The indications were made Tuesday evening after the officials had spent the day touring the Buhl plant's operations, attending a luncheon hosted by the Buhl Economic council and visiting some local farming areas and observing the agricultural potential of the area.

BERLIN, Aug. 23 (UPI)—Western allied troops, including an entire battle group of 1,500 tank-supported U. S. soldiers, moved up to the tense East-West city border today in swift reaction to new communist travel restrictions. The allies called the moves "illegal" and "brutal." The combat-ready U. S., British and French forces were deployed along the 140-mile border area. The three western commanders denounced the communist travel controls as a "grave restriction on freedom of movement in Berlin." The commanders are taking the necessary actions to insure security and integrity of the sector border in joint western statements.

Problems Are Discussed at Hospital Insurance Confab

About 15 persons, including representatives from five Magic Valley hospitals, attended a one-day hospital insurance institute Tuesday in the Idaho room of Gooding cafe. The institute, which was jointly sponsored and conducted by the Idaho Hospital Association and the Idaho committee of the health insurance council, included a panel discussion on hospital insurance problems, question-answer periods and a panel dinner.

Featured speakers included Dr. D. Hutchinson, Boise, executive secretary of the Idaho Hospital Association; Harry McOee, Caldwell, agency manager of Western Accident and Life Insurance company; Melvin Engstrom, Burley, Cassia Memorial hospital administrator; Myrtle Romney, Pocatello, agency manager, Businessmen's Assurance company of Kansas City; Norman Stiengraber, Chicago, Ill., field representative for the health insurance council; Mrs. Stern Lee, administrative manager of the Gooding County Memorial hospital, and Raymond Tale, assistant administrator, Magic Valley Memorial hospital. McOee discussed the health insurance council and its purpose. He explained that the council, organized in 1946, is a federation of eight insurance associations. It was organized to provide information to physicians and hospitals on health insurance, its laws and progress.

McOee also was featured speaker during a noon luncheon, when he spoke on the health insurance partnership. Engstrom spoke during the morning session on the rising costs of hospital care. Romney discussed the effects of rising hospital care on hospitalization rates, and Stiengraber spoke on uniform claim forms.

Mrs. Lee discussed problems of hospital on uniform claim forms and the morning session was conducted with a question-and-answer period conducted by Engstrom and Stiengraber.

A panel discussion highlighted the afternoon session with McOee as moderator. Panelists and their subjects were Norman Herzinger, representing the Businessmen's Assurance company; determination of insurance coverage and benefits; Frank T. Brizga, Pocatello, representing Mutual of Omaha, "What hospital public relations can do to help with HIC objectives," and "Problems of over-utilization of hospital services and the implications of insurance coverage."

Representatives of Magic Valley Memorial hospital, Twin Falls; Gooding County Memorial hospital, Caldwell; Cassia Memorial hospital, Burley; Rupert, St. Benedict's hospital, Pocatello, attended the one-day institute. The meeting was adjourned after a question-and-answer period and summary by Tale. The institute was opened by Hutchinson. Tale explained Tuesday afternoon that the institute was intended to improve the relations between hospitals and private insurance carriers in Idaho through the interchange of ideas and problems.

Unit Formed For Library At Kimberly

KIMBERLY, Aug. 23—A non-profit organization has been formed to head a library project for the Kimberly area. Letters have been sent to all area clubs, churches and organizations requesting that they appoint a representative for the library committee.

It is also necessary for the library to send a resolution of their support to Mrs. Don Whitbread, Kimberly, as soon as possible. This is necessary as the library board is able to sign only service contracts with community groups.

As soon as these resolutions are received and the committee incorporated they will be forwarded to the state library board. Once a contract is signed it will take about two months for the library to be established. It is hoped the library will be open by Nov. 1.

Kimberly American Legion post No. 76 has donated the space of the hall for the library project. It has been estimated that the cost of remodeling the building and operating for the two-year demonstration period would be about \$1,500.

This amount would have to be raised by the local community. A bank account has been established by the Kimberly branch of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust, and donations may be sent to the bank in care of Mildred Gill. The state board will place about 3,000 books with a \$5,000 grant in the library—the operating date. It also will train and pay the librarian for the demonstration period.

The library will be open a minimum of 20 hours a week and will include encyclopedias, reference material, fiction and non-fiction. It will be a complete library, especially planned for children and youth of the area. There will be no charge for library cards.

Following the two-year demonstration period, an election must be held to establish a library district and a library council.

There has been a tendency in past years to refer to wheat as a commodity, but Newman said it is a business. "We are not just growing wheat to sell, we are growing it to use," he said.

Charles B. Shuman, president of the Farm Bureau, said he is going to continue marketing wheat products will ensure that a government program support guarantee of \$2 per bushel next year. But, in return for his increase of 21 cents per bushel, they will have to cut their wheat acreage by 10 percent.

In Brasilia, President Janio Quadros said he would make no changes in his foreign policy despite growing criticism of his close contacts with Cuba and countries of the communist bloc.

"The government... will follow the path it has chosen because it is the path which meets the interest of the nation," Quadros said.

Russian Aim to Cut Japan Ties With West Is Failure

TOKYO, Aug. 23 (AP)—Anastas Mikoyan ended a controversial nine-day political visit to Japan yesterday, his mission an apparent failure.

The Soviet deputy premier's mission was obvious from the start—to loosen this strategic Asian nation's ties with the West and to woo it closer to the Soviet Union. Mikoyan tried to turn to Japan, tempt and frighten the Japanese.

He praised their modern industrial achievements and their agricultural culture, he dangled the bait of expanded trade and tried to scare his hosts with threats of nuclear war.

Mikoyan might have frightened some individual Japanese but the government and press instead voiced annoyance.

His flattery fell flat. Japanese businessmen who have previously been courted in Soviet economic red tape looked warily at Mikoyan's airy offers of 10-fold increases in Soviet-Japanese trade.

While Mikoyan used the same stock promises and threats in his visits around this island nation, he did inject one new note into the Berlin crisis.

At a plane-side news conference before leaving for Moscow, he declared the western powers still have to sign a peace treaty with Communist East Germany if they wish to retain access to West Berlin.

"There is only one way," he said when questioned how the West could maintain its supply lines into the divided German city if the Soviet Union carries out its threat to sign a treaty with East Germany. "Every country will have to sign an individual peace treaty with the East German democratic republic too."

Phone Firm Rates Boost Is Rejected

BOISE, Aug. 23—The Idaho public utilities commission is rejecting the Gem State Telephone company to resubmit revised rates if the utility wants to raise its rates.

The PUC denied the company's bid rate increase proposals submitted after the state borrowed \$20,000 in 1959 for expansion and improvement.

The company contended that operation under present tariffs made it impossible to raise enough money to pay back the loan.

However, the PUC held the proposed rates would be more than "just and reasonable."

The commission asked the applicant to submit revised rates that will produce annual revenues of not more than \$30,000.

The PUC also said the applicant should be required to transfer the operations of the Cascade office to McCall and the Cascade office should be closed. The commission allowed the company one year to effect such transfer.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22—The addition of a transfer to household comes in two major categories.

One group of advisors on moving is of the do-it-yourself school.

"The other, which of course includes the professional-movers, holds that it is easier in the long run on the family and the furniture to call the pros," they'll take a week to find the flying pan and the coffee pot.

Before we moved, I rounded up all those moving company pamphlets telling how to make the process painless—such as "establish a moving day schedule" and "provide the mover with a general floor plan of your new home."

The most candid advice came from Allied Van Lines which informed us, "moving is what you make it—a smooth operation or a monstrous headache." For us, it was a monstrous headache.

Looking back, now that most of the cartons are unpacked, I believe the safest advice came from the proprietor of our meat market, who said, "Turn the movers loose with a key to your old apartment and the one to the new one. Then go to the country for two weeks."

I didn't listen because it acted all we had to do was get the contents of one apartment transferred to a larger apartment and the movers below in the same building.

A breeze! There was a freight elevator. Besides, if you're moving all the little things, let the professionals take the piano and the sofa and beds and other heavy pieces.

I forgot how many "little things" you can stow into five walk-in closets.

"We could have moved coast to coast easier," said a tired husband who must have made 500 trips on the elevator or up and down the back stairs.

Maybe we saved \$50 on our do-it-yourself plan. But husband reported immediately afterwards to the family physician for a checkup. "There went that \$50."

At least from the ordeal, I've gathered some tips you won't find in the manuals. They'll tell you, for instance, to provide that general floor plan for the new house if you hire a professional. Don't bother.

Nothing fits in the new place. About establishing that moving day schedule. Try that sometime. The morning the movers arrived, so did the man to transfer the air conditioning unit, so did the man to measure for window shades for the new apartment. If told you nothing fitted, the man to move the telephone and the man to turn on the gas and electricity. Our "whistle" turned into pandemonium.

Do rid those closets and drawers beforehand. Discard without mercy. I know, you've been saying that old picture frame for a new filling, the cuckoo clock which doesn't work, the swatch of fabric for an apron and a chipped bowl for repairs. A good rule, I decided in desperation—is—if you haven't used something in the last year, you never will. Donate it to charity.
