81 Rescued, Six Die In Mountain Mishap

CHAMONIX, France, Aug. 30 (UPI and AP)—Rescuers toiling by moonlight and searchlight high in the Alps early today saved the last of 81 tourists left trapped in dangling cable cars when a low-flying jet snatched a tow cable. Six persons—four Germans and two Italians—were killed when three cars fell 500 feet to an Alpine snowfield after the French plane clipped the cable. Officials said all 81 survivors were in good condition, although several were injured, some seriously. The rescue operation was hampered by the weather in the recovery area and the operation of the satellite to determine the best time.

Look at N. Y. State Needy Aid Ordered

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 30 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today ordered a sweeping study of public welfare in New York state. The governor named an 11-man commission, headed by S. Hazard Oleske, prominent attorney, to make the inquiry.

"The maintenance of public confidence in the objectives and in the operation of the laws relating to the aid, care and support of the needy is an essential task for responsible government," Rockefeller said.

"Programs for the aid, care and support of the needy must not be permitted to falter or lose their purpose," he said in a statement. "They must always be the vigorous and compassionate instrument of the entire community for human betterment and social progress."

Among eight points the governor specifically ordered the commission to investigate was the role of work relief in public assistance programs as provided under existing state law.

ICC Recommends U. S. Aid To Help Maintain Railroads

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission today recommended direct federal subsidies for the New York, New Haven and Hartford and other railroads to help them maintain essential passenger service.

The recommendation reversed the commission's position against federal grants in the transportation field.

The commission made its recommendation in connection with an investigation of the New York, New Haven and Hartford's financial plight.

In its report today, the ICC said it is "highly questionable that the New Haven can emerge from reorganization and continue to render essential transportation services in the absence of direct federal grants."

The commission described the New Haven—and railroad passenger service generally—as facing a bleak but not necessarily hopeless future.
