## AW Bid On Profit Dropped

DETROIT, Sept. 4 (UPI)—The United-Auto Workers hoped to get a counter offer from General Motors by dropping its profit-sharing demands and starting negotiations for a \$30,000,000 GM raise if no agreement is reached in two days.

With tension building toward the 10 a.m. Wednesday deadline, UAW President Walter P. Reuther and GM Vice President Louis G. Beaton scheduled a special holiday meeting and Reuther planned to leave early Monday for a Labor Day speech. Then return later.

Reuther who asked GM to follow American Public and share profits with factory workers, withdrew the demands Wednesday.

Reuther stated his unwillingness to accept profit sharing.

Instead, he asked GM to match the UAW demands for a 10 percent raise, paying for them in an "autonomous way" from corporate funds.

Reuther said a profit-sharing plan offered after American Motors, GM promised to study the UAW request. The firm also agreed to come up with a counter offer of its own soon.

Reuther rejected GM offer last month as "totally inadequate."

The union said yesterday it would work with GM by handling a strike but "Unless we make great headway progress" than that, it would go on strike.

Reuther said he "can't afford a strike" because the union said workers at 129 plants around the country would be on strike.

### Labor Picks Up Boost for Minimum Pay

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—Organized labor picked up a boost in the fight for a federal minimum wage today when the House passed a bill to raise the minimum pay for workers in the federal government.

The bill would raise the wage for federal workers from \$1.15 an hour to \$1.18 an hour. It also would raise the minimum pay for workers in the federal government to \$1.15 an hour.

For regularly covered workers the minimum pay level would be raised to \$1.25 an hour in 1962, and the newly covered group to \$1.15 in 1964 and to \$1.25 in 1966.

President Kennedy's Labor day message said the minimum wage legislation should be a source of national pride, along with housing, social security, and other social aid measures recently adopted by congress.

There was a clear division between opponents—many of them in the modern world—of life in the modern world—many of them look upon man's toil as an expression of individual personality and will—not a commodity to be exploited for the benefit of a state or ruling class. The president said, "The man who desires a man of the modern world and joy of his work."

Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg counted these blessings: More than 60 million Americans at work, average factory output at a record \$4 a week, average per person income after taxes at \$1,974 a year, highest in the world, personal income at 420 million dollars, and national output at \$10 billion dollars, both at record highs.

Goldberg counted as shortcomings, however, the more than 10 million unemployed and the fact many industries are operating below full capacity.

### Initial Phase of Autopsy Is Started on Ill-Fated Reactor

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 4 (AP)—The first phase of an autopsy on an ill-fated reactor is underway at the national reactor testing station.

General Electric company crews are cleaning out the building, which houses a stationary low power reactor that exploded in January and killed three men. The cleaning is in preparation for dismantling the atomic pile. GE has a contract to decontaminate the building, dismantle the reactor core and place it in a hot-shield for storage, study through remote methods.

Because of its significance—the first reactor in the history of the nation's nuclear program to explode with fatal results—the incident has attracted world-wide attention. It precipitated one of the most intensive studies of a facility that the atomic energy commission has ever executed.

### Police Quell Beer-Seeking Mob in East

CLEMONT, Ind., Sept. 4 (AP)—An angry mob of race fans, mad because they couldn't buy beer in Indiana early this morning, tried to do something about it, but were stopped by more than 50 policemen.

The shouting, stomping mob was part of a group of out-of-state fans who have been camping at a park near this Indianapolis suburb during the national drag championships at nearby Speedway park.

Sheriff's deputies said about 150 of the crowd started marching on the business district of Clemont, shouting, "We want beer."

Ten sheriff's cars, 30 state police cars and two cars each from the towns of Speedway and Clemont converged on the angry crowd.

"We were afraid the group would attempt to take over the town and break into a tavern," said Sheriff Robert A. O'Neal. The group dispersed after the officers arrested "but not before 20 were arrested and lodged in a portable jail.

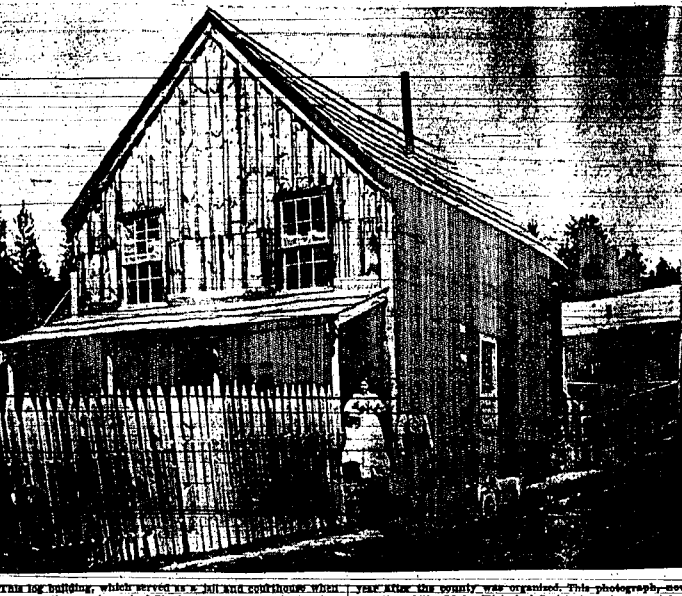

### First County Government in Idaho Was Started Century Ago Saturday

BOISE, Sept. 4.—County government in Idaho began a century ago yesterday. The territory of Idaho had not yet been created, but on Sept. 2, 1854, Shoshone county was organized as part of the territory of Washington.

It included, for practical purposes, everything which is now in the state of Idaho south of a line drawn eastward from Lewis and Clark river to the mouth of the Snake river.

County organization took place at the town of Pierce, now a center of the lumber industry but a booming gold camp, some 20 miles from the mouth of the Snake river. The original gold strike in what is now Idaho, like many historical events, it wasn't simple. The newly chosen commissioners — William L. Cardwell, James Griffin and John T. Udell — drew lots to see who got the long piece of the river. Then they proceeded to organize the county government.

Unfortunally, Pierce, where they were meeting, was outside the county boundaries. For that matter, practically none of the now Idaho gold camps except Elk City and the supply town of Lewiston were inside the official boundaries of Shoshone county, but nobody seems to have challenged the matter, since the organization proceeded without hitch. ### Idaho Solon Scores U. S. Sugar Law

BOISE, Sept. 4.—State Rep. Carl E. Burt, R., Ada, charged this week-end that the 23 million tons of sugar formerly imported from Cuba is now to be imposed from 24 nations without "the usual" 10 percent tariff on United States producers.

Burt, who may seek the Republican gubernatorial nomination in the next election, said the average Idaho citizen is "probably not aware of the damaging effect on Idaho's economy of the recently passed sugar act" which allows the importation of foreign sugar.

According to the U. S. department of agriculture figures, Burt said, this makes a total of 10 million tons of sugar now to be imported from foreign nations — many of which have never before.

Burt said that this Cuban sugar quota was allotted to our own domestic sugar producers. He feels it should have been Idaho producers would have benefited approximately 20 million dollars.

Burt listed some facts that he said "might clarify the situation."

Sugar beet production is vital to the economy of Idaho, from the standpoint of both revenue and employment.

This was the primary motive, administration sources believe, for the challenge to the British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan have thrown to Boyville Premier Khrushchev.

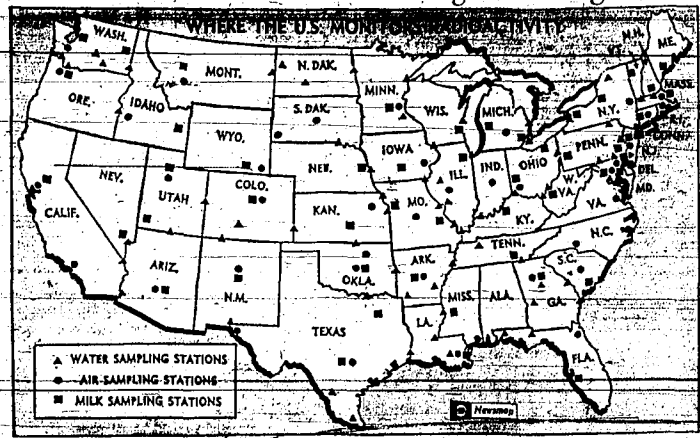
The Cape Cod White House announced that Kennedy and Macmillan called on Khrushchev yesterday to accept an immediate ban on nuclear tests in the atmosphere which would produce radioactive fallout.

He was described as hopeful that a three-power plan would lead to a global agreement guaranteeing that such radioactive particles in the atmosphere.

The Soviet test, last Friday, after nearly three years of presumed nuclear silence, occurred over central Asia. Atomic explosions in the atmosphere unleash radioactivity, contamination and other hazards with the wind, in great measure, fallout can be deadly.

Kennedy and Macmillan called on Khrushchev for an answer by next Saturday.

### Radiation Network Is Atomic Age Listening Post



Though nuclear tests have been suspended since late in 1958, ground health service radiation surveillance continues to operate. Established in 1956 in cooperation with the atomic energy commission, it maintains a continuous check as a means of determining increases in levels of radioactivity due to fallout from nuclear tests. Presently, some 250 to 300 water sampling stations may be in operation. Included in the net, though not shown, are stations in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

### Red Germans Talk of Plan After Treaty

**BERLIN, Sept. 4 (AP)—**The East German communists today to impose air, road and water controls on allied movements to West Berlin after peace treaty with the Soviet Union.

The warning came from Gerhard Eisler, a key propagandist in East Germany, writing in the communist youth newspaper, Junge Welt, that the East German government would send 1,000 American captives to travel through the communist zone to West Berlin.

But, he said, once a treaty is signed with the Soviet Union, "no one can use the highways of the German Democratic Republic without permission."

"They are determined to deal with the government of the German Democratic Republic," he said, "to use the highways and the air corridors."

They are threatened to sign a peace treaty with the East Germans by the end of the year.

### Venezuela's Most Democratic Regime Fighting for Survival on Two Fronts

**BY ROBERT BERRILL, CARACAS, Venezuela, Sept. 4**—The most democratic government in Venezuela is fighting for survival on two fronts—economic and political—against enemies from both the extreme left and right.

With a less able politician than Rómulo Betancourt at its helm, the 20-month-old regime might have gone under in its first year.

The President appears to have weathered the most pressing crisis so far. His position has been improved to some extent by shrewd political maneuvering, but mostly through suspension of some constitutional guarantees.

Grave economic troubles, however, appear to jeopardize hopes for political stability for the remainder of Betancourt's term.

Venezuela—mainly political body lives in one of the richest countries in South America. It has large deposits of oil, iron, aluminum ore. An estimated 100 million dollars pour into Venezuela monthly, for the iron and oil. It has rich farmland.

The annual gross national output is six billion dollars, tripled in the last 18 years.

Only two and one-half years ago Venezuela deposed Dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez and held the popular election that elevated Betancourt to the presidency. Yet now constitutional guarantees are suspended in a country that has known only four years of democratic rule in its 150-year history.

Left-wing extremists argue the government has not gone far enough in its social reform legislation. They say Betancourt is a traitor who sold out to "imperialists."

The government, rocked by strikes, has a high death toll.

"Organized workers through their unions are a powerful force in promoting the general welfare of all our people," he said.

"All progressive legislation which has been placed on our federal statute books during the last 20 years has been sponsored by organized labor."

Organized labor shall continue its fight for progressive legislation and support the noble principles sponsored in the past.

"This is a time for challenge for the American labor movement," he said, "as well as the nation as a whole."
