### Red Atomic Test in Asia Is Reported

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—The United States announced Friday that Russia has conducted a nuclear test. The White House said the test was of an "intermediate range." There was no immediate amplification as to the strength of the explosive. The test, the White House said, was conducted in the general area of Sapsinatinsk in central Asia. It was detonated in the atmosphere. "The device test was of a substantial yield in the intermediate range," the White House said.

How the test was detected is reported in the linked states was not immediately disclosed.

The nuclear test occurred just two days after the Soviet Union announced it would resume nuclear experiments—an announcement President Kennedy has branded as atomic Jack mail.

The test of the White House statement:

"The Soviet Union today has conducted a nuclear test in the general area of Sapsinatinsk in central Asia. The test was of a substantial yield in the intermediate range. It was detonated in the atmosphere."

### Toll Worst In U.S. for Lone Craft

CHICAGO, Sept. 1 (AP)—An arriner-laden with passengers crashed and burned in a cornfield today, killing all 78 persons aboard in the nation's worst single plane disaster. Many of the 73 passengers were family groups. The four-engine TWA Constellation disintegrated when it plowed into the muddy ground 10 miles west of Chicago's Midway airport minutes after it took off for Los Angeles. It was the third worst U. S. commercial plane accident, but both the death toll and the number of injuries far exceeded the toll of the other two. The crash was the worst of its kind since the crash of a single-engine plane in 1945.

Witnesses said that the plane apparently smashed in an emergency landing attempt. They said there was no explosion in the air. Doctors said the first dead ex-losion injuries but looked rather like auto crash victims.

In Washington, the FBI said it had started an investigation of the possibility that a "bomb" may have caused the crash.

The crash came shortly after a heavy thunderstorm had taken the plane from Los Angeles to Chicago at 7:45 p.m. yesterday. It was en route to Los Angeles and had a stop at New York, Pittsburgh and Chicago. It left Chicago at 2 a.m. and crashed about 10 minutes later.

Jerry Brock, a farmer whose house south of Hinsdale is only 150 yards from the wreckage, said he heard the plane roar overhead. "I think he was trying to land," Brock said. ### Auto Fatality Paul Youth Is Is Basis for \$50,945 Suit

David S. Cantrell, 18, and his father, Homer Cantrell, both of Wendell, were named defendants in a \$50,945 civil suit filed Thursday in district court by Mr. and Mrs. Harold O. Ochaner, parent of Larry Ochaner, 18, who was killed in an auto accident July 8.

Mr. and Mrs. Ochaner claim their son was killed because Cantrell negligently operated his car. Ochaner was clinging to the side of the car driven by Cantrell and was crushed to death when the vehicle sideswiped a Jeep station wagon in the 200 block of Second avenue west.

Cantrell told both police and a 12-man coroner's jury that he did not see or hear Ochaner, who was clinging to the window of Cantrell's car, directly behind the driver's seat.

The Ochaners ask \$50,000 for the loss of their son and \$945.50 to cover funeral expenses.

They explain in the petition that Cantrell's father also was named as a defendant because Cantrell was "it and a minor at the time of the accident, and that Homer Cantrell had the legal duty to control Cantrell's car and was legally responsible for his son's actions."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—Ambassador Arthur H. Dean today charged Russia's plan to resume nuclear tests shows clearly the danger to the world from the resumption of nuclear testing.

"The Kremlin said it is capable of exploding a 100-megaton bomb," the power it has built up in the past 10 years, he said.

### Unity Power Suing Burley For \$140,000

**BURLEY, Sept. 1**—The Unity Light and Power company has filed a \$140,000 suit against the city of Burley, the Burley city council and the city electrician, Charles Lewis in district court here.

The suit alleges that the city began in 1960 to annex territory, portions of which were being served by the Unity Light and Power company and immediately Power company and immediately Power company to extend its municipal electrical system into this area and caused the cooperative to discontinue its membership to be discontinued.

The city immediately installed its own service and excluded the cooperative from the annexed area, the power company alleges.

The Unity Light and Power company further asserts that the city tore out the cooperative's poles, without paying any compensation.

The company asks special damages in the amount of \$15,000, general damages of \$100,000 and punitive damages of \$20,000. The power company also asks that the city of Burley be restrained from occupying with their electrical system in any and all areas originally and formerly occupied by the plaintiff, that the city of Burley be ordered to move its system from this area and that the cooperative members which the city took from the power company be returned. The power company also asks for the costs.

The suit was filed by William J. Dea, Grangeville; William A. Parsons, Burley, and Lawrence H. Duffin, Rupert. Dea also was an affidavit of prejudice signed by Dea which stated that the firm would not take a few days before Judge Edward Heep.

In a previous anti-suiting suit the Idaho supreme court ruled against the cooperative and in favor of the city of Burley.

## Recommendations for Potatoes Are Reported

BURLEY, Sept. 1.—Two recommendations for growing potatoes in Idaho were made by University of Idaho extension specialists, says Glenn Boddy, Cassia county agent.

The first pertains to irrigation. Darrell Larsen, irrigation specialist, says spuds may be better off if they aren't irrigated after the last week of August.

Larsen says spuds don't need irrigation after August, and that the hides will be tougher if they are not watered. If the fields get too wet, he warned, the chances of getting water rot will increase.

The second recommendation comes from Richard Ohms, extension potato specialist. Ohms recommends using ammonium sulphate for killing vines if growers don't want to depend on frost to do the job.

He says 100 pounds of the chemical, dissolved in 100 gallons of water, will kill vines without causing stem-end discoloration, and will have fertilizer value for the next crop. Some other chemicals cause discoloration, he warned.

## Rupert Firm Expands Into Frozen French Fry Product

RUPERT, Sept. 1.—Plans were announced this week by M. Buhler, president of the firm, for the expansion of the Rocky Mountain Chemical company, makers of commercial potato products, into the frozen French fry field.

The \$500,000 expansion will include two processed products, the French fries and a fresh-frozen boiled potato, Buhler said. The company's cattle feeding operation also will be expanded to include facilities for handling 2,000 head, to be fed from by-products from the other operation.

Dr. Adolph Blacek will be in charge of the alcohol processing operation, arrived in Rupert Monday to begin work at the plant, with plans to expand that phase to an average daily output of some 3,000 gallons.

Dr. Blacek has had years of experience in the field, Buhler reported, having designed and built alcohol plants in France, Germany, Russia and Argentina. He now holds a number of patents on equipment used in the fermentation and distilling industry. A native of Czechoslovakia, Dr. Blacek is a graduate of the University of Prague.

Another addition to the company personnel, Cooper H. McMullin, arrived in Rupert Monday, and will take charge of the installation and operation of the French fry operation.

McMullin, formerly of Nampa, has had 12 years experience in the field, including connections with the Gamble-Robison company, Sta-Fresh Foods, and Tasti-Spuds, all Omaha, and has recently been engaged in the operation of a similar plant in Washington. His wife is living in Nampa, and will join him here soon as housing plans are found.

Buhler reported that the company had entered into a contract arrangement with the Spring-Rite-Pepper-Food company to produce the packaged potato products at full capacity, to be distributed both on the retail market and to restaurants. He explained that a full scale advertising and sales program was now underway, and that they expect to reach all known markets for the products.

The Rupert plant is undergoing extensive remodeling now in preparation for the fall harvest season, the manager explained, with the main warehouse area being lined and insulated to house the French fry operation, with adjoining storage facilities.

The first shipment of machinery for the new operation arrived Tuesday, Buhler stated.

Waste materials from the processing of the frozen products, along with culls from the sorting tables and used cooking alcohol, and the mash which is a by-product of the alcohol plant, is dehydrated and used for cattle. Tests made last year proved the feed very satisfactory, Buhler said.

The company fed cattle last year on a small scale on the output of the plant, Buhler said, adding that this year, they expect to be able to sell to other feeders in the area as well as to take care of their expanded feeding program.

A new technique will be used, by which each piece of potato is instantly and separately frozen, allowing the product to be packaged in whole amounts desired. The company president explained that the Rocky Mountain Chemical corporation is an Idaho corporation, with common shares of about 200,000 persons throughout the state. Shares are now being offered for sale at \$1 per share, Buhler added.

## U.S. Dairymen Claim Cheese Imports Are Cutting Into Domestic Markets

U.S. dairymen have now added their protest to those made by sheepmen that imports from New Zealand are cutting heavily into domestic market channels.

The National Milk Producers' federation, Washington, D. C., reported recently that imports of Colby cheese from New Zealand have hit a record high as of the first half of 1961.

Through June, the federation said, more than 10 million pounds of this cheese have been permitted entry into the United States. This is an increase of 200 million pounds over the 100 million pounds allowed into the United States in 1958 and the four million pounds in 1960.

Colby cheese, similar to domestic cheddars, displaces therefor a corresponding amount of domestic cheddar, and in turn has forced the domestic dairy manufacturers to enter the support program. Through August 1960, the federation reports, more than 21.2 million pounds of cheddar have been purchased under the support program.

The national association stated that failure to control Colby imports will tend to undermine current efforts to improve the economic lot of the American dairy farmer.

Sheepmen, who have similar attitudes about permitting New Zealand and Australia to enlarge their lamb exports into the United States, contend that their markets have been disastrously curtailed and the price for domestic lamb sharply decreased, at least to growers, on account of low U.S. tariffs.

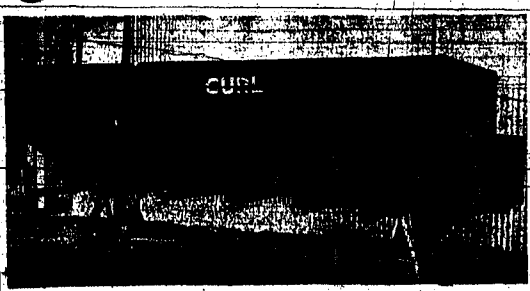

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—The department of agriculture has reported the list of 37 wheat varieties which are undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities. These varieties will continue to be discounted 30 cents per bushel in price-support rates on the 1962 wheat crop.

### Fresh Are Using Archimedes' Law In Swine Weight

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—The farmer using Archimedes' principle—the law of hydrostatics—to determine the amount of lean meat in hog carcasses.

Archimedes, a Greek scholar who lived from 287 to 212 B. C. discovered his principle while reclining in a bath tub. It is: "A body surrounded by a fluid is buoyed up by a force equal to the weight of the fluid it displaces."

The foreign agriculture service (FAS) said researchers in north Indiana applied the principle to weigh hog carcasses as weighed in air and then in water to determine their densities. The weight of the carcass is divided by the difference between the weight in air and the weight in water, the figure is then plotted on a graph which indicates the lean content of the carcass.

FAS said the process is extremely accurate.

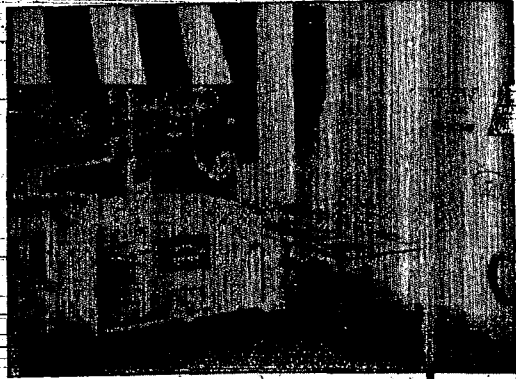

### 1961 Harvest Season Is Reported Well Under Way for Crops in Magic Valley

The harvest season for most crops raised in Magic Valley is well under way and will continue for at least two months.

Up on the hills, cattlemen "have" some of their yearling steers, many selling them about as fast as they can be loaded into warehouses and processing plants.

Many sacks of bean hull have to be cut in the valley, but a few loads of commercial already have entered the warehouses. Quality of the first loads of pinto and Great Northern has been reported excellent, and yields have been running from about 30 to 32 sacks to the acre where the irrigation water was plentiful. Where it was short, some pinto made only eight sacks.

Some contract beans are about ready to harvest, particularly in the upper area, but the harvest will increase next week and kick up through September.

Many sacks of bean hull have to be cut in the valley, but a few loads of commercial already have entered the warehouses. Quality of the first loads of pinto and Great Northern has been reported excellent, and yields have been running from about 30 to 32 sacks to the acre where the irrigation water was plentiful. Where it was short, some pinto made only eight sacks.

Sweet corn yields have been running about one ton average less than normal, though higher than last year. Average yields had risen for Green Giant company, 3 1/2 to 7 1/2 tons, but have dropped this year on account of the conditions to about 1 1/2 tons to the acre. Harvesting is about 60 per cent complete.

Legume beans are coming in.

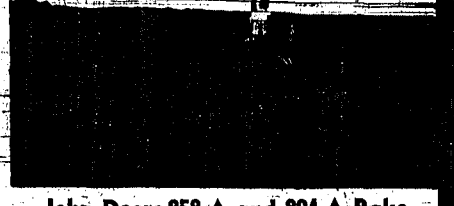

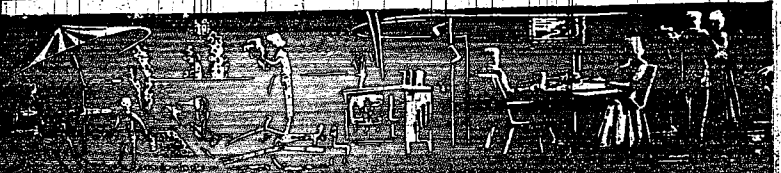

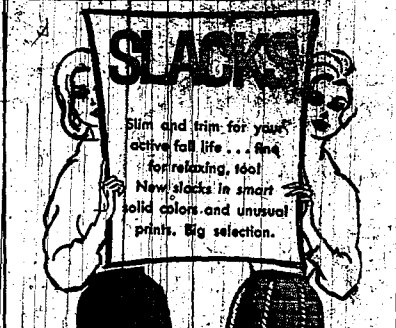

Books in Review

Writer's Version of Old Theme Is Credible Work

A Trip Into Town, by Michael Rubin (Harper). The novelist who writes about the younger generation in "The Young Man" has written a satire on the struggle between Chinese communists and human nature.  
The western reader must be possessed of a detailed mental agility to understand the nuances of meaning in this book. He must perform a delicate balancing act, attitude toward life and then adjust further to the interplay of the new order of the Oriental perspective. It is not too difficult in this book, and fortunately Lee has maintained an early, universal approach to his narrative.  
Cripple Man is the typical proletarian who is confused by the dictates of the red order, but is too simple to resist them. Professor Chang—who finds it discreet to ask his students to call him Comrade Shi—and Chairman Wang, the cultural commissar, are more complicated figures who play principal roles in this story of communism's impact upon the somewhat inscrutable Oriental mind.  
He Own Man, by Martha Gellhorn (Simon and Schuster). If you like a sophisticated tale of the international life set, this is your book. It was written by an accomplished master of the subject. Of its type, it is first class.  
There are three people in this book, and the central figure is Ben Richards, a sophisticated man going for him. He has discovered that through formation scholarship one can become a Communist graduate student at the Sorbonne, studying some obscure specialty such as Chinese culture, and living a comfortable life on the Left bank. He also has discovered that when men do not know where to go, they usually go to the women are apt to pursue men. Together, these two principles can make life in Paris a pleasant hedonistic experience for an American in his mid-thirties.

"The Sun Also Rises" (1957) ran into creative and censorship problems. The hero's epistolization could not be treated as frankly as in the book. And the gay, life international set seemed somewhat dated after 30 years.

How has Hemingway fared so far with his other works?

"The 12th" "A Farewell to Arms" with Cooper and Helen Hayes remains fond in recollection.

The 1937 "Farewell" was less successful. David Semick tried to give it "Gone With the Wind" proportions.

"The Breaking Point" (1950) actually used a title of "To Have and Have Not," and it was a sharp, well-kept job, especially in the dialogue.

"The Killers" (1946) started out with the Hemingway short story, then lengthened on the plot in faithful style.

"The Snows of Kilimanjaro" (1951) was a less happy expansion of a Hemingway short story.

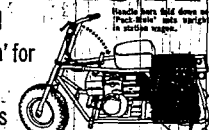

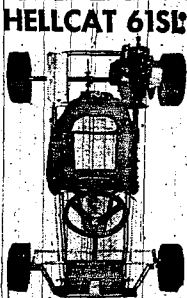

## Solve Lawn Trouble by Noting This Check List

During outdoor living season lawns are subjected to their toughest tests. Even when the sun is bright, problems will develop.

Use this check list to see if you lawn thriving. If grass looks green in the neighbor's yard, review your fertilizer program.

Fuzzy, yellowish grass generally indicates lack of plant food, especially nitrogen. Grass is a big nitrogen user. A summer top-dress of 12-6-6, 16-8-8, 10-5-8 or similar high-nitrogen fertilizer will help build vigorous growth. A simple soil test will indicate if lime is required to avoid soil acidity. Grass won't thrive in acid earth.

**Look for Label**

In choosing a lawn fertilizer, check the label. Those containing urea-nitrogen will release nitrogen slowly and more evenly to give longer, more uniform growth.

If you see stripes of green and yellow-green, they are usually from faulty fertilizer spreading. Be sure to overlap rows when applying plant food. It also helps to apply half the amount in one direction; the other half at right angles for uniform coverage.

Spots of lighter color often mean a clogged spreader. Check it on a bare strip of uniform distribution. Also clean it well after each use to avoid clogging and clumping.

**Causes Nitrogen**

Dead spots of grass can result from several causes. Most common are soaked soil or gasoline, excess fertilizer or weed killer, shallow soil over a septic tank and animals.

In most cases, flooding is the best solution. Remove old soil, flush the tank for back-wash water, then put new sod in place. It may be raised extra grass to gully and when needed.

Two new developments often gets waterlogged. You can build individual dry wells for each downspout, lay tile or perforated drainage pipes to get rid of excess rain water.

Big up the waterlogged spots about six inches deep. Mix peat moss and sand with good garden soil for replacement. Then water. Then put new sod in place. It may be raised extra grass to gully and when needed.

**Damage by Animals**

Random dead spots surrounded by green grass usually indicate animal damage. Replacing sod is best, after you have corrected the cause by some diplomatic talk with the dog owner.

Underground grubs also cut roots and weaken grass, creating blotchy areas. Cut a slice of turf and check soil beneath it for grubs. If grubs are present, use insecticides such as chlordane, dieldrin, aldrin or DDT. They can be applied in granular form with fertilizer or in sprays to eliminate insects.

On all garden problems, identify and remedy the cause before you repair the damage. Preventing trouble saves the expense and effort of the cure.

**Balanced Arrangements Make Room Attractive**



Balancing furniture arrangements to make a room attractive from the patio as well as from inside the house, is stressed by designers as a means of doubling living enjoyment in modern, glass-walled homes. "This means that rooms opening onto the patio must be considered as part of the over-all outdoor living area, and as such should be arranged to present a pleasing balance of furnishings from outside, and not just when viewed from indoors," Miss Pallas continued.

One of the important points of open planning is the feeling of spaciousness it creates by joining a room to its surroundings in all directions, expanded, thus making the garden or patio an integral part of the room. To interrupt this indoor-outdoor flow with bulky furnishings is defeating the purpose of the design by isolating the two areas, cutting down the feeling of space and giving the impression from outside that the patio is not an integral part of the house.

One solution is the use of furniture placement is the use of "flexible" arrangements. By forming occasional chairs, sofas and tables into a free-standing group within the room, all as the background, ample seating is provided, while leaving the floor area near the window unobstructed. This unit arrangement leaves plenty of floor space for easy indoor-outdoor movement.

**Rapid Print Processors May Be Aid to Amateurs**

By HARRY KINCH  
First it was pictures in a minute, then pictures in 10 seconds. Now it's prints in a matter of seconds without the need of a darkroom, trays or enlarger.  
The new quick picture process designed primarily for the amateur is the Rollaprint system.  
The Rollaprint unit, which makes 3 1/2 by 4 1/4 prints, consists of a compact printer and a section for exposing the print.  
The 3 1/2 by 4 1/4 paper is passed between rollers from a developer solution to a stabilizer solution. The first set of rollers squeeze a thin film of activator solution on the paper. It then passes through the stabilizer solution and another pair of rollers that damp-dry the print and direct it out of the machine.  
The operator of the Rollaprint machine transports the paper by means of a hand crank.  
This seems to be a feasible drawback since the speed with which the operator turns the crank may vary from print to print and thereby alter the total value of the finished photograph.  
Other larger and more expensive models by various manufacturers that operate by means of an electric motor and can produce enlargements up to 11 by 14 inches also are becoming available. Rollaprint also has "professional" models that is similar to its smaller cousin but which accommodates paper up to 9 by 12 1/2.  
These rapid processors, it takes about 15 seconds to make a print, may prove a boon to amateurs who have limited time to devote to darkroom work. The convenience, speed and low cost per print is a combination hard to beat.

**Specialist Gives Tips on Cooking**  
EAST LANSING, Mich., Sept. 1 (AP)—A Michigan State University foods and nutrition specialist indicates there's more to the cook-out than just putting the meat on the fire.  
Anita Dean, the specialist, says charcoal won't produce the even heat if should be subject to draft. She also says barbecue sauce should be used sparingly unless the aim is to mask the natural meat flavor; extra charcoal should be warmed before being added to the fire and good ventilation is essential when using a charcoal fire indoors because it uses a large amount of oxygen.
