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Leave Berlin's Airways Alone, Allies Tell Russ

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The United States and France tonight solemnly warned the Soviet Union not to interfere with the western air corridors to Berlin. In notes delivered simultaneously at Moscow, the western big-three denounced what they described as the Soviet "sacredly-veiled threat of aggression" against the rights linking the west to the non-communist world. And they rejected as false Soviet claims that the West is using the three air corridors to airlift West German spies and provocateurs to West Berlin.

U.S. Will Not Fight China Talk in U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. Aug. 26 (AP)—The United States has agreed to a general assembly from which the United States will be excluded.

The assembly's 10th annual session starting Sept. 10, the United States will not introduce a resolution to postpone consideration of the question for the assembly's duration.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk said the United States will not do so as it would be useless to do so at this time. He said the simple majority needed for adoption.

Rusk also added the United States was still dead set against introducing a resolution to exclude the People's Republic of China from the assembly.

At least this year, he said, the assembly will be held in the United States but through what has become known as a "rotating" system. He said the assembly will meet in the United States for the first time since 1949.

DETROIT, Aug. 26 (AP)—American Motors corporation and the United Auto Workers union agreed today on a profit-sharing plan for production workers. It is the first such plan in the auto industry. The three-year agreement also will give AMC's hourly-rated union-represented employees a share in the company's stock. UAW President Walter P. Reuther said afterward: "We will submit this approach to General Motors, Ford and Chrysler. It ought to lay the economic basis for settlement with the other three."

Struggle for Power Has Brazil-Tense

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 26 (AP)—Tense Brazil was caught up in new power struggles tonight with the military reported determined to topple Vice President Goulart from assuming the presidency vacated by Janio Quadros and a Labor party leader, ending a four-year separate government.

Three federal deputies told the National Congress in Brazil that War Minister Gen. Odilio Denys was bent on ousting Goulart, suggesting that Goulart, who dramatically resigned yesterday.

Certain hours, Deputy Doulde de Andrade, a Brazilian Labor party official, declared his party might establish a government headed by Goulart in Porto Alegre, southern Brazil.

Informants in Brasilia said the military might ask Goulart to resign.

School Buses Are Checked For Safety Devices

Children's Safety on Buses Gets Primary Consideration

The safety of the children is the primary consideration which overrides all other school bus transportation. Ernest Reiland, superintendent of schools in district 411, said Sunday.

Reiland said that school officials should follow when boarding or alighting a school bus.

The pupil should have a strong sense of responsibility for the safety of himself and others while should remain seated until the bus stops to unload. After the bus has stopped, the pupil should wait for signal from the bus driver. If it is necessary to cross the road, cross the road in front of the bus.

The first pupil who crosses the road should check very carefully for the group before going across the highway. Be careful in approaching bus stops and always walk on the left of the highway toward oncoming traffic.

Be on time for the bus. Do not disturb other pupils while going to or from the bus.

Several "extra" safety devices not usually found on standard buses include a stop sign on the left front of the bus which flashes oncoming traffic when the bus stops to load or unload children, and a buzzer alarm which is set off when the emergency exit door is opened. "Be courteous to fellow pupils, bus drivers and patrol captains and remember that they are all working for safety," notes Reiland, adding that pupils should treat school bus equipment "as one would treat the valuable furniture and possessions in his own home."

Parents interested in obtaining copy of "School Transportation," a booklet listing duties and responsibilities of the bus driver, school officials, teachers, children and the board of education, plus other information about school buses, may write to the Idaho department of education, statehouse, Boise.

Economist Is Speaker for Rupter Meet

RUPERT, Aug. 26.—Change in the family life pattern was stated to be an important factor in the growth and expansion of the potato processing industry by Roy Nelson, economist for the First Security corporation, Salt Lake City, who addressed the Rupter Chamber of Commerce Thursday.

Dr. Nelson said that homemakers aren't willing to spend as much time at household chores when foods in the various processed forms are available. He traced the changes in consumption of potatoes, stating that the peak was reached in 1925 and again in 1930.

The increase in use, up to the present, of processed potatoes a few years ago, could be accounted for by the increase in population. Nelson said that the quality processed packaged potato came on the market about three years ago and the upward trend stopped, and the spiral started upward.

Southern Idaho, especially the local area, had a definite part in effecting this change, Dr. Nelson said.

The sugar beet industry, he said, is an important factor in the development of the farming industry in the state.

Dr. Nelson said that the average county invested in a farm in this area was \$42,000 now as compared to \$20,000 six years ago.

He pointed out that Minidoka county is the unique and doubtful honor of being the only county in Idaho that is spending more than the spendable income, and pointed out that during the past three years retail sales in the county were half million dollars more than the income.

Dr. Nelson explained this unusual situation by pointing out that the large amount invested in wells, pumps, buildings and farm equipment in the development of the irrigated lands, as well as the new business and industrial plants established in the area, are the cause of this.

Other developments bringing in outside money, such as the new hospitals, feed mills, sewage plants and electric installations, all of which depend on borrowing.

Dr. Nelson, who handles the accounts when the bank of the area is added, described the process, explaining that in order to get the money, he first has to get the community wishing to borrow the money. It must be presented in such a light as to make the prospective lender feel confident that his potentialities guarantee the return on the loan, the speaker asserted.

As a part of the report of the area, Dr. Nelson stated that the population increase for Minidoka county of 47 per cent and for Rupter 28 per cent compared to the national increase during the same period of 18 per cent.

A report was given by Mrs. Hazel Dean Hunter on the highway plan committee, and a drawing of the proposed sign was shown to the group. A vote favoring the project was given by the members.

William Lait, chamber president, read communications from the department of the interior office at Bureau expressing appreciation of the community's action in reclaiming for the special honor given by the community to all the land drawing last Saturday.

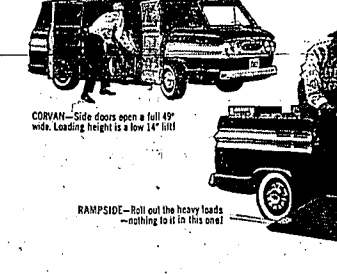

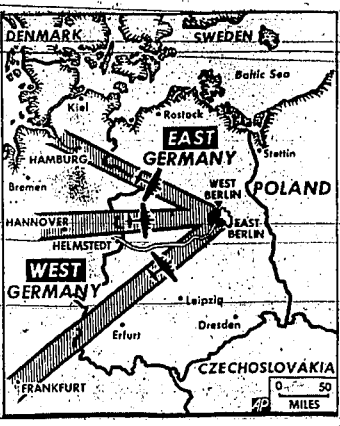

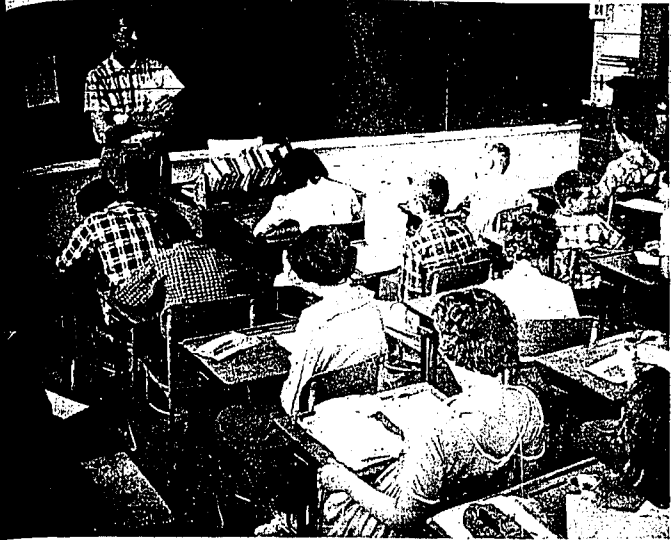

Youth Solves Uncontrollable Pig Problem by Dash or Two of Honey

FILER, Aug. 26—One of the 600 4-H members in Twin Falls county recently solved the problem of a pig that has a mind of its own.

David Annis, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Annis, has discovered that an ounce of honey will control 150 pounds of pig. This is no mean discovery, as anyone knows who has ever tried to sell a pig what to do.

David is a member of the Filer Livestock club, led by Ted Sier and Miles Votroubek.

One of his projects is a 6-month-old Yorkshire pig named "Porker." David is working with the pig, getting him ready for the cutting and showing classes at the upcoming Twin Falls county fair and rodeo, Sept. 6-9 at the Filer fairgrounds.

"Porker," like many pigs, isn't always in agreement with David concerning what he should do at any given moment. David decided to appeal to the pig's better nature—appetite.

He reasoned that if he could get the pig's confidence and undivided attention, he would be able to control it in the show ring. He was right. The pig idolizes David.

David brought this about by giving the pig a few mouthfuls of honey each day. He has been doing this for the past two months, and "Porker" has become a honey addict. He follows David around the pen and will do as he is told or pushed. Just to get a mouthful of honey.

The honey is dispensed to the pig, directly in the mouth, with a plastic squeeze bottle, used for such things as honey, mustard and catsup.

Mrs. Annis says this method of pig control was originated by David's older brother, Steven, when he had a pig project a few years ago. The new method of pig persuasion netted Steven the reserve grand championship at the district 4-H fair in 1959 at Jerome.

Mrs. Annis laughs when she recalls how Steven trained the pig. She had a bottle of honey in the cupboard. One day she noticed a considerable amount was missing. She didn't think the children would all devour what that much honey struck, but, nevertheless, she asked them about it. The boys were claiming anything to do with the missing honey.

She immediately after Steven went the price with the pig, he told his mother, "Well, Mother, now that I know how to do this, I guess I can tell you what I did with that honey. I fed it to the pig." Mrs. Annis agreed that the honey was well used.

Recently a photographer who is retained by the national 4-H club committee visited the area and took many photographs of area members working on projects. He is a man who travels thousands of miles a year taking photographs. Donald Youls, extension agricultural agent, told the photographer to see David's pig. The photographer noted that pig with a bottle of honey.

Walking Plow and Wooden Wagon Wheel Models Recall Man's Past

Using scrap wood from orange crates and empty tin cans, Norman Brewick, Twin Falls, is recreating models that call up visions of the old west.

Working with near-impossible small pieces, he is making models of the old walking plow and the wooden wagon wheel, two symbols of the old west that slowly are passing from the scene.

Brewick is a hobbyist who for years has tinkered in his workshop and found all sorts of projects to occupy his spare hours.

Last spring he noticed a photograph in the magazine "Arizona Highways" that showed an old broken, partially repaired rocking chair. This set Brewick to work. He made a model of the old chair and, later, started making models of the broken wheel and the walking plow.

He says he has no particular reason for selecting the objects, just that they are symbols of the old west and he finds model-making an interesting hobby. He adds that the walking plow he calls them "foot farmers" is something that reminds him of his childhood on a farm in the Wendell area. Brewick was born and has spent most of his life in this area. He says that every time he looks at the models of the plows he is reminded of his youth on the farm.

He has made about 12 of the models and has given a few of them to friends. Some of the larger models can be used as small tables, using a piece of scratch wood to support the shade.

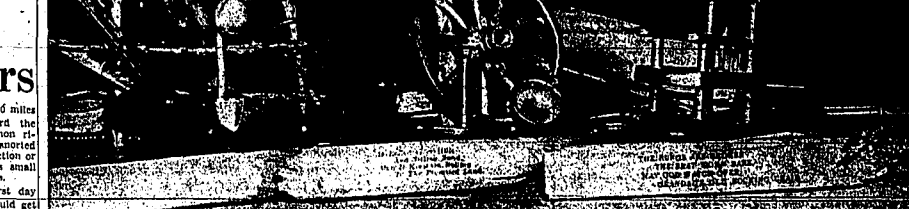

L.H. Van Riper, Jerome, Feels Helping Youth Is Investing in Town's Future

JEROME, Aug. 26—L. H. Van Riper, owner of the fair board and related activities because he feels by helping Jerome's youth he is making a good investment in Jerome's future.

"It takes kids—and any time I have ever spent with them I have been more than compensated," he says. 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Sighted-in Rifles Bring Hunter Success, Safety



For greater safety and hunter success, rifles should be sighted-in before being used. More than 175,000 sportsmen will buy Idaho hunting licenses of all types this year. These pieces of paper give the purchaser the privilege of hunting without guaranteeing game birds or animals. Across the nation, hunters who buy licenses will purchase licenses with as even the promise of a place to hunt.

carbine. On the other hand, the bullet range is limited and in open spaces it often gives way to bigger and more powerful guns that can kill at twice or three times the distance.
Some of these high-powered rifles are called "wildcats" because of the non-standard shell-loading action and rifle bore which can vary according to the likes or dislikes of the owner and his pocketbook.
The gun can be long-barreled or short, and the stock custom-made of any material and in any shape or form.
All types have one thing in common: Irrespective of their grooves and coils, or whether they are of the "small bore" kind or "screaming wildcat," they all are deadly when their shots are placed right in elk, deer—or man.

involved in firearms accidents, this is small solace. This is true especially in the light that almost all accidents could be avoided if every hunter would just follow a few simple rules of safe gun handling.
Here they are again, these Ten Commandments of safety, because accidents still happen, even if in statistically small numbers:
1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun—this is the first rule of gun safety.
2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded and taken down or have the actions open. Always carry guns in cases until you get to the shooting area.
3. Always be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from the chamber before firing.
4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle if you stumble;

keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun towards you by the muzzle.
9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice be sure your backdrop is adequate.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.
These are tried and tested rules. They do work and if every hunter obeys them, a long step will have been taken this year toward eliminating firearms accidents.
Don't end up as a statistic this fall. Instead, follow the Ten Commandments and urge other sportsmen to do the same.

into a license is obtained, it is up to the sportsman to arrange transportation, to find a place to hunt, to have the knowledge to recognize the various aspects of game birds and animals—and the skill to hit the target.
What's more, it is his responsibility to see that his gun is in good condition, that the sights on his rifle are adjusted to his personal requirements so that it will hit where it is aimed.
In short, a rifle should be sighted-in before going afield.
In the interest of a safe and successful hunting trip, the hunter himself should sight-in his gun since other shooters can not see the sights exactly as he does.
A safe target background and a comfortable support for the rifle are necessary. These conditions also result which truly represent his aim. A paper target at a distance appropriate to the rifle's use registers accurately the results of sight adjustments.
All these things are available on established ranges in most communities.
Because a properly sighted-in gun increases the chances of successful hunting, produces more pleasure and saves the expense of the shooting sport, this is the second year of national sponsorship of rifle clinics in events by the National Rifle Association.
Hunters who go to good firing ranges learn the capabilities of their rifles at practical hunting distances, shotgun patterning and slug testing, trajectories of various rifle calibers, differences between uphill and downhill shooting, bullet performance during rain, the effects of cant on point of impact, plus other items of importance to accurate field shooting.
This year, as in the past, hunters will go afield with pet rifles of every make, type and description. These will range from antique shot of ancient vintage to the most modern of repeating rifles. They will be equipped with fancy scopes, peeps or plain iron sights and, in many cases, guns may be sporting all three types.
Arguments are commonplace around campfires and elsewhere, including the magazines, about the merits of this rifle over that one and how much better one is for elk and whitetail deer than the one that belongs to his neighbor.
Some hunters say that only high-powered rifles equipped with scopes are completely reliable while the next man says that by his old standby, the 30-30
