Red Decision Sets Stage for Massive Arms Race

MOSCOW, Aug. 31 (UPI)—The Soviet Union's announcement that it will resume nuclear tests on its own set the stage for a massive arms race today aimed at producing weapons of millions of tons of explosive force. The decision announced in Moscow last night appeared certain to boost international tensions to a new high. The forthright manner in which the Soviets made their move startled diplomatic observers with its boldness. In announcing its decision to resume nuclear testing, the Soviet government set one of its immediate goals the perfection of a 100 million-ton superbomb which would be tested by the Soviets anywhere in the world.

U.S. Hits Move; Nation Is Ready

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (UPI)—The White House today condemned Russia's decision to resume nuclear bomb tests as atomic blackmail and declared the U. S. arsenal is "wholly adequate" to defend the free world. The statement—the second from the White House since last night's Soviet announcement—was issued after President Kennedy met with his top military council and congressional leaders of both parties. "It was recognized that the Soviet announcement" was primarily a form of atomic blackmail, designed to substitute the threat of nuclear force for reason in the present international scene," the statement said. "What the Soviet Union is obviously trying to do is to force us to raise such devices but the will and determination of the free world to resist such tactics and to defend freedom."

Some School Teachers Are "Uncertified"

BOISE, Aug. 31 (AP)—Several Idaho schools this fall are being forced to fill faculty vacancies with uncertified substitutes on a day-to-day basis again.

In a survey of some of the largest districts in the state and one educator, United Press International reported several are turning to uncertified substitutes to complete their teaching staffs.

However, it is how serious the problem is state-wide has not yet been determined.

State Public Instruction Superintendent F. Zuehlke said that, "at this point we can't tell what the exact situation is. Reports generally show that schools are filling vacancies, but how well certified the teachers are we don't know."

Engelking said that those schools that don't have certified teachers are facing a serious situation now and will probably have to resort to a great deal on substitutes.

The state education official said enrollment in the education field in American colleges has been dropping for the last several years, generally speaking, but he didn't know if there were enough new instructors available to take care of the country's shortage.

Ernest England, superintendent of the Twin Falls district, points out that the staff in his area is older in average age.

"There is extreme difficulty in recruiting younger members," England said, "and the situation will get worse in the fall."

"We have no unfilled teaching positions," he said, "but there is no question that the supply of teachers is limited."

A common problem, however, is illustrated at Coeur d'Alene high school in northern Idaho.

School officials there say there is a shortage of teachers, although they think they have had to hire "some sub-standard instructors" who do not have a college degree.

In southern Idaho, at Idaho Falls, Bennington school district Superintendent Davenport has a similar situation.



Gen. Lucius Clay, Hero of Berlin, Going Back Again

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP) — They called him the hero of Berlin. When Russia blocked every ground access to the beleaguered city in 1948, the sharp-featured U. S. military governor for Germany rallied the U. S. forces there. He infused West Berliners with the "enthusiasm" to beat the blockade, and they did. And when it was over, and he retired, he told them that if they ever needed him again "I would come back on my hands and knees." He is going back. President Kennedy yesterday announced he is sending Gen. Lucius D. Clay, the man congress called "the hero of Berlin," back to the city that regards him as a mighty symbol of resistance to red pressure. Kennedy announced yesterday that Clay would embark on the task Sept. 15 and "serve as long as the special arrangement seems desirable." With West Berlin faced with another, perhaps even more than-grievous crisis because of communist barbers Clay was certain to be welcomed back. This time he will go as Ambassador Clay, the President's personal representative, not as a general of a conquering army. He already has been back to West Berlin, accompanying Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson earlier this month on a morale-boosting visit to the red-encircled city. The President told his news conference yesterday that "the situation in Berlin is a serious one and I wish to have the advantage of having on the scene a person of General Clay's outstanding capacity." Kennedy said Clay's appointment "will not change the existing responsibilities of our military and diplomatic offices in Germany and Berlin." But he added Clay would add to "our resources of judgment and action."

Venue Change Denied in Suit

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 31 (AP) — A federal judge says that he has denied motions for a change of venue in a suit filed by KATV, Inc., Blackfoot, Idaho, against two Idaho Falls television stations and the National Broadcasting Company. Crack-Down Launched on Food Prices

BOISE, Aug. 31 (AP)—A statewide crack-down on pre-packaged fresh, frozen and cured food pricing is under way, the state agriculture department reports.

Agricultural Commissioner Stanley T. Trenhaile said he plans to take legal action against grocery store officials who continue charging customers for packaging weight without telling them about it.

Trenhaile says a demonstration for reporters in his statehouse office to illustrate the point that "discrepant shades of the pricing and weighing statutes" are being committed.

The commissioner "handed out" a pre-packaged unit of frozen poultry from an out-of-town firm. The package, before the thawing, weighed and was marked at two pounds, three ounces. After the ice, water and heavy packaging was discarded, the unit tipped the scales at one-pound 15 1/2 ounces.

"The total unit price and weight was misleading to the average customer," Trenhaile said. "The public must become conscious of net weight and avoid being charged eight or 10 cents for heavy packaging and for content."
