers and ranchers here borrowed \$10,200,000, and Oregon, \$6,000,000, of long-term credit from the Federal Land bank of Spokane in the fiscal year ending June 30. This is the most borrowed by any of five states.

Montana borrowed 16 million dollars; Washington and Alaska borrowed \$10,200,000, and Oregon, \$6,000,000. Total figures show this was the largest dollar volume of credit extended in any one year since the bank opened for business, added Fred A. Knutsen, bank president. Thirty product, credit associations in the four northwestern states also were reported to have extended almost a quarter billion dollars of short-term credit to farmers and stockmen for the fiscal year. The Federal Intermediate Credit bank of Spokane, a major source of PCA loan funds, showed that of farm and ranch operators used more than 226 million dollars of credit from the association in the fiscal year. This was an all-time high for a 12-month period. The PCA associations now owe more than 32 per cent of the bank's capital stock, a program that the associations initiated in 1931 to buy out the government's investment in the bank.



### Much Work Necessary to Prepare Beds for Bees; Then Insects Drill Holes

### Enterprising Farmers Are Investing In Alkali Bees to Help Alfalfa Seed

Starbuck, July 21—A few farmers around the valley have spent large sums of money this year buying alkali bees and building bee hives. And also if predators like bomber flies don't kill them off. The bees will multiply in a season at the ratio of about five to one. Correct conditions are provided. The area is first dug with a bulldozer or front-end loader and dirt placed alongside on top of the bank. The bottom is leveled so that water will flow evenly. Polyethylene lining is placed over the bottom of the trench to hold water later and so it will irrigate to the top quickly without seeping through the dirt. A thin layer of dirt is placed over the plastic lining and the place is on it so that it can be filled with water from the top when it is all filled back with dirt. From the bottom of this tile, pieces of perforated tile pipes are extended out along the trench floor. Then dirt is shoveled back down into the trench. With the dirt it mixed tons of salt to make the soil alkaline. About 25 pounds of salt are added for every square foot of soil restored to the trench. Only the tile pipe extends above the surface of the soil when this is all filled in and mixed with soil. Beck pipes water down into this tile with a hose. Water flows down to the bottom, seeps back up to the top and then holds because of the alkali condition of the soil. The plastic underneath makes it impossible for the salt to leach out. The next step is procuring alkali bees. Beck purchased them in the area where they thrive naturally. He saw the area was alive with bees last summer, and then went back when the eggs were all laid in the holes in

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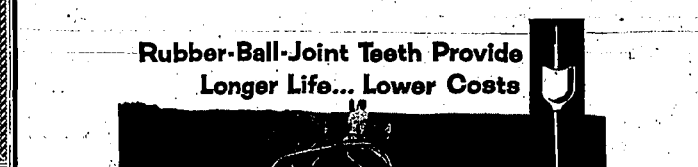

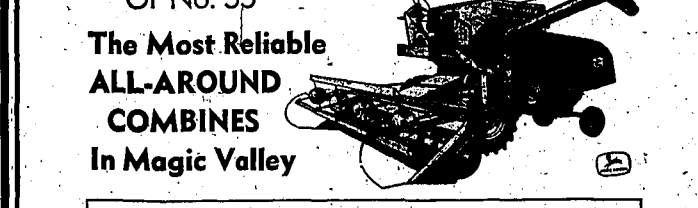

### Hunger in World Is Serious Threat to Survival of West

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — A search for food over large areas of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

Aside from purely humanitarian considerations, hunger is a serious threat to the West's survival. Where large numbers of people are inadequately nourished, the stability of the distressed countries where they live is jeopardized. In a world growing smaller, such centers of unrest are a danger to the other parts of the world.

The distressed areas are already fertile ground for communist propaganda.

The world's depressed areas also present a grave economic problem to the highly industrialized countries of the West.

In the industrialized states is taking place at an ever increasing rate, there is already a problem as to where to find markets for the goods produced.

For example, India, with a population of 438 million, buys no more from the United States than does highly industrialized Switzerland with a population of only five million. Yet the U.S. is India's largest source of supply.

Industrial production in the underdeveloped countries has increased only five per cent since the end of the last war, but the increase in the industrialized

countries of the West has been 45 per cent. Thus the gap between the rich and the poor becomes wider and provides all the elements for an unstable international economic situation.

It is precisely in the famine areas that the population is increasing most rapidly. The highest rate of growth is in Latin America. But the countries in Asia and Africa are not far behind.

Of course, large families are traditional in many of the new independent countries and are even considered a blessing.

But the reason for the population increase also is due to the increasing availability of modern medicine and medical care supplied mostly by the West in competition with Soviet Russia. As a result, infant mortality has dropped and the life span is longer than before.

But it is in these incomplete and inadequate blessings of western civilization that seeds of communist revolution are contained. As the U.N. survey noted, "the additional years that modern society now bestows on man are unhappy ones."

All in the underdeveloped countries is no longer a question of charity which can be measured or even justice which can be paid off indefinitely. Raising their standard of living is the only means by which the West can check communist expansion and assure its own political and economic survival.

Unless the non-communist industrialized countries assist them with technical knowledge, capital and by utilizing their own energies in moving toward social and economic development, they will become easy prey for Russia and Communist China.

### Bank Report On Loans for Latins Asked

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP)—Sen. Henry Dworshak is calling for a complete report by the export-bank on its South American loans.

The senate senator from Idaho expressed concern over reports of "threat of the Chilean government to curtail the mining interests and lower the possibility of repayment on loans already made."

He noted many industries are interested in the investment of American tax dollars in South America since much of the money used is to stimulate production "that competes with Idaho's mining and agricultural industries."

"Dworshak called for the report as a Senate foreign aid appropriations hearing.

"I think while Congress is devoting more aid to comply with administration requests to give away American dollars in South America that in fact in this country are interested in knowing to what extent they have already been expended and what they may expect in the future," he said.

"Some of the reports of these days, will become alerted as are American people already, as a result of dealing directly with these countries in South America.

"I think we ought to know specifically and correctly what situation confronts us now so that we may be able to move in that direction. It is necessary that programs we are promoting do the job they are intended to do and not promote nationalization of industry nor help the rich get richer and not improve over all living standards."

"We have millions of dollars of American investments, dollars already invested there, and we should get a close check on what is happening in these areas with our dollars before we blindly commit more. Cuba is still fresh in the mind, and it is not up into a very sinister threat, not only to the economic life of these nations and jeopardized under which our government is placed, but also that if we do not develop a friendly atmosphere and to actually help these nations, then we have to face the real problems facing us," he said.

### Second Move Reported for Road System

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP)—The administration, for the second time this week, has moved to speed highway building while stimulating the economy.

The commerce department yesterday allocated nearly \$1 billion dollars in federal aid money to the states for highway construction for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1951.

On Tuesday, President Kennedy directed the commerce department to release more than \$1 billion dollars in highway funds for this fiscal year which normally would not have been available to the states until Oct. 1. It was the second time this year Kennedy had let highway

money go early as a spur to the economy.

Yesterday the commerce department announced a list of state allotments for fiscal 1951 which totaled 3.1 billion dollars.

The total broke down into 2.4 billion dollars for the interstate highway program and \$697,750,000 for the "ADP program" of federal aid for primary and secondary road systems.

### Reds Set Record

MOSCOW, Aug. 18 (AP)—A jet-powered Soviet flying boat of the MiG class has flown 810 miles in an hour—565 miles—setting a world record, the Soviet press reported yesterday.

The present airplane record of 440.57 miles per hour was set in Italy before World War II.

This came out in court yesterday when another suit was filed in the case. J. H. Winkler, Rath, widow of Miss Lombard's publicity man, Otto Winkler, also killed in the crash, seeks \$100,000 from Gable's estate.

Mrs. Rath, now married to businessman Ted Rath, charged that Gable had promised her that he would provide a \$100,000 annuity for her after Winkler's death if she did not file suit against the airline. She settled

### Defecting Scientist Believed To Have No Military Secrets

OTTAWA, Aug. 18 (AP)—Canada has discounted any idea that the defecting Soviet scientist Mikhail Antonovich Klotzko is a bearer of military secrets but disclosed that the Soviet embassy tried to talk him into going home.

Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, Justice Minister David Fulton and Royal Canadian Mounted Police all figured in the series of discussions following Klotzko's successful appeal for asylum.

Fulton said the Soviet chemist looked asylum here because "there was no intellectual freedom in Russia" and "everything is done subject to direction."

He added that Klotzko expressed a desire for freedom to go on with his work in Canada.

But the nature of the prize-winning scientist's work developed into something of a mystery. A search of standard reference works in Europe turned up no listing for him, but a leading British chemist said the fact that he went to a world meeting on pure and applied chemistry in Canada attested to his standing in Soviet science. The chemist added that many leading Soviet scientists are rarely published abroad.

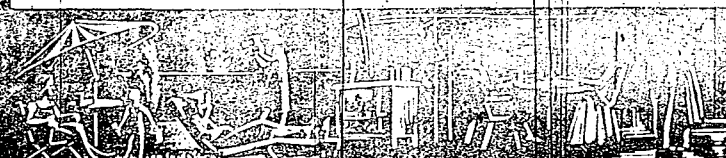

### Author Views Sheppard Case After Seven Years

The Sheppard murder case by Paul Holmes (McKay): It has been nearly seven years since Dr. Samuel Sheppard was convicted of second degree murder for bludgeoning to death his pregnant wife Marilyn in a Cleveland suburb. This book is a review of the case including the unsuccessful legal appeals.

The conviction was based on circumstantial evidence, a fact which often leads some people to wonder whether the defendant was innocent. The author thunders the defendant's innocence.

Holmes says "it was never my purpose in this book to make out a case for Samuel Sheppard. If this has been done, it is the facts that have done it."

He has performed a service in clearing up a point in the appellate stages of the case. The defense contended a specimen of blood found on the shirt which contained a factor which indicated the presence of an outsider—an "intruder," as the defense contended. Holmes consulted blood experts and ascertained that the blood on the shirt, this specimen actually indicated the blood was of the same group as Sheppard. ### Meal Dialing Is in Future

MEANS PARK, Calif., Aug. 18 (AP)—The Home Economics Institute director for the U. S. Agriculture Department says that by 1960 a housewife may be able to "dial a feast" in the morning and have it ready to serve at the stove in 10 minutes.

Reporting in the Stanford Research Institute Journal, Dr. Hazel Stubbington envisioned several such possibilities for the kitchen of 1960.

"In fact," she said, "there may not even be a kitchen at all in 1960."

Gold surface cooking and gas from flexible pipes with safe means of plugging in at different points will be developed, together with electricity from fuel cells.

With these improvements, a meal could be cooked in the room where it is served. Other facilities would have to accompany this development, such as built-in or mobile refrigerating and waste disposal units and hot and cold water disposal.

All of this equipment would blend with the design of the room.

### Listen to Recordings as You Tackle Routine Job

A frequent lament among homemakers is their lack of time for reading. The steady, unremitting round of housewifery duties leaves little time for relaxed reading and even less for reading material that requires greater concentration.

At the end of a full day, concentration powers are at low ebb, and eyes fall shut if confronted by anything more demanding than light fiction, a woodcut or the newspaper comics.

One of the interesting points about the new record players is the introduction of a three-speaker stereophonic high fidelity. One new one, for example, could be carried to the kitchen counter or the basement work area.

Unique Speakers

Speakers in two detachable wires can be unclipped from the unit to give a three-dimensional blending of sounds. While this is of importance to clarity of musical performance, the spoken word benefits from the richer sound reproduction, too.

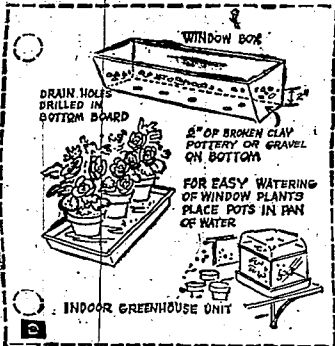

## Try Window Garden, It Could Be Blooming Fun

When space is limited, window gardening lets you exercise your green thumb inside all year long. Indoor plantings or outside window boxes add color and beauty to your home.

New miniature plants and old flower favorites complement each other in window boxes. You can even have a private vegetable patch or herb garden if you like. Choose Durable Violets for an outside window box, choose durable wood such as cedar, redwood or cypress if possible. They resist rot better. Make it 6 to 10 inches deep, depending on the plants you want to grow; about 15 inches wide at the top and 12 inches at the bottom. Length depends on your windows. Drill a row of one-half to one-inch holes along the top edge of the bottom board for drainage. This prevents rain from filling the box and dripping down on your wall.

Place between one and two inches of gravel on the bottom. Next, add soil if you wish to plant directly in the soil. Mix two parts good garden soil with one part peat moss and one part sand. Add a pound or two of dried cow manure or mix in least mold if available.

The Mixtures  
If you plan to use changeable potting plants for variety, place a mixture of peat moss, perlite, peat moss and the clay pebbles in the window box. This conserves moisture and the porous clay pebbles allow plant roots to obtain adequate water.

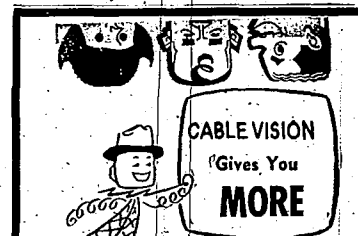

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**Close-up Pictures with Simple Camera Possible**

By United Press International  
The fundamental technique of close-up photography is simple and satisfactory results can be obtained with simple cameras as well as the more expensive and elaborate lens reflex or rangefinder models.  
For the photographer making his first attempt at close-up portraiture, the simple camera, supplementary lens and tripod are required. These lenses are similar in appearance to those used in both black and white and color photography and are relatively inexpensive.

**Watch Distance**  
Adjustable cameras generally permit the photographer to move to within about three feet of the subject. Most fixed-focus cameras cannot be used at distances closer than six feet.  
By using the supplementary lenses for close-up photography it is possible to make it closer. Employing two such lenses, the distance can be narrowed still further.  
For example, a fixed focus camera with a pair of supplementary lenses (fitted over the regular lens) can be used as close as 3 1/2 inches from the subject.

The supplementary lenses come in various powers and have complete instructions for measuring distances from camera to subject. Focusing, viewfinder and exposure are the three most important considerations in close-up work.  
**Accurate Focus Needed**  
Focusing must be accurate because the zone of sharp focus is shortened by the addition of the supplementary lenses. A miscalculation of an inch can throw the center of interest out of focus and spoil an otherwise good shot.

Viewfinding also is important because virtually all simple cameras have the viewfinder above the camera lens. Thus, when the camera is moved in closer than its normal shooting distance, the camera lens will be lower than the subject matter and the top may be cut off. To avoid this, tip the camera upwards slightly.  
One of the most effective and accurate aids in solving the problems of close-up focusing and

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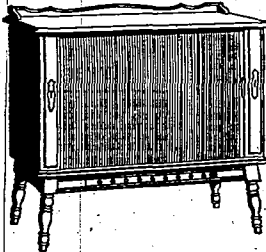
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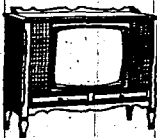

**It's Time for New U.S. Card Craze**

Turry up and deal—while you still know what you're doing. If history holds to course, we've got only about six months before the next big game craze hits the U.S. card table.

And as 122 million of us are card players (and do another five million), even the slightest change in the rules, object or scoring will be a big deal.

At least that's how it's always been: Take a look at the record:

Just about 10 years ago a game called *Chalkie's* started out of Argentina to overwhelm America. In no time its influence spread to women's clothes, accessories, home furnishings—even men's wear.

Earlier Came Gin

A decade earlier the new game was gin rummy. Schedules, contracts and weddings were canceled while grin opponents "had to play one more hand."

Ten years before, in 1932, contract bridge was fusing with the national character. A trumped ace in the rounds for divorce—and still is.

In 1923 it was auction bridge. And before that whist. And so on and on into the past.

And today, all the signs point to a big change coming again. Not only are the most popular 10 years over, but a survey by the card industry shows that Germany's popularity is over, leaving first place open.

Some Being Revived

In addition, the traditional stand-by of games of poker and bridge are showing signs of revival, and specialty games such as an ancient and involved card game called *Tarot* is in demand—only in a ripe time for a fast shuffle and a new deal.

What's on the horizon?

Not much, a 27-year poll by the Association of American Playing Card Manufacturers reveals. The British communalists is still playing blackball. Italy is still playing Scopas and poker. Belgium is still playing whist. And everybody else is still playing *Canasta*.

One new game has turned up, however, in Toronto, New York, Chicago, Miami, Los Angeles and Durban, South Africa. It's called *spile-and-male*. The card makers and merchants are watching it bop—and it still requires two decks and four jokers.

Never Cast Shadows

The fifth joker, unhappy for production planning reasons, is that new game craze never cast their shadow before them.

A man named Harold Vandenberg just happened to invent contract bridge during a cruise. Gin rummy was invented some 30 years before it had by Elwood Baker, a whist teacher in Brooklyn.

And *Canasta*? Who would have guessed that so many people had the stamina to play that one a second time?

**Mixed Again For Walls Is Latest Plan**

CHICAGO, Aug. 18 (AP) — The "shibui" look for walls is textured and translucent.

It is created by coating a textured white base paint with translucent glaze to achieve the subtle, understated, shaded elegance the Japanese call "shibui." The end result should be irregular enough to relieve the dull monotony of perfect uniformity and symmetry, while avoiding gaudy effects.

Textured paints come in a wide choice of colors, so why use a white one and glaze it with color for a "shibui" wall? Decorators use this trick because translucent color added to a textured white base tends to cling to the particles of the base and emphasize the texture with shading. The effect is subtler and deeper than a simple monochrome textured wall would be.

Both professional and weekend painters can achieve a wide variety of finishes with the new "shibui" paints. There are not only different kinds of base—of fine, coarse or intermediate texture—but various techniques of glazing them.

Striking the glaze on irregularly with a brush may produce a wall with a random surface of feather. Using only one thin coat of glaze in a pale color may result in a cloud-like pattern and a second, thicker coat of glaze may produce a surface that looks more like driftwood.

**Artificial Lamp For Heat Noted**

There is something new under the sun, in this case under a cool artificial sun. It is a small incandescent lamp with an incandescent filament that throws off intense light and heat and a reflector that absorbs the heat.

**Ideas Given For Longest Flower Life**

URBANA, Ill., Aug. 18 (AP) — To get the longest life from cut flowers, follow these suggestions of G.M. Fowler, University of Illinois horticulturist.

Pick flowers early in the early morning or late in the evening when the stems are full of water. Cut the stems at an angle, 45 degrees.

Take a container of water with you to the garden and plunge the stems into it immediately. Cutting the stem base at an angle side water up-take.

Indoors, fill a deep container with lukewarm water. After putting flowers in the warm water, place in a cool spot overnight or for a few hours to allow the flowers to "harden off" or take up all the water they can.

Follow manufacturer's directions for use of commercial flower preservatives, available at most flower shops and department stores.

Remove lower foliage on flower stems so it is not submerged in water.

**Dramatic Touch OK in Entrance**

CHICAGO, Aug. 18 (AP) — The decor of an entrance foyer or hall should be in keeping with the rest of the house. It can be more dramatic, but the period and furnishings should not be in complete contrast, decorators advise.

It's best to let walls, ceiling and floor of an entranceway provide the decorative interest and limit furnishings in this small area to a few utilitarian pieces.

If the entranceway is not a separate room, but a partitioned area in view of the living room, decorate it to look like a separate area. Wall coverings generally do the trick.

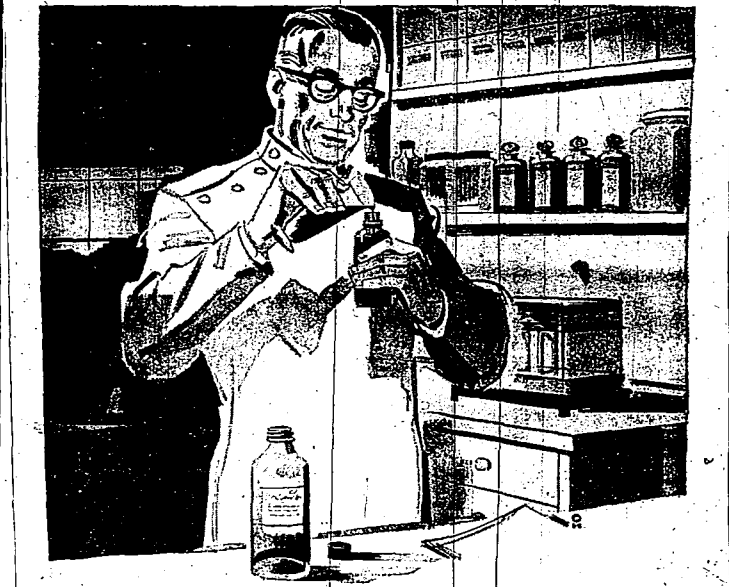

**Argument Over Amplifier for Hi-Fi Unsettled, but Clearer**

By FRESTON McGRAW

The old argument between advocates of high-powered amplifiers and high fidelity music systems and advocates of adequate amplifiers isn't nearly as it used to be.

There never was any question about adequate amplification. There are fewer horn-type speaker systems than there used to be — horn-type systems required less power than others — and adequate amplifiers are more powerful than in the early days of high fidelity.

Inadequate power has a marked effect on the sound that speakers reproduce. It has an especially marked effect upon low frequency sounds, since they take more power to reproduce than high frequency sounds.

Amplifiers also must have enough power to take care of peaks in music. Otherwise, the sound is muddy.

But high fidelity equipment owners can buy amplifiers with more than adequate power. Are they necessary?

Not necessary, but few owners of 50, 60 and 75-watt amplifiers are thinking about trading them in on larger, more powerful models.

An audiophile can tell the difference instantly between high-powered and adequate amplifiers on the same speaker systems. The high-powered amplifiers

**Fiber Glass Roots Give More Light**

Fiber glass roofs for patios, porches and breezeways have attracted considerable popularity because they allow the passage of a large amount of light yet block the transmission of much of the sun's heat.

Since the fiber glass is light in weight and can be worked with ordinary tools, this material has gained wide acceptance among do-it-yourselfers. The panels can be bought with regular flat surfaces or in a number of flat surface variations, but it is the corrugated panels which are the biggest sellers. The corrugations not only have a certain attractiveness, but help to shed rain-water. They come in various colors, with green the most popular.

If you are planning on putting up a fiber glass roof, it is well to know what size panels you will use before the framework is installed. That's because the size of the panels will influence the spacing of the rafters. If the joints fall on the rafters, they will be stronger and will not require as much mastic to be sure they are leakproof. The joints are made by overlapping the panels at least one corrugation.

The panels are nailed to the wooden framing with special aluminum nails with washers that insure watertight seals although it is possible to hammer the nails through the paneling without marring the fiber glass. This must be done so carefully that it is better to drill holes through the roofing material to receive the nails. These holes should be slightly smaller than the size of the nails.

For proper drainage, the framework should have a pitch of at least one inch to every foot. Special metal flashings are available to be used at the point where the panel meets the house. These flashings have corrugations in them to match the corrugations in the panels, insuring tight fits and preventing the passage of water under the seams.

Our national enthusiasm for "going places" extends to the very youngest members of the family. Mobility becomes as important for baby as it does for the adult. It is important to taking him with us to leave him behind with a reliable baby stroller.

The luxury of a baby stroller is reserved for gala adult occasions.

In the spirit of "If you can't lick 'em, join 'em," many a mother has put across her dreams of unnumbered shopping trips or afternoon excursions and concentrated on finding the best and easiest way to transport her little dumpling.

As her onesy you'll make the mistake of trying to carry the baby while you shop. This will teach you that after a half hour's pressure on your arm a 12-pound baby weighs like 130 pounds.

A smooth-running baby carriage for the tiny baby and a free-wheeling stroller for the older child are an economy at any price. If you live a distance from the shopping center, a folding stroller to ride in the car is a must.

A top quality stroller doesn't cost a great deal more but will give a lot better service. It is far easier to maneuver indoors and out and, especially, the resale value is higher. Padded strollers seats support a baby's back and keep her from slumping back to sleeper position.

# Tools Were Meant to Be Kept Sharp; Slip With Dull Tool Can Mean Injury

A sharp tool is not only more useful than a dull one, but it is also safer. A razor edge means that the tool can be used with a minimum of effort. A dull edge generally slips instead of cutting and a slip can mean an injury. Sharpening tools yourself is an easy job. Equipment for grinding and sharpening should be high up on the list of needed tools in any workshop. Without such equipment, even the best becomes useless.

## Homeowner Might Save Cost By Installing Own Tile Floor

Most homeowners are judging the cost of installing vinyl asbestos tile flooring by doing it themselves. According to the Construction Research Bureau, national clearing house for building information, special kits are available which contain a linoleum knife, an ax, chisel and a trowel. Only other items needed are adhesive and flooring material such as asbestos tile, which can be purchased in any room and double wood floors, plywood, masonite underlayment, concrete floor on and below grade, radiant heating and existing rigid floor coverings.

First step is to figure the number of tiles needed. Standard 12-inch tiles come in boxes of 10, which cover about 43 square feet. Therefore, a 10-foot room would require about four boxes. Next, lay a row of unceremented tiles as guides, screw deep lines in the lower tiles with an awl. Then snap off unwanted portions of the lower tiles. Rough edges may be trimmed with sandpaper.

Next, remove the tiles and spread adhesive over both ends. Then rewrap the lines. If the adhesive has dried slightly, then spread adhesive over half the floor. When the adhesive becomes "tacky" or has become tile hard, lay the tiles back into position, snap a chalk line at right angles with the row of tile, parallel with the two walls it connects. Repeat this to obtain a guide line for the second row of tiles.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18 (AP)—New haircuts for men in the "princeton cut." It's achieved by sweeping the hair back from a left-side part and cutting it quite short.

The growing popularity of the new cut was indicated by a survey carried out by a maker of men's toiletries. The survey showed that 60 percent of men's hair styles were more than once or twice in adult life. They do considerable experimenting in their styles, but then settle down to one style with only minor variations in length.
