### Power Trouble

**FILER, Sept. 8**—Two separate incidents involving power outages occurred Thursday evening at the Twin Falls county fairgrounds. The Idaho Power company spokesman said Friday. Apparently an unknown car entered into a power pole in the area, causing the lines to be snapped. The wind later snapped them, but lights were off for a short time during the process. Later a 400 amp fuse blew in the arena, blacking out half the food stands. Fair producers stalled while maintenance men searched for an extra fuse. Joe Taylor, fairgrounds maintenance man, for many years, was injured Tuesday when he fell from a ladder and his sons who were working for him were unable to locate a fuse. Finally an Idaho Power company service man, called to fix the wiring, had to produce the needed fuse. The midway section has its own power plant.

## Storm Carla Speeds Toward Coast Areas

**NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 8 (AP)**—Residents of low-lying areas along the Louisiana coast began evacuating their homes today as Hurricane Carla sped toward the Gulf of Mexico. The New Orleans weather bureau, in an advisory, said Carla—the season's third storm—has become a major hurricane. Carla's course veered during the early morning, and it is now headed in a northwesterly direction. At 10 a.m. the center of the hurricane was about 400 miles south of New Orleans.

The weather bureau said Carla would continue its northerly movement at 10 to 15 miles per hour for the next 12 to 18 hours. The hurricane watch was extended to include the entire Texas coast and areas in effect from Brownsville, Tex., to Apalachicola, Fla., 50 miles southwest of New Orleans, ordered evacuation of all areas outside the city, which is completely surrounded by water. No immediate evacuation plans were issued for Cameron parish, where over 500 persons died in 1960. Hurricane Audrey killed over 100 people here next to the Texas border.

### Red Remark Is Described As Publicity

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)**—The White House today dismissed as publicity seeking Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's offer to meet with President Kennedy.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said pointedly that Khrushchev has not issued any invitation through diplomatic channels but has made a statement in public statements and interviews.

The White House also accused the Kremlin of preparing for the current series of atomic test explosions even while Soviet negotiators were participating in test ban negotiations in Geneva.

In a "U.S. News" report, NATO Secretary General Dirk Stikker said that war over Berlin is a "U.S. News" report, but he declared that if the communists start hostilities, "NATO will fight."

In a "U.S. News" report, talks with state and defense officials, told newsmen that NATO military commander, Gen. Lauris Norstad, has told him: "If anything happens, I have the means to fight and I'll damn well fight."

In his discussion with reporters, Salinger said he considered it significant that Khrushchev had delayed telling the Soviet press that Russia had fired four atmospheric nuclear tests.

Words of Khrushchev's first disclosure to his own people that Russian tests had resumed came at about the time Salinger's meeting with reporters. Unaware of the Khrushchev announcement, Salinger commented: "The people of the Soviet Union still have a right to know the Soviet Union has testing."

**BURLEY, Sept. 8**—Ralph J. Abernethy, 41, Burley, Ore., was reported in good condition today at Ochsle Memorial hospital with injuries received in a one-car accident at 8:15 a.m. Friday about one and three-quarter miles west of Burley on highway 30.

L. E. O. Warrall said Abernethy was going east when the car went off the road, traveled along the shoulder for approximately 100 feet and then tore out about 75 feet of fence owned by Arthur Croner. A revised police report said the driver will face a charge of driving without valid license. The state chamber of commerce has been notified of the accident.

## Red Claims He's Ready for Talks; Allied Note Sent

**Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev** said today he is ready to negotiate the problems of Germany and West Berlin with President Kennedy, provided the President "really means" his suggestion to talk. At almost the same moment, the western allies thundered over a new series of notes in Moscow warning Russia "in the most solemn terms" that any further interference with the Berlin air corridors would be considered an "aggressive action."

The school completed the project at the request of civil defense officials, who selected the school as one of five in Idaho to build the five-person shelter.

## Leader Says French Can Stay at City

**TUNIS, Tunisia, Sept. 8 (AP)**—Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba announced today he was ready to let France remain in Bizerte until the Berlin crisis is solved. French troops there would take only a few weeks.

After that, he said, Tunisia's President Charles de Gaulle of France to agree to evacuate the Bizerte naval and air base by stages.

## Decrease in Jobless Rate Is Forecast

**SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 8 (AP)**—Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon said today he expects unemployment to fall below five per cent in the next 12 months. He said the labor force is growing at nearly seven per cent of the labor force since last December. He said the unemployment rate is expected to be about 4.5 per cent.

The secretary hinted broadly that the U.S. may shortly renew pressures on other NATO governments to carry a greater share of the cost of maintaining U.S. forces in Germany.

## Red Training In Corridors Is Predicted

**BERLIN, Sept. 8 (AP)**—A Hamburg newspaper today said the communist East German army may hold "training maneuvers" in the western air corridors. The article said the training would be held in the corridors to defend their rights to unrestricted use of the vital air lanes to Berlin.

## GM Slating Halt Order Over Strike

**DETROIT, Sept. 8 (AP)**—General Motors said today it would go to court for an injunction to stop an "illegal" wildcat strike by United Auto Workers. The union said the strike threatens to shut down all the giant corporation's automobile operations.

### New Proposal

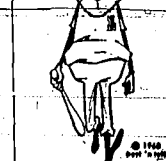

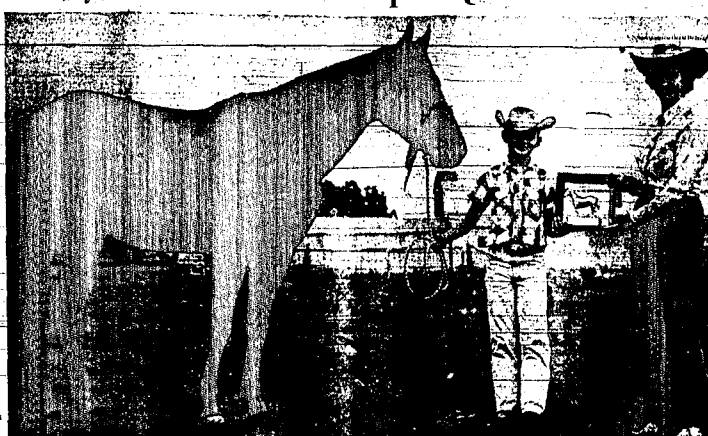

## Second Titan in Two Nights Shot

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Sept. 8. (AP) — The alt. force yesterday successfully launched its second Titan missile in two nights and tested the inertial guidance system for an upcoming more powerful model of the intercontinental range weapon.

### Smylie Hits U.S. on Tax

**SUN VALLEY, Sept. 8 (AP)**—Gov. Robert E. Smylie said here today that there would have been no need to increase road taxes if diversions from the highway user revenues in the federal treasury had been stopped.

The chief executive made his remarks at the annual convention of the Idaho Motor Transport association.

"It would have been unnecessary to raise transportation taxes this year if the federal government had not continued to practice diversion of some of the new, front-end, motor user revenues," Smylie said.

"There is literally no excuse for adding to the gas and fuel taxes and to the taxes on tires and automobiles on the theory that the money is needed to build roads when that same money is being spent on other road building purposes in multi-million dollar chunks for general fund purposes," he said.

### Nuclear Test Shot by U.S. Is Due Soon

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)**—The U.S. administration plans to fire the first shot in a U.S. nuclear test series in about two weeks.

Officials said yesterday the shortest possible time lag, following the presidential inauguration of Tuesday, is the best for diplomatic as well as weapons development purposes.

Those are among the considerations which weighed heavily with Kennedy when he received conflicting interests and feared a "go ahead" to the atomic energy commission and the defense department.

Kennedy acted almost a week after the Soviet government announced it would resume testing, attributing its decision to West-ern military preparations in connection with the Berlin crisis.

The Western powers said the Soviets were trying to provide a propaganda cover by blaming the West. They accused the U.S.S.R. of employing "atomic blackmail" in an effort to compel concessions to its demands.

The Soviet announcement of Aug. 30 broke the three-year-old nuclear moratorium and appeared to put the final mark of failure on East-West nuclear weapons test ban talks at Geneva.

From the moment this decision became known there was no real doubt among those close to the President that the United States would itself begin testing. There is considerable uncertainty about when the decision should be made formally.

### Straw Left in Field After Harvest Is Excellent Source of Organic Matter

JEROME, Sept. 8—The straw left in a field following grain harvest can be a source of organic matter and also an excellent source of fertilizer, says W. G. Priest, Jerome county agent.

Under analysis, this amount of straw will contain nine pounds of calcium, 4.5 pounds of phosphorus, 31 pounds of potassium, seven pounds of sodium, 14 pounds of sulphur, 40 pounds of nitrogen and slightly more than a ton of fiber. All these are essential soil ingredients.

However, to get best results improving the soil and getting better crop the next year, the straw has to be broken down and the ingredients released. The fiber has to be decomposed to form humus and the mineral ingredients released to serve directly as plant food.

Three things are needed before the straw can be broken down, or decomposed. These are soil temperatures above 55 degrees Fahrenheit, soil moisture, and an additional supply of nitrogen. The first item, warm soil temperature, is essential to promote bacterial action. The breaking down process of the straw is conducted by soil bacteria, and these aren't active enough at soil temperatures below 55 degrees. Above this temperature, they are extremely active.

The soil moisture, the second factor needed for soil improvement, is needed to keep the soil organisms in the area where the straw has been placed, either by the plow or the disc. When the surface of the soil dries down, the soil organisms follow the moisture level down, and often this forces the organisms to work below the level of the straw in the ground.

The third requirement, additional nitrogen, is needed to feed the soil organisms while these are working on the straw. The organisms are composed in a ratio of two parts carbon to one part nitrogen. Straw itself has a composition ratio of from five to 12 parts carbon to one part of nitrogen. However, since there isn't an abundance of nitrogen in the straw for the organisms to feed on while working, the majority of these will die before the job is finished. Of course, when their bodies decompose, nitrogen is released and another group of organisms will build up. But this method is slow.

This situation can be remedied by adding 20 pounds of available nitrogen per ton of straw so that the action of the soil organisms will be continuous.

To make conditions ideal therefore for the decomposition of the straw, notes Priest, the field should have 60 to 80 pounds of available nitrogen applied to it, be plowed as soon after grain harvest as possible, and have enough moisture added to keep the soil moist enough for even sprouting seeds in it.

### New Armour Packing Plant Will Have Tremendous Impact Upon Magic Valley

The fact that Armour and company will have capacity to slaughter some 15,000 head of cattle at its new plant east of Hansen leads to the conclusion that the impact on Magic Valley will be tremendous.

Not only will this new plant, to be completed next fall, influence the feedlot industry to more than double its size in the valley, but it also will impress upon the West Coast the fact that its future food supply will come from this and other similar areas in the West.

Clarks Nelson, Los Angeles staff assistant, to the executive vice president, Albers Milling company, said recently one reason his firm bought out Feed and Supply center, Twin Falls, in order to manufacture a complete line of animal feeds in southern Idaho, was that the company sees Magic Valley as being the future "food basket" for the West Coast.

Nelson, who is son-in-law of D. H. Stewart, chairman of the Garrison Milk company, parent organization of Albers Milling company, said all calculations for this area showed the cattle industry was going to increase rapidly. And following this increase would be an increased use of feeds, minerals, antibiotics and the like.

Nelson said a persuasive reason for Albers to come to Magic Valley was the knowledge that Armour and company was going to build a slaughtering plant here.

Cattle on feed would certainly increase rapidly in numbers in this valley, he asserted—large quantities of grains and hay would be shipped out of this area and these could just as well be processed into feeds here, and Armour and company will be able to furnish Albers Milling company, and other similar feed manufacturing groups, with a steady supply of meat scraps.

D. R. Mostardi, resident engineer for Armour and company, pointed out Thursday that the company will have a silo project near the building, and that some of the dried scraps will be sold locally. The firm itself will not make feed mixes in this area, but it will make those available to those interested. Fish farm owners also will be concerned with this and other by-products.

Mostardi said the new plant east of Hansen, which will be located midway between the overpass and the feedlot, will occupy 46,000 square feet of space.

In addition, outside the building will be eight roofed holding pens and about four open holding pens for the animals waiting to be slaughtered. Each of these pens will have feed troughs and watering places. The total area for the holding pens will encompass

## 'Lanny Budd' Series Slated

MONROVIA, Calif., Sept. 8 (AP)—Pulitzer prize-winning author Upton Sinclair, 82, heavily and will writing at 83, has signed a contract allowing production of his famous "Lanny Budd" novels as a TV series.

The books—fictionalized history covering the period from World War I through World War II—describe the political life of the era through the eyes of Sinclair's hero, Lanny Budd.

"Lanny was brought up as a playboy and became serious because of the terrible world crisis he found himself growing up in," Sinclair said. "His father's position put him in the center of the struggle so he knew all about it. He had to choose between his mother's fashionable world and the more serious call of civilization."

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 8 (AP)—There they were—the whole Hitler gang—Adolf Hitler, Hermann Goebbels, Himmler, Breicher, Bormann, Strasser, Jodl, Keitel and Adolf himself with girl friend Eva Braun.

Robert Abernethy, Washington correspondent for NBC news, has a new assignment beginning Sept. 16. He will be the "on-the-air" editor of a new show called "Update," a program of news and current events for young people but not about them.

Abernethy hopes, in fact, that parents will be as interested as young people in his Saturday (noon eastern time) evening of feature, history and personality sketches.

Before putting the program back together, Abernethy had a long conference with officials of the National Education Association. Then he went back to school—Washington Irving high school in New York City—and had private sessions with teachers.

"I got a sense of the level of interest and concern," he said in an interview. "From the schools there is hardly any significant difference between the interests and level of understanding of teen-agers and adults. The difference is far more one of a basis of intelligence level and family than of age."

"Teen-agers from a home where parents are bright and concerned about the world reflect those characteristics. The situation is just the reverse among people from homes that are the reverse. Teen-agers are much interested in themselves. So are we all. They are interested in the opposite sex. So are we all."

"What I came away with was a sense that it was very important that we be interested—but then this is important for any audience—and that we take the time.

The Polaroid corporation's recently introduced 366 electric eye camera should prove a boon to persons interested in a camera that is easy to operate and will produce high quality prints.

This versatile camera can be operated by a child and the pictorial results are outstanding. There are just four steps from releasing the shutter to removing the finished print from the camera back. Each step is numbered 1, 2, 3, 4—and you are ready for your next shot.

To test the camera under a variety of lighting conditions the 366 proved to be a high-quality picture camera.

An indicator on the top of the camera informs the photographer at a glance whether there is sufficient light for taking a picture. If not, a tiny built-in flash gun that accommodates the penumbra size of light can be swung into position for either bounce or direct flash shot.

The camera utilizes a single element lens which when set at normal has an aperture of f/32. The light-darken ring alters the aperture from f/19 to f/64.

A faster lens is not necessary on a camera that utilizes ultra high speed film such as this camera. It also permits use of a lens of simple design, that virtually eliminates the necessity for focusing.

The camera is of the folding type and opens in two positions.

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 8 (UPI)—The first point to establish in my personal belief that movies have a future—a big one. I am not among the nay-sayers anxious to bury what I consider a very lively corpse. Major studios no longer have their "stable of stars" as they did in the '30s and '40s. What therefore have to find a substitute or compensation for this lack of marquee interest—and the best substitute I have found is better subject matter.

The notion that audiences will only go to see pictures with top ranking stars is fast becoming obsolete. Instead of asking "Who's in it?" customers are demanding to know "What's it about?"

"Dolce Vita," one of the most successful foreign films to reach America in years, has only one recognizable name in its cast: Anita Ekberg. The British "Carry-On" films with no star names have also been extremely successful here because of their comic treatment and subject matter.

Box office lines form principally when audiences know they are going to see pictures with very funny ideas and interesting backgrounds.

### Wall Street Blamed for Complications of Movie

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 8 (UPI)—Producer-director George Stevens blamed Wall Street for the demise of his contract with 20th Century-Fox studios and complications in filming "The Greatest Story Ever Told."

Stevens pulled no punches in blaming the financial "bigwig" for ending his agreement with the studio and forcing him to go ahead with the biblical epic on his own.

"It was not the work of Spyros Skouras or any other executives at the studio," Stevens said unapologetically.

"The New York executive committee determined to postpone the picture indefinitely on the very same day that I was talking to Mr. Skouras here in Hollywood about a starting date for production."

The men are Eugene Woodfin and Milton Gould, chairman of the committee, who gave us their views on how the 'street' felt about the motion picture. Earlier they had even made sug-

gestions about casting. One of them had in mind a Broadway musical adaptation.

At first the Wall Street contingent had hoped to cancel the picture altogether, but Stevens was determined to see it through.

"My attorneys prepared the greatest lawsuit ever filed," he said, "but I reached an agreement. I felt was fair. My contract clearly was for making a picture, not for 'abandoning one,'" he said.

Stevens went on to say that three major American film companies and two European organizations were interested in working with him.

"The European offers were the most attractive, but I want to make 'The Greatest Story Ever Told' in the United States, in our language and with our crew and technicians. We decided against joining the ranks of the so-called 'runaway producers.'"

### Take Load Off Your Feet; Sit Down While You Do Those Kitchen Chores

Sick leave from housekeeping duties is a laugh for the average homemaker. Let a member of the family fall prey to a virus and he is hustled off to bed, patted and pampered and spared from the sticky everyday problems of life.

If the virus hits mom! It's just too bad. A day off to recuperate is about all she can wish for. She'll be out at the door, maybe two days can be spared.

A minor accident or injury is only recognized as a challenge to her ingenuity to carry on despite the handicap.

It's not until you try to follow the advice to stay off your feet that you realize how much you are on your feet — often unnecessarily.

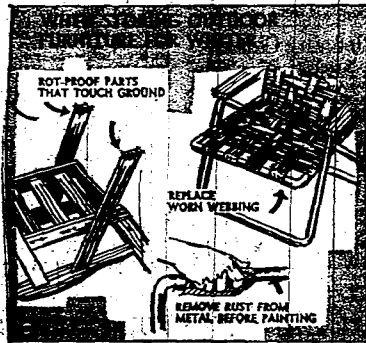

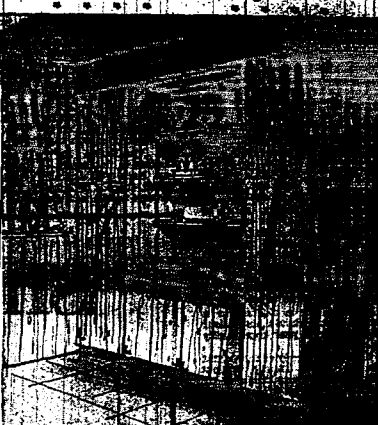

2. Building a fallout shelter, you or your contractor should remember this: Any additional thickness of dense material between you and the outside air will reduce the amount of radiation that reaches you.

Concrete or bricks, earth or sand, are some of the materials heavy enough to afford protection by absorbing radiation. There is about the amount of shielding in eight inches of concrete, for instance, as to 12 inches of earth, or 16 inches of bricks or 30 inches of wood.

Materials for a shelter for a family of four should cost about \$20. To build your own family fallout shelter:

1. Get a free copy of the OGDM booklet "The Family Fallout Shelter" from your local civil defense office or by writing to Box Home Shelter, OGDM, 8444 Chestnut, Mich.
2. Ask your local building authority for a permit to build the shelter. Don't be discouraged if you get a rundown on your first effort. Apply again and if you need technical advice, contact the local civil defense director.
3. Choose a corner of your basement which has no above-ground windows. Or, close off any windows with concrete blocks.
4. Two inner walls of concrete blocks or brick or heavy timber set in place along guidelines of the ceiling will complete the corner-type shelter. In place of a doorway and door, a haffle wall can be constructed within the shelter, leaving an open doorway.
5. Ventilation for basement shelters is not much of a problem. Even with outside windows sealed, there is sufficient air flow through cracks and spaces.

6. To start construction, set a row of solid concrete blocks in about three-eighths of an inch offset in a row along guidelines marked on the basement floor. The corner is built about six blocks high. The remainder of the wall then is raised to the same height. The corner is built up once more and the wall again raised to its level. The wall is not raised all the way to the basement ceiling. Clear space of at least 18 inches is needed over-

8. The first one or two roof boards are slipped into place against the rear wall from one corner post to the other.

9. The roof beams are installed after the mortar in the block wall has dried at least a day. One end of each roof beam is nailed to the wall beam. The other end is nailed to the block wall. Concrete blocks are placed between the beams and put on the boards. The roof blocks are in two layers and are not mortared together.

Finally, check with the subcontractors about the status of masonry, highways, factories, airports, waterways and public buildings.

**Cleaning Chores Assisted by Tile**

"Part of a job is better than none" is probably the most meaningful piece of practical philosophy ever applied to the home—especially where a tight budget is a sticking third party.

With thought, imagination and very little cash outlay, you can add to the convenience and beauty of your home by concentrating on certain strategic areas against the day when a more bountiful budget will allow you to have the "whole loaf."

First, make a complete survey of your present home. Look for small areas that represent major cleaning problems. As you do it, be alert to what can be accomplished with a specific material like ceramic tile that combines beauty, practicality and all-important versatility.

Flush the toilet and run all wall taps to see that there are no clogging pipe blockages which can be eliminated. Try all appliances. Nooks and crannies need lubrication or may be off level.
