Price Supports Okayed in Area By Slim Margin

Magic Valley area farmers approved a proposed wheat referendum by a slim margin in a referendum held Thursday. A two-thirds majority was needed to carry the referendum. It carried by a 56.8 per cent support. A total of 85 ballots was challenged. The referendum, if approved by a two-thirds majority of the nation's farmers, will place in motion a government program of high price supports for wheat with rigid controls.

If rejected, a low price support program with no controls will result, reports Carl Boyd, Twin Falls agricultural chairman and conservation lobbyist.

"Our Magic Valley counties did not give the referendum the necessary two-thirds majority," Boyd said.

Of 4,903 eligible voters only 814 went to the polls. This was "light but double what it was last year," noted Hellen Blackburn, ASGS fieldman.

Results by county are: Blaine, 54.2 per cent, 49 votes; 39 no, one challenged, 63 eligible; Lupo, 56.75, 35, no one challenged; 20 no, 12 challenged, 97 eligible; and Twin Falls, 100, 90 no, one challenged, 150 eligible.

The challenged votes were cast by Blaine, Blackburn explained, adding that these votes will be counted by the ASGS committee Friday, placed in the proper districts and the results mailed to Washington.

Blackburn stated that if the referendum is approved, farmers will receive about \$1.18 per bushel of wheat in 1962.

In order to be eligible to vote, a farmer had to have produced wheat on at least one acre in one of the last three years, Blackburn noted.

Advance for Cancer Cure Is Reported

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 25 (AP)—A Cleveland scientist said Thursday he has discovered a new method of treating and preventing cancer and leukemia in animals.

Dr. Galois said he has already made the serum on a wide variety of human cancer patients.

He said the serum, he said, has protected rats with a high susceptibility to cancer from the disease.

He said preliminary indications are encouraging, but it may be several years before conclusive findings can be made.

Dr. Galois said a group of horses would be used to grow the serum, he said.

He said he and others working on the serum are cooperating with other scientists in Detroit developed the serum.

Overcrowding at T.F. Junior High School Is Emphasized

"Enrollment at the present Twin Falls junior high school is entirely too large for the classroom space available and the space limitations are not merely hindering good school work, but are actually posing safety problems that could cause disaster," declares Ernest H. Ragland, Twin Falls superintendent. He noted that the building should not be carrying an enrollment of more than 1,000 pupils.

When classes convene Aug. 29, "it is almost a certainty that 1,500 pupils will be enrolled."

"Ideally, when a new junior high school is built in this school district, the large enrollment of grades seven through nine could be divided equally between the two junior high schools so that each unit would accommodate 700 to 800 students."

Space Scout Is Launched Successfully

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—The United States today launched a satellite from Wallops Island, Va., in a space shuttle.

The satellite was launched at 2:26 p.m. on a four-stage, solid-fuel rocket from the miniature Cape Canaveral operated by the national aeronautics and space administration (NASA) at Wallops Island.

At 2:38 p.m. EDT, the space shuttle was launched into orbit. The satellite is expected to be in orbit for about 10 days.

Fuel Controls for Corridor Accesses Demanded by Red

BERLIN, Aug. 25 (AP)—East Germany's communist chief demanded full control of West Berlin's air and land routes with the West today and he would not interfere with Western military communications until conclusion of a separate peace treaty with the Soviet Union. In effect, Walter Ulbricht promised not to attempt to take over controls until the end of the year—when Soviet Premier Khrushchev has said there will be such a treaty.

Speaking at a mass rally of invited party faithful in East Berlin, he said:

"In the opinion of all sensible people there must be negotiations soon over disposing of the remains of World War II, through the conclusion of a peace treaty so that peace will reign at last 10 years after the end of the war."

If the Western powers refuse to do this, he went on, then the negotiations would be limited to clearing out "nests of agents, the American radio and branches of the Bonn government from West Berlin" and "the regulation of transit traffic over the routes of the German Democratic Republic on land, water and in the air under the control of the German Democratic state organs of the GDR."

Ulbricht said that until the routes of transit traffic through the German Democratic Republic was prepared to hold to its agreement of 1953 with the West, it would not allow transit traffic of members of the Western Allied marions in Berlin.

That was an exchange of letters between Lothar Böhme, East German foreign minister, and Deputy Soviet Foreign Minister V. A. Zorin. It specified that the routes of transit traffic through the German Democratic Republic would be controlled by the Soviet Union.

By limiting his promise until the time a German peace treaty is signed, Ulbricht is clearly giving notice his regime expects to take over after then. The Soviet Union has not signed a peace treaty with East Germany this year if the West does not sign a peace treaty with West Germany, that would make German division permanent.

July's Living Costs Hit All-Time Peak

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UPI)—Record high food prices pushed living costs to an all-time peak last month, the labor department reports today. Middle income city families paid \$12.81 for the same goods and services that cost \$10 in 1947-49. Officials predicted prices would stay at the record level or perhaps climb higher this month, then rise again in September. They said manufacturers and retailers who cut prices or held them steady during the recession now were boosting them.

Tunisia Will Defend Self, U.N. Is Told

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Aug. 25 (AP)—Tunisia warned today that it would defend itself if the United Nations failed to force France to pull its troops out of Tunisia before the July 15 deadline.

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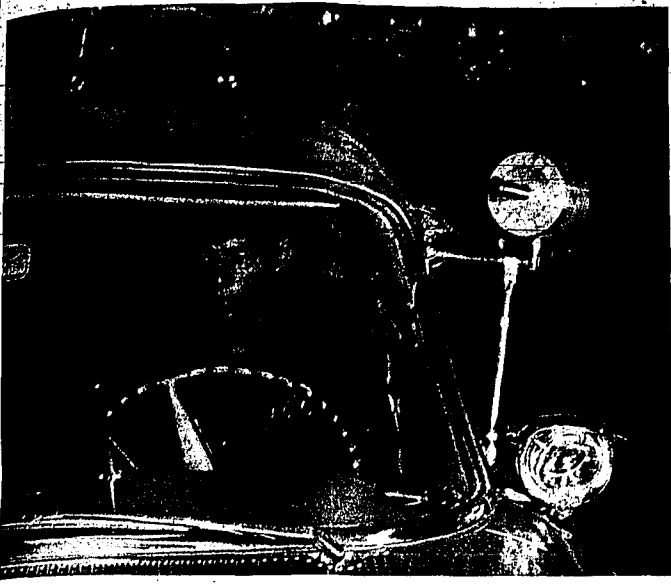
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Car Speed Checked by Versatile New Device

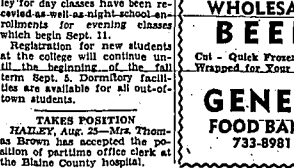

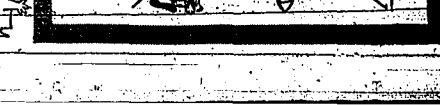

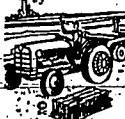

New White Winter Wheat Released By Agricultural Experiment Station

MOSCOW, Aug. 25.—A new white winter wheat, officially named *Galina*, will be released by the Agricultural Experiment Station at Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, which is bred by an American wheat breeder at the University of Idaho.

The variety is a pasture-type wheat with white heads and beards, it is recommended by officials for areas now raising *Patens* and *Brevor*, and it is resistant to lodging, smut and leaf and stripe rust.

The straw is six to 12 inches shorter than the other varieties and therefore won't go down during the winter months. However, if the straw is cut, it is not a problem.

"Development and introduction of *Galina* at this time," says J. H. Gowers, "is a fortunate for Idaho growers."

This is particularly true in the Idaho area where *Galina* has been reduced sharply in the past two years on account of stripe rust. *Galina* has produced

One Man Can Handle 50 Cows in Modern System

BOISE, Aug. 25.—What is the size dairy herd that one man should handle with modern labor-saving equipment, such as pipeline milking, bulk tank and automatic washers?

About 50 cows, suggests Russell D. Kennedy, economist for the University of Idaho extension service.

Farm management research in Idaho shows that one man for 50 cows is about the most efficient and is large enough for warrenting the investment in modern equipment.

According to the 1935 census of agriculture, adds Kennedy, only one per cent of Idaho farmers had milking strings of more than 50 cows. No figures are available for 1939.

Idaho Weather Mostly Favorable for Continued Harvest and Crop Activity

BOISE, Aug. 25.—The U.S. department of agriculture reported today that Idaho weather was mostly favorable for continued harvest and crop activity.

The department said above-normal rainfall—amounting to 3.5 inches—has been reported since the beginning of the season, but at the same time beneficial positive and soil moisture conditions.

A few fields of dry beans were cut, but the bulk of the crop is still in the field. Peaches, early apples and prunes were picked. Livestock ranges are good, and the weather is generally favorable for continued crop activity.

North Idaho: Weather was generally favorable for harvest operations except for scattered showers and light rain which held up some work. All in the final phase were harvest operations in winter and spring grains, dry peas, white Dutch, and Alaska clovers, and second-cutting alfalfa. Final preparations for fall seedings are under way in early localities.

Idaho: Although irrigation requirements were heavy, weather was favorable to development and maturation of crops. Harvest of small grains and second crop may be nearly complete. Digging potatoes and harvesting sweet corn made good progress. The onion harvest and planting melons is still in progress, while peach and prune picking has started in a few areas. Early fields of alfalfa crop alfalfa have been cut and held up second crop hay and the grain harvest, but have lessened irrigation requirements.

Sorting of Early Russets Began This Week at Twin Falls Area Warehouse

The sorting of early Russet potatoes began Thursday morning in the Ed Harper warehouse, probably the first start of the new crop in the valley.

Harper, who sold his other warehouse near South Park around July 1 to the Idaho Potato Products, Inc., has moved his equipment and operation to his new site at 210 Ash street, near Five Points east. This site also is known as the old Mark Means Bean warehouse and is part of the Ty Cobb estate.

Harper said prices to growers are expected to be generally smoother and of better quality.

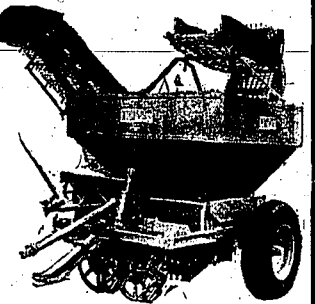

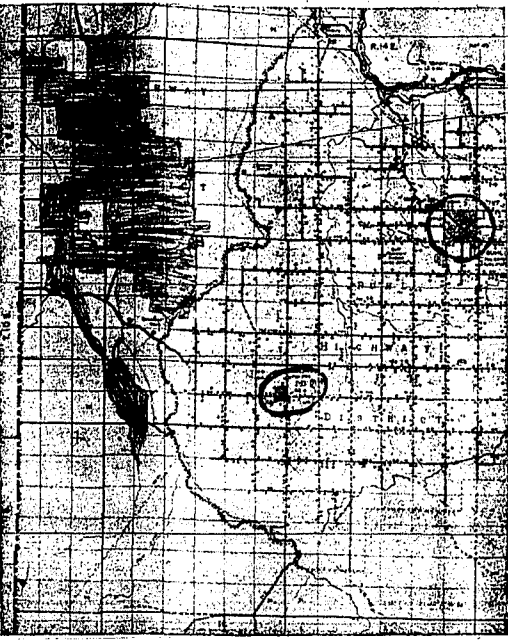

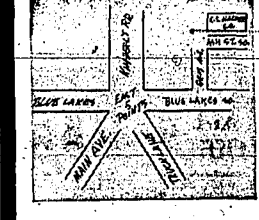

Water Taken Out of Area Canal Friday

RUPERT, Aug. 25—Water was turned out of the canal today, according to William C. Cresson, manager of the Minidoka Irrigation district.

Cresson said that the flow would be held up, and turned back into the canal late in September to allow irrigating of best fields before harvest.

The board of directors voted in June to allow the regular flow of water during the summer growing months, Cresson said, because of the extremely dry condition of the fields and the hot weather, and because it was felt that more damage would be done to crops than to stop irrigating in the fall.

Vance Smith, county agent, said that some damage to crop yields would be done, pointing out that some beans may not mature to full size, and some beets may fail to attain full growth.

Irrigation district figures show a total of some 418,015 acre feet of water at the beginning of the season last spring, at which time the board of directors decided on the present course. A listing of the amounts contained in the four reservoirs shows that Jackson contained 170,800 acre feet; Pallander, 21,351 acre feet; American Falls, 75,551 acre feet, and Walcott, 42,500 acre feet. The normal flow was listed as 85,137 acre feet.

Diversion to the north side canal was 353,540 acre feet, and to the south side canal, 42,000 acre feet, during the irrigating season.

Cresson said that there was some 10,478 acre feet left on the season's allotment for the project but that 2,000 acre feet of this amount would be lost in transmission.

He pointed out that 85 per cent of the water held for this area in Jackson lake is exchanged with water upstream, and that a transmission loss was charged on the 35 per cent brought to the area.

Cresson reported that, in addition to this, total gains and losses from Neely to Milner, which are charged to the district, amounted to some 10,000 acre feet which could put the district as much as 40,000 acre feet over its allotment.

Instead of Damp and Gloomy

The mud room can be an appropriate area of the house larger than a gloomy little damp spot. An entranceway from garage or basement usually is the mud area. These pass-throughs are ideal places for color and imagination.

Linoleum and tile are good floorings for boots, dripping umbrellas and soggy clothing.

The walls should be dressed too in good waterproof material. A self-adhesive vinyl material goes on easily. A knotty pine pattern is ideal for this purpose. Use it right over the door too. The advantage of the pattern besides its attractiveness is that it doesn't show fingerprints.

A combination coat rack and boot tray will keep coats out of the way and wet boots and rubbers off the floor. Make the unit yourself by constructing a coat-rack against the wall using plywood or other suitable material. A decorative note, and a shelf several inches off the floor from the bottom of the unit, large enough to hold the family's collection of boots and rubbers, will add to the utility of the coat rack. The scalloped effect of a cornice may be cut out on a home saw, but these brackets may also be bought as-is at local lumber yards.

When the rack is assembled, line the interior and the bottom of the boot tray with a red gingham fabric self-adhesive vinyl. Paint the cornice and frame white, outlining the scallop in red. Put black metal coat hooks at the back of the rack. A small mirror could be used in this area and be attractively placed.

A simple square stand of wood or metal may be patterned in the same red gingham cover to be used for umbrellas. The door frame may be perked up with red gingham vinyl, a nice contrast to the knotty pine vinyl.

If a lamp is used in this area, its shade could be decorated with a border of the gingham. An old table could be covered with the pine patterned vinyl to further coordinate the space that should prove worth all the effort you put into making it attractive.

"Maybe so, but his latest role, in the film version of 'The Pleasure of His Company,' presents Astaire as Pogo Poole, a defunct playboy whose chief concern is the pursuit of pleasure. Co-stars are Debbie Reynolds, Lilli Palmer and Tab Hunter.

Kidnaping of Lindbergh Baby Reviewed by Writer

Kidnap - The Story of the Lindbergh Case, by George Waller (Dial).

Next March 1 will be the 30th anniversary of one of the crimes of the century. Twenty months ago Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., was stolen from his crib and killed. But the body was not found immediately and the kidnap case collected a ransom before he was caught.

Because the father was an American hero the case shook the whole nation, and a whole generation, and more, has grown up since that crime, and only a fraction of the present population can remember the feverish excitement of the hunt for the killer, Bruno Richard Hauptmann, a schizophrenic who finally was convicted of murder on evidence that had to be circumstantial.

Even to an older generation it will come as a shock to realize again how the case was bungled - the stupidity and jealousy of some of the investigating agencies; the pretenses and faking of evidence; the political meddling of the press; the atmosphere of the trial, and cranks and opportunists who cropped up on all sides.

The author gives strong emphasis to the crime-detecting skill of wood expert Arthur Koehler, whose analyses tied Hauptmann to a ladder that was found at the scene. But that was after the capture, which resulted from a tremendous watch for

the passing of ransom bills. Waller also details a facet of the case that perhaps was not fully understood at the time. Dr. Dudley D. Schofield, a psychiatrist, made through his study of a series of ransom notes, was able to forecast with remarkable accuracy the kind of man the police should look for, where to find him and how to handle him when he was caught.

The Sands of Dunkirk, by Richard Collier (Dutton). Few events in history have captured public fancy as did Britain's successful rescue of nearly 300,000 British and allied soldiers and civilians trapped by the Nazi blitzkrieg in the French port of Dunkirk, and on the nearby beaches.

Collier, who commemorated London's resistance to the bombings of 1941 in "The City That Would Not Die," has drawn on official and private records and the recollections of more than 1,000 eyewitnesses to produce this book, a day-by-day account of the epic feat.

This is not the whole story of Dunkirk - merely the story of a group of people whose lives were bound up in that fateful week," Collier says.

The story will be an eye-opener to most Americans, who think of Dunkirk largely in terms of cabin cruisers snatching soldiers from the beaches. Actually, much the largest number of persons were picked up by destroyers from the fettes that protected Dunkirk harbor.

Outdoor Cooking Can Harm Trees

If you are an outdoor cook, you may give your trees heartburn. You could cause irreparable damage to your landscaping by singeing. And in your garden don't spray weed killer close to trees. The root systems may draw poison up to the leaves. The vapors also may affect the leaves. Don't drain chlorinated water from your swimming pool into areas where you have trees and shrubs. Don't hang shooting targets on tree trunks. The bark will be injured. Don't glide or strangle your trees by tying rope or wire to strings or branches to tree branches. Don't leave identification tags on newly planted nursery stock. These, too, may choke tender growth.

System Made to Save Negatives

One of the important aspects of summer snapshooting, easily overlooked, is a good system for the preservation and filing of negatives and prints. It is so easy to keep shooting but it gets progressively harder to maintain order as the pile of pictures accumulates. The sensible thing to do is to keep pace with the shooting by identifying and dating the pictures as they are processed. It should be one of the first chores attended to after returning from a vacation trip while the names, places and activities are still memory fresh. Fortunately there is a trend on the part of commercial processors to aid in this direction. For one thing, it's a help when prints and color slides have the processing data imprinted on them because it's a convenient record. This is more prevalent in the color field but gets progressively harder to find in black-and-white photo finishing field, as new type of envelope has been developed to make negative filing easier. It is the brainchild of Max Froehlich of Philadelphia after studying the methods of picture-conscious Japan and Europe.

As a professional photographer, he was quite unhappy with the various ways in which negatives are returned to camera firms in this country. None of them seemed to make an orderly system for saving and identifying the precious negatives. So he designed his own. It had to be incorporated, however, in the same envelope which could hold the original rolls of film brought in to camera shops for processing and which is returned to the photographer with the finished prints. Froehlich's answer was an inner compartment to hold negatives of all roll film sizes. This compartment is perforated all around so it can be separated instantly from the envelope and used as a permanent negative folder. It is printed to provide all pertinent data by the photographer for filing away. It also has a reprint order blank so none of the negatives need go astray even for later reprocessing.

Check Shoe Size For Child Often

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP)—The National Shoe Institute recommends that a child's shoe size be checked regularly by a trained shoe fitter—every few months while he is very young and at least every six months as he nears his teen-years. "The responsible shoe fitter will also sufficient growing room between the tip of the shoe and the youngster's longest toe, and enough room for movement across the ball of the foot," authorities at the institute said. "Sticking to realism on the show, Bob and his fellow detectives have more challenging problems in dealing with criminals than do the western marshals. "In most westerns," he explains, "the hero can dispense his own justice because the law is either non-existent or thinly applied."

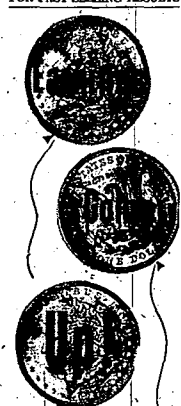

Two Styles of Furnishings Are Defined

Modern and contemporary! These two terms, as they regard furniture designs, are bandied about rather freely today.

So often are these terms used interchangeably by some, to the concern of others, that the National Association of Furniture Manufacturers quizzed talented decorators to clearly define the similarities and divisions between these two furniture styles. It is the consensus that the term modern refers to the present; that contemporary designs belong to the same era — any period — but not exclusively of today. Sam Tilles thinks of contemporary as akin to transitional, which is a label but which is a traditional styling, bearing some accent or detail from the past.

Ernest A. Pietrens, experienced decorator, discounts modern design as that in more clean-cut, simple tailored lines. Ordinarily, he says, seating pieces utilize foam rubber for cushioning to achieve firmness and the slighter proportioned look. Contemporary seating pieces, in his opinion, go in for the more billowy look.

Denim Is Moving up in World With Expert Aid

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP) — Denim has been around a hundred years or more before anything much happened to it. If you were a farmer you wore blue overalls. If you were a cowboy you wore blue jeans. And if you were a mechanic you wore blue or brown overalls. And if you worked on a railroad you wore blue or brown overalls and a matching jumper and cap.

Designers George Galin and About 10 years ago a couple of top designers, Bonnie Cashin and John Wells, got to fooling around with 10 million garments or so done with it. They produced some items, including "boating clothes," which were a fad but which were pretty much ignored by most of the denim people.

The denim council, an association of manufacturers and others interested in selling more denim, somewhat overlooked these possibilities and the denim people went on turning out overalls. About five years ago several designers decided to see what they could do with denim. They concentrated mostly on more generous proportions, using either foam and rayon, drapes and springs, or down and rayon.

Your Eyes Pretty Accurate? Level Is Needed When Laying Out Lines in Work

You may think that your eyes are pretty accurate but don't count on it when it comes to laying out vertical or horizontal lines in your work.

Nor should you count on other lines to help you judge—ceilings and walls may be off more than you think.

Include Plumb Bob
Add one of the vertical levels that are available to your tool collection. Also include a plumb bob—a heavy metal weight with a string attached used for establishing vertical lines.

Use a level or a plumb bob to make certain the mounting strip goes up vertically.

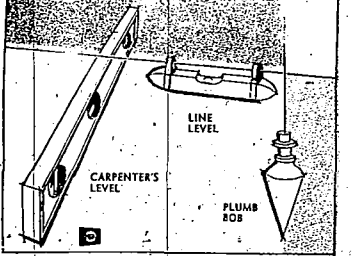
Check Accuracy
Use a level to check the accuracy of all shelves—on a wall, in a closet or in a piece of furniture you might be building.

Use a plumb bob when doing any framing work, before placing studs or setting up upright. The plumb bob will establish above.

USE KNIFE
Skilled cabinet makers use a knife when scoring lumber or plywood for cutting. The blade follows a straight edge more accurately, eliminates errors in the variations of thickness of pencil lines.

LINING IT UP



Don't count on your eyes when laying out vertical or horizontal lines in your work. These three levels are necessary for any home carpentry work.

A horizontal line between two points. The level is a small item equipped with hooks to fit over a line. The line should be laid out all three times.

The line level will help you set fence posts accurately. And it's an absolute necessity if you are putting up a masonry wall. Use the plumb bob for vertical accuracy, the line level to make certain that a row of bricks doesn't lean out higher at one end than the other.

Try Wood Level
If most of your work is indoors a wood level will do. Levels made of metal are better for outdoor work; are generally used in construction work because they are not affected by moisture.

"Women should remember form means nothing. If you hit the ball good, you look good."

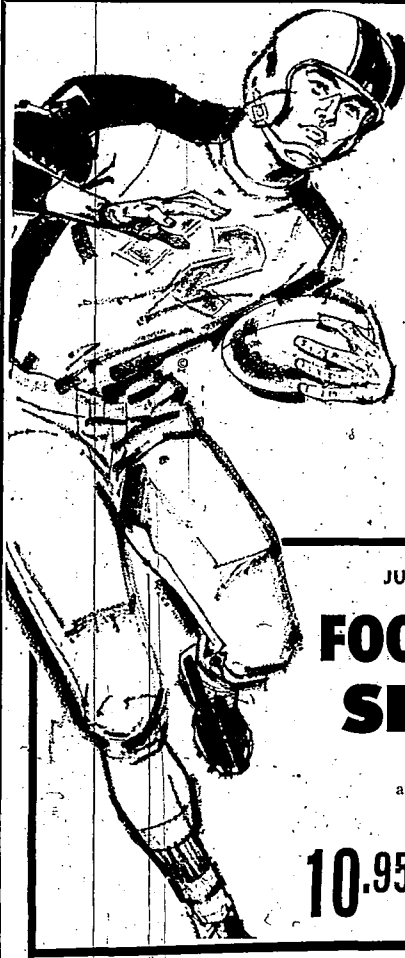
