Curious Attitude

No millionaire is expected to demonstrate an anti-business attitude unless he acquired his wealth as a leader of organized labor. But President Kennedy and his administration seem bent on maintaining an anti-business course.

Columbia, Jay Tucker noted in his Times-News column last Friday that President Kennedy's "invitation" to the steel industry to maintain present prices carried the implied warning that the government will freeze prices and wages if it sees fit.

Mr. Tucker went on to point out that the President's letter doesn't actually threaten a wage freeze in the steel industry, although it sets the stage for such action.

In fact, the entire Kennedy letter is tougher on the steel industry than it is on labor," points out Mr. Tucker.

Similarly, when the Kennedy administration was applying pressure on the auto industry and United Auto Workers to avoid a strike, pressure was applied on the car manufacturers to the point where manufacturers negotiated made concession after concession to the union.

Previously, the Kennedy administration has favored government development and distribution of power in the West, a program contrary to the principles of free enterprise.

Attorney General Robert Kennedy, following up on the Eisenhower administration's exposure of price-fixing in the electrical equipment industry, charged the whole business community with "moral apathy."

And the President blamed "widely spread business cynicism" to fix prices of "basic commodities" for causing the nation's inflation.

It is hard to quarrel with the price-fixing charges. Collusion in the industry has cost consumers millions of dollars.

But the President's administration is not doing enough to set a precedent against price fixing in the government of U. S. bureaucrats.

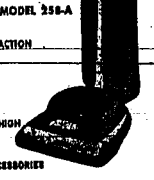

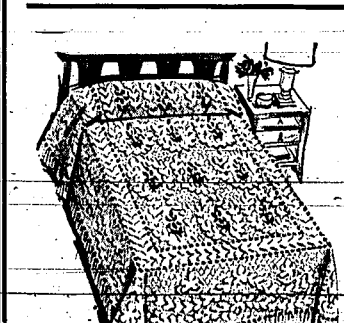
Mrs. Laughlin's essay, "Jobs for the handicapped—a community challenge," discusses three handicapped persons and how they find jobs.

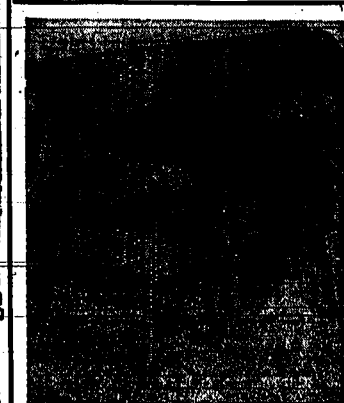

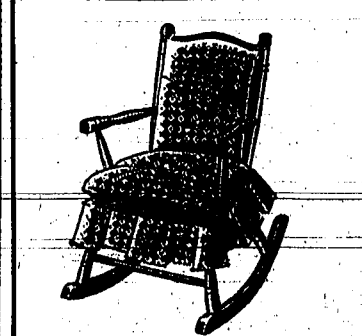

Idaho Interest Increases for Civil Defense Preparedness

BOISE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Idaho civil defense officials report a "tremendous" increase in civil defense preparedness throughout the state.

The last few weeks have brought ready to hand requests for information at the state office as well as the rest of the year put together. Lieut. Col. James S. Keel, Jr., state civil defense director, reports.

Ada county civil defense director, Norman Jones, said the quest for information from his office on radiation, fallout shelters and home preparedness has increased 500 per cent.

The rise in interest is attributed mainly to the Berlin crisis. Jones said two months ago his office averaged not more than one or two queries a day. Now he said his office is getting 35 a day.

The pamphlets cover fallout shelter plans, fallout information, first aid, emergency food needs, sanitation and other questions.

The number of requests for films has doubled, Keel said, "and we can't fill them all."

Keel said he has received more than 35 requests from other states for plans of a community fallout shelter of the type planned by a group of Boise residents and built with matching federal funds.

The underground shelter, with two levels, is in the Boise highlands, and is the first of its type.

Put simply, this is: Wages have gone on rising each year under union pressure. Added to this greater labor costs are all the other factors: higher transportation, distribution, repair, servicing charges. These steadily rising costs have pushed prices higher.

This has been offset to a debatable degree by a rise in productivity, which means the use of machines and automatic controls to get more goods from fewer man-hours. Labor insists that productivity has risen as fast as or faster than operating costs.

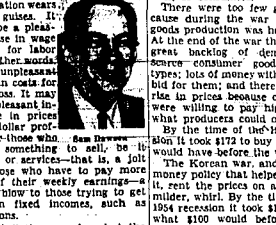

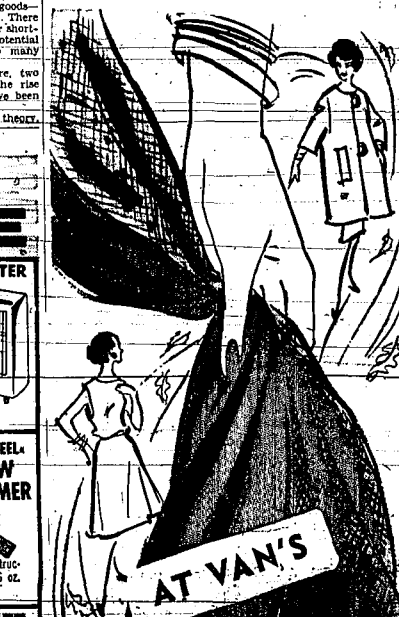

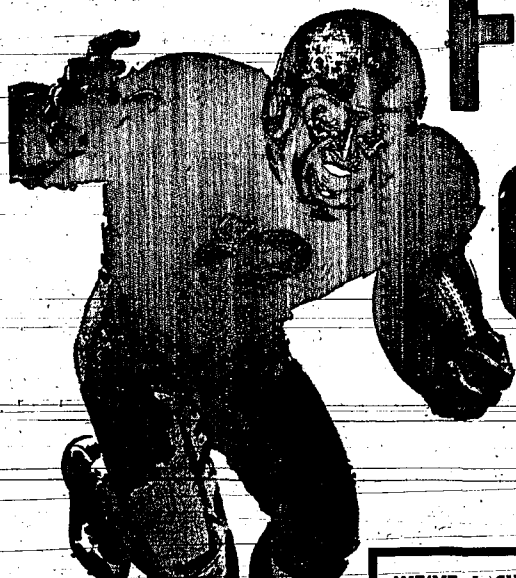

Southern Idaho Duck Hunters Come Alive in Mid-October



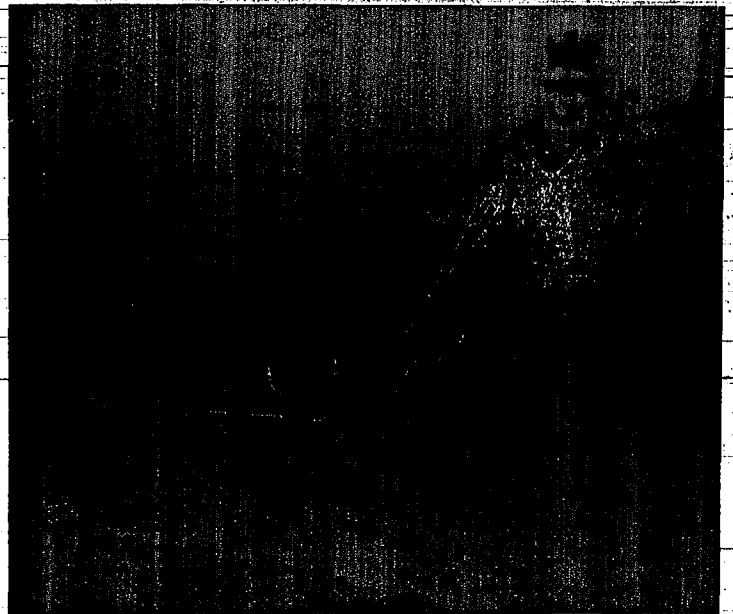
A familiar scene after Oct. 14 in Southern Idaho will see hunters placing decoys in streams and shivering in nearby blinds. This year's migratory waterfowl season has been shortened 15 days in the Pacific Flyway area, but the regulations are more liberal than in many other parts of the country. Shooting will

start at noon on Oct. 14 and continue through Dec. 27. Bag limit of five ducks per day is retained, plus a "bonus" of two mallards daily in certain counties. Three Canadian geese may be taken each day during the same 75-day season. (Sun Valley color photo—staff engraving)

Southern Idaho Hunting Is Good But Tall Tale Telling Adds Zest

SUN VALLEY, Sept. 20 (Special)—It is an interesting question whether in the sport of hunting it is the hunt itself or the tall tale afterwards—true tales and tall tales—that adds the zest to the sport.
Sun Valley has a wealth of stories including three new ones this year about the bow and arrow hunters.
First, about Paul Ramlow, one of the real experts with the

hunting bow, who stalked an elk through snow, rain and sleet and got within easy shooting distance only to find that his hands were so cold and wet by that time that they just slipped around on the bow—no elk.
Then about Nimrod Carl Mauline, who spotted a bull grazing in the meadow by the Russian John ranger station, one evening. Next morning he was out bright and early and in answer to his call the big bull came up

the hill towards him, just as he shot his bow string snapped and there he was—the bull pawing the ground, circling him and making mighty certain that the hunter wasn't going to go anywhere. When the elk finally let him get away he found his arrow so deeply imbedded in a tree and he had to carry home a piece of tree trunk to retrieve the arrow.
There is also the story of Bob Black, Glen Phillips and Denny

Schwartz, who after hunting in Boulder basin all day were coming home without game.
As they neared Richburg, which would be funny if that near home they got a shot at a deer or elk. Just then one boy three elk walked across the road one target for each archer.

Archery Hunting for Big Game Has Become Popular Sport in Gem Area

Idaho Fish and Game Department people who still equate big game archery hunting with the kind done to buck yards by 6-year-olds, are beginning to upgrade the sport. There are many reasons for the change in attitude. One is that Fred Bear, a Michigan trophy hunter of international repute, has come to Idaho and now is in the primitive area stalking bighorn sheep. This is the only major North American game animal he has not bagged with a bow and arrow. Nobody has in modern times. Last year, Bear killed an Alaskan brown bear with an arrow. He plans to hunt grizzly again later this fall in the nation's 49th state. Meanwhile his quarry is an Idaho bighorn ram with a three-quarter curl of the horns or better, the most wanted trophy of them all.



Archery is rapidly gaining in popularity in Idaho and it is now estimated that 1,500 archers head for the mountains with bow and arrow each fall. Archers do not take a high percentage of game as the hunting is so difficult, but they take pride in stalk-ing their animal and enjoy hunting under somewhat primitive conditions. Mrs. O. J. Historically, archers took their chances with gun hunting. In September of 1945, when the first special Idaho hunt for women was established. Although the deer tags were \$10 each, 25 archers showed up to try their luck. Today there are archery seasons for the mountain goat and extending almost continuously from Sept. 3 through Dec. 31.

Everybody knows that the archer must be an exceptionally skilled hunter to bag his quarry. Must have the ability to move as a shadow through the brush and must be able to come within range of his weapon to even get a shot.

But these are qualities every hunter should develop whether bowman, rifleman or scattergunner. All animals should be shot carefully as the archer. This would result in more kills for all. The closer the target, the closer the kill. This should be a basic requirement of all hunters, not just archers.

The record shows that most bowmen miss their targets be-cause of a lack of concentration and a good case of nerves. Most bowmen miss their targets be-cause of a lack of knowl-edge of their weapons. Which is worse?

Archers hunt in common with all good hunters the basic precept of making sure of the target—and what lies on beyond the target—and their safety records show the results. Although the archer may hunt in any general Idaho big game season if he has a valid license an appropriate tag, it is true that he also has special seasons on most animals. Sometimes special areas are de-clared, but not special pri-vileges.

Special archery seasons and areas are prescribed by the fish and game commission to ensure the safety and success of the hunt. These conditions must

exist. If all archery areas and seasons were opened at the same time to gunmen, bowmen and a method of taking game would suffer, perhaps fatally. For the principle of the "fair" bow-hunting is simple. Fire one-gun and the hunter's difficulty in-creases tenfold. For at the sound of the first shot, the animal is spooked.

Likewise, mixing bowmen and shotgunners invites disaster. One must see the target before draw-ing that string. There is no such thing as a "sound shot" with a bow and arrow. And there is no wandering away at deer-like ob-jects even though the range or terrain is restrictive to the point of obscurity.

American history is replete with eloquent words about the right to bear arms and its im-portance to national security. It minimizes through omission the importance of the bow. Never-theless, both British and Ameri-can commanding reports disclose

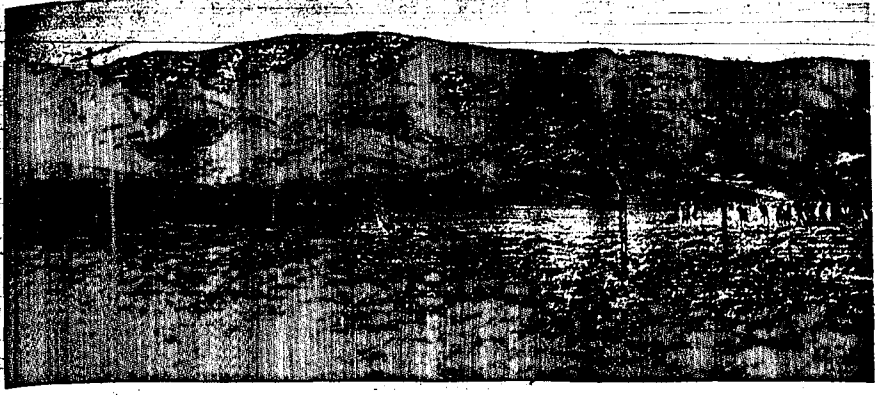

Idaho's Pronghorn Antelope Is High On 'Most Wanted' List of Big Animals

High among Idaho's ten "most wanted" big game animals is the pronghorn-antelope, the "wild" animal that sees far more of Indian man. The flowing grace and beauty of the antelope as it gallops erect from a resting place to speed across the sage-covered foothills and plains is one of Idaho's most thrilling sights. Because of its high rank as game animal and the difficulty of maintaining antelope in large numbers, extended management studies have been directed at antelope problems during the past several years.

The game management workers want to know what is happening to the pronghorn, why some herds receiving heavy hunting pressure maintain their numbers at a high level while other herds can stand but little hunting.

Game biologist Errol Nielson says nobody has the answers to this and other questions — so he decided to ask the antelope.

One factor in determining herd trends is fawn production. Since there was no birth register in this phase of the project started from scratch during the spring of 1956, Nielson says it is a scrubbing but challenging task to go into the middle of a 50,000 acre sage flat and wander "Where are the antelope-fawns?"

He also was impressed with the value of miltlets, "earmuffs" and long handles for summer-time early morning work in some of the high-desert country on the Pahsimero.

That first year, three main pronghorn ranges were studied intensively. These were the upper-Batholomew, the ABC and

Chama national wildlife refuge. The next two years, the latter areas were eliminated—and the upper Little Lost was substituted.

Generalizations based on this study stress the best time to make the summer count is late August, ahead of the annual hunt; but after the heavy summer loss. Fawns are hard to see during early June and July because they often weigh no more than five pounds and stay hidden most of the time except when nursing. Observability increases rapidly until late July when the most fawns are seen. Then the numbers decline with a slight — and surprising — increase in late August.

Nielson explains the paradox this way:

"There is an increase in observability of fawns all summer, but the rate of increase declines as the summer progresses. Also there is a loss of fawns during the entire summer which, at one point, is even greater than the increase in observability. The apparent high fawn ratio in late July, but the actual high for the summer undoubtedly is just after the fawning season."

Just how high is the doe-fawn ratio in the study areas? Fifty-six post mortem examinations on winter-killed does found 55 that were carrying twins and the other a single fawn. This is good production indeed, but does not mean very much near 200 fawns per 100 does since the yearling doe is a non-breeder. It shows that fawn mortality or number born is not the main problem. These are important, but herd trends rest on survivability—the number of fawns alive at the end of the summer.

Summer-fawn counts developed

been faced at speeds up to 70 miles per hour for short distances, second only to the cheetah. But infant fawns—the celebrated fleetness of the species does not develop until they are two or three days old. Hiding provides safety—but they must nurse, and the mamas breast them. More than 100 fawns have been tagged over the past three years and, when tagged, their ages can be learned exactly from serial numbers.

If the low loss of tagged fawns are made available to game biologists during controlled hunts to come, more scientific standards for determining the ages of untagged antelope of unknown maturity can be established over a period of time.

Most of the state's 8,000 antelope today are found on the headwaters of the Big and Little Lost rivers, the Lemhi and Pahsimero drainages, and along Birch and Crooked creeks, and from the latitude of Arco and blind lake in Butte and Jefferson counties north to Salmon. Some also are found in southwestern Idaho in Owyhee county and in the Hart river country of southern Idaho.

The outlook for Idaho pronghorns is a mixture of good and bad. No quality or basic production is good. It appears that most every adult doe has twins each spring. But by the end of the summer in some years, nearly half of them are dead.

Nielson puts it this way: "There appears to be a wide variation in total reproduction success from year to year and place to place—sometimes so extreme as to be alarming. Is it due to predators? he asks, "or to cold stormy weather during fawning season? Or accidents? Maintenance? A combination of these? Or none of them?" Nutritional deficiencies seem to be basic, according to study results to date.

Idaho's pronghorn antelope is the only game animal that has no relatives in any other country in the world. Moose, elk and

weather—but strangely enough, weather-of-opposite-kinds. First a long dry spell. Starting around 1916, southern Idaho experienced its longest and driest periods. Streams dried up—springs stopped flowing—and the grass stopped growing because water dried in the spring. By the early 20's, many marginal farms had folded and thousands of acres of formerly good range were down to the bare soil.

"Then, with what could be considered the supreme irony of nature, several severe winters dropped deep mantles of snow. Temperatures ranged unusually low during these periods and antelope experienced heavy losses along with other wildlife and livestock.

"Things started looking better for the antelope shortly after the mid-20's. Ranges started to recover and, in some cases, old ranges became available to antelope as abandoned dry farms went back to nature . . .

While no one believes that the American west will ever again will roam the plains by the millions, neither will the buffalo. The former ranges of both species have been altered, their

Gun's Safety Rules Listed

Hunters again are urged this year to follow the 10 commandments of gun safety during the big game and bird hunting seasons.

The 10 commandments of gun safety are:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
2. Guns carried into camp or home, or placed in a vehicle, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded.
3. Never aim at a person.
4. Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to kill.
7. Unattended guns should be left unloaded.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun.
9. Never shoot a bullet at a dog, hand surface or on the surface of water.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or while hunting.

movements restricted, their herds reduced to remnants of their former abundance.

Nevertheless, permit hunters will continue to stalk antelope in Idaho because of their beauty, grace, speed, uncanny eyesight, often fatal curiosity, and because they make one of the most attractive head mounts of all big game trophies. After a century of settlement by the white man, the antelope still is present in huntable numbers here in Idaho. Game management will keep it that way.

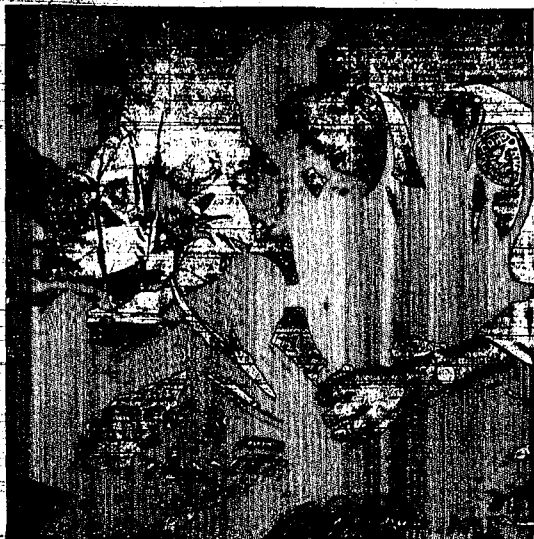

South Hills Deer Hunt to Be Only Three Days This Year

Les Trout, Idaho fish and game department game biologist and the man who keeps a sharp eye on the Cassia deer herd throughout the year, recently gave the Times-News an idea on what the deer hunting will be like in the south hills, and he also threw in some pointers on where to hunt.

The hunting game management unit No. 54, which stretches from Highway 93 to Oakley, will be a three-day season this year, from Oct. 21-23. The season was shortened from a five-day season, which it has been for several years, in an effort to lessen hunting pressure.

The size of the herd has remained stable, but Trout points out that it is desirable to keep the hunting pressure from getting too heavy. The winter population of the herd is about 7,500.

Trout says the deer herd suffered no winter loss last winter and, in spite of loss of winter range because of range fires this summer, range conditions for the deer herd still look good going into the winter season.

Trout says it is estimated that the deer harvest this year will be about the same as in the past 150 years. He estimates

about 2,500 deer will be taken. In 1960 an estimated 6,000 hunters took about 2,700 deer. In 1959 an estimated 5,000 hunters took about 2,500 deer; in 1958 (a special hunt), 2,000 permits were issued and an estimated 1,100 deer were taken. This includes unit No. 47.

Trout believes the number of hunters will drop off or at least level this year, mostly because of the shorter season. This is the best, he says, because it would be good to lessen the hunting pressure on the area.

Trout points out that it would benefit hunter and deer herd alike if the hunter pressure would be altered. For the past two years the hunter pressure has been the greatest in the northern part of the unit, that portion that lies north of the road from Oakley to Roseburg.

He says this is not desirable because the deer population in the southern part can better absorb the increased pressure. Trout is hoping some hunter pressure will be switched to the southern area.

The area southwest of Goose creek reservoir can stand a slight increase in hunter pressure, particularly the area in the Coal

Five Different Classes Of Big Game Tags Used

Five different classes of big game tags for fall hunting seasons have been made by the thousands to license vendors around the state, the Idaho fish and game department reports.

Director Ross Leonard indicated the volume by disclosing that last year vendors ordered 228,500 big game tags for a total value of \$285,000. Of this amount, \$248,945 in tags of all kinds was sold in 1960.

Leonard expects the 1961 hunting season to be equally good or better. These tags are those sold for general deer and elk hunting as well as the special or "multiple" deer hunts. They are called the "extra" deer tag, the "middle fork" tag, and the "Hells canyon" tag, and permit a hunter to take not more than four deer as follows:

1. Regular deer tag is used to take one deer in any general season deer area.
2. Extra deer tag is used to take one deer in any one of management units 42, 75, 76, or 78, or in that portion of the Deer field refuge which is open to deer archery hunting. A person may purchase only one "extra" deer tag.
3. Middle fork tag is used to take one deer in unit 26, or west of the Middle fork of the Salmon river in unit 27, or in the part of the primitive area which lies east or south of the Middle fork of the Salmon river in unit 27. A person may buy only one "Middle fork" tag.
4. Hells canyon tag is used to take one deer in unit 22 or unit 13 or in that portion of unit 18 in the Snake river drainage.

BOWMEN WARNED Each archer must have a valid hunting license and also obtain a proper tag. It is unlawful for any archer to carry a firearm in the archery area or any device propelling an arrow. The use of a crossbow by means of an explosive charge is unlawful.

Boundaries for 4 Deer Hunt Areas in South Idaho Listed

There are four deer hunt areas in southeastern Idaho which should be of particular interest to hunters in Magic Valley. They are management unit numbers 40, 47, 54 and 55. The season in unit No. 46 opens Oct. 21 and runs through Nov. 5. Specifically, the boundaries of this area are, beginning at the Snake highway 51 bridge on the Snake river, then up the Snake river to the U. S. highway 30 bridge across the Snake river, para Sagreros, then south and east along highway 30 to U. S. highway 83, then south along highway 83 to Rogerson. From Rogerson the boundary continues westerly along the Rogerson-Three Creek-Murphy Hot Springs road to the Idaho state line, then west along the state line to highway 31, then northerly along highway 31 to the Snake river, the point of beginning. 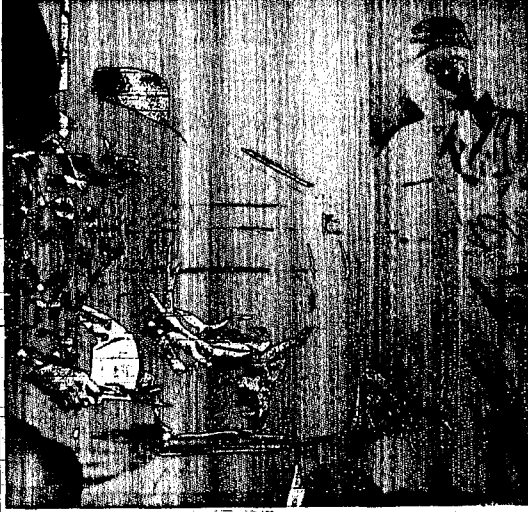

2 Open Deer Hunt Units Are In Gooding-Fairfield Areas

There are two general deer hunt areas in the Gooding-Fairfield areas. They are units 43 and 44. Unit No. 44 is a controlled deer hunt area. Season in unit 43 is from Oct. 21 through Nov. 12. This unit is within the following described boundary: Beginning at Anderson Ranch dam, then up the South fork of the Boise river to the Boulder mountain game preserve boundary, then northerly along the game preserve boundary to Elaine-Camas county line, then south along the line to Dollarhide-Little Smoky creek road. From this point the boundary extends westerly along the road to the Five-Points Creek-Couch summit road, then south along this road to Couch summit, then westerly along the water-erased divide between the South fork of the Boise river and Camas creek to the Corral creek-Chimney creek divide. From this point the boundary runs southerly along the divide to state highway 88 near Corral, then westerly along the highway to Dixie, then northerly along

the Anderson Ranch dam road to the point of beginning. Unit 45 boundary begins at Dixie, then easterly along state highway 88 to the junction with state highway 46, then south on highway 46 to U.S. highway 26 at Gooding. From Gooding the boundary runs westerly on highway 26 to Bliss, then down old highway 38 to junction of river road at bottom of hill, then on dirt road to Snake river at Bliss bridge, then down Snake river to state highway 81, then northerly along state highway 81 to Dixie, point of beginning. Season in this area is Oct. 21 to Oct. 31.

Some Preserves Open for Birds

The following game preserves are open to hunting of upland game birds during the open season—closed for the county or counties in which they are located. Soldier Mountain game preserve in Camas and Elmore counties. Minidoka forest: state bird sanctuary in Twin Falls, Cassia, and Power counties.

Reduction in 2-Deer Hunt Areas Noted

BOISE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Reductions in the area in which hunters may kill two deer will be effective for the fall hunting season, the Idaho fish and game department reports.

For several seasons killing of two deer has been permitted in much of the Salmon river's Middle fork drainage, the department said. This year the area is being reduced, the department said.

"Two deer may be taken in unit 36, Big Lost; in unit 27, west of the Middle fork of the Salmon; or in that part of the primitive area which lies east or south of the Middle fork in unit 27."

The two-deer in unit 27 and unit 36 both open in this region Sept. 24 continuing until Nov. 30.

CHECK LICENSE
Before leaving home, hunters should double-check to make sure they have in their possession a license, duck stamp or big game tag. These items must be carried on the person at all times while in the field. A hunting license, at home will not satisfy an inquiring conservation officer.

Feathers, head or feet of upland game birds must be in possession of the hunter in the field or in transit to final place of consumption. This is to provide evidence of sex or species.

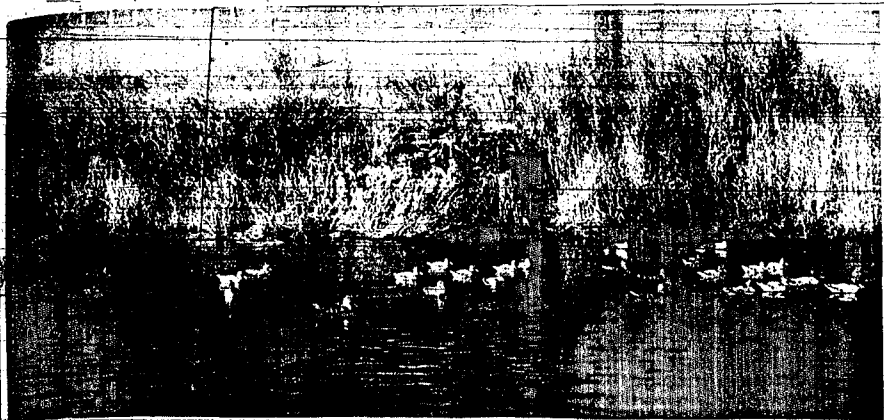

Southern Idaho's Fields, Streams Provide Excellent Water fowl, Upland Bird Hunting

Idaho's Migratory Waterfowl Season Shorter, but Regulations Are Liberal

Idaho's migratory waterfowl season will be 15 days shorter this year from last year but hunting regulations on the Pacific flyway remain more liberal than in the country's other three flyways.

This year's season has been set from Oct. 14 (noon) to and including Dec. 27.

The reduction in number of days coupled with sharply reduced bag limits in other parts of the country, was taken when surveys in Canada showed extensive loss of nesting habitat as a result of water shortage.

The Pacific flyway regulations remain more liberal because waterfowl breeding areas which support birds for this area have been less affected by the recent drought cycle.

On the bright side, Idaho hunters will retain their former bag limits of five ducks per day, plus a bonus of two mallards a day in specified counties which form a part of the Columbia.

Winter duck counts have shown a major increase of mallards in the upper Columbia basin sector of Idaho, Washington and Oregon in recent years. Crop depression problems have mounted in direct proportion. The additional mallard bag is allowed in this specific area in order to reduce the potentials for more severe depression on farm crops and for heavy winter duck loss.

Three Canadian geese may be taken each day during the same 75-day season with the exception of Bear Lake, Caribou and Bonanza counties and that portion of Blackfoot reservoir lying within Blaine county where the daily bag and possession limit will be two Canada geese.

The half hour before sunrise shooting start has been retained for Idaho this year with the exception of opening day when shotgunners must wait until noon.

The Idaho fish and game department says that a few minor changes have been made in hunting regulations and methods, but in general they closely follow those of last season.

Pheasant Hens May Be Shot In Some Counties This Fall

The reasons why Idaho's upland bird hunters this fall may take hen pheasants near the end of the season in 22 of the state's 44 counties are explained by the fish and game department.

Director Ross Leonard said increased commission action increased the amount of limited hen hunting available to hunters over last year because an analysis of field data and hunter questionnaire results indicated that:

1. This year's pheasant brood stock was about the same as last year despite the hen shooting.
2. Hunting pressure and hen harvest during last year's two-day hen hunt were both low.
3. Last year's final week-end hen-in-the-bag hunt brought the average bag up to nearly one bird per hunter for the last week end as compared to less than half a pheasant per hunter if legal hen hunting had not been permitted.
4. Hunter questionnaires indicated that only one hen was taken for each 20 cocks bagged in the state last year.
5. Through limited hen hunting, the 1961 pheasant hunter harvest for a portion of the high natural loss which occurs every year.

Leonard said that printed regulations covering new upland game bird seasons and bag limits will be in the hands of license vendors before the season opens in October.

Briefly, seasons begin at noon on the opening day for pheasants, Hungarian partridge and quail, except in the five northern Panhandle counties. Noon opening does not apply on any of the grouse seasons.

An official of the company notes that through the combined use of a quail call and hawk call, the odds for a full limit with less wasted shots are appreciably improved.

Pheasants

Pheasant seasons and bag limits for the Magic Valley, south-western and eastern Idaho areas are as follows:

Southwestern Idaho (Ada, Adams, Boise, Canyon, Elmore, Gem, Owyhee, Payette, Valley and Washington counties) — Oct. 28 (noon) to Nov. 26. Daily bag limit—four cocks, except Nov. 18-23 only when the bag limit shall be four pheasants, one of which may be a hen. Possession limit—eight cocks, except Nov. 18-23 only when possession limit shall be eight pheasants, two of which may be hens.

Magic Valley (Blaine, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties) — Oct. 28 (noon) to Nov. 26. Daily bag limit—four cocks, except Nov. 23-28 only when bag limit shall be four pheasants, one of which may be a hen. Possession limit—eight cocks, except Nov. 24-28 only when possession limit shall be eight pheasants, two of which may be hens.

Interesting Use Of Hawk Caller On Quail Noted

An interesting new application for the hawk call has recently been announced by a Pekin, Ill. firm. This hawk call has proved invaluable to quail hunters across the country who have been plagued in the past by scarry coveys of quail.

Field reports show that when a hunter's dog goes down on a point-indicating quail in the area, several blasts from a hawk call will freeze the covey allowing the hunter to get closer before the birds flush. This has proved to be true even later in the season after they have been pursued by other hunters. One report indicated that the hunter was practically able to drop on the quail before they flushed.

An official of the company notes that through the combined use of a quail call and hawk call, the odds for a full limit with less wasted shots are appreciably improved.

1. To hunt or take game, or carry an uncased rifle or shotgun in the fields and forests without a valid hunting license.
 2. To hunt, pursue, or kill big game animals, without having in possession a valid tag and kill report card.
 3. To hunt upon private lands without first getting permission.
 4. To shoot from or across a public highway.
 5. To shoot at any game animal from a mechanically powered vehicle or boat, or capture or kill big game with pitfalls, traps, snares, or at any deer lick.
 6. To take, capture, or kill big game from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise.
 7. To hunt or kill any game with the aid of artificial light.
 8. To maliciously waste any game or fish.
 9. To hunt game animals (except rabbits) with a firearm using 22 rimfire cartridges.
 10. To hunt big game (except bear) with the use of dogs.

Idaho Hunting Is Good, but Tall Tale Telling Adds Zest

(Continued from Page 21) than to hear either a woman or the hunters got his own bow and the three noble beasts of the forest as far as anyone knows. On the mountain side he explained that there are right handed bows and left handed bows and also bows of different weights so that unless you have your own weapon you are out of luck.

The bow and arrow hunters claim that theirs is the real sport of hunting since you must be a good enough hunter to get your birds or your game before you shoot. Paul Ramlow, Rex Watson and Jack Simpson have each got an elk so far this season.

Since one of the hard tasks of hunting is getting big game out of the mountains after it is shot, a hunter is considered to have lucked out if he doesn't have to take horses and go in after his game. Anderson, head of the Sun Valley sports department, a few years ago sighted deer near Trail creek cabin on the opening morning of the season. The deer was on the hill above the road and when Anderson brought it down, he was on one of the cables scrambling down the hill and landed, not only near his station wagon, but right by the tall gate post.

Last year, Bill Adams had the good luck to spot and shoot his elk running along the road, by the north fork where just five miles from Sun Valley, Ames hastens to amend this tale of luck. He had spent a solid week tramping unaccounted miles up and down the mountains before he saw "Mr. Elk."

We can't quite remember whose young son was involved in this tale but two Ketchum lads had made great preparations to get an early start on a day hunt. When their mother heard them in the kitchen at 7 a. m., she thought they had overslept.

When she entered the room one of them groaned, "We didn't even get out of town." They had each killed a deer but beyond the outskirts of Ketchum and their day of hunting was over.

One reason for the increase in the big game population here is the region surrounding Sun Valley is the decrease in the number of sheep raised in the area. Accordingly to sheepman Jack Lane, in the years when there were three times as many sheep shipped each year from Ketchum as now, the Middle fork country was about the only place where a hunter could be sure of getting a deer or elk.

Just a few of the housewives of Ketchum wish this were so now. These wives, who don't like to see game or cook game, will point out that it is one of the world's greatest fallacies to think that getting an elk or deer in the deep forest is an inexpensive way to stock the larder.

First there is always the necessity of a new gun, fancy scope, especially made bow or some other piece of fancy equipment. Then there is the cost of travel, the cost of the damage done to the family car in rough country, hiring horses and trailers and of course the "trifling" (if necessary when the man of the house takes to the woods with the boys) but one of the most necessary items is the cost of the gas to get to the woods.

This would have earned two great hunters—Bert Hensley and Sun Valley's chief guide Taylor Williams, who scorned anyone who didn't enjoy game for its own distinctive flavor. Nothing upset them more

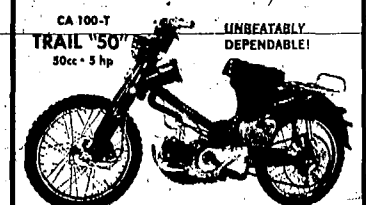
