Plans for dedication services at 3 p.m. Saturday at the new Twin Falls Seventh-day Adventist church, Grandview drive, were announced Wednesday by the Rev. D. L. Ringering. Work on the new building was started in the spring of 1958, with a majority of the work done by church members. The 130 by 100-foot "T"-shaped building includes a sanctuary which seats 340 persons and an overflow area for 125 persons. The entire area is capable of seating about 600 persons, under crowded conditions. The Seventh-day Adventist church was started in Twin Falls in 1923. In 1925, the church rented a home above Idaho street and in 1927 they moved their meetings to a home on Kimberly road. The house was sold in 1928 and services were held in members' homes until an old church building at Knoll was purchased for \$400 and moved to Twin Falls, where it was located at the corner of Third avenue and Third street north and remodeled.

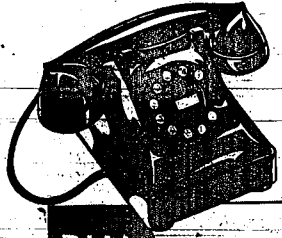

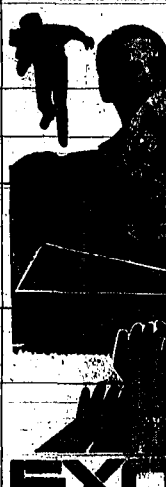

### Good Valley Area Yield Indicated as Beans Begin Pouring to Warehouses

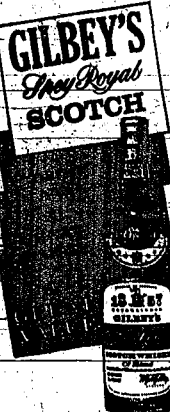
Both commercial and contract beans began to pour into warehouses again the middle of this week after weeks of rain. Damage from the rains was non-existent, except for a few areas where the wind had blown the drying windrows into huge piles, causing pods to shatter and beans and crack open.

Yields, so far, generally are far above last year's, with contract beans yielding extremes of 14 to 28 bushels and plants reported as high as 30 to 35 bushels. About 100,000 acres still have to be harvested, and with the weather threatening from day to day, farmers are showing increased anxiety about the crop.

The bean acreage for the entire state is down 30,000 acres from last year, but since last year was 1959, some observers believe the total crop will be about equal, though yields total acreage is expected at about 100,000 acres.

### Fewer Herds React to Tests for Brucellosis

Fewer dairy herds around Mars Valley showed a positive reaction to the last brucellosis ring test held in August than ever before, reports Dr. M. H. Beard, Gooding, federal veterinarian for this area.

Only 10 herds showed a positive reaction to the ring tests out of 4225 herds in the valley, about 2.5 percent. The 10 herds will have to be blood-tested as a result of the positive reaction, but only one or two of the cows are expected to have the disease.

The ring test for dairy herds was adopted by dairymen and local creameries some six years ago. Samples are taken three times a year from the milk the farmer sends to local creameries, then forwarded to the state laboratory in Boise.

If one cow in a herd has brucellosis, then her milk will infect all the milk in the 10-gallon can or bulk tank. Blood-testing on the farm follows to identify which cow has brucellosis. The brucellosis ring test, or BRT, has saved most farmers the expense of testing the goats with blood samples, a procedure that would otherwise be followed every three years on dairy herds in the valley.

Creameries, herds tested in each, and the number of reacting herds are: Segs (P&O) Milk company, Burley, 272 herds, one reactor here; Swift and company, Twin Falls, 271, none; South Dairy, Buhl, three, none; Segs Milk company, Buhl, 846, four reactors; Kraft, Rupert, 305, two; Jerome Cooperative Creamery, Jerome, 1213, one; Kraft, Malia, 100, two; Kraft, Carey, 188, none; Nilson-Ricks, Richfield, 134, none; Jerome Cooperative Creamery, Burley, 874, one, and Young's dairy, 10, none.

The new unabridged, titled "Webster's Third New International Dictionary," is also the first completely new unabridged in 27 years, a period when more new words and meanings entered the English language than in any similar period in history.  
John F. Kennedy, Dwight D. Eisenhower, General MacArthur, Winston Churchill, Charles G. Don, Somerset Maugham, Ernest Hemingway, Ebbel Merzman, Ted Williams, Duke Snare and Mickey Spillane are among 14,000 contemporary notables whose remarks are quoted along with excerpts from current publications as the major sources of 200,000 new words and meanings introduced in the new Merriam-Webster unabridged in a revolutionary

break with tradition. Source material is a unique Merriam citation file containing 10 million words in context.  
"The second revolutionary defining technique inaugurated by the new unabridged is the use of precise single phrases to define 450,000 entries, including 100,000 new words and new meanings. A third is the simplified system of sound symbols which make all subtle nuances of pronunciation clear for the first time, even to students of English."  
The recent explosion of language has forced into everyday usage an avalanche of bewildering new technical concepts, ranging from a bomb astronomer, beak, den mother and fringe benefit to satellite, solar house, wage and dividend rent—Mr. Gallian said.

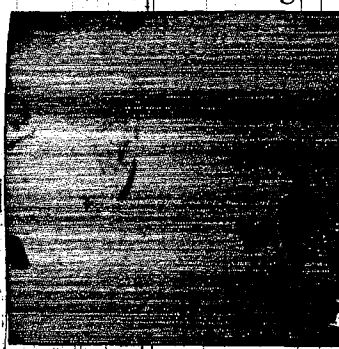

### Miss Bergman's Role in Film Is Switch for Her

One day in Sweden, in 1937, a talented young actress, teamed with that country's dramatic leading man in a film which told the tender story of a girl who falls in love with an older man. The movie was "Intimitet" and it was responsible for catapulting the world's enjoyment of the remarkable talent which made the name of Ingrid Bergman headline news on both the front pages as well as in the entertainment sections of newspapers all over the world.

Now, at 43, looking years younger, never more witty or ebullient, Miss Bergman appears in another love story which tells, this time, of a woman her age who falls in love with a man 15 years younger. It is "Goodbye Agatha," the filmization of Francisco Sagan's best-selling novel. Yves Montand co-stars as the older man who loves her in the film, and Anthony Perkins is the youth.

First brought to the United States by David O. Selznick to make the American version of Intimitet, Miss Bergman starred opposite the beloved Leslie Howard and the picture was an immediate success.

She began her fabulous motion-picture career with "Adam Had Four Sons," "Rage in Heaven," "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," and later "Casablanca." "For whom the Bell Tolls," "Saratoga Trunk," and "Obsession" for which she received her first Academy award, for best actress, of 1944. In 1945 Bergman made "The Belles of St. Marys" and "Spellbound" for which the New York film critics named her best actress of that year.

Following World War II she made four top Hollywood pictures: "Notorious," "Arch of Triumph," "Joan of Arc," and "Under Capricorn." Most recently Bergman starred in "Indiscreet" and "The Inn of the Sixth Happiness" and won her second Academy award for best actress in "Anastasia."

### Is Filmland Distressed? Actor Sees Need for Aid

HOLLYWOOD Sept. 15 (AP)—U. S. government aid for a distressed Hollywood? Actor MacDonald Carey, senior, argues it could halt the local movie industry from moving to steadily or the Vis Veneto.

Carey doesn't envision subsidies for plowing under budding young stars, but he seriously believes some sort of financial guarantee is needed to soothe the critical condition of Hollywood films.

"England, Spain and other countries give financial aid to producers who abort their pictures there. Why not here?"

"That's the big reason for run-away production," says Carey who just returned from eight weeks of picture making in England.

"In England, the producer is assured return of his negative cost by government guarantee. He knows he can't lose.

Even such a relatively poor country as Ireland gives financial aid to movie-makers. The reason? Movie production means jobs

publicly not always good and an influx of big spenders.

Carey, with a large family rooted here, isn't happy about having to go abroad for his work.

"I've even had an offer to make an English resident—so you know how deep they've bitten into our industry here.

"Last year both London and Rome produced nearly more movies than Hollywood—and Japan produced three times as many—all with some government help," Carey declares.

Aid for Hollywood sounds ludicrous on the surface. But it's not really so, he says.

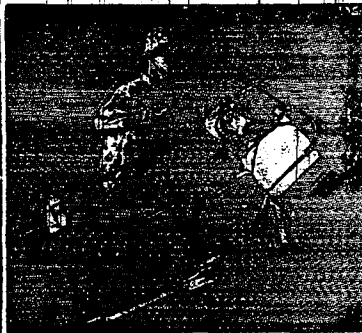
"This film is an industry—a glamorous industry, true—but also an industry that provides thousands of jobs for ordinary working people. They're the ones that are hurting now."

Typical of Hollywood's financial straits now is a recent disclosure that 20th Century Fox, the town's second-biggest studio, suffered a 20-million-dollar production loss this year.

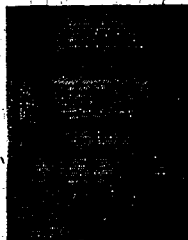

## Keep Mobile Home Light, Bright

How do you decorate a mobile home? More than 1,200,000 of these transient units now are called home by retired couples, arid persons, young married people and others who find them a great convenience.

Decorative consultant Betty Jennings says the main object should be to make the mobile home cheerful and durable through the use of color and proper materials.

A typical decorating scheme she has suggested to manufacturers includes oak plywood walls, dark textured brown coach, bright orange small chair, dark beige carpet.

"Since the kitchen can be seen from the living area, it's a good idea to carry the color from the living room into the kitchen," she points out.

"She uses short orange curtains and other accessories, and the same living room wall paneling for kitchen cabinets."

The bathroom is ideal to be in a pastel color or white. She says a white.

"I choose light colors as much as possible because dark woods and dark colors tend to make the area look smaller. One can use accents of darker colors, perhaps in one wall. Light colors may be used in small-scale furniture. (The new plastic-grain finishes are very attractive.)"

A mobile home may be from 10 by 45 feet to 10 by 60. It is transported by truck rather than by car, and it is dropped on either blocks where it will be up to electricity, water tank and other home conveniences. The industry estimates more than 2 1/2 million people now live in them.

Young married couples who invest in mobile homes at a cost of from \$5,000 to \$10,000 frequently add another unit when the family grows. Then something is built in between, a glassed-in area, that can serve many useful purposes.

"Many mobile homes have extensible flooring and sides, often telescoping out as much as 20 feet. When the living room and bedroom is extended in this way, some home owners add a screened-in porch between the sections," Betty says.

"The main idea is to make the homes more livable as we progress. The level of design has become better as more people live in these homes," she explains. "Park owners are taking more pride in their project, offering mobile home people better community development, attractive landscaping and other features available usually to the residential home owner."

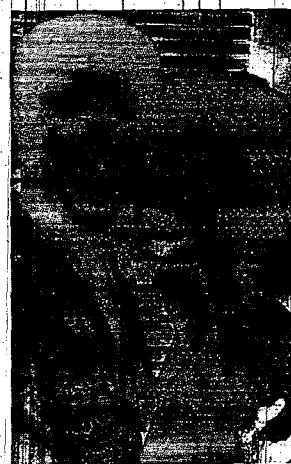

These names represented a certain entertainment value. The public, seeing their names on a marquee or in a newspaper ad, knew what to expect of the movie. It was just as the advertised presence of a Garbo, Cagle or Cooper promised certain values.

The brutal fact is that the best actor can only be as good as his material.

# Child Should Learn How to Be Solvent

By KAY SHEERWOOD  
The process of negotiations with children's objections to their allowances. With the cost of school supplies, clothes, food, transportation and a proliferation of special fees and dues assailing our beleaguered budgets, it is as good a time as any to discuss who will pay for what.

Money management is an important lesson for a child to learn, but it's a hard one to teach.

How large should a child's allowance be? What should it cover? How early should you start? These familiar questions have no pat answers.

In one group of typical sixth graders, some children received no allowances, getting money as they needed it from their parents, others received it and a month to spend as they chose. Neither formula suited our family.

Although not intended as a hard and fast set of rules, I read suggestions made by experts in the publication by the American Bankers' association: a 4-year-old starting a child on an allowance as soon as he can tell one coin from another.

A modest, regular allowance should cover stipulated items and it should be essentially "using" or spending money. An allowance in itself, of course, shouldn't cover necessities unless you deliberately allow for them.

Parents make an allowance dependent on good behavior, they counsel. Permit no begging for extras. How he spends his money is up to him.

As they grow older and take on more responsibility, their allowances should increase. At the beginning of school, we supply the basic necessities (notebooks, pencils, etc.) but the frills and fads must come from allowances.

You might be surprised by the generous weekly minimum allowances suggested by the bankers' group. They say: Give a 6-year-old a week 10 cents under 6 years old, 45 cents for the 6-to-11-year-old, 90 cents for the 12-to-14-year-old and at least \$1.50 for the over-15 year group.

Part of the value of the allowance is to encourage a child to save as well as spend. The youngsters who can save money looking ahead to future purchases won't find it so difficult to budget purchases when they become teenagers.

By teen-age, a spending-and-saving plan should be set up. In such a plan the young person divides expenses into major categories for school, clothing, personal care, recreation, donations, transportation and hobbies.

Dad may help him figure her income from allowances, part-time jobs and gifts. Some set amount should be set aside for regular saving. Bankers suggest that adults save 10-20 per cent of take-home pay at this point, a savings account which pays interest on the money may be a good idea.

For the unprofessional home decorator, the better presented problem. But there is help at hand, and at no charge. Visit your local department store and take a look at the sample books there.

You will find in almost every sample book groups of coordinated papers that make a good starting point for a decor. For the scheme, two, three or even four papers are tied together.

## Added Space Problem for Many Homes

The need for additional living space is often what comes to mind first and most forcibly when the family gives thought to the matter of how its present home can be made to accommodate its requirements more comfortably and conveniently.

If the family has increased in size, perhaps one or more extra bedrooms will get top priority on the home improvement schedule, or possibly indicated for early consideration will be a study where dad can read or work to peace, a sewing room for mother, a playroom for the children or a family room for everybody to enjoy.

First step in any such program is to evaluate the house in terms of its practical possibilities for remodeling or creating the desired extra room or rooms.

Fortunately for those concerned with expanding a home's living facilities, almost every house has unused space that could readily be converted into useful extra rooms.

In many homes an unused attic will provide ample space for one or two extra bedrooms for the children or guest rooms. Another good source of useable space is the basement, which often offers excellent possibilities for an attractive recreation room, library room, hobby room or TV lounge.

# Brush? Roller? Sprays? You Can Have Choice for Doing Fall Painting Jobs

Which will you use for your fall painting job—a brush or a roller? Or will you try for extra speed and use a sprayer?

Although there are surfaces that can be painted with any of the three—any large flat surface for example—you will find that one type will be more suitable for a particular job than another.

Brushes are the oldest of the three and the most versatile. A certain amount of skill is necessary the average user can generally acquire enough skill to do a reasonable job.

By Good Brushes

By Good Brushes begin with. They are worth the extra dollars in terms of the better job they will do in the extra years they will last. Of course, how long they last depends on the care you give them. Essentially, all this means is cleaning them immediately when you finish painting.

For the ordinary house painting, a brush is the best choice. And for trim—around windows—the brush is just about the only choice.

Use as big a brush as you can handle providing the surface you are painting is flat. When it comes to a four inch brush will speed your work. But keep small trim brushes handy for the hard-to-get-at spots. Squeezing a large brush into a tight corner will also squeeze the life out of it.

Rollers Popular

The roller has been the great boon to amateur painters in years. Just dip and roll the paint on "without worry" over brush marks. Not only is it easy to use, but they also are fast. For close work you will still need a brush. Rollers that won't go where wall meets ceiling, not without some messy smearing.

Use the roller indoors on plaster walls or paneled walls, outside on brick walls (which would tear brush bristles). A roller also can save time when painting a wire fence.

Whether you use mops, lambs wool (really a synthetic) or sponge rubber, be sure to clean immediately. A deep nap will get into the cracks of a rough surface.

Keeping a check list of things to be done around the home is half the work. When it comes to painting, the first step is keeping a record of what must be done, then the work begins.

Easy to Clean

Get the type of cleaner on which the cover slides over a cylinder. They're easy to take apart and clean. With a few strokes of the hand you can change colors easily.

Sprayers are expensive but they are the fastest way to paint. Rough shingles are often easier to paint with a spray than brush. Masonry walls also take well to spraying. A sprayer calls for skill. Too close and the paint will pile up and run. Too far and it will be thin and spindly. If you don't move the gun evenly, keeping the same distance from your work all the time, the paint will not be even. Do not work in the wind. Do not work in the weeds of a fence.

Spraying will provide a glossy surface free of brush marks on most objects. Again, for trim, you might as well use a brush. Around windows, for example, you would have to do considerable masking.

## Famed Photographer Has Tips for Taking Pictures

By BART KINCH

How does one go about getting an unusual photograph?

Can the average amateur photographer take any positive steps to assist in the birth of a photographic idea?

One of today's most renowned photographers, Philip Halseman, answers both these questions and many others in his latest book, "Halseman on the Creation of Photographic Ideas" (Ziff-Davis).

Halseman, a native of Riga, Latvia, who came to the United States at the start of World War II, has built an enviable reputation as a magazine photographer. His photographs have appeared in leading magazines throughout the world and he has had his photographs on the cover of Life magazine 62 times.

Now in this small 96-page book the famous photographer reveals his method of creating photographic ideas.

Aimed at amateur photographers as well as professionals, the book suggests six rules and six kinds of stimulation which, if followed, could turn an ordinary photograph into an artistic creation.

Each rule and stimulation is illustrated by the author and he explains in detail the particular approach to illustrate an idea or situation.

In capsule form the six rules are:

- The rule of the direct approach.
- The rule of the unusual technique.
- The rule of the added unusual feature.
- The rule of the missing feature.
- The rule of the compound idea or idea.
- The rule of the literal or ideographic feature.

After discussing the application of these rules with 22 examples from his own work, Halseman outlines the stimulation creative photographer can put to use to generate the artistic process of photography.

Stimulation by brainstorming.

Stimulation by memory.

Stimulation by knowledge.

Stimulation by an object.

Stimulation by the photograph itself.

Halseman believes that every photographer who applies these rules and stimulations soon will find the "making" photographs instead of "taking" pictures.

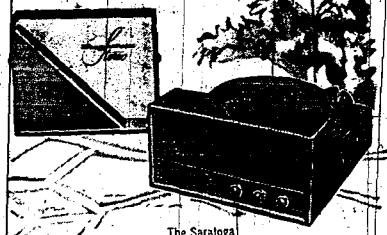
The "best laundry" technique requires the use of very thick "dry" suds—made by beating a handful of soap or detergent with very little water until the lather stands up in stiff, meringue-like peaks. To lighten color further, a teaspoon of ammonia may be added to this mixture. Then supply yourself with a large bowl or tub. Use a cloth, sponge, or soft brush to apply the beaten lather to one small section of the upholstery at a time. # Freeze-Tips Are Offered For Savings

URBANA, Ill., Sept. 15 (AP)—For more effective home freezing, consider these suggestions from Betty Schaffner, University of Illinois home economist:

- Foods seasoned with onions are equally disappointing when frozen, since freezing weakens the flavor of onions.
- Frozen cooked meat tends to have a warmed-up flavor when reheated. For better flavor, freeze the raw meat and cook after thawing.
- Potatoes frozen in skins become mushy when thawed. It is advisable to add frozen potatoes to frozen stew or other mixtures when preparing to serve.
- When preparing a casserole containing vegetables to be frozen, undercook slightly to avoid overcooking the vegetables in the finished dish.
- Frozen white sauce thickened with flour or cornstarch tends to separate when thawed, so freeze only the meat and broth and prepare the sauce just before serving.
- Custard-type pie fillings have a poor consistency after freezing.
- For safety's sake, never try to freeze a stuffed turkey. The stuffing may spoil before the turkey is thoroughly frozen.

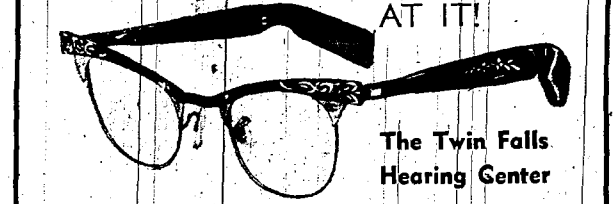

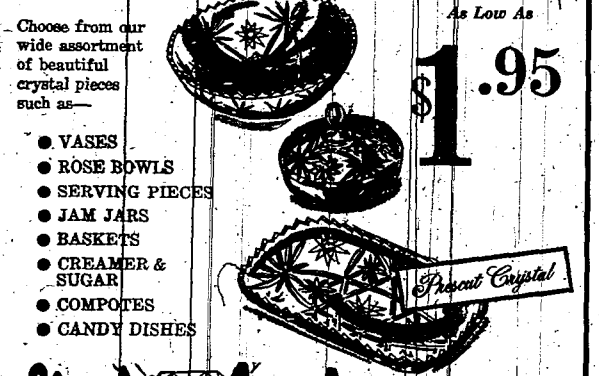

### Creeping RF Interference Is Most Frustrating Hi-Fi 'Bug'

BY JOHN WARNER. One of the most frustrating bugs that can creep into a high fidelity system is RF interference. That is, radio frequency stimulation. It can come from a radio station, an amateur radio operator's rig, a television signal, or any other source of electrical appliances.

Interference from radio stations, amateur radio operators, TV and X-ray generally manifests itself as a buzz, hum or high-frequency squeal. In some cases that involve broadcasting, voices come blasting through the speaker of high fidelity systems. Material protruding from appliances inside the house manifests themselves as pops when appliances are turned on or off. This type of interference can often be corrected at the source with a commercial AC line filter.

But more exotic types of interference can't be corrected as easily. According to a discussion of means to fight RF interference by engineers of Dynaco, the Philadelphia kit makers, there are, surprisingly, many ways a high fidelity rig could be picking up the interference. And it
