Three of Six Victims in Buhl Crash

Three of six persons died Sunday as the result of a two-car collision two miles east and two miles north of here on a county road at 5 p.m. Sunday, the worst traffic accident in the history of Twin Falls county. The tragedy nearly wiped out two generations of a southern Idaho family—father, mother, one son, a daughter-in-law and a grandson. Only one person, Ivan Kistler, 26, Eiler, survived the crash. He is at Magic Valley Memorial hospital where he is reported recovering from multiple lacerations and shock. Killed in the crash were the following members of the Kistler family: Albert L. Kistler, 53, and his wife, Mrs. Delma G. Kistler, 48, Buhl, parents of the single survivor; Ivan Kistler's 22-year-old wife, Betty, and their son, Edward Kistler, 4 months old; and Ivan Kistler's younger brother, Michael, 11, Buhl. Judith Anderson, 16, daughter of Mrs. and Mr. Ivan Anderson, Buhl, died at the Magic Valley Memorial hospital.

Ketchum Boy Dies Of Mishap Injuries

KETCHUM, Aug. 21—William H. Klein, Jr., 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Klein, died about midnight Sunday at St. Thomas hospital in Sun Valley after injuries received when he fell off the back of a moving pickup truck about 3:10 p.m. Saturday. His death brought Magic Valley's traffic toll to 31 for the year. It was the first fatality from a trucking accident in Blaine county. Young Klein, who was driving a 1959 Buick Wildcat, was traveling on a road which had been set up in downtown Ketchum for wagon days. The car, which was being driven by his father, was struck by a truck. Young Klein was standing on the back of the truck when it was struck. He was thrown into the air and landed on the road and apparently struck his head.

Idaho may have set several traffic records on its highways this week-end. Twelve people were killed and four more were critically hurt. This brings to 23 the number of people to die from injuries received in traffic accidents in the Gem state in the past eight days and boosts the Idaho traffic toll to 154, 13 more than were recorded on the date last year. Eleven persons died yesterday in a 12-hour period and one critically, which took six lives, and five members of one family.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The chairman of the house-atomics energy committee and two Democratic senators yesterday urged that President Kennedy should seriously consider resuming atomic testing.

The three members of Congress believe Russia is secretly testing nuclear weapons in violation of a 34-month 4-1/2 year moratorium. Rep. Chet Holtfield, D., Calif., chairman of the atomics energy committee, said Kennedy's general feeling that Russia is cheating on tests but is willing to talk the issue to obtain an agreement at Geneva on a nuclear test ban.

New Courses, Longer Hours Offered in Schools of U. S.

What's new in the schools? Courses in how to take notes, for one thing. They're being offered in schools across the country, partly as college preparation, partly, even in elementary grades, as an adjunct to growing television instruction.

More schools, for another. Numbers of schools are lengthening the school day, eliminating study hall periods, offering advanced classes in early morning hours, at noon and on Saturdays.

These, and more, are among the innovations planned for the coming year and reported to the National Education association in a survey of school superintendents in cities of 20,000 to 100,000 population.

Most frequently reported were: More classroom television.

GEORGETOWN, British Columbia, Aug. 21.—A tiny British colony of 25 Indians and Negroes on South America's north coast has a new government today in an election that "political" experts here may describe as the first British Guiana moves on to democratic independence or Bolshevism.

Cheddi Jagan, socialist with communist leanings, has been elected to the colony's politics for eight years, seeks to become the first premier. Opposing the East Indian desire for power over the 83,000 square miles of territory are Forbes Burnham, socialist lawyer leader of the Negro-dominated People's National congress (PNC), and Peter Dugalar, an anti-communist baron of Portuguese origin.

Jagan attacked the United States in an election eve statement and said he would like to see it establish any form of dictatorial regime.

Without denying the necessity of his People's Progressive party (PPP) is communist, he said: "Events in Russia and America have deeply won the hearts of the people of British Guiana and made their fear of communism irrefragable."

His opponents predicted that Jagan, in his first year in office, would lead the colony to a close election with Jagan's party.

Political experts forecast a close election, with Jagan's party winning a form of government, but a new election may be necessary.
